## 26th Salado Art Fair coming real soon

The 26th Annual Salado Art Fair is coming soon. Real soon, Aug. 1-2. The gates will open to Pace Park 9 a.m. Aug. 1 and 10 a.m., Aug 2. and close at 5 p.m. each day. Admission to the fair is \$3 for Adults and children age 12 and under are admitted free.

This year promises to be exceptional with over 200 master artisans and creators of beauty displaying their wares. Visitors will find paintings in many styles and media, jewelry, glass, pottery, woodcrafts, clothing, toys and much more. Free programs will be available at the gate so no one will miss a thing.

For your comfort and convenience free parking, bus transportation, hand-cap parking and a hospitality tent is provided, with a variety of reasonably priced food and drinks. For a really refreshing break Salado Creek awaits your bare feet. This spring-fed creek runs the length of Pace Park with plenty of room for everyone.

Aug. 1 at 7 p.m. Salado's Tablerock Amphitheatre will host a dinner theatre. The melodrama **The Golden Fleecing** will allow you to boo the villain and cheer the heroes as you enjoy "All You Can Eat" fajitas for \$10 adults and \$5 for children.

Richard Cohen a PhD Clinical Microbiologist, self-taught in the skills and art of metal sculpture, glass work and kaleidoscope making will display his creations at the Art Fair.

Since 1974 when he began working in metal, he has developed a unique style through experimentation and refinement.

Working primarily in solid brass and copper and stained and fused glass, he creates table ornaments, jewelry and wall pieces. His artfully designed kaleidoscopes are one-of-a-

kind handcrafted pieces with copper or glass bodies combined with imaginative viewing objects of stained glass, seashells, and other colorful materials. They are prized by collectors and first-time kaleidoscope buyers.

Cohen does not produce in volume, as he continues to hand craft each piece individually with attention to the production of quality artwork.

He has created numerous custom pieces for private collectors and his work is shown in select galleries in the Dallas/Fort Worth area and Salado.

The Salado Chamber of Commerce invites you to the village of Salado to participate in this day of art in the park, to visit the historical sights, dip your toes in the creek and take advantage of the ambiance of the village.

Proceeds from the Art Fair fund scholarships, provide upkeep for Pace Park, pay for the street lights and support various community projects.

**Kuffs** is a stupid movie.

Christian Slater (**Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves, Mobsters**) stars as George Kuffs, a young man without an inkling of responsibility forced into a situation where he is responsible for the lives of many.

His older brother is killed in the line of duty as a patrol special. George takes over his brothers business as a patrol special against the wishes of everyone. Bucking the system, he pursues his brothers killer etc., etc.

Viewers get an hour and a half of Christian Slater being shot at, beaten up and making wisecracks. Slater is a pretty good actor, though you won't see any evidence of this from this dog, **Kuffs**.

It has been well over half a year since the courts decreed that the County Education Districts were

unconstitutional while at the same time allowing them to remain in place for another year, so as to not "upset the proper operation of the school systems in Texas." Shortly after the court's opinion reached the street, Governor Ann Richards allowed as how she would call a special session of the Legislature to cure the money collection problem as well as to tag the entity that would cough up the extra dough needed to operate the system. Some tax source other than the rank and file voter - it being an election year, don't you know?

Along came Guv Ann's announcement for a May session that would ask House and Senate members to ponder a plan that would collect a statewide tax on business and commercial activities; pile it up in Austin and then divvy it among the 1000 plus school systems on some sort of "equalized" formula. Schools would continue to tax home-

steads and agriculture land as before - thus bringing about, according to the Governor, that often sought for but never found - Day of Jubilee for all taxpayers. Namely that their monies will be collected and distributed efficiently and equally!

We predicted at that time the Governor was biting off a big chew and despite her sharp tongue and biting sense of humor would have trouble selling this to the multitude of lawmaking special interest worthies. As a matter of fact - May has now come and gone and still no special session. No approved plan for equalization either at the intake or outlet levels. And since we are only six months from the next regular session and less than four months from election day - we anticipate there will be no special session at all thus throwing the Brer Rabbit tax problem smack in the middle of the Legislative Briar Patch!

It is also easy to crystal-ball that the next session will produce another massive tax increase for not only education but all the

If any descendants or relatives of a Mr. & Mrs. Fox, and Mr. Louis Poteet are living in the Salado area, I hope they will read this letter.

In 1929 while living with my parents near Whitney, I hitch-hiked to Belton, Texas, went to a cotton gin in Belton and got a job picking cotton for a Mr. Fox. I was 15 years of age at that time. Mr. Fox was at the gin with a bale of cotton at this time. I picked cotton for Mr. and Mrs. Fox for two weeks but had to quit when my school started.

