## Trustees adopt \$4.4 million budget, set tax rate hearing for Sept. 9

Salado ISD Trustees set a public hearing on a proposed tax rate of \$1.2897 per \$100 evaluation for 7 p.m. Sept. 6 in the Salado Civic Center. The board voted to set the hearing after voting 6-0 Aug. 28 to adopt a \$4.4 million budget for the 1997-98 school year.

## Freshman legislator recalls 1st session in Texas House

Before addressing the Salado Lions Club on pressing matters of the day, State Rep. Suzanna Gratia Hupp revealed a bit of herself ... so to speak.

Hupp told the Lions during their Aug. 27 luncheon at Mill Creek Country Club that the photo of her on the front page of the Aug. 27 edition of the *Salado Village Voice* was taken a week before she deliv-

ered her son Alexander, who's now a year old.

On the way to the photo appointment, Hupp grabbed an outfit that turned out to be too small. Mother Nature would allow only so many buttons to be buttoned.

"What you don't know," Hupp told the Lions, "is just below this picture is this enormous bare belly, which they were able to crop out."

The birth of her son was fol-

lowed by her election to represent District 54, which includes roughly the southern half of Bell County and four counties to the west: McCulloch, San Saba, Mills and Lampasas.

The freshman legislator, a Republican from Kempner, noted that she, not Rep. Dianne White Delisi, represents Salado. Delisi, R-Temple, represents the other portion of Bell County, which leads to the

confusion.

There is no confusion, however, on Hupp's stance on an individual's right to carry a concealed weapon.

In 1991, after leaving her gun in her car, Hupp watched as her parents, along with 21 others, were gunned down in the mass shooting at a Killeen restaurant.

Hupp did not speak to the Lions about the shooting and

## Congressman Chet Edwards Staying In Touch



### TAX RELIEF AND BALANCED BUDGET ARE SIGNED, SEALED AND SOON TO BE DELIVERED TO CENTRAL TEXAS FAMILIES AND BUSINESSES

I am pleased to report that Congress has buckled down and passed into law two important bills that balance the budget by 2002, cut taxes, protect Medicare and provide funding for children's education and health care.

I was proud to support the bipartisan budget and tax relief package recently signed into law because it will do four primary things: balance the budget, reduce taxes for working families, extend the solvency of the Medicare Trust Fund and make a college education more affordable for all Americans.

The legislation will also help provide health insurance for millions of children whose parents are working but cannot afford insurance for their kids.

The package cuts federal spending by \$961 billion and reduces taxes by \$250 billion. Overall, the deficit is cut by over \$700 billion and the budget is balanced in four years.

This will be the first balanced budget in a generation and provide much needed tax breaks for working families, students and small businesses.

For example, working families making under \$110,000 annually will be eligible for a \$500 per child tax credit and the capital gains tax will be reduced for investments in businesses and the sale of homes.

The exemption on estate taxes on family-owned farms and businesses will be increased from \$600,000 to \$1.3 million beginning in 1998.

The estate tax, also known as the death tax, has ended the lives of many family-owned farms and businesses. Providing an exemption makes good sense and is something

I have pushed for more than two years.

Having that exemption in place will help keep Central Texas families on the farm, running the ranch or managing the family business.

For the elderly, the viability of the Medicare Trust Fund will be extended to 2007. In spite of spending reductions, options for Medicare recipients will be expanded with, for example, preventive care for breast and colon cancer.

Higher education will be made more accessible and affordable for working families with the introduction of \$1,500 HOPE scholarships. In addition, the plan provides a 20 percent tax credit for college juniors, seniors and graduate students.

This is not a perfect legislative package and it does not solve all of our long-term fiscal issues, but it reduces the deficit by \$700 billion over 10 years.

The tax relief and balanced budget package is the product of genuine bipartisan effort. The Congress and president did what the American people have been demanding — put aside politics and balance the budget in a fair and responsible manner.

My hope is that Congress will now pass a balanced budget amendment to the Constitution to insure that we will have a balanced budget not just for one year but for all future generations.

