Mask & capacity regulations lifted

Governor Greg Abbott issued several Executive Orders detailing the ongoing plan to open businesses and activities in Texas.

All newly opened businesses and services are subject to the recommended minimum standard health protocols outlined by the Department of Safety and Health Services.

On March 2, 2021, Governor Greg Abbott issued Executive Order GA-34, which went into effect on March 10 and provides that, in all counties not in an area with high hospitalizations:

- there are no COVID-19-related operating limits for any business or other establishment; and
- individuals are strongly encouraged to wear face coverings over the nose and mouth wherever it is not feasible to maintain six feet of social distancing from another person not in the same household, but no person may be required by any jurisdiction to wear or to mandate the wearing of a face covering.

GA-34 is effective March 10, 2021, at 12:01am and supersedes GA-17, GA-25, GA-29, GA-31, and GA-32.

Executive Order GA-34 also provides authority for county judges to institute mitigation strategies in areas with high hospitalizations. Bell County is part of Trauma Service Area L, which as of March 8 has a COVID-19 hospitalization rate of 5.4% percent of the total capacity of hospital beds. A TSA must exceed a COVID-19 hospitalization capacity of 15%

of total hospital beds for seven days in a row in order to meet the high COVID-19 standard.

In counties that reside in Trauma Service Areas (TSAs) with high COVID-19 hospitalizations,

- there are no state-imposed COVID-19-related operating limits for any business or other establishment:
- there is no state-imposed requirement to wear a face covering; and
- the county judge may use COVID-19-related mitigation strategies; provided, however, that:
- business and other establishments may not be required to operate at less than 50 percent of total occupancy, with no operating limits allowed to be imposed for religious services (including those conducted in churches, congregations, and houses of worship), public and private schools and institutions of higher education, and child-care services;
- no jurisdiction may impose confinement in jail as a penalty for violating any order issued in response to COVID-19; and
- no jurisdiction may impose a penalty of any kind for failure to wear a face covering or failure to mandate that customers or employees wear face coverings, except that a legally authorized official may act to enforce trespassing laws and remove violators at the request of a business establishment or other property

Study: Texas roads among the worst in nation

Aging roadways cost drivers an average of \$556 a year in repairs, and in some states, it's nearly \$1,000.

Rhode Island, Mississippi and West Virginia have the worst roads and bridges in

the U.S.

Texas roads are among

the worst in the nation. And it's costing every driver in Texas hundreds of dollars every year. That's according to a new study put together by research analysts at QuoteWizard. Deteriorating roads cost Texas drivers \$682 a year, compare that with the national average of just \$556 per motorist. Meaning that Texas drivers

are paying more and getting

Texas ranks as the 11th worst in the nation in terms of its roads. Across the state, 22% of its roads are considered unacceptable by the report standard. Additionally, more than 1% of the state's bridges and decks are in poor condition. Bad roads cost Texas motorists \$682 per

year, according to the study.

Other key findings in the report include:

Over 20% of U.S. and 6.1% of bridges are in poor or "non-acceptable" condition

How much of what drivers pay for roads, actually go towards road repair

Road conditions cost drivers nearly \$120 billion in vehi-

cle repair and operating costs

It's the opposite of "you get what you pay for." Drivers in some states are paying over \$800 a year, and our team of analysts at QuoteWizard found that between 25 - 50% of their roads are in poor condition," said Nick VinZant, Sr. Research Analyst and Insurance Expert with QuoteWizard.

The new study also ranks states with the worst and best roads by compiling the latest statistics from the Federal Highway Administration and Bureau of Transportation Statistics.

Worker efficiencies soar in manufacturing trades while services struggle to survive

The Markets

The old, trusty S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) soared and slumped like a kite during the week as March came on the scene but wound up rising a meager 0.81% to close at 3841.94. That leaves the Index up 2.29% year-to-date but down 1.15% from a month ago. Those small moves over time belie the frenetic headlines and market swings during the week as traders either ran in fear or doubled down with greed as interest rates bobbed around. The retreating seems to have mainly occurred in the overheated large-cap growth tech shares while the normally boring mid-cap value side of the SPX rose 2.78% to 2262.40, up over 10% year-to-date (CRSPMIV1). We see the gradual move toward a realistic price in the growth side of the Index as a healthy sign.

