## 500 volunteers make Art Fair successful

"We ran out of one dollar bills at noon on Saturday and had to make a raid on community stores. Thank heavens Dale Kehn manager of IGA, could furnish us with more change on Sunday morning."

Artist Ken Cargle came to the Art Fair information booth to thank the volunteers for a well run show. "I'm selling \$1,000 paintings! I haven't done this well at an Art Show in 8 years," he exclaimed. And

other artists had similar comments.

Late Saturday afternoon Mr. Cargle played hero to a little girl who lost her coin purse. The park loud speaker stopped the crowd as the 12 year old told of her loss. The young lady confided that her purse contained \$20..., all of the money I saved to spend at the fair. The wrist purse must have slipped off of my arm." Her heavy sigh and plea of "I just might cry if no one finds my lost purse" brought forth big hearts and white hats.

Cargle left paying customers waiting at his booth and hurried to the information desk to hand the tearful girl a \$20 bill. He told her "I want to share my good fortune. Here is \$20 to spend. I don't want your day at the

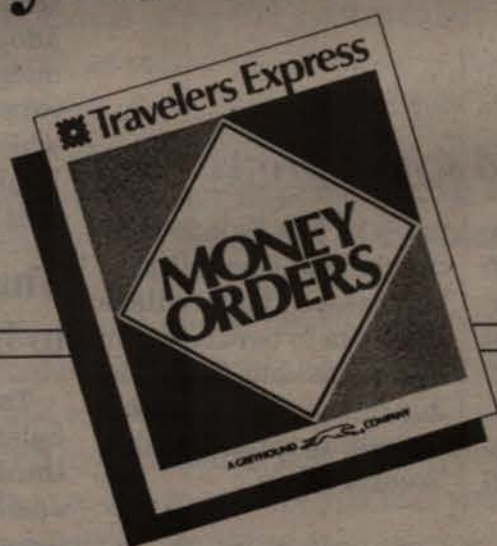

# Parents should help children through changes

Do you remember from your own childhood how frightening a new situation could be? New places, faces and events can be handled successfully when youngsters are self-confident and do not fear change.

Parents are the primary teachers who help prepare their children for new situations. Starting to school or kindergarten, a move to a new town, or learning to ride a bicycle for the first time can be an exciting time or a difficult experience.

Here are six guidelines you can use to prepare

children for change:

1. First examine your attitude about new situations. Apprehension can be contagious, but so can flexibility and enthusiasm for the uniqueness of new things, places and people. Be aware of the impressions you are teaching children through your words

and actions.

2. Respect individual differences of family members. Be sensitive to the needs and abilities of each child. Decide when to offer encouragement or assistance and when to let the child accomplish the task on his own.

3. Provide a rich variety

of successful learning experiences for your youngster. Children gain confidence and experience by doing things on their own. Praise for accomplishment is often a motivating force.

4. Empathize with your child. Try to understand

what your youngster thinks and feels about the situation. A change in routine or surroundings may mean adjustments. Talk with him and listen carefully to learn what the child is thinking and feeling. Also, be alert for changes in behavior that might indicate the child is worried, frightened or confused.

5. Prepare the child in advance for the change. Help youngsters know what to expect and how to act in different situations. Talk about the anticipated change. Play "what if" games to help the child think about various alternatives for new situations. If possible, provide first-hand experiences so the child will be better prepared for similar tasks or changes.

6. Talk about the change afterwards. A review of the situation helps children realize that first tries at new skills will not always be successful.

Children need to learn situations may not turn out as they would like. A review may help the child realize some tension is normal when you are doing something new and different.

## Pecans falling because stem end blight

We are getting a number of calls at the office about pecans falling. The pecan crop is very short anyway. If a lot of pecans drop during August, there sure will be a very short crop this year.

Most of the pecans we have examined have disease problems which are causing the nuts to fall. The most common problem is stem end blight.

Stem end blight is a disease caused by a fungus which attacks the nuts in the latter part of July and August.