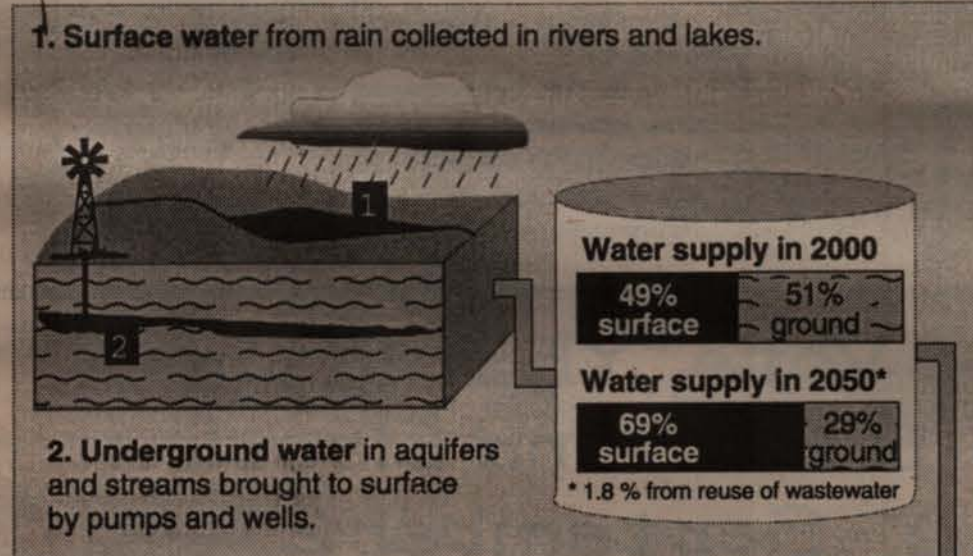

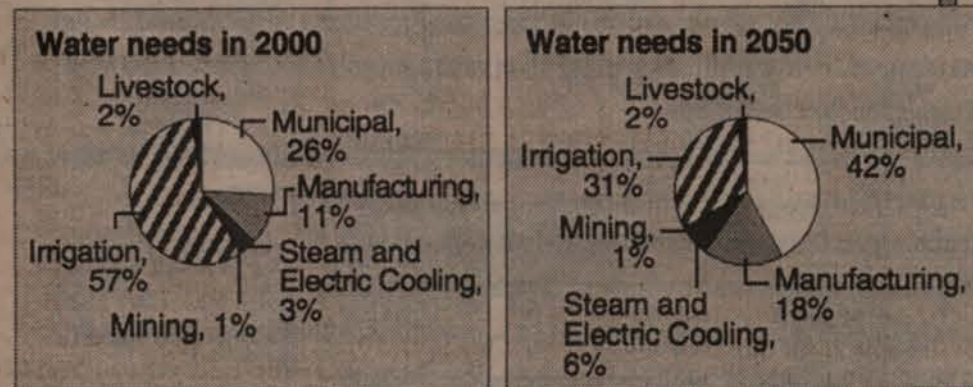
## Keeping an eye on Texas

### Water: supply and demand

**Supply:** Texas currently uses surface water—collected from lakes, rivers and streams—for about half of its water needs. As water in underground streams and aquifers is depleted, surface water is expected to supply almost 69% of all the states' water needs.



**Demand:** Texas' population is expected to double in the next 50 years. Water needed by cities, manufacturing and the electric power industry is expected to be two-thirds of all the state's water supply in 2050.

# Beef Cattle Short Course Talk given by A&M's Dr. Bill Mies

Last week we featured a talk Dr. Bill Mies, with the Animal Science Department at Texas A&M University, gave at the 1997 Beef Cattle Short Course. Dr. Mies told us in last week's article that quality is what sells in today's market. This week we will complete Dr. Mies talk.

Dr. Mies said, "Any industry that produces a consumer product that is made by producers in the industry who are intellectually or economically unconcerned about the quality of the product is doomed to failure. In the beef cattle industry, the argument for price and maximal production is done by ignoring the fact that the product has to be consumed by someone someday. This leads to indiscriminate use of genetics, overuse of implants, failure to provide information to other segments of the industry failing to use all available technology to insure quality post-harvest and adversarial relationships between industry

sectors. In other words the problem is short-term thinking.

Producers ask "When will someone pay me for investing in higher quality?" The producer expects this return on the first set of calves produced under the higher quality system. The answer is that most of the return may be in reversing the downward spiral and eventual failure of our entire industry. These are not doomsday predictions made to win an argument. Rather, this is an analysis of an industry that has been in decline for twenty plus years, and does not show any signs of healing itself."

