Cost of lumber axes April new housing starts

The Markets

Despite all the alarmist headlines about a market decline underway, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) closed out the week ending May 21 at 4155.86, down only 0.43% for the week and a mere 1.81% from its record high close of 4282.60 on May 7. The Index is up 10.64% yearto-date. The reported consensus on Wall Street was that the market was looking for something to be afraid of. First, it was a fear the Federal Reserve would prematurely raise interest rates, then when the minutes of the last Fed meeting allayed that fear, the market slumped because of a selloff in crypto currencies. Walmart, Amazon, and Target all came in with exceptional revenue and earnings reports for the first quarter as well as positive guidance for the rest of the year, indicators of more growth to come. The CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index slid 0.93% leaving it up 19.74% for the year and down 1.75% from its top two weeks ago.


The rate on the 10-year U.S. Treasury note where one would expect so see the first evidence of any inflation threat, actually declined 1.1% to yield 1.612% at the end of the week. Traders reported that they, like their stock-trading comrades, are confused as to what the future holds but with each small rise in yield, interest-hungry buyers swoop in and drive the rates back down. The yield curve remains steep. Analysts who read the Treasury tea leaves posit that the Treasury market is forecasting about 2.25% average annual inflation over the next five years, very close to what the Federal Reserve Board has targeted as its goal. The price of West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) slipped down about 2.6% to \$63.78, well within its recent trading range and suggesting the economic recovery will continue.

The Economy

It would be easy to blame generous unemployment benefits for the worker shortage, but only about 25% of the unemployed workers are drawing those benefits. More, the same labor shortage in the face of high unemployed numbers is evident in other countries. In Australia, where unemployment benefits were cut in March, there are 40% more unfilled jobs than before the pandemic, and in England, as the pubs open up, hours are being limited by the inability to hire staff. Surveys suggest that fear of contracting COVID combined with a critical shortage of childcare may account for some of the McDonalds, discrepancy. Amazon, and Walmart have responded with increased hourly wages and in some cases, hiring bonuses, and raised by the marketplace.

If you are worried that this expansion may stumble and as it does, take down the stock market, the Conference Board's Leading Economic Index (LEI) may put your mind at ease. As their report states, "While U.S. employment and production have not recovered to their pre-pandemic levels yet, the U.S. LEI suggests the economy's upward trend should continue and growth may even accelerate in the near term." The Board now forecasts real GDP growth at an annualized rate of 6 to 9 percent in the second quarter and 6.4 percent for 2021. The LEI is not infallible, but in the decades of its existence, it has proven to be one of the most reliable indicators of where our economy is in the business cycle of recovery-expansion-contraction.

Housing starts sagged a bit in April and the reports from builders are that the cost of lumber has simply gone to the point where it is often unprofitable to build even at the house prices we are seeing. One local builder noted that a piece of lumber that cost him \$7 a year ago is now priced at \$51. Initial unemployment claims hit a new pandemic low of 444,000, still twice the pre-pandemic norm, but trending nicely downward.

The bottom line remains mostly unchanged. Both the U.S. and global economies are experiencing some glitches and bumps as demand suddenly ramped up in the last month or so, but a lot of focus and money is going into the means to meet that demand. Expect more bumps as we do an economic restart in a few months that took us years to accomplish following the great recession of 2008-2009. Meanwhile, the markets are going to fret and worry, but that is good. Be patient, keep some powder dry and hang on for the ride!

When it comes to property taxes, you ain't seen nothing yet

To the Editor:

Today there are consistent complaints about local property taxes, but as they say, "You ain't seen nothin' yet."

What with aberrant construction inflation and induced property value increases due to a few area developments, there will be no limit to Bell County values. However, I recently told an Appraisal District employee that what we have now is much better than it once was.

Before the District's evolution, appraisals were "catch as catch can." In the 1960s, Salado ISD's appraiser would sit at your dining table and inquire as to how much livestock you had; your furniture's worth; and any jewelry, cash in bank, securities, etc. that you had.

Later, the district used Bell County's assessments. Invariably, with that came multiple and gross inequities in appraisals. One assessor's ran to good buddy deals and another's to corporate favoritism, about which, as the ISD's appointee to address tax values within the Salado ISD, he and I had several heated disagreements - I won.

Inequities are not adequately addressed under the current system, but there is a more legitimate appeal process instead of having to challenge the county assessor and then appeal to a consortium of pompous and avaricious county commissioners. (Still, I don't understand the Appraisal District's concept that bedrock-exposed, caliche land is more productive than creek bottom, ex-farm land planted in improved grasses. But who is a rancher to question "experts"?)

Real estate - land and improvements - still carry the major burden of what taxpayers must "render unto Caesar." This, for no other reason than their visibility and lack of mobility. Business inventories contribute a minor part. A few decades ago, individuals were expected to voluntarily render their personal assets, but I was told that only one person in Temple did so, and the city commissioners would laugh at her honesty.

Soon after Nixon abandoned the Gold Standard in 1971, agricultural land became a target, and projected taxes were feared to exceed production. This precipitated a movement to assess and tax "open/agricultural" land based on use, not speculative "value." Early successes were only partial, but as LBJ said, "Anyone not satisfied with half a loaf has never been hungry."