Shucks turn black rapidly and drop soon after. Lesions are black, sunken and shiny. When infected nuts are cut open, the liquid in the kernal has turned brown. This can be controlled with foliar sprays of a fungicide applied when pecans begin to fill. Fungicides to use would be either benomyl, Orbit, DuTer or Topsin M. Apply according to label directions.

Another pecan problem we are seeing a lot of this year is scale. Any time the

humidity is high, a lot of rainfall and warm temperatures in the spring, scale will be a severe problem in pecans.

The fungus invades young rapidly growing shoots, leaves and later developing nuts. Severely infected nuts fall or fail to develop, which results in a total crop loss. Defoliation occurs during periods frequent rains and mild temperatures. These conditions are optimum for rapid development and spread of the scab fungus. Infection takes place when leaves or nut are covered with free moisture. The scab fungus overwinters in infected shoots, old shucks and leaf petioles. In the spring, when temperature and moisture conditions become favorable, the fungus begins to develop in lesions and within a few days produces spores. The spores are spread by wind and rain to newly developed leaves where they germinate and initiate new infections.

On nuts, scab lesions appear as small black dots which become sunken as they mature. Adjacent le-

sions on the nuts may coalesce, forming large sunken black lesions. When infection is severe, the entire nut surface is black, development is arrested and the nut drops prematurely or fails to grow in the infected area.

Pecan varieties vary in their susceptibility to the scab fungus. Among the highly susceptible varieties are Wichita, Cherokee, Western, Chickashaw and most western varieties. Choctaw, Kiowa, Cheyenne, Shawnee and Desirable varieties have varying degrees of resistance to the scab fungus.

Thorough coverage of leaf, nut and shoot surfaces with a fungicide must be maintained to prevent infections. Sanitation measures, such as removal of old shucks and

leaf petioles from around trees and plowing under fallen leaves and shucks, helps reduce infections. Pruning to open up the tree for better air circulation will help reduce scab occurrence. Avoid the use of close spacing in areas where extended periods of rainfall are common during the growing season.

The same fungicides as mentioned for stem end blight can be used to prevent scab.

Three certificates are issued upon successful completion, standard first aid, adult CPR, and infant and child CPR. The 12-

hour course will be given 6-10 p.m. Aug. 21 and 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Aug. 22. The cost is \$40.