"The producers with the most at risk are those who would like to leave a healthy beef industry to their children. The long term survival of the industry is dependent upon each segment of the industry understanding that the highest quality must be produced at the lowest price possible. This is the only philosophy that will allow the beef industry to survive into the next generation. Thus the answer to the Quality versus Price question is that

it must be both. We must deliver a high quality product at a competitive price in order to meet our consumers demands. I do not claim this is simple or easy. It will be difficult and it will take time and money. It will involve producers taking responsibility for the product they produce and recognizing the desires of the retail customer in their production program. It will require each producer to understand that he is not in the cattle business he is in the BEEF business."

The next time you buy a bull or keep heifers for replacement cows think about what Dr. Mies has said. Will that bull or heifer produce a quality product that you would like to put on your dinner plate tonight or will it produce a product that you wouldn't eat yourself but you are more than happy to sell and let someone else consume?

only touched briefly on handgun laws, noting that the Legislature "passed a good cleanup bill" on the Texas Concealed Handgun Law.

The passage of House Bill 2909 clarifies the current law through the establishment of uniform "posting" requirements for places that prohibit concealed carry. This legislation will also allow the Department of Public Safety to negotiate license "reciprocity" agreements with certain other states whose background check requirements meet or exceed those established in federal law for handgun purchases.

Two months removed from her first legislative session, Hupp gave the Lions an overview of some of the laws that will affect her constituents.

Among them was the approval for establishing an upper-level, public university in the Killeen area. "We are disgustingly proud of this," Hupp said.

Although the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board must give final approval on the

matter, Hupp said she believes the board won't go against the Senate and House, as well as Gov. George Bush, who signed the bill.

Hupp and other supporters of the bill argued that a public university in Central Texas would give residents the opportunity for a more affordable education.

Hupp also helped improve elections procedures for overseas soldiers from Texas. The law will allow absentee ballots cast by the soldiers, mailed on or before election day, to be counted if they are received by the fifth day following a general election or the second day after a primary or special election.

Hupp also worked to remove the liability which impeded the donation of much-needed firefighting equipment for use by volunteer fire departments.

She told of a fire department that, because of liability concerns, gutted a truck -- with only 2,300 miles on it -- and sold it for parts, instead of giving it to a volunteer fire department.

On the subject of property tax relief, the constitutional amendment proposed by the legislature -- and approved by voters Aug. 9 -- will increase the homestead exemption by \$10,000 and provide for the transfer of the tax limitation to another qualified homestead for persons over 65 and a reduction in taxes on homesteads subject to the limitation.

The amendment also increases the school property tax exemption on residence homesteads from \$5,000 to \$15,000. That will allow taxpayers an average savings of \$140 per year, Hupp said.

Hupp, a member of both the Corrections and Agriculture committees, also told the Lions about what she termed "unintentional consequences," concerning legislative bills.

As a member of the Corrections Committee, she was asked to consider a bill that would sentence to life anyone convicted of two sexual offenses.

Hupp was the only member of the committee to vote against the measure -- despite being warned that she would be considered soft on crime.

Hupp said she had no problem getting tough with sexual predators who prey on innocent children.

But she told the Lions of a case where a 19-year-old Hispanic male was caught with his 16-year-old white girlfriend.

Despite the girl's admission that she loved him, the young man was convicted of statutory rape and given probation.

As luck would have it, the couple was later caught in a hotel room by the girl's mother, who wasn't happy with her daughter being involved with a Mexican, Hupp said.

"If this law had been in effect, he would have been going to jail for life," she explained.

The bill, with its "unintentional consequences," was eventually voted down, she added.

Hupp, continuing the theme of "unintentional consequences," told an odd but interesting story that was passed along to her.

It seems that a man, intending to kill himself by jumping from a window on the 10th floor, was instead killed by a stray bullet as he fell.

It seems that an older couple on a lower floor had gotten into an argument, and the husband had shot at his wife, but instead hit the suicide victim.

The husband, who had a history of threatening his wife with an unloaded gun, never intended for anyone to get hurt.

But his son, who had been on the outs with his mother, had secretly loaded the gun, figuring his father would eventually shoot the mother.

But the son became despondent over the delay in his mother's death and decided to commit suicide -- by jumping out of a 10th-floor window -- but was instead killed by the gun he himself had loaded.

"We all know fact is stranger than fiction," Hupp said.

Hupp, who attended the University of Texas at El Paso and graduated from Texas Chiropractic College with a Doctor of Chiropractic degree in 1985, owns Cove Chiropractic Clinic in Copperas Cove and also owns a small Arabian horse breeding ranch with husband Greg.

