National election undecided Republicans hold seats, **Emergency District passes**

The election for President of the United States is still in question with Michigan, Wisconsin and Nevada all swinging to Joe Biden on the morning of Nov. 4; however, Republicans John Cornyn, John Carter, Dawn Buckingham and Brad Buckley were all re-elected to office.

In an historic turnout, Salado voters overwhelmingly approved the formation of Bell County Emergency Services District #1 to provide services and levy a property tax rate of up to \$0.10 per \$100 valuation. The ESD#1 was approved by 4,081 votes in favor for 71.96%, and 1,590 votes against, 28.04%. The ESD #1 received 3,576 favorable early votes, 292 favorable votes on election day and 213 favorable absentee votes. In early voting, 1,349 voted against the ESD #1, 155 voted against on election day and 86 voted against in absentee voting.

In other local races, Salado ISD returned two incumbents, Kim Bird and Troy Smith, to the school board of trustees and added a new member, Savannah Hennig.

Bird received a total of 3,276 votes in the race: 2,880 early votes, 245 on election day and 151 absentee votes.

Hennig had 3,206 total votes: 2,850 early votes, 220 election day and 136 absentee votes.

Smith had 2,928 votes, 2,598 early votes, 237 on election day and 93 absentee. Byrd had 2,320 votes:

2,060 early votes, 207 on election day and 53 absentee. Village of Salado voters

on the Board of Aldermen. Howard led the field with 755 votes, including 660 early votes, 59 on election day and 36 absentee.

Cox won election to the board with 716 votes, including 626 early votes, 43 on election day and 47 absentee.

Bell Co. Coalition opposes Salamander habitat

Management Coalition (BCAMC) announced its the comments that the group will be submitting to the U.S. Fish to the species and its habitat & Wildlife Service (FWS) concerning its proposed critical habitat designation for both the Georgetown and ic Analysis was not inclusive Salado salamanders.

The Coalition takes issue with the proposed critical habitat designation for the two local salamanders species on the following areas that the Coaltion says is supported by a better legal and scientific understanding of the species due to the research conducted and analyzed by the Coalition:

• The Colations questions the foundational science that the FWS used in support of the designation. The Coalition said that the science is not consistent with available literature, and should not be used as the basis for designating critical habitat.

 Water quality degradation should not be a factor considered for this designation because the Coalition continues to implement and manage research efforts and regulations that have improved water quality to stable conditions.

 Water quantity degradation should not be a factor considered for this designation because the Coalition continues to implement research, regulations, and ordinances that maintain suf-

Bell County Adaptive ficient water quantity for the Salado Salamander.

> Public identification of sites could increase impacts (i.e. site disturbance, species harassment, etc.)

> The associated Economfor all anticipated impacts in Bell County; and,

> • Salado salamander sites a conservation easement in Bell County monitored by The Nature Conservancy (TNC), should not be included in this designation because of the existing, successful management by TNC.

> The FWS proposed a revision critical habitat designation for the Georgetown and Salado salamanders on September 15.

In total, the proposed habitat would comprise more than 1,500 acres of Central Texas land in Bell and Williamson Counties. The proposal allows for filing public comments until Nov. 16.

The BCAMC is comprised of officials from Bell County, the Village of Salado, the Salado Water Supply Corporation, and the Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District.

Since 2012, the BCAMC has expended various resources on this topic, with the overall goal of increasing scientific knowledge of the Salado salamander, and adding to its conservation. "The combined effects of the Coalition's efforts have protected the Salado salamander and its habitat, rendering a critical habitat designation simply unnecessary and not prudent," according to Dirk Aaron, manager of the Clearwater Underground Conservation District.

Handouts concerning the Georgetown and Salado salamanders can be found at the Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District website: www.cuwcd.org.

"The importance of local participation with comments is so very crucial," Aaron stated. In its comments, the Coalition states that "the need for critical habitat designation is simply not prudent nor scientifically defendable under the statutory authority of US Fish and Wildlife Services who is proposing the designation

The Coalition encourages local citizens to be engaged by submitting comments prior to the formal deadline of Nov. 16. Coalition members are willing to assist those who wish to submit.