Some elected officials began a search for taxable options. One such individual was Gene Fondren, the "floatorial" state representative between Bell and Milam Counties. I had met Gene in the mid 1970s upon his campaigning in Salado's Pace Park, and he invited me to present at a "Special House Committee on Alternatives to Ad Valorem Taxes for School Funding" to be chaired by Tom Massey. In my youthful optimism, I gladly accepted. I prepared a list of potential items for assessment that would support the philosophy of tax-

ation - small assessments on a broad tax base that would be fair to everyone. Since investors, including me, paid no taxes on securities transfers, I felt that a small tax on their many transactions would be fair, as would be a small tax on real estate transfers. There already was one on automo-

I really emphasized extending the sales tax to groceries. There was already one on restaurant meals - and even beer if one ate something with it. The collection and reporting mechanisms were already in place, so there would be no start up costs, and everyone ate, so the tax would be

The committee consisted of old time legislators who had for years fed at the taxpayers' trough as well as one recently elected Black female representative. There came forth a cacophony of cries that a groceries' tax would be "regressive." I countered, "It would not be regressive," and above the clamor arose a firm female voice, saying, "He's right." She and I simultaneously said, "Food stamps." I later found that the lady was a younger Wilhelmina Delco, who had been elected in 1974, and during ten terms was a stalwart for support of public education in Texas.

There was one unanticipated distraction. Off to my left a television crew was conducting an interview. I asked who it was, and was told it was the Speaker of the House, Bill Clayton. That night I saw the interview during which Clayton emphatically said, "There will be no action on school taxes."

Thus furthered my education on the political process, but upon reviewing the documents my comments and projections are still relevant today. Unfortunately, the politicians also continue to be of the same cut.

Although that effort was fruitless, landowner interests were able to make somewhat of a trade: They would not push taxation of the wealthy's personal assets in return for consideration of open land taxes based on use or potential agricultural productivity.

I still treasure legislators' kudos for my helping make this happen. For a few years taxing entities circumvented the intent of the process, but eventually it evolved to what we now have. However, even today there appear to be stirrings within taxing entities to whittle away at the hard won protective aspects of the legislation(s).

Yessir, the inevitables: Death and taxes.

To the Editor:

I have read with great concern your article in the Salado Village Voice on May 20, 2021.

The front-page article entitled "CUWCD approves both Well permits for Victo-

ry Rock crushing operation" was incomplete and very deficient and lacked the whole story. Because of its misleading nature, the full truth did not prevail. The District's desire is to conduct a public hearing in accordance with State Law and District Rules for non-exempt wells. We have a storied history of providing due process to all parties and staying within our statutory authority.

CUWCD is a model of taking this approach since being affirmed by the voters in 1999. I am a Bell County native and a Salado graduate, property owner and businessman. I cherish my role that we be fair to all parties, protect property rights, keep the district in our lane and deliberate in such a manner that decisions are legally and scientifically defensible. What better opportunity for our constituents to feel that their opinions are heard and that the board can fairly and impartially deliberate.

I would like to simply provide additional facts and insight to the nine hours "you referenced" in your article and let's call it "The Rest of the Story" in memory of the late and great, Paul Harvey. I was the Presiding Officer of the Contested Case Hearing on both permits by Victory Rock LLC and have been the board president since 2011.

As the Presiding Officer, my role is to determine and afford all affected parties who wish for a contested case hearing that we conduct one with empathy and decorum. This simply means, if protestants are adjacent property owners and/ or well owners potentially effected by the pumping of groundwater, they are given "legal standing". Legal standing affords them the right to offer formal comments, offer evidence and cross examine the applicant, their representatives, the district general manager, the district's consultants as well as the board members. During the time of hearing testimony and deliberation, the board, prior to rendering any decision, is required to consider the affected parties comments, evidence and specific requests before rendering a defensible decision.

In your article you failed to state, at the beginning of evidentiary portion of the hearing, why I denied their attorney's initial request for another continuance on the first application. For the record we decided at the initial hearing on March 10, 2021 that a continuance was needed for all parties and specifically that the applicant provide additional evidence and correct their initial needs assessment. We were aligned with the concerns of the affected parties and a continuance was given at that March meeting. We then put our general manager to work gathering additional information, have the applicant modify the application to address our concerns, and provide LETTERS CONTINUED PAGE 3A

a better understanding why the 2-acre feet was needed from the middle Trinity well located on the property. He was also to communicate to the protestants what a "Contested Case Hearing" is and what it provides to the affected parties. It was apparent they did not know in the first hearing that it affords them effect legal remedies over simply offering "public comments" prior to the hearing. All elected officials know and understand the limits to deliberating on public comments.

If a person listens to the entire recording, they will hear numerous times during the testimony and after testimony that, I "the presiding officer" offered all parties the opportunity for them to request a "Continuance". The protestants, their attorney and the applicant did not take advantage of those multiple offers I made. They had a legal right at that time to stop the hearing for an additional thirty days. I could have and most likely, would have provided another continuance. It was then their choice, at that time, to put the board on a path to render a decision. The board deliberated and applied measures and benchmarks of accountability of

the applicant to comply before using groundwater.

The Village Voice has failed to tell the whole story. CUWCD's hope is that the community would see the merits of holding a contested case hearing at the local level so that citizens can hear all sides.

At the end of the night the board sided with the concerns of the affected parties and established legally defensible expectations of the applicant to protect groundwater and comply with TCEQ's regulations. I quote from the six protestants at the end of the evening that "We want them to have water! We want them to suppress the dust?"


The board also expressed our legal position that the applicant should take extreme efforts and measures to conduct a geologic assessment of the underlying aquifer even though the district legally cannot demand that to be done. The district also guided our GM to develop a legal and scientifically defensible effort to monitor the Edwards BFZ water quality in the area wells with the owner's approval. That was funded later in the evening.



In commemoration of 529 College Savings Day, the Comptroller's office is offering a special webinar on May 26 at 1 p.m. Central Time to provide information about the TCSP and LS529 college savings plans.




