Sales tax check up 9% for Village

April 2021

The Village of Salado April sales tax payment was almost 9% more than the 2020 payment.

The Village received a payment of \$36,951.44, compared to \$33,960.99 for April 2020. For the year, Salado is running almost 10% ahead, having received \$208,518.34, compared to \$190,243.93 through April 2020.

Other Bell County cities that collect sales tax, saw sizable increases. Harker Heights saw an increase of 11% over last April. The city received \$578,606.70

this month compared to \$522,756.77 in April 2020.

Salado Public Library District received its April sales tax check of \$31,780.95, which was 7.5% more than last year's \$29,551.83. For the year, the Library is running 11.8% ahead of 2020, having received \$170,681.03 compared to \$152,613.62 through April 2020.

Bell County had an increase of 5% in its April payment. The County received \$1.7 million for the half-cent sales tax it levies, compared to \$1.6 million in April 2020.

JP Morgan CEO: economy ready for Goldilocks moment

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), our choice for a U.S. stock market indicator, rose 2.71% for the week ending April 9 to close at 4128.80, its 19th record close this year. That rise in value brings its year-to-date gain to 9.92%. The catalysts were reported to be a slight dip in bond rates combined with increased Wall Street enthusiasm for the proposed budget and infrastructure plans presented by the administration. While the week's leading gains shifted back to the larger tech companies, the CRSP US Mid-Cap Value Index rose 0.79% for the week and is now 15.54% ahead, year-to-date.

The yield on the ten-year U.S. Treasury note slipped 1.1% to 1.658% as longterm inflation fears continued to abate and in doing so supplied fuel to the stock market rally. The yield curve continues to be quite steep, forecasting good economic times ahead for the next year or two. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) joined with bonds, falling about 3% to \$59.34, still well within its recent trading range at a price high enough to provide profitability for the oil companies but not so high as to negatively impact economic growth.

In a bit of reassuring news, the frenzy around GameStop has abated, with the price down 50% from its high in February and gold which serves as a harbinger of doom as dark days approach when it rises, is down 17% from its \$2,070 high last August. In short, some of the craziness that was in the headlines during the pandemic is simmering down. There are still millions and even billions of dollars chasing pipe dreams though, as Special Acquisition Corporations (SPACs), essentially speculative corporate shells that own nothing but promise to do something interesting with investors' money come to market, so all the insanity is not behind us.

Market & Economic Update

Jamie Dimon, the CEO of JP Morgan, America's largest bank, wrote in his annual letter published on April 7, that the U.S. economy has the potential to enter into a "Goldilocks Moment" as we emerge from the suppression generated by this pandemic, bolstered by strong consumer savings, low consumer debt levels, expanded vaccine distribution, and the proposed \$2.3 trillion infrastructure plan. This year's letter is a near complete reversal of the one he published in 2020, in which he warned Americans to brace for a "severe recession". He did warn us to be aware that higher taxes will come on both corporations and wealthy families as "you can't run a 10% to 15% deficit forever" but he added that wealthy families and corporations would not object if they thought their money was being well

As if in coordination with Mr. Dimon, the Labor Department released its March Jobs report showing that the economy added 916,000 jobs and the unemployment rate fell to 6% from February's 6.2%. Private employers added the lion's share of jobs at 780,000 while much of the rest were teachers going back to work as schools reopened. The leading sector for jobs added was leisure and hospitality with 280,000 as Americans returned to eating out and traveling.

of Independent Businesses (NFIB) reported that the number of unfilled job openings also jumped, to 7.364 million, approximately 74% of the number of officially unemployed individuals. Contrast that with the fact that for the five years following the June 2009

bottom in the "great recession" the number of openings averaged only 28% of the official unemployment numbers. Unfortunately, as has happened before, both location and skill set mismatches hamper getting those unemployed workers into the open jobs. 40% of small businesses surveyed by the NFIB were reporting they had openings that were "hard to fill" because of a shortage of qualified work-

In more good news, de-

spite supply constraints

caused by a shortage of computer chips, U.S. auto sales rose 11.3% in the first quarter according to Ward's Intelligence. March's estimated sales were up to 16.8 million vehicles, putting that month about on par with sales before the pandemic. In a confirmation of the individual statistics, Moody's/ CNN Back to Normal Index rose to 87.1 from its low of 74 at the beginning of the year. To cap the current and trailing good news, the Institute for Supply Management (ISM) announced its nonmanufacturing survey's composite index jumped from 55.3 in February to 63.7 in March, putting it at a record high since its inception back in the 1990s. On that index, numbers above 50 indicate growth. At the same time the manufacturing index rose from 60.8 in February to 64.7 in March, its highest reading since the early 1980s.

The bottom line remains The National Federation the same, and perhaps even more so. The American economy is well on its way back to what we used to call "normal" but still has a way to go. Just as importantly, the proposals and funding appear to be falling into place to create Jamie Dimon's "Goldilocks moment" in the next few years.



Decoys and Other Fakes


When we constructed the interstate system, we simply bypassed much of our country's intricate variety. Still, in spite of losing this national character, there are those who get their kicks motoring the monotonous I-ways of America. They find a comfortable routine in the coast to coast, border to border ennui of signs for toll collection, motels, chain restaurants and gas stations.

But some blotches of local personality remain, concealed in this national humdrum. For instance, one of the oddball pleasures of driving along I-95 tempts the motorist at Havre de Grace, Maryland.

At exit 89, to be precise, is a billboard for the Decoy Capital of the World. That's right, there's an actual museum for hunters who want to kill ducks and other birds, blow them out of the sky. That's not my kind of thing, but my mind has wandered, curious as I've coped with the interstate boredom at exit 89, whether there is an actual decoy museum, or if when you get there it's nothing but a sign, a decoy fake -- a year-round April Fool's joke.

