

County now has public nuisance abatement

Bell County Commissioners at their June 14 meeting, approved a Public Nuisance Abatement Order that allows officials to issue notices to property owners for creating a public nuisance on their properties in the unincorporated areas of the county.

The seven-page Order defines the following as public nuisances:

(1) Keeping, storing, or accumulating refuse on premises in a neighborhood unless the refuse is entirely contained in a closed receptacle;

(2) Keeping, storing, or accumulating rubbish, including newspapers, nuisance vehicles, refrigerators, stoves, furniture, tires, and cans, on premises in a neighborhood or within 300 feet of a public street for 10 days or more, unless the rubbish or object is completely enclosed in a building or is not visible from a public street;

(3) Maintaining premises in a manner that creates an unsanitary condition likely to attract or harbor mosquitoes, rodents, vermin, or disease-carrying pests;

(4) Allowing weeds to grow on premises in a neighborhood if the weeds are located within 300 feet of another residence or commercial establishment. Weeds are defined as "all rank and uncultivated vegetable growth or matter that has grown to more than 36 inches in height or may create an unsanitary condition or become a harborage for rodents, vermin.

(5) Maintaining a building in a manner that is structurally unsafe or constitutes a hazard to safety, health, or public welfare because of inadequate maintenance, unsanitary conditions, dilapidation, obsolescence, disaster, damage, or abandonment or because it constitutes a fire hazard;

(6) Maintaining a flea market in a manner that constitutes a fire hazard;

(7) Discarding refuse or creating a hazardous visual obstruction on county-owned land or land or easements owned or held by a special district that has the commissioners court of the county as its governing body.

(8) Discarding refuse on the smaller of the area that spans 20 feet on each side of a utility line; or the actual span of the utility easement.

(9) Filling or blocking a drainage easement or failing to maintain a drainage easement.

(10) Discarding refuse on property that is not authorized for that activity; or

(11) Surface discharge from an on-site sewage

The Nuisance Abatement Order was created in accordance with Section 343.021 of the Texas Health and Safety Code.

If an offense is found, property owners will be issued a notice and have 30 days to abate or clean up the problem. If a property owner is found to have ignored the notice, the result is a misdemeanor and can result in a fine of \$200. However, repeated convictions for failure to address nuisances can result in fines of up to \$1,000 and up to six months in jail.

During discussion of the order, members of the Commissioners Court made clear that it would not be used as an excuse to write citations.

"We are not going to have a bunch of officers out looking for things to issue citations on," said Russell Schneider, Commissioner Precinct 1. "It's another tool to expedite getting things done."

"When the offense is given, it is a 30-day notice before a violation actually occurs," said Precinct 2 Commissioner Bobby Whitson. "Before it is abated, you can request a hearing and talk to a judge about whether or not it really needs to be abated, so there are several steps in that process to ensure that everybody has a say."

"It only comes into effect when it affects somebody else's property or public safety," Whitson said.

"We did not do this lightly or overnight," Schumann said. "What we're finding is that in neighborhoods in the county, outside of the city, there are neighbors who are not very considerate."

Bell County Judge David Blackburn agreed that the purpose of the order is protect public health.

"I believe that the county has always tried to work with property owners over the years to get compliance," Judge Blackburn said. "The end goal for all of this is not to issue citations or injunctions or set assessments on properties. The end goal is just to get compliance."

Village sets June 24 hearing on Sanctuary Development

Salado aldermen invite citizens to a public hearing regarding Sanctuary Development at 6:30 p.m. June 24 at Thomas Arnold Elementary Cafeteria, 575 Thomas Arnold Rd.

Since agreements between the Village and Sanctuary were signed by Billie Hanks, Jr. and then-mayor Skip Blancett on Nov. 25, 2015, almost 300 acres of mostly agriculture land has been annexed into the Village of Salado.

As part of the agreements, Sanctuary donated six acres near the top of the hill at Royal Street to the Village for its Wastewater Treatment Plant as well as a Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) discharge permit approving operation of a WWTP of up to 200,000 gallons per day (GPD) treated water (with the ability to expand to 300,000 GPD capacity).

The property annexed into Salado in 2016 as part of the requirements of the Master Development Agreement and Wastewater Agreement. The property owners continue to claim the agricultural use exemptions for property tax until such time as they are developed. Since annexation, only two projects have been brought before the Village for development: a 180-lot single family residential development off of Royal Street and an apartment complex off of South Main Street.

Sanctuary broke ground on the 180-lot single family residential development last year, but work has apparently come to a halt.