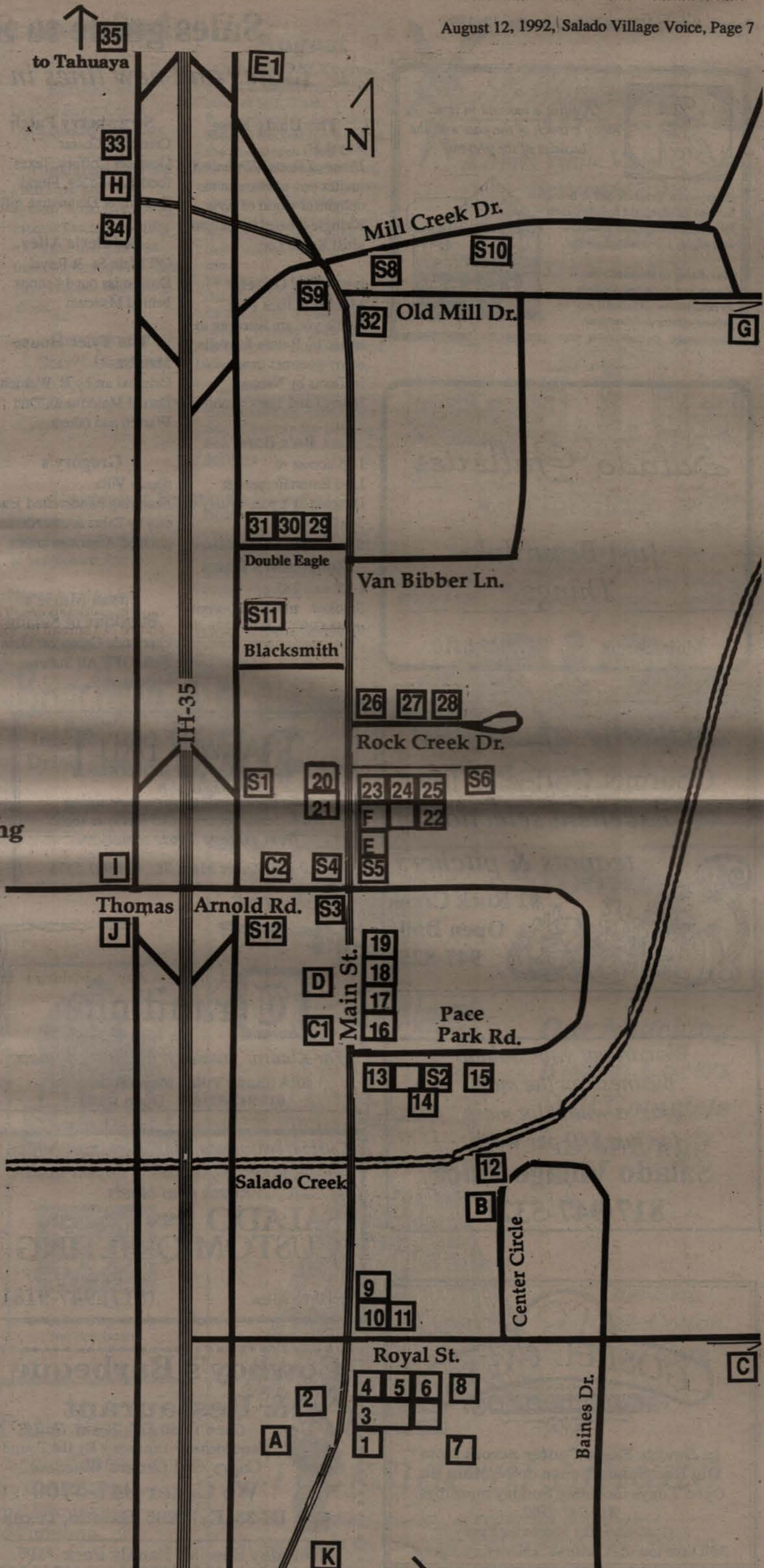

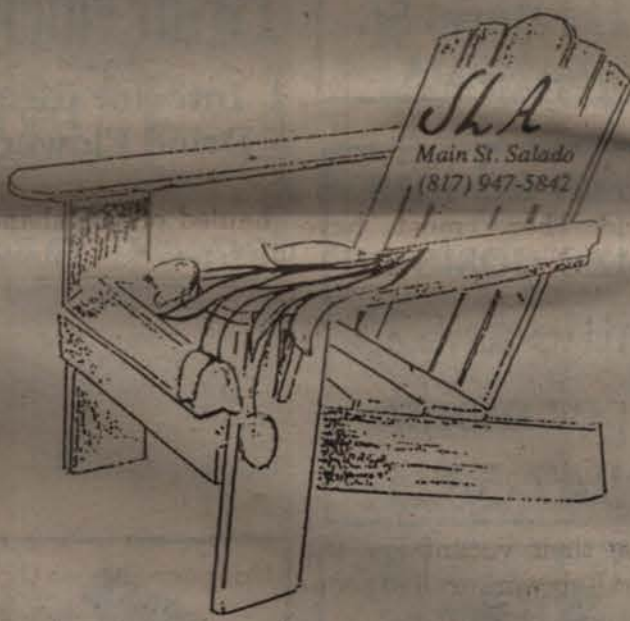

**Did You Know ?**  
 Congenital heart defects are a leading cause of infant mortality throughout the world. Deborah Heart and Lung Center in Browns Mills, New Jersey reaches out across the nation and the world to help children in need.



Through its Children of the World program, each year Deborah treats over 500 children from the United States and 100 foreign children for critical heart anomalies, at no cost to their families.