In 2012, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) proposed to list the Georgetown and Salado salamanders as endangered, and designate 1,031 acres (ac) of critical habitat for the Georgetown

"We are very excited to be included on the Hickory Golf Association of Texas (HGAT) tournament circuit this year," says Dave Swarthout, Salado Museum executive director. "The money raised will enable us to continue renovations and preservation of our historic building and the college ruins and parkland on College

Sponsors for the tournament include Title Sponsor Stagecoach Inn; Mill Creek Golf Course; First Texas Brokerage; and Sloan, Cartagena and Associates, P.C. The golf weekend features special guest William W. Reed, past president of The Golf Heritage Society (a global non-profit organization headquartered in Lebanon, Ohio) who will display an extensive collection

of historic golf equipment and artifacts at Mill Creek

throughout the weekend. "The public is welcome to come out for the opening tee-off ceremonies at noon on Saturday, which will include a Scottish bagpiper performing on the course, and to view the historic golf items on display in the clubhouse," says Swarthout. "Of course, there is no charge but donations to the museum are

What makes Hickory Golf unique is that the players use clubs that have a solid hickory wood shaft as did clubs used in the late 19th and early 20th Century. The players also dress the part, with men wearing vintagestyle golfing knickers, jackets and caps.

According to the HGAT website, most of the hickory clubs in play today actually

date from the late 1890s to 1935. Clubs manufactured during this period are original hickory clubs. There are several companies that make replica hickory-shafted golf clubs that are also approved for play.

New surge in COVID-19 cases Pushes market down 5.6%

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) fell a whopping 5.64% for the week to close at 3269.96, nearly wiping out 2020's gain and taking it down to 8.7% below where it was at the beginning of September. The proximate causes appeared to be the new surge in COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations combined with an acceptance that the administration and the House were unlikely to agree on the size and targets of a fiscal support bill. The yield on the 10-year U.S. Treasury note moved in the other direction, rising 5% to 0.879% as the yield curve steepened. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) agreed with the stock market that a COVID resurgence was not likely to be good for the economy and sagged 10.5% to a money losing \$35.59 per barrel.


With the SPX down nearly 9% and the generally accepted definition of a "correction" of a 10% loss, we are close to that metric. More, historically, the 10 largest S&P 500 companies tend to trade at about the same multiple of annual earnings as the whole Index, but they were priced nearly 60% higher recently. As we have written before, when large-cap growth stocks get this far out of line with the market, historically that divergence ends with, at the least, a correction. Fasten your seat belts, but also recognize that on the other side of this pandemic we are likely to see a substantial period of growth as we make up for lost time.

The Economy

In normal times the Commerce Department's quarterly GDP report is not only relevant but crucial in understanding where the economy is headed, but this time, with weekly data varying greatly, it is both old news and potentially

Again, because things are changing so relatively fast, even that estimate is probably a bit off. The bounce-back we saw in the third quarter was evident in the weekly and monthly data that came in over the summer and appeared to be largely driven by the generous fiscal stimulus earlier this year. With the cessation of the stimulus, current data is indicating a deceleration of the recovery. That deceleration is also being amplified by the new, record-breaking resurgence in COVID-19. Once more, the short story is that the delightful third quarter growth numbers may well be irrelevant as we enter the second month of the fourth quarter. The question at this point is whether the recovery will merely slow in this quarter or ultimately reverse and take us back into recession.

Speaking of COVID,

Texas has now had 18,283 deaths and the confirmed infection rate is now growing at an astonishing 10.3% per day. In Bell County, our death toll has reached 100 and the infections continue to grow.

In further news offsetting the soaring third quarter GDP figures, Caterpillar and 3M, both normally reliable bellwethers for the economy, reported falling sales. Caterpillar reported this week that revenue was down by at least a fifth (20%) in the latest quarter in construction, mining, energy, and transportation. At the same time, consumer durable industries, like Whirlpool were having trouble keeping up with demand as people refurbish their homes and buy new vehicles. An indicator that business investment is also recovering appeared as orders for capital goods, items used for manufacturing, increased one percent in September as well.

With the new GDP estimate, the United States appears to be in the middle of the large economic blocs across the globe. The Asian nations cumulatively have largely brought COVID under control and are leading with net positive annual GDP numbers. The Europeans are at the tail end and, particularly as new shutdowns are appearing as the pandemic is again surging there to new records. The U.S. appears to be riding in the middle but, as we mentioned above, much is dependent on what if any relief the Congress approves as well as how severe this second wave of COVID-19 turns out to be.

Texas veterans need our help, especially during COVID-19

Texas has the second-highest population of veterans in the country-nearly 1.5 million-and many of these veterans are poor or homeless. While groups around the state are tirelessly working on veterans' behalf, there is always more to be done to ensure their civil legal needs, like eviction and the inability to access medical care, are being met as they reintegrate back into civilian life--especially during a global pandemic.