Speaking of interest rate rises, the yield on the benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note soared nearly 11% for the week to 1.567% putting it up over 70% year-to-date. At the beginning of the year, the T-note was yielding 0.91% and it was that sudden increase that spooked the stock market as stock traders assumed that bond traders knew something they didn't know about future inflation. When the stock traders remembered that as recently as the end of 2018, the 10-yr. T-note was yielding 3.28% with no sign of serious inflation, stock prices promptly recovered. The price of West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) ignored the inflation scare and roared ahead to \$66.32, up 7.56% for the week to the delight of the good folks in the oil patch. WTI is now up 37% year-to-date as growth in demand continues to rise faster than production. Oil prices are now higher now than they were in 2019, another signal that the global economy is rebounding.

ic news for the week ending March 5 was that employment ticked up a bit in February as the devastation from this pandemic-induced economic slump gradually abates. According to the folks at the Labor Department, the official unemployment percentage declined marginally from 6.3% last month to 6.2% in February. Employers added about 379,000 workers, but the total official unemployed ranks remain around ten million, or roughly twice the number we had before the onset of COVID-19. The difference appears mainly in the short-term unemployed in the leisure and hospitality industries with the longer-term and permanent unemployed numbers remaining constant. Another factor in the reduced official rate is that the total persons in the workforce has declined nearly 2% in the last year and there are about 6.9 million workers who would like to work but have given up looking and are not in the official numbers. The numbers are marginally better, but we still have a long way to go to return to a healthy employment situation. There are still a lot of companies down or out in the services side of the econo-

Meanwhile, the high demand for homes combined with the rising loan demand pushed the average 30-year mortgage rate above 3% for the first time since July according to Freddie Mac. Over the last six months Americans have seen the lowest mortgage rates since official records have been kept. The Fed has pledged to hold interest rates down for the next couple of years, but

the pressures are building.
The ISM Non-manufac-

turing Index, which measures the growth rate for the services side of the U.S. economy slipped from January's 58.7 to 55.3 for February but still remained comfortably above the 50-mark that delineates growth from contraction. Representing the other side of the economy, the ISM Manufacturing Index hit 60.8, up from January's 58.7. Manufacturing activity was centered in commercial trucks with an emphasis on the big rigs, but production hit the wall as once more a shortage of specialized computer chips was the limiting factor. Even as factories went allout to meet the demand for conventional 18-wheelers, General Motors appears to be planning to build a second battery factory in the U.S., doubling its investment in batteries for future electric vehicles.

The contrast in the two sides of our economy was starkly outlined as the Labor Department reported that while U.S. manufacturing productivity rose 5% in the fourth quarter of 2020 as output rose 13% while hours worked was up only 7.6%, total worker productivity though was down 4.2% as the services sector worked more hours with less output. We are seeing automation and worker effectiveness soar in the manufacturing industries while restaurants, hotels, resorts, and other service industries struggle

to survive.

As we continue to see declining new COVID infections, hospitalizations, and deaths, and a slowly increasing vaccination rate, hope is rising that we may have turned the corner. If we can avoid letting our guard down, spring may just be at hand both metaphorically and physically!

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Salado ISD will continue mask wearing for students, staff, visitors



I surveyed our teachers and staff and 82% of them are in favor of continuing to require the use of masks. The most common reason our employees gave for wanting to continue

to require the use of masks is that the vast majority of them have not had an opportunity to be vaccinated yet. I hope you will join me in supporting our teachers and staff that are not comfortable discontinuing our face-covering requirement at this time.

I am grateful that educators have now been included in the phased vaccine rollout. We are working with the Bell County Health District to obtain vaccine doses and our school nurses have volunteered to administer them to our employees.