Water's Edge, the apartment complex being developed by RREAF Holdings, deviates from the Old European style of architecture that the Sanctuary developers said would be the key look of Sanctuary properties. Instead, it opts for a

simpler, historic Texas design in its architecture that features lap siding, high pitched roofs, limestone and board and batten siding.

Phase 1 of the apartment complex will be 210 units of apartments along with a resort-style pool, a leasing headquarters and clubhouse. Phase 2 will be an expansion of multi-family residential with 90 units. The third phase will include the 10 single family residential units.

Water's Edge will include a new road, Nottingham Street, that enters onto South Main Street. Edinburgh Street will connect College Hill Dr. to Santa Maria.

The first phase of the apartment complex will have seven three- or four-story apartment buildings. Phase 1 will have nine studio apartments, 77 one bedroom apartments, 92 two-bedroom apartments and 32 three-bedroom apartments.

The Land Uses Master Plan outlines the following general use categories and specifications, which can be amended by as much as 20 percent without further approval:

- Commercial (e.g. office, retail, restaurants, etc.): 515,000 heated sq. ft.
- Entertainment Venue: 40,000 heated sq. ft.
- Lodging: 355 rooms.
- Multi-family (multi-story including senior housing and rental): 575 units.
- Multi-Family (for sale including condos, townhouse and duplexes): 130 units.
- Single Family (for sale): 364 units.
- Parking Garage: 500 spaces

The Chapter 380 Economic Development agreement outlines 15 years of tax rebates for commercial properties. It states that the owners will receive rebates equal "to the annual Property Tax Receipts actually received by the Village associ-

ated with such development (if any) less the amount of Property Tax Receipts in the Base Tax Year for the property associated with such development," multiplied by 50%.

The property taxes will be rebated for a period of 15 years "from the recording date of the last Subdivision as designed by the Village of Salado Subdivision Ordinance No. 2009.02 or the 15th anniversary date of the last certificate of occupancy issues for a commercial building, whichever is the last to occur."

Additionally, the agreements include verbiage concerning Future Phases in which it states that the Village "shall look favorably in good faith on extending the existing economic incentives" for the future Phase Two Entertainment District which will consist of an approximately 1,800 to 2,500 seat additional music venue and multi-story parking garage. However, the agreement is not binding on this future development.

The Tourism Marketing Agreement includes a rebate of 50 % of the hotel occupancy taxes generated by the Sanctuary back to the development "for a period of 15 calendar years from the Opening Date of the last Venue opened to the public by the Owners."

The agreements also state that the Village will support the formation of Public Improvement District for financing the construction of infrastructure for wastewater, water, streets, lights, parks and public spaces in Sanctuary.

Sanctuary developers have proposed two separate PIDs to fund improvements. Sanctuary PID petition requests funding of up to \$35 million in improvements while Sanctuary East PID petition requests funding of up to \$25 million in improvements. Both PIDs, if

approved, will have a maximum assessment of \$0.50 per \$100 valuation property tax rates for the properties within those PIDs.

Salado Mayor Michael Coggin released a copy of the June 8 letter to Robert Sulaski of Sanctuary Development outlining areas that he would like to address in the agreements.

Coggin suggests limiting the term of the agreements to 15 years from the signing of the agreements, rather than 15 years from the issuance of the last subdivision plat filing (residential) or building permit issued (commercial). He also requests limiting property tax rebates to commercial development only.

"Not only are the terms of the multiple Agreements between us very one-sided in your favor, but it now seems that the underlying development project is less viable than anticipated," Coggin wrote Sulaski. "It has been well over five years since the Village granted you the zoning you requested, and yet other than the one multi-family project, there is no movement towards developing the bulk of your project. We take this as a sign that perhaps the current zoning and project plan are not viewed positively by the marketplace."

"We have not been given any projected financial information regarding your project sufficient to allow the Village to conclude that the PID will successfully be able to pay the debt without imposing crippling assessments on the landowners and residents in the project. We will need full disclosure to establish that the PID will succeed; otherwise, the Village will be saddled with an area of town that is a drag on the future success of the Village," Coggin stated.

Coggin invited the developers to attend the June 24 meeting but has received no response (as of presstime)

PUC asks Texans to cut back

The Public Utility Commission of Texas this week echoed a call from the Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT) to encourage electricity conservation in Texas homes and businesses for the coming week.

ERCOT has reported the loss of more than 11,000 megawatts of generation due to "forced outages." Forced outages are unscheduled and result from the failure of a power plant to function as designed.

Texans are being asked to take simple steps in their homes and businesses to reduce demand on the grid. As temperatures peak in the late

afternoon, air conditioning use typically follows suit, causing demand to surge between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. The PUC advises residential and business customers alike to reduce electricity usage with simple adjustments: Raise air conditioning thermostats at least two degrees and turn off unnecessary lighting. Customers should also wait until after sunset to run dishwashing and laundry appliances.