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, nearly 5.2 million Texans, including a significant number of veterans, qualified for civil legal aid. This number is only expected to increase as we continue to see the devastating financial and economic fallout, unemployment and uncertainty caused by COVID-19. Veterans aren't exempt from this; they are an already vulnerable group made even more vulnerable by the coronavirus pandem-

Legal issues amount for five of the top 10 unmet needs of homeless veterans, according to the annual survey of homeless and formerly homeless veterans by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. Legal aid programs, local bar associations, law schools and pro bono lawyers all help provide civil legal aid for veterans, but they struggle to meet demand without adequate funding. Veteran legal issues—including credit problems, accessing benefits, landlord/tenant

disputes, restoring a driver's license and denial of critical medical care—are essential legal issues that must be handled in order to keep Texas veterans from falling through the cracks.

The Texas Access to

Justice Foundation (TAJF). created in 1984 to provide funding for civil legal aid in Texas, is committed to the vision that all Texans will have equal access to justice, regardless of income. Last year, The Foundation awarded more than \$6 million in two-year grants to 13 Texas legal aid providers to provide civil legal services to low-income veterans. This year, in response to the coronavirus pandemic, grantees of the TAJF, the Texas Veterans Legal Aid Coalition pivoted from coordinating in-person veteran legal aid clinics to virtual clinics across the state, along with creating a series of videos about benefits available for veterans.

In an additional show of support for Texas veterans, TAJF established the Joe Jamail Endowment for Veteran Legal Services in 2017 to ensure veterans have fair and equitable access to the justice system. Earlier this year, the Endowment reached a milestone \$1 million in donations, which will be used to provide legal representation to veterans throughout the state.

This year is also the 10th anniversary of Texas Lawyers for Texas Veterans, a collaborative effort between local bar associations and legal aid organizations that specifically addresses the need for pro bono civil legal assistance for veterans and

their families.

Each year, the week of Veterans Day is designated as Texas Veterans Legal Aid Week (TVLAW). This year from Nov. 9-13, local bar associations, legal aid organizations and law schools across Texas are hosting free, virtual legal clinics to serve veterans with the support and civil legal guidance they need. To find a clinic in your area, visit texaslawhelp.org/ tvlaw-2020 or call the statewide hotline at 1-800-622-

Texas veterans are at an increased risk of displacement, unemployment, requiring medical care and other problems arising from the COVID-19 pandemic, and it's on us to make sure they are adequately being taken care of. We must ensure they can access the resources and services they need to reintegrate back into civilian life and thrive even despite the current public health crisis. Legal aid services can make a real difference in the lives of veterans who qualify, and support for these services ensures that veterans aren't left behind as the state works toward COVID-19 recovery.

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



salamander, and 372 acres for the Salado salamander in Bell and Williamson Counties, Texas (77 FR 50768). While both species were eventually listed as threatened in 2014, critical habitat was never finalized (79 FR

In 2019, a well-known environmental organization, the Center for Biological Diversity, filed a lawsuit challenging FWS' failure to designate critical habitat for both species (Center for Biological Diversity, Case 1:19-cv-01607). Subsequently, a Stipulated Settlement Agreement was made on Feb 26, 2020, requiring FWS to propose critical habitat by Aug 12, 2020, and finalize it by Aug 12, 2021 (Center for Biological Diversity, Case 1:19-cv-01607-KBJ).

On Sept 15, FWS proposed 732 acres of critical for the Georgetown salamander, and 787 acres for the Salado salamander (85 FR 57578). In total, this redesignation increased 116 acres from that originally proposed in 2012. The public comment period is 60 days, ending on Nov 16.

The local option election to allow for the off-premise sale of beer and wine in Bell County JP Precinct 2 passed by a wide margin. The local option election received 5.498 votes in favor. for 73.16% of the total vote in the precinct. It received 4,416 early votes in favor, 821 on election day and 261 absentee votes. There were 2,017 ballots cast against the local option, 1,647 in early voting, 245 on election day and 124 absentee votes.

Pres. Donald Trump carried Texas with 52.31% of the vote. He had 5,802,815 votes, 4,942,877 in early voting. Joe Biden had 5,132,475, 4,620,884 in early voting. Pres. Trump carried Bell County with 53.32% of the vote. He tallied 67.113 votes, while Biden tallied 56.032 in Bell County.