We will assess and re-evaluate our face-covering requirement throughout the remainder of the school year as vaccines continue to be widely distributed to our educators and community members.

Health Insurance Is Unattainable for Too Many Texans

For far too many Texans, health insurance has become unaffordable — to the point of being unobtainable. For other Texans, even those with insurance, the cost of premiums and health care have become unsustainable.

Average annual premiums to cover a family on employer plans in Texas are more than \$20,000 — that's one-third of the average Texas household's annual income. These premiums are expensive because the underlying prices of care have risen, increasing the cost of premiums and outof-pocket costs for insured Texans. To empower Texans to avoid excessively high-priced providers, we must make those prices transparent.

For other Texans, the price of care and availability of insurance aren't the only barriers; rather, a lack of facilities, providers, and access to care prevents many Texans from receiving the care they need when they need it.

We can, and must, address these issues, but one particular problem stands out when comparing Texas to other states: our state has highest uninsured rate – by far. Five million Texans lack insurance — nearly one in five Texans — which exposes them to potentially ruinous medical debt that they have no ability to avoid.

For many Texans, state and federal policy choices have left them without a realistic path to coverage. They cannot access Medicaid because they earn too much (in many cases, "too much" means \$1 per year) and cannot qualify for federal subsidies through the Affordable Care Act because they do not earn enough under current rules.

Today, Texas makes Medicaid available to parents who are at or below 14% of the Federal Poverty Level, which translates to a family of four earning no more than \$3,500 per year to qualify. Unless disabled or over the age of 65, childless adults are ineligible for Medicaid.

As a result, many full-time workers across Texas whose employers don't offer coverage are unable to obtain it on their own. Consider these hypothetical examples based on average Affordable Care Act Silver Plan premiums in the Marketplace:

A 24-year-old grocery clerk in Houston with one child making \$16,000 a year, slightly above minimum wage for a full-time job would pay \$3,671 per year in premiums — or 23 percent of her annual income. Out-of-pocket costs could total an additional \$8,550.

A married 50-year-old-couple in Dallas with three children, who were laid off and now are stringing together gig labor as delivery drivers making \$30,000 a year combined would pay \$13,987 per year in premiums, or 47% of their annual income. Out-of-pocket costs could total an additional \$17,100. In total, that could be more than the couple earns in one year.

For these Texans — and the hundreds of thousands falling into this "coverage gap" — our failure to act as

a state has left hard-working Texans like them with no realistic way to obtain coverage that can protect them from ruinous medical debt.

Developing affordable health coverage solutions for the growing number of uninsured is critical so that Texas families and individuals can access the medical care they need today. Three out of every four Texans without health insurance report skipping care because of costs, according to Episcopal Health Foundation research

search.

Health coverage would also reduce the threat of significant medical debt for Texans accessing emergency care. According to a 2018 survey by the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority, 29% of Texans – 6.2 million adults -- have unpaid medical bills. Especially for low-income Texans, overwhelming medical debt can make an honest day's work

However, our state government has the power to give Texans more coverage options.

seem futile.

Texas 2036 created The Health Coverage Policy Explorer. This tool allows all Texans – both policymakers and the public – to explore policy alternatives and combine policies to maximize both the number of covered Texans and federal funding

streams.

Transparent, data-driven resources, like the Explorer, show that Texas has opportunities to create cost-effectives solutions for our state.

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
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Keep Salado Beautiful Spring Cleanup April 10-17

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



If you don't believe in fairy tales, you won't believe this happened. It is said that the deal was actually played in the early days of contract bridge more specifically, in 1927!

Opening lead — six of diamonds.

South opened the bidding with one spade. Of course, today we'd bid one club, but in those days the principle of opening the suit below the singleton had not yet been developed.