I don't remember his first name or initials but they lived some three or four miles north of Salado near Salado Creek. They had a daughter who was a little older than myself who was recovering from an illness that effected her ability to walk. She was taking therapy to learn to walk at the time.

The Fox's told me about a church a mile or two from their home on the creek. I believe it was a Methodist Church. I visited this

church on Sunday and Mr. Louis Poteet was the Sunday school superintendent.

My wife and I have been living in Waco for more than 40 years and we average going to the Stagecoach Inn to eat about once per month. Each time we go to Salado I think about the Fox's and Mr. Poteet. That has been a long time ago but if you are a descendant or relative of any of these fine people please let me hear from you. I would like to know what happen to them and if the church is still standing.

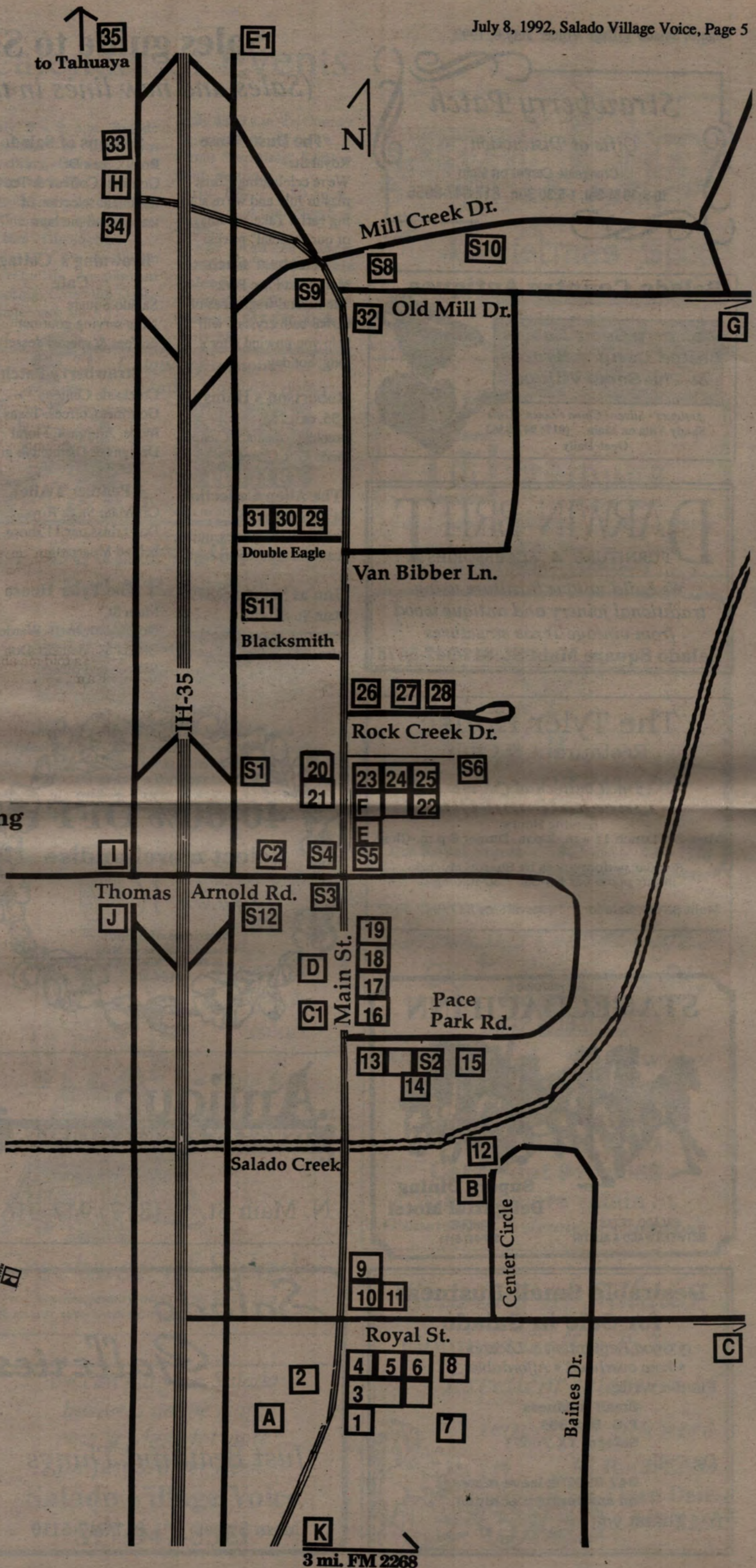

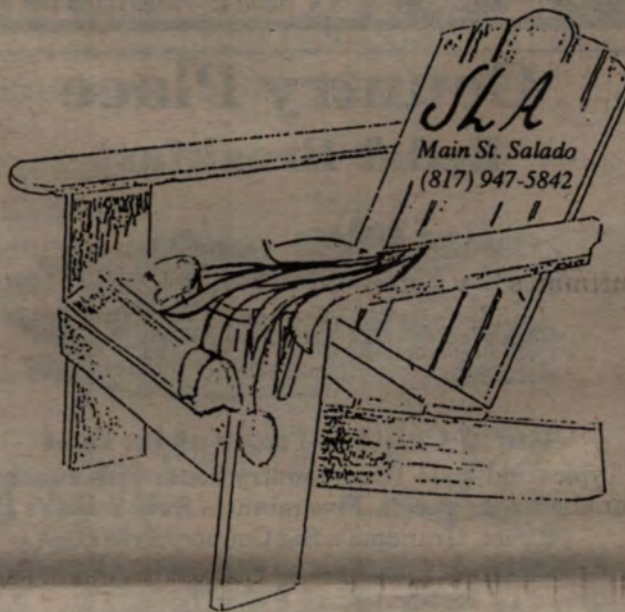

## Oak wilt disease killing trees in Central Texas

We are being flooded with calls at the County Extension Office about oak trees dying. In many cases it is the dreaded oak wilt that is killing the Texas Oak and the Live Oak trees.

Oak wilt is potentially one of the most destructive tree diseases in the United States. Oak wilt was first identified in the United States over 40 years ago and is now known to occur in 22 states. In central Texas, the disease was more recently diagnosed in 36 counties including Bell County. All oaks are susceptible to some degree, but some species are more resistant than others. Texas red oaks, particularly Spanish and black-jack oaks are extremely susceptible and play a unique role in fungal transmission over long distances. The live oaks are not only susceptible but are more seriously affected because they tend to grow in large, dense groups with interconnected roots. This common root system facilitates rapid fungal spread following infection of a single tree. Post oak, a common white oak in central Texas, is more resistant to the fungus and rarely dies

from oak wilt. The successful management of oak wilt depends on diagnosis and an understanding of how the pathogen spreads in these different oak species.

The leaves on diseased live oaks often develop chlorotic (yellow) veins