When the subject of welfare was broached, Hupp said, "The welfare system is the biggest lie we have. I don't believe our government should be involved in social welfare."

She welcomed the Lions to contact her anytime. "Nobody down there (in Austin) has a monopoly on brains," she said. "If you've got a problem or an idea, pick up the phone."

**Reporter's notebook:** Before Hupp addressed the Lions, they held their regular raffle drawing. One Lion, remarking about "honest politicians," suggested that Hupp draw the winning ticket.

She did so, and handed the ticket to Lions President Lloyd Parks, who announced the winning number: "105."

Hupp promptly corrected Parks -- "106," she said -- drawing howls of laughter from the Lions.

"Believe me, I can see without my glasses, but it's the lighting," Parks quipped.

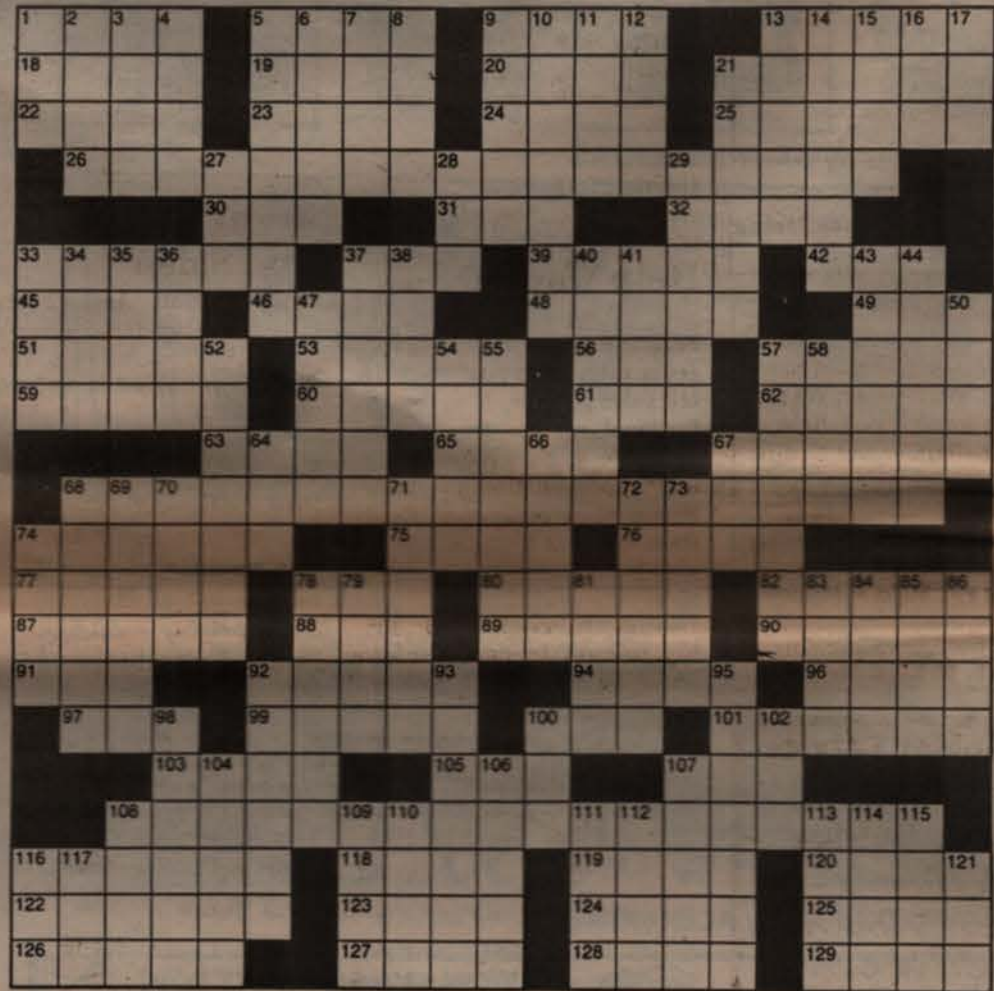

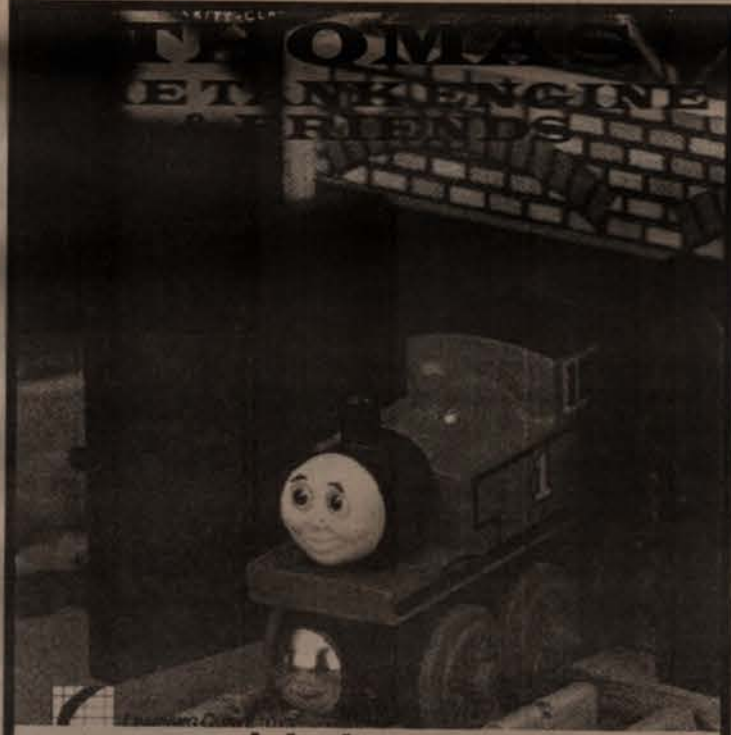

# Tips on storing quilts

There has been much interest in old quilts. They often record family history and provide a link to the past. It doesn't matter if you inherited your quilt or purchased it at a flea market or garage sale. You can use the quilt in your home for that special touch in so many ways with proper care.

Most quilts are perishable. You should care for a quilt so it will survive to enrich future generations. How fragile is an old quilt? This will depend on the materials used and the conditions under which the quilt was used and stored.

Very old, fragile or valuable quilts, or those containing many kinds of yarn and fabrics should not be cleaned in the home. If you're in doubt don't clean it. Improper cleaning can permanently damage your quilt.

Quilts should not be stored in direct contact with wood or wood products. Wood is acidic and acid destroys cotton and linen.

Store quilts in unbleached muslin or a cotton pillow case that has been washed several times. The quilt can also be wrapped in acid-free tissue paper. If the wrapping is in contact with wood, remember to wash the fabric or change the paper about twice a year.