Deborah also undertook a humane medical mission to the former Soviet Republic of Georgia. The hospital transported a 44-member medical team and 15 tons of medical equipment and successfully operated on children who would have otherwise died.

Deborah's Children of the World program also provides training opportunities for medical personnel from other countries. Foreign doctors serve three-month rotations observing diagnostic, medical and surgical techniques and care at Deborah. They then return home to put into practice the new methods they have learned.

Deborah Heart and Lung Center is a specialty teaching hospital that concentrates on the diagnosis and treatment of heart, lung and vascular diseases in adults and acquired and congenital heart conditions in children.

**New books, materials goal of library, Mott's program**

New books and materials for local public libraries is the goal of a program being sponsored by Mott's U.S.A.

The "Mott's Library Program" enhances a five-year reading program by Mott's that has provided over 200,000 elementary school classrooms with literature and learning materials since 1988. "Mott's is a staunch supporter of the need of Americans to read," said Steve Wasik, a spokesperson for Mott's.

even some closings have affected libraries in communities nationwide.

"Budget cuts resulting from a sluggish economy and cutbacks in public funding are the worst since the 1970's and may be worse than during the Great Depression, when no libraries are known to have closed their doors," according to the American Library Association. Compounding this financial crisis for libraries is the rising-cost of books and materials. The average price of a hardcover book more than doubled from \$19 to \$40 between 1977 and 1990, and the average price of U.S. periodicals increased almost 400% during the same period.

In response, Mott's has offered the "Library Program" to over 10,000 public libraries nationwide via a mailing last April. "The response has been excellent," said Wasik of Mott's. "Participation is easy and the benefits are tremendous."

Libraries will receive special promotional materials, including a collection box, poster and book mark. Local retailers may also participate, and may receive an in-store banner and collection box.

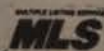

Despite Their Name, Pavement Ants Like Indoor Living

Dr. Richard Kramer

(NU) - If the pavement ant would only live up to its name and stay beneath the pavement, millions of homeowners would be far happier.

Unfortunately, pavement ants — slow-moving dark brown or black ants about an eighth of an inch long — are busy and aggressive seekers of food. They forge their way indoors, combing kitchen floors and cupboards for crumbs.

And once indoors, the ants are tempted to stay there, forsaking pavement life for the cozy year-round warmth beneath floors and inside partition walls. They're also nearer to a steady food supply.

The experts at the National Pest Control Association offer the following tips:

— Store food in airtight glass or plastic containers.

— Wipe up food spills immediately; keep counters, floors and cabinets clean.

— Vacuum frequently.

— Keep garbage cans tightly covered.

— Seal cracks and crevices, caulk openings around pipes, fixtures and cabinetry.

## A Message from the Volunteer Fire Department

Dear Neighbor,

It has been many years since your fire department has had to ask for help to purchase equipment. However, we are in need of rescue tools. One of these, called the Jaws of Life, is a set of extrication tools designed to remove injured persons from within or under vehicles or farm machinery with greater safety and efficiency.

With the recent arrival of the 911 system to our area, the time to get to the accident scene with trained personnel has resulted in tremendous reduction in response time. This has given a great boost to life saving efforts by your department. Unfortunately, the "Golden Hour" (the first 60 minutes after an accident during which the victim must be removed from the scene and taken to the hospital) leaves firefighters short this much-needed equipment. Currently, we must request this rescue system from our friends in Belton. On occasion, it is already in use by their department. This Jaws of Life system costs nearly \$11,000, which is about the amount of our yearly maintenance and operating fund.

We are having a fund-raiser, family barbecue, auction and dance Sept. 12 at Pace Park to give you the opportunity to see some of our existing equipment and to talk to the members of your department about what we do for the community and to give you a chance to help us.

None of us wish to be called to your home for any 911 need, but you have our sincere promise that if needed, we will do everything we can to protect you and your family and your property.

We express our thanks to those in this great community who have on a regular basis contributed to the department.

- Emergency medical aid
- Fire and safety education
- Fire and safety inspections
- Community project involvement