The PUC also maintains a friendly source of low-cost conservation tips and other energy efficiency-related home improvements at www.PowerToSaveTexas.org.

CPI may be misleading, due to short recession spike in used car prices

The Markets

The old S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) rose a mere 0.41% for the week but that was enough to eke out a new record high close of 4247.44. The market overcame a bout of worry as the Consumer Price Index rose more than has been seen in 13 years and initially began a swoon but those who had looked hard at the economic evidence swooped in with buy orders, resulting in a net gain for the Index. The SPX is now up 13.08% year-to-date. The CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index joined the Dow Jones Industrial Average in slipping backward, down 0.49% but up 21.70% for the year. The reported consensus on the street was that the stock market was priced fairly for the reported earnings from first quarter and would now need new positive economic information to continue rising at more than a sedate pace.

The yield on the benchmark ten-year U.S. Treasury note not only ignored the inflation alarms, but actually declined by well over 6% to 1.453% for the week. The indicators from the yield curve suggest that we have a healthy economy with plenty of growth ahead of us but with no structural inflation in sight. To say that the bond market behavior was frustrating to the inflation hawks was to make an understatement. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) rose another two percent to \$70.78 per barrel on steadily increasing demand, the highest it has been since October 2018.

The Economy

The week's headline economic news was not exactly new or unexpected but potentially misleading. The Labor Department reported that May's U.S. Consumer Price Index (CPI) rose 5% from this time last year. If we eliminate the volatile food and fuel prices, the rise was a lower but still notable 3.8%. The misleading parts of that number are to be found in two areas. First, a year ago the U.S. economy was in free fall and prices were down and

declining pretty much across the board. Measuring from that brief but significant period of deflation to the rather sudden return to something that looks a lot like "normal" and becoming alarmed that prices have risen is not a good assessment of the facts. The recovery from sudden, short recessions often produces sudden, short inflation spikes. Second, about one-third of that inflation number comes from a single element, used cars and trucks. This is pretty much an old story by now, but folks, there is a severe computer chip shortage in the auto industry. The combination of consumers released to hit the car lots and roads with their bank accounts bulging, and a dramatic slowdown in auto production has forced the overflow demand off into the used car lots. Lots of demand and a limited supply means prices will go up, in this case 7.3% in one month. The story is much the same as with houses. If you've got a used car, truck, RV, or house to sell, this is the time. Unfortunately, finding a reasonably priced replacement may be a bit of a challenge.

Looking at the CPI numbers from both a shorter and longer period gives some perspective. For one month, the overall prices rose 0.6%, or at a 3.6% per year rate. Removing the used vehicle element from that rise, the annualized rate drops to 2.4%. If we extend our time horizon and measure core CPI inflation from two years ago, it has risen about 2.3% per year. Both of those numbers are quite close to the Federal Reserve's current target of overshooting a 2% annualized rate for a couple of years. More, this spike in inflation appears to be a result of a temporary supply shortage rather than a buildup

in long term demand. Historically, supply side inflation tends to be of relatively short duration, unlike demand-side inflation which can compound.

Complicating matters, COVID-19 outbreaks in southern Chinese ports are creating a further slow-down in the supply chains from which we draw much of what we buy here in America. That has raised shipping costs and those are being passed on. Expect more of the same as the world economic system oscillates back and forth as this pandemic continues. Here in the United States, with our high vaccination rate, we are hopefully mostly unencumbered by COVID with the Moody's-CNN Back to Normal Index up to 88%, but in much of the rest of the world it is as bad or worse than ever.

Speaking of back-to-normal, aggregate U.S. consumer spending has recovered back to trend levels that were expected prior to the pandemic. As you may guess, the spending is in areas that were not prepared to receive the demand and weak in others. Spending on goods is still quite elevated while services spending is still in a slump. It is also clear that excess savings are still present, so the big spending surge anticipated by economists is still in the future when consumer and business confidence fully recover.

The bottom line remains very much the same. The economy is still in recovery mode with a lot of momentum and little or no signs of structural weakness. Historically, such conditions have preceded decades of economic expansion, such as the 1920s and 1950s. Only time will tell, but we remain quite optimistic.

Trump 'Reinstated'

A typical day in the Divided States of America: The New York Times is reporting that Donald Trump -- in case you've forgotten, the previous president -- has been telling friends and associates that he will be "reinstated" by August.