Avoid plastic bags as they hold moisture and increase the chance for mildew to form. If a plastic bag is used for storage, leave an end open. Quilts need a source of fresh air.

Over the years, quilts can weaken along fold lines. It's best to roll them on plastic pipe or cardboard. When using cardboard rolls, cover with muslin or acid-free paper.

If it isn't possible to roll your quilt, loosely fold it. Put crumple acid-free tissue paper between the folds so the quilt doesn't crease. Air and refold the quilt every few months.

Store quilts in a clean, dark place away from sunlight. Light causes fading and fabric deterioration. A stable temperature of 60° to 70°F, and well ventilated place with a humidity of about 50% are preferred storage conditions.

Avoid hot attics and damp basements for quilt storage. Heat accelerates the deterioration of cotton and linen. Dry heat causes all fibers to become dry and brittle.

Mold and mildew form when the humidity is high. When the temperatures and humidity fluctuate, fibers expand and contract causing unnecessary stress to a quilt.

Insects shouldn't be a prob-

lem if quilts are properly stored. However, if there's a possibility of moths damaging a quilt, put some moth balls in a fabric bag in the storage area.



## Salado's Dr. Carver to perform one-man show to help benefit Bell County Museum

The Bell County Museum Board of Trustees will present Saladoan Dr. Raymond Carver performing a one man show, "We Had A Grand Time, Didn't We, Kid?" at the Cultural Activities Center Auditorium 7 p.m. Sept. 13.

Admission is \$12.50, and tickets are available in the Bell County Museum or at the CAC performance. All proceeds will go toward development of the Museum's endowment and special projects of the Board of Trustees, according to Stephanie Turnham, Museum Director.

His work has also been produced at the Atlanta Alliance Theatre, the San Francisco-based American Conservatory Theatre, and the American Theatre Association in Dallas. He directed events on three occasions at the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC. He is a member of the Dramatists Guild. And he is director of the new Living Room Theatre of Salado.