Republican U.S. Sen. John Cornyn was re-elected to his fourth six-year term in the U.S. Senate. He won with 53.77% of the vote, tallying 5,880,414 votes over Mary 'MJ' Hegar, who had

4,769,263 votes for 43.61% of the vote. Sen. Cornyn carried Bell County with 54.44% of the vote, 68,118, while Hegar had 53,489.

Republican U.S. Rep. John Carter was re-elected to his 10th term as U.S. Representative. He received 210,768 votes, 182,509 in early voting. Donna Imam received 174,394 votes, 159,337 in early voting. Rep. Carter outperformed the President and Senator in Bell County, which he carried with 58.53%. Carter had 66,069 votes while Imam had 44.325.

State Senator District 24 Dawn Buckingham won re-election with a total of 263,156 over Clayton Tucker, who had 114,737. State Senator Buckingham carried Bell County with 57.01% of the vote, 70,638 while Clayton had 53,265.

State Rep. District 54 Brad Buckley won re-election to his second term in the Texas House. He had 38,440 total votes, 31,879 in early voting. Likeithia "KeKe' Williams had 33,391 total votes, 28,898 in early voting. Rep. Buckley lost the Bell County portion of his district 54 race with 48.81% of the vote. He had 30.058 while Williams had 31,523.

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

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

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

A common method of defense against a suit contract is to try to shorten declarer's trumps by forcing him to ruff. This is most likely to be effective when declarer and dummy together have only eight (or fewer) trumps.

Opening lead — king of hearts.

Here is a typical case. South ruffed the second round of hearts, led a low spade to the king and finessed the jack on the return, losing to West's queen. West led another heart, and declarer ruffed again. He was now down to the lone ace of spades in his hand, having

led trumps twice and ruffed twice.

After drawing West's last trump declarer crossed to the club ace, led the ten of diamonds and finessed. West won with the king and cashed two hearts to defeat the contract two tricks. The repeated heart leads had exhausted South's trumps and brought about his downfall.

But analysis shows that South did not handle the situation in the best manner. He could have made his game by exercising better trump control. After ruffing the heart at trick two, he should have played a club to the ace and finessed the ten of diamonds before tackling the trump suit.

If the finesse wins, the contract is virtually assured. If the finesse loses, South is in a much better position to deal with the heart return. He ruffs and still has the A-J-6 of spades as well as the established diamonds.

A low trump to the king is followed by a trump to the ace, deliberately rejecting the finesse. When West follows suit, the contract becomes a certainty, even though the trump queen is still outstanding. Declarer simply runs his tricks in the side suits, losing only a trump whenever West (or East, if he has the queen) elects to ruff.

In effect, South plays for a normal 3-2 trump division instead of yielding to the temptation of winning a trump finesse. Percentagewise, this offers him the best chance of success.

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

Texas A&M Forest Service launches TreeMD app

Texas A&M Forest Service has launched an app to help users quickly identify the "root cause" of tree problems, whether they be from insects, diseases or other factors.

The TreeMD app is part of the Texas Forest Information Portal, and its main feature is a diagnostic tool that allows users to quickly find results from TreeMD's vast database. Users are prompted to enter the tree species, prominent symptoms exhibited or even the specific part of the tree that is being affected to help diagnose the problem.

In the event there are still questions on the actual cause, users can upload pictures and connect for input from a professional.

"TreeMD was created when we saw a need to provide a rapid identification process of tree issues for landowners, homeowners and natural resource service providers," said Sam Rhodes, Texas A&M Forest Service staff forester.

Users can filter lists of suspected causes by potential health problems. Once a pest or environmental factor has been selected, additional information, images and possible treatment options are provided by the user-friendly application.

"I love it," said Sean Jacobson, City of Denton planner. "I was able to easily find an answer within roughly one minute."

While TreeMD is a useful tool in investigating potential tree problems, it is not intended to be a substitute for the recommendations and management planning of a professional service provider.

"One of the most frequent calls we get in the office is from landowners asking what is wrong with a tree," Rhodes said. "This app was created to give users an initial start in diagnosing the cause of their sick tree."

For users who need assistance in identifying their trees, there is an app for that too. Texas A&M Forest Service's My Tree ID app helps identify tree species based on leaves, flowers, seed, bark or location using a key, descriptions and full-color images.

"We have a gallery of helpful tools available to Texans that are interested in natural resources and the great outdoors," Rhodes said. "The Texas Forest Information Portal includes numerous applications designed to assist in everything from land mapping and forest markets to finding big trees and beautiful scenic views across the state."