West ventured two hearts, a hair-raising action by present standards, but people were more sporting

South thought he'd be unlikely to score many diamond tricks if he undertook a three-notrump contract, so he tried four hearts, even though West had already bid the suit. He was hoping he'd make enough high-card tricks in the side suits and low-card trump tricks to bring the contract home.

West doubled, and North, who had no idea what was going on, passed. West led a diamond, whereupon South quickly wrapped up 10 tricks!

and cashed the king, discarding a club. He then played a club, losing the king to the ace. Back came a club to South's queen. Declarer then cashed the A-K of spades, ruffed a spade in dummy and a diamond in his hand.

By this time, South had won seven of the eight tricks played and still held the A-Q-10 of hearts, a spade and a club. West had only the K-J-9-

Declarer led a spade, and West was forced to ruff and return a trump. South won with the ten and exited with a club. Again West had to ruff and return a trump, handing declarer his 10th trick and his doubled contract.

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

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

NOTICE OF APPLICATION TO AMEND A CERTIFICATE OF CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY TO PROVIDE WATER AND SEWER UTILITY SERVICE IN BELL AND WILLIAMSON COUNTIES, TEXAS

The City of Jarrell has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to amend its Certificate of Convenience and Necessity (CCN) No. 13214 and CCN No. 20998 for the provision of retail water and sewer utility service in Bell and Williamson Counties, Texas.

The requested area overlaps the district boundaries of the following districts:

- Chisholm Trail SUD
- Donahoe Creek Watershed Authority

If the districts do not request a public hearing, the Commission shall determine that the districts are consenting to the City of Jarrell's request to provide retail water and sewer utility service in the requested area.

Requested Water Area 1 and 2

The requested areas include <u>0</u> current customers, are located between <u>4.6</u> mile <u>north</u> and <u>4</u> miles south of downtown Jarrell, Texas, and is generally bounded on the north by Solana Ranch Road; on the east by Interstate Highway 35; on the south by Ronald W. Reagan Boulevard; and on the west by intersection of Farm to Market Road 487 and Spears Ranch Road. The requested water area 1 and 2 includes approximately 5,482 acres of uncertificated area.

Requested Sewer Area 1 and 2:

The requested areas includes <u>0</u> current customers, are located between <u>4.6</u> miles <u>north</u> and <u>4</u> miles south of downtown Jarrell, Texas, and is generally bounded on the north by Solana Ranch Road; on the east by Hill Road and County Road 303; on the south by Ronald W. Reagan Boulevard; and on the west by intersection of Farm to Market Road 487 and Spears Ranch Road. The requested water area 1 and 2 includes approximately <u>5,854</u> acres of uncertificated area.

The result of the application will be the addition of approximately 5,482 acres to CCN No. 13214 and approximately 5,854 acres to CCN No. 20998.

Persons who wish to intervene in the proceeding or comment upon action sought should contact the Public Utility Commission, P.O. Box 13326, Austin, Texas 78711-3326, or call the Public Utility Commission at (512) 936-7120 or (888) 782-8477. Hearing- and speech-impaired individuals with text telephones (TTY) may contact the commission at (512) 936-7136. The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is (30 days from the mailing or publication of notice, whichever occurs later, unless otherwise provided by the presiding officer). You must send a letter requesting intervention to the commission which is received by that date. The letter must include the person's name, address, email address and fax number if applicable.

If a valid public hearing is requested, the Commission will forward the application to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH) for a hearing. If no settlement is reached and an evidentiary hearing is held, SOAH will submit a recommendation to the Commission for a final decision. An evidentiary hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district

A landowner with a tract of land at least 25 acres or more, that is partially or wholly located within the requested area, may file a written request with the Commission to be excluded from the requested area ("opt out") within (30) days from the date that notice was provided by the Utility. All opt out requests must include a large-scale map, a metes and bounds description of the landowner's tract of land, landowner's name, address, email address and fax number, if applicable.

Persons who wish to request this option should file the required documents with the:

In addition, the landowner must also send a copy of the opt out request to the Utility. Staff may request additional information regarding your request.