Dr. Carver has been a resident of Salado for the past two years, directing *To Kill a Mockingbird* for the Temple Civic Theatre in 1996. He says, "Barbara and I retired to Salado because we're only fifty minutes away from our daughter and son in law in Austin. We really enjoy attending events like those sponsored by the Institute for the Humanities, the Temple Civic Theatre, the Central Texas Orchestral Society and, of course, the Bell County Museum."

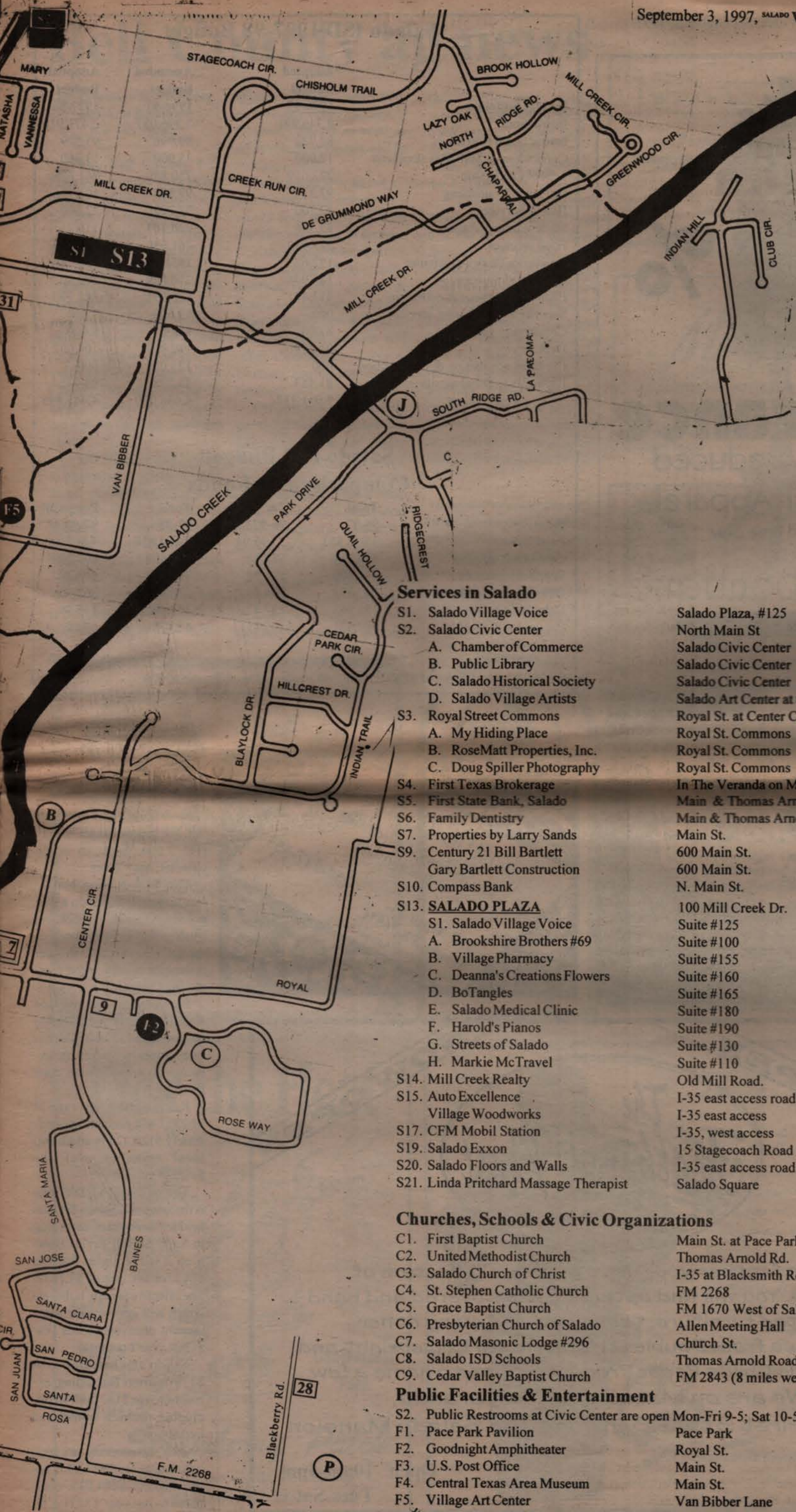

Following the tax rate hearing, the board will set the tax rate 7 p.m. Sept. 16 in the Salado Civic Center.

The \$4.4 million budget was originally based on a proposed tax rate of \$1.2228, but trustees will consider keeping the tax rate at \$1.2897 in order to replace money taken from the fund balance.