Such is the state of the demented mind badly in need of a rest stop. ("Don't worry, if you can hold it just a few minutes, there's one nearby.")

I've had similar tortured fantasies as I've meandered along the information highways in more modern times. I embrace a fundamental law of cyber-life: "Never believe anything you see on the internet." That applies to social media



postings that have no constraints on misinformation, along with the commercial advertising that rocks to a deceptive algorithmic tempo all its own and whispers, "You're being duped."

Emails are even more underhanded. How many thousands of them have you gotten, pretending to be from royalty and claiming that you personally have received a large inheritance -- all you have to do is send a few hundred or few thousand dollars to get it?

Communication been so corrupted that you can't even trust the calls you receive from Social Security or the IRS, warning you that you're about to be arrested unless you send gift certificates to the authori-

Back to emails, my personal favorites are the ones making some fictitious claim. Then you receive another email, on official looking letterhead, warning you that the original was a fraud. Except that it's a fraud too, with a link to share personal information or some other cybermarker with a certain secret Russian or Baltic hacker or phisherman lurking out there.

But the anti-social media are the absolute worst. Tucked among the cute doggy pictures and videos of daddy and mommy coming home from a dangerous

military outpost are the advocacy lie mongers, the troll farmers, the purveyors of "alternative facts." If it's too scandalous to be true, it is. Actually, it's the contemporary version of something that's been around for much of history. It's the smear campaign, the political lie, all gussied up in the latest version of the technological pandemic.

Unlike the coronavirus, where there seems to be a cure in reach, the main impediments are only the humans with distorted political thinking and no common sense whatsoever; they don't even wear a simple mask until the deadly threat subsides. But there is no end in sight for the cyber scourge, no light at the end of the tunnel, just more tunnels ... hiding whatever dark money for mischief it can buy from political hucksters.

Wherever our infrastructure can take us, the principles of leadership are hidden in the folds of a worldwide web that is impenetrable, particularly the sections that the politicians have reserved for themselves. Unlike any repairs involving concrete they may have contrived, the technological bells and whistles rust out. That's because they are fake and deep, con artists making increasingly complex but effective decoys and fooling everybody. 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
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
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
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Weldon Glen Townsend November 12, 1935 April 4, 2021



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



Occasionally, declarer may make a play that might arouse suspicion that he had peeked into one of his opponents' hands. While such things have been known to happen, the fact is that most such plays are based more on sound reasoning than on ill-gotten information.

Consider this case where South was in three notrump and West led a heart. Declarer held up his ace on the first two hearts and won the third as East discarded a low spade.

South handled the club suit, from which he needed to score three tricks to make his contract. The obvious approach was to cross to dummy and try a club finesse. If it won, 10 tricks would be there for the taking; if it lost, he would go down one.

After careful consideration, declarer plunked down the ace of clubs, caught West's king and finished with an overtrick!

Since the chance of West's holding the king singleton with five cards outstanding is exceedingly small

to develop the three club tricks he needed in the safest way possible. He could afford to lose a club trick in the process, so long as he did not lose it to West. A successful club finesse



Lady Eagles' season ends in State Semi-Finals

As Maria Pauer's corner kick with 20 seconds left on the clock curved into the side of the Calallen goal, Salado's hopes for a return to the State finals ran out with the remaining ticks left in regulation.

Salado had closed a huge gap from the first period, in which the Lady Cats had put up a 3-0 lead, but could not get that final shot to cross, despite having two shots on goal in the final six minutes of play.

The Lady Eagles looked as is they would get an early lead, but Lady Cat goal keeper Raquel Vasquez made a save in the fourth minute of play.

Three minutes later, Jillian Curtis got past the Salado defenders and put a shot into the back of the net in the eighth minute of the match for a 1-0 lead.

Vasquez made another save in the 11th minute and defended a free kick by Payton Cunningham from 35 yards out, kicking the ball to midfield.

The Cats got past Salado again and Curtis got her second goal of the night in the 17th minute of the match. A minute later, Calallen set up for a corner kick, but Avery Wright got the save off of a header on the in-bound kick.

It wasn't enough to get the Lady Eagles out of trouble, as Calallen was able to keep the ball on the Salado side of the field and Kaitlyn McCarty took a kick from Curtis and put it in the net with 21:19 left in the first period for a daunting 3-0 lead.

Over the final 18 minutes of the first period, Calallen missed five shots on goal and Wright defended another five shots on goal to keep the game from becoming a blowout.

Calallen defended a shot on goal in the first 30 seconds of the second period and took a shot of their own in the 43rd minute. Allison Carnahan took

a corner kick from Pauer at the 45th minute but missed across the goal.

Just a few minutes later,

Halev Piatak put the ball in the net coming across from the left side to make the score 3-1 in the 47th minute of play.

Wright made two saves before Pauer scored on an assist from Anna Lesley in the 61st minute of play.

Salado missed shots in the 65th and 66th minutes and defended against free kicks as the clock clicked down into the final eight minutes of play. Wright made a save against a header coming off of a corner kick in the 72nd minute and kicked the ball back to the Calallen side. Lesley missed a shot in the 75th minute and Wright made a save against a shot in the 78th minute, getting the ball back down-field.

Salado worked the ball down-field, setting up the corner kick when the ball went out of bounds off of a Calallen player with 40 seconds left in the match. setting up the final corner kick that hit the side of the net, ending Salado's storied season.

The Lady Eagles end the season as the Region III Champions, winning over Bay City, who were the #1 ranked team in state before their first loss to Salado on April 9.


