The "Oio De Dios" or the "Eye of God" is used in "Las Posadas," which is a ceremony of Joseph and Mary seeking shelter and being welcomed at "The Inn" or "The Sheltering Place." Each family has an "Ojo De Dios" (similar to the Scottish Clan having a plaid of its own). One member of the family carries it, the "Ojo De Dios," in the procession while everyone else carries a lighted

I was born and raised in Eagle Pass, across the river from Piedras Negras, Mexico, and also, Cy and I lived there for 18 years after we married. We enjoyed our living in Eagle Pass, where he was High School principal and Assistant Superintendent, so much that this influenced us to build a Mexican home and carry out Mexican customs.

While neither party is 100 percent on these items, Democrat leaders seem to fight most of them.



# First Responders bring home state award for SVFD

The Salado Volunteer Fire Department First Responders were acknowledged with the First Responder Award at the 1997 EMS Conference Awards Luncheon in Austin.

The First Responder Awards recognizes a First Responder organization which assumed a leadership role in EMS by achievement in areas of patient care, public access, medical control, disaster preparedness, public education and training.

There are 448 First Responder organizations in Texas. Last year, the First Responder award went to the City of Fort Worth, according to Salado Fire Chief Wayne Rutherford.

The SVFD First Responders began in October 1991 with a 1978 grass truck (as the rescue truck), a pumper, 12 volunteers, including two EMTs and one paramedic, serving a 100 square mile area.

The Department now has a fully stocked rescue truck, two pumper trucks, two grass trucks and 20 volunteers, including four ECAs, three EMTs and three paramedics.

Specialty training for the department includes two swift water technicians, two vertical rescue technicians, three hazardous materials (hazmat) specialists and eight factory trained extrication technicians.

All certified personnel can maintain their continuing education hours from the biweekly training held in both fire and EMS.

The department is funded by donations from the community, grants and money raised through fund raiser held during the year.

These volunteers responded this year to several multiple vehicle accidents with multiple fatalities, mutual aid to the Jarrell Tornado, over 225 fire and EMS calls, extrications, hazmat spills and swift water rescues.

Everyone is invited to step back in time and come stroll the streets of Salado viewing the sights and hearing the sounds of Christmas.







# Corn Club of Jacksboro, Texas, evolved into 4-H Clubs of America

by Tumbleweed Smith

Jacksboro News, a local farm publication and served as parttime county agent for Jack County. He felt there was a great need for new developments in farming methods. He had a demonstration farm and showed farmers how they could make poor land produce better crops by using good farming practices. He staged a Corn Show in 1907 and encouraged the farmers to enter their corn. But very few showed up.

The next issue of his paper carried a big notice to the boys

of Jack County urging them to enter a corn growing contest. Tom Marks edited the He offered three prizes for each of the five categories of corn (white, yellow, laguna, bloody butcher and flower corn). Mr. Marks would furnish the seed.

He went to farmers and encouraged them to let their sons enter the contest. He told the farmers they should let the youngsters own the corn and sell it as a further inducement.

Mr. Marks went to the schools of the county, circling in his car to attract attention. Since there weren't many cars A friend told Tom, "You at the time, the young boys were fascinated with the new vehicle. Mr. Marks gave them

He formed a Corn Club and instructed the boys as to planting and cultivating practices. He visited them to check on their progress.


The day of the corn show, October 8, 1908, 43 boys gathered with their corn. Judges considered the length of the ear, straightness of the rows and how well it was filled out. The prize for first, second and third places was fifty cents off on the price of a hat.

A button with an ear of corn on it was given to each boy who entered. The button allowed them to get a free ice cream cone, go to a movie and ride some carnival rides. Mr. Marks made sure the kids had plenty of motivation to come to town that day besides just to enter the corn show.

Tom Marks took some of the youngsters by train to the 1908 State Fair of Texas and entered their corn there. One of the boys won a blue ribbon and 17 ears that weighed 25 pounds. The boys took a dollar with them for spending money. Most of them came home with a dime.

The Corn Club in Jacksboro evolved into the 4-H CLUBS OF AMERICA. The cloverleaf is the emblem of 4-H. Initially there were only three leaves representing head, hand and heart. The familiar phrase was taken from a Rudyard Kipling poem, "Children's Song." The 4th H, for health, was added in 1909, 4-H now has more than 5 million members in 88 countries. It is open to boys and girls between 9 and 19 years of age. The organization has exchange programs so youngsters can experience life in a far away place.

Mr. Mark's home in Jacksboro has been made into a 4-H museum. It is visited by people from all over the world. The house is where the first meeting of the Corn Club took place.

The Salado Local ATPE organization has had two recent meetings to discuss projects to raise money to fund scholarships for graduating seniors.



ATPE extends a welcome to any retired teachers in the community to come and participate in this organization. If anyone is interested, call the elementary school for information.








It's safe to say that the story had a happy ending.

The book is illustrated by Greene's son, Geoffrey Greene, an artist and TV graphics designer in New York City.

Silverthorne has written on a variety of topics of Texas and Southern history. Her "Christmas in Texas" is a collection of various beliefs and customs brought to Texas by different ethnic groups.

She writes that "decorated Christmas trees arrived in England in 1844 when Prince man husband, had one set up at Windsor Castle for their children. The London Illustrated Times published a picture of it. As the royal family went, so went the nation, and soon Christmas trees replaced Yule logs in importance."