Presently, the fund balance is approximately \$667,000, but needs to be \$733,000, which is two month's operating expenses to comply with state law.

Keeping the tax rate at \$1.2897 will generate approximately \$120,420 in additional local revenues over the \$1.2228 tax rate.

The proposed \$1.2897 rate is the same rate Salado ISD has held for three years, according to Supt. Steven Ervin. However, it is 11¢ higher than the effective tax rate of \$1.1872. The effective tax rate is the rate which will generate the same amount of revenues this year as last year's tax rate.

Salado's tax base grew from \$174 million (including exemptions) to \$182 million (including the new homestead exemption).

Yet, the property tax base per student for 1997-98 is approximately \$204,035, compared to last year's \$211,679.

## Eagles tune up for grid opener

The Salado High varsity football team tuned up for its season opener by defeating Crawford, three touchdowns to two, in an Aug. 29 scrimmage at home.

The Eagles open the season at Riesel Sept. 5 with an 8 p.m. kickoff.

"They (Riesel) always play us tough," said new head coach Joe Mullins, who's been an assistant here the last seven years.

Last year, Salado lost to Riesel, 25-12, as the Indians took advantage of several Eagle miscues.

"They're well-coached and don't make many mistakes," Mullins said. "I think it will be a good game. We've got to cut out the mistakes."

Mullins said Riesel's offense operates out of the run-oriented wishbone formation, but also "throws the ball well."

The Indians run a 4-3 defense (four linemen, three linebackers), and as Mullins said, "They're tough, they hit."

The Indians return several players from last year's team that went 4-1 in District 25-2A before losing to Rogers 37-18 in the playoffs. Rogers won the District 26-2A title last year,

and Salado finished second. Riesel is expected to contend for the district title again this year under coach Todd Harbour.

The Indians tuned up for Salado by defeating Florence in a scrimmage last week.

Salado was successful in its final scrimmage as well, against a school that beat it 21-0 in the first round of last year's playoffs. "We played good on both sides of the line," Mullins said. "We moved the ball well and played good defense."

Mullins singled out several defenders, including ends Tate

Hunter and Adam Nuse, John Woolard, Dan Alcozar, David Kirk and Joe Barron.

Offensive coordinator Alan Haire singled out Hunter at tight end, quarterback Paul Mashburn and guard Mitch Lindley.

Fullback Taylor Hutton scored all three Salado touchdowns, including one on a busted play in the early stages of the scrimmage. The 200-pound junior picked up a loose ball and scampered about 50 yards around right end.

He also scored on a tough

## Thrill of victory, agony of the feet

While exercise is great for the heart, it can take a toll on the soles - of your feet that is.

"Feet are one of the most neglected parts of the body when it comes to fitness," said David Brennan, an exercise physiologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Most people don't think about taking care of their feet until they hurt. By that time, damage may have already occurred."

Using proper shoes for your exercise is the most important "step" you can take to avoid foot problems.

"If you're participating in several activities, you need more than one pair of shoes," cautioned Brennan. "Sport-specific shoes can help prevent injuries."

In addition, Brennan recommends:

Always wearing socks to help absorb the shock of exercise and keep feet dry.

Clipping toenails. Pressure from shoes can irritate nails, causing them to fall off. Rubbing or soaking feet after workouts. This helps to increase circulation and relax foot muscles.

"Your feet might be sore after a workout, but they should not hurt," said Brennan.

### Spinning toward better health

Spinning is the latest craze sweeping America's health clubs.

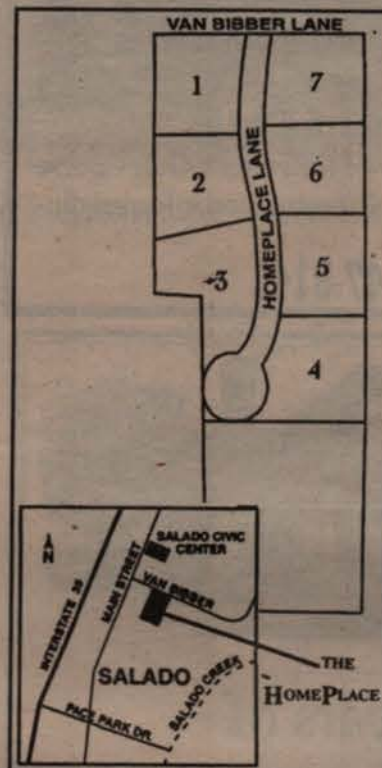
While it might sound innovative, it is nothing more than a new workout on an old piece of equipment — the stationary bike.