that eventually turn necrotic (brown), a symptom called veinal necrosis. Defoliation may be rapid, and dead leaves with brown veins can often be found for months under the tree. Leaves may exhibit other patterns of chlorosis and necrosis, such as marginal scorch or tip burn, but these symptoms are less reliable than veinal necrosis for diagnosing oak wilt.

Foliar symptoms of oak wilt on Spanish or black-jack oaks are less distinct. In early spring, the young leaves simply wilt, turning pale green and brown. More mature leaves show water soaking or turn pale green or bronze starting at leaf margins and progressing inward.

Following infection of a live oak, the fungus is transmitted to adjacent trees through connected roots. This is the only

proven means of transmission for the fungus for one live oak to the next. As a result, a patch of dead and dying trees if formed, sometimes expanding at a rate of up to 75 ft. per year. Following initial appearance of symptoms, most live oaks defoliate and die over a 3-6 month period. Some live oaks may survive for up to a year, and a few untreated trees even outlive the fungus, surviving many years in various states of decline.

Unlike live oaks, Spanish and blackjack oaks never survive oak wilt and may die in 3-4 following the initial appearance of symptoms. Sporadic long distance transmission of the fungus is possible when insects feed on fungal mats on diseased red

oaks and then visits wounds on other oak trees. Plant sap formed on the surface of pruning cuts or wounds attracts beetles. During feeding, spores are dislodged on the wound surface where infections can occur. To prevent this, prune only damaged or hazardous limbs. If pruning is necessary, the best times are Jan. 1-Feb. 15 or during July, Aug. and Sept.

There are asphalt or latex based pruning paints that are used to paint wounds or pruning cuts. A protective barrier is formed between the cut or wound surface and fungus-carrying beetles when paints are applied immedi-

ately (within minutes) after wounding.

A chemical (Alamo) is available for oak wilt prevention. The chemical has to be injected into the tree with a special system. Alamo has proved to be very helpful in stopping the spread of oak wilt.

The keys to oak wilt prevention are early detection and stopping the spread through chemical and mechanical methods.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or handicap.