Silverthorne also writes that mistletoe, which British settlers found plentifully in Texas, was regarded as a sacred plant by the Celtic Druids, and sprigs of it were hung over doors to ward off evil spirits and to ensure fertility.

"Perhaps this has something to do with the license to kiss under its boughs," she writes. "This custom quickly caught on in nineteenth-century Albert, Queen Victoria's Ger- Texas, where kissing needed

more of an excuse than it does

(Silverthorne also notes that today 95 percent of the world's supply of mistletoe is produced in a twelve-county area in Central Texas.)

Allen, a first-time author, will sign her new book, "Gordon Conway: Fashioning a New Woman."


The book profiles the life of illustrator/designer Gordon Conway, a Texas native who helped create the image of the flapper, or New Woman, of the 1920s. (The name 'Gordon' was selected by her father long before her birth in honor of an ancestral line in Virginia.)

Allen, a cultural historian in American studies, follows the course of Conway's life (1894-1956) from her Dallas upbringing in a wealthy society family through her working years in New York, London and Paris, to her premature retirement and early death at the family estate in Virginia.

Conway had nearly 5,000 finished drawings appear in some 26 magazines like Vanity Fair and Vogue, as well as in newspapers and on posters, in costumes and set designs for 119 stage productions and in 47 films.


The University of Texas press published the book as part of the American Studies Series (editor William H. Goetzmann).

Writes Goetzmann in the book's foreword, "Even if most of what Gordon Conway, 'that red-headed gal' from Dallas, New York, Paris and London, portrayed was unattainable - indeed, sometimes ridiculous -- it gave women a sense of self-worth and sexual attractiveness. It also provided a sense of humor, frivolity, and flapper smart-aleckiness that was largely lacking among the suffragists. If the stern women's movements of the early twentieth century aimed to drag males into the world of equality, Conway's female enticed them into it."







Living plants are increasing in popularity for holiday season gifts and decorations. With a little T.L.C. (Tender Loving Care) you can prolong the beauty of these flowering pot plants for weeks.

Poinsettias used to be pretty sensitive to changes from a greenhouse environment to that of a home, with leaf and flower drop being a common problem. But now, with newer varieties, you can just about plan on poinsettias on Valentine's Day if you care to keep them around that long. Place the poinsettias in a room with bright natural light. Water the plant thoroughly when soil is dry to touch. Always discard the excess water to avoid over watering and damaging the root system. When the colorful bracts fade, cut back your poinsettia plant to eight inches to grow as a foliage plant. It may be placed out-of-doors when outside temperatures are warm next spring. If you want directions on how to make the plant reflower next year, give us a call here in the Extension office.

Kalanchoes should be kept in a sunny window. This plant flowers when the days are short, consequently they are difficult to re-flower in the home if carried over from another year. Lights used in the home provide long days and the plants fail to set flower buds. They do make excellent foliage plants once the flowers are faded, however. Just remove the flower stalk and use as a foliage plant.

Christmas Cactus isn't a typical cactus. It requires as much water as any other houseplant though it should not be over watered. This is one plant that can be kept over to bloom again next Christmas. Keep it in a sunny window until danger of frost if past, then place it in a shady spot out doors during the summer.







# SFD volunteers thank community

Dear Fellow Saladoans,

Over the past few years your Fire Department has made tremendous gains in the trucks. equipment, and training we have obtained. Thanks to your generosity we are on the verge of becoming one the best suburban / rural Fire Departments in the State of Texas!

For the year, 1996-1997. your department has been nominated for the Texas Department of Health - First Responder of the Year Award. This nomination was made by the Central Texas Trauma Council. The winner of this award was announced on November 25,1997 at the State E.M.S. Conference in Austin. This nomination comes from the hard work and dedication, of the Volunteers of this -your

department.

Despite these achievements, in the recent weeks this Fire Department has responded to several situations that have made us realize some of the severe shortcomings in our equipment. Even at the Stagecoach Inn fire, in the middle of the downtown area, we had to call on other departments to carry water for us. Just think how hard it is to maintain an adequate water supply outside of the Village?

The Insurance Services Organization rates fire protection on a 1 (being ideal) to a 10 (no protection at all) scale. Salado has a rating of 7, and the outskirts have a rating of 9. If this Department can demonstrate an effective WATER SHUTTLE SYSTEM, we may

be able to lower this rating. This means that you could pay less in insurance premiums.

To accomplish this goal, we need to have your support. A WATER SHUTTLE SYS-TEM can be managed with the purchase of a TANKER TRUCK and a portable holding tank. A TANKER TRUCK for this type of operation will have to be capable of meeting the requirements of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standards 41906, carry over 1,000 gallons of water, and be able to dump its water in less than one minute. This makes for an expensive vehicle, in the \$100,000 range. But what price can you place on not just your valuables or your life, but the lives of your loved ones?

We believe that this type of TANKER TRUCK, is not a luxury but a necessity to ensure our ability to provide an adequate fire protection water supply anywhere in our dis-






Each of the 18 Finalists

The first meeting of the new year will be Jan. 15 at the Stagecoach Club, where coffee will be served at 9:30 a.m., followed by the 10 a.m. program.