"Spinning is like an aerobics class on a bike," said Dr. John Cianca, a sports medicine specialist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"The idea behind the workout is to increase the intensity of pedaling on the bike. It's an excellent exercise for the heart, with virtually no impact on the joints."

Many fitness clubs have instructors who conduct spinning classes that work on cycling techniques and also incorporate other exercises while on the bike.

Cianca said spinning is a good option for people just beginning an exercise program, since it is easy to learn and the intensity can be controlled with resistance levers on the bike.

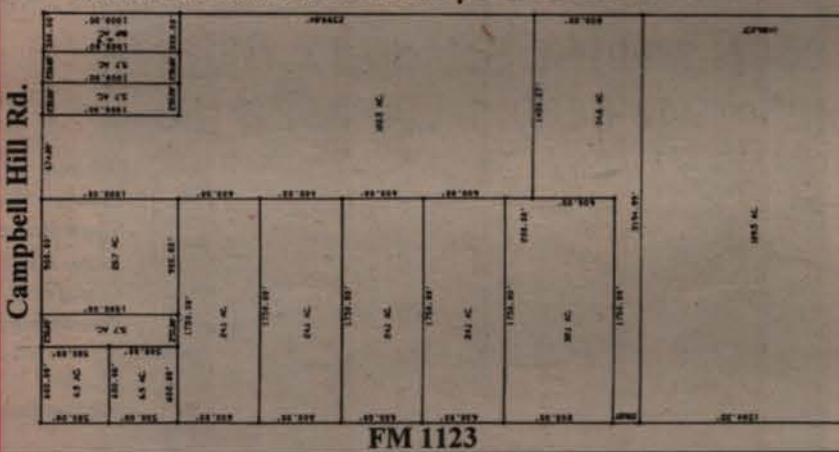

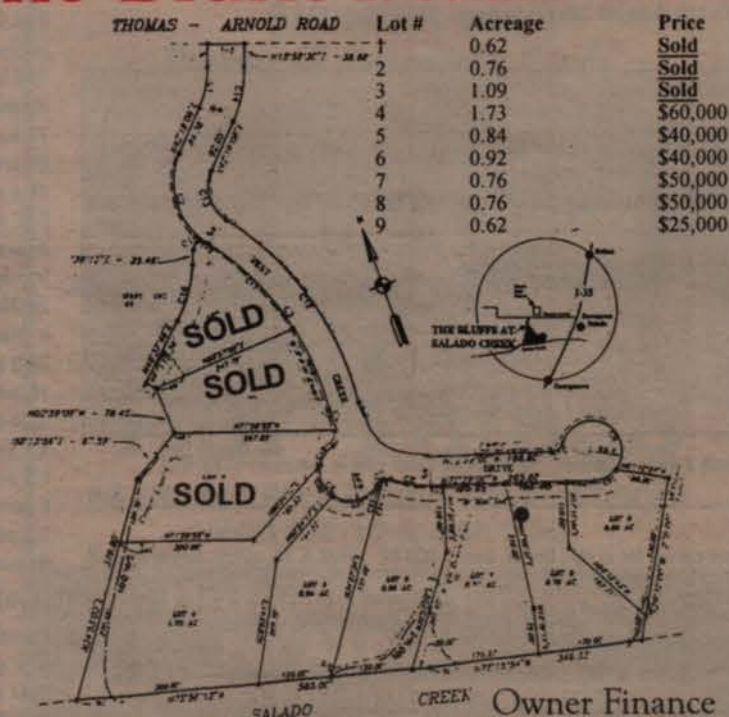

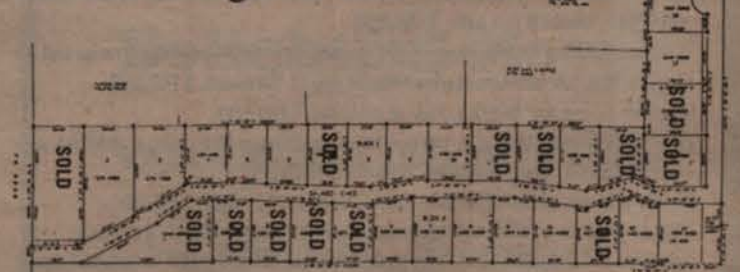