"He can simply be reinstated," Sidney Powell told a meeting of QAnon, whose slogan is "Where the inmates run the asylum." "Biden is told to move out of the White House, and President Trump should be moved back in," she went on. "I'm sure there's not going to be credit for time lost, unfortunately, because the Constitution itself sets the date for inauguration, but he should definitely get the remainder of his term and make the best of it."

Never mind that the Constitution sets a four-year term for the presidency, "reinstated" is the trending word these days in wild and wacky Trumpworld.

"It is my hope that Donald Trump is reinstated, after all the proof comes out, by the end of August," said Mike Lindell, the My Pillow Guy, who has strange dreams. By the way, he first made his declaration on Steve Bannon's podcast. Need I say more?

And Lindell is taking credit for predicting Trump's triumphant return, although he thinks that Trump would have to go through the judicial process. And never mind that the Supreme Court refused to consider every effort to even hear Trump's fantasy that the election was stolen from him, a belief he allegedly still holds to this

day. If so, his next project might be renaming his residence the Mar-a-Lago-Madhouse. It's more probable that he's really too embarrassed to admit he lied about the whole thing.

Whichever it is, one of Trump's early cast of characters was Lt. Gen. Mike Flynn, his first national security adviser. Flynn didn't last very long, because he got caught lying to the FBI. Well, after President Trump pardoned him, Flynn is still rattling around. He spoke at that same QAnon conference and had his own ideas for "reinstatement" ... a coup d'etat: "No reason, I mean, it should happen here. No reason. That's right." To be clear, he was responding to an audience member who was suggesting a military takeover, like Myanmar's. After an uproar, including calls for sedition prosecution, Flynn beat a hasty retreat on Parler, one of the only social media platforms available to him: "Let me be VERY CLEAR -- There is NO reason whatsoever for any coup in America, and I do not and have not at any time called for any action of that sort."

Remember that Flynn led the Defense Intelligence Agency from 2012 to 2014, until he was forced to retire from the military. It begs the question why he headed the powerful agency for two years during the Obama administration. But in 2016,

he declared his allegiance to Donald Trump. His main function at Trump rallies was to whip the supporters into a frenzy, charging Hillary Clinton with all manner of crimes and leading the crowd in chants of "Lock her up!"

Don't worry; there is no evidence that Donald Trump will be "reinstated" by this August, or any other August through 2024. First of all, his successor Joe Biden enjoys a 54% job approval rating in the polls. Secondly, the job is methodically cleaning up the mess created by the Great Divider.

Trump's support, meanwhile, is slipping even among Republicans, who are possibly puzzled by the changing stories of their congressional leaders. For instance, they blocked an investigation into the Jan. 6 insurrection at the Capitol, which could be considered the start of Flynn's coup.

Donald Trump's role in that debacle is still debated. Meanwhile, his participation in the Trump Organization's alleged scams and what transpired during his presidency probably won't lead to his "reinstatement" either, particularly while his legal status is so precarious. It's tough making a comeback while you're being prosecuted.

The Smear Campaign Against Joe Manchin

Joe Manchin is being pilloried for the offense of being consistent on the filibuster.

Back in 2017, when Senate Democrats were desperate to stop Donald Trump's agenda, 33 of them, including Manchin, signed a bipartisan letter backing the filibuster in ringing terms.

"We are mindful of the unique role the Senate plays in the legislative process," they wrote, "and we are steadfastly committed to ensuring that this great American institution continues to serve as the world's greatest deliberative body."

Well, the commitment of almost all the Democrats was not quite as steadfast as advertised.

Now that the filibuster is an obstacle to passing Joe Biden's agenda, the long-standing Senate procedure has been deemed a threat to our system of government and to racial justice that only a naïf or cynic can support.

And that means you, Joe Manchin.

The West Virginia senator has been badgered for months by reporters eager to get him to change his mind on the filibuster, or at least show some flexibility. Now, the pressure campaign from within his own party has ratcheted up to include over-the-top insults that have an air of desperation about them.

After Manchin reiterated his support for the filibuster and made clear his opposition to HR1, a sweeping Democratic voting bill, in an op-ed that weekend, progressive House Democratic Mondaire Jones from New York unloaded on Twitter. Per Jones, the headline

of Manchin's piece might as well have been, "Why I'll vote to preserve Jim Crow."

This is a preposterous smear, and a transparent attempt to bludgeon Manchin into submission by defining his sincere attachment to Senate tradition and belief in bipartisanship as tantamount to racism.

Another New York member of the House, Jamaal Bowman, said on CNN, "Joe Manchin has become the new Mitch McConnell."

The comparison might make sense if Mitch McConnell had voted with Joe Biden 100% of the time so far, and had supported the Affordable Care Act and voted twice to impeach President Donald Trump.

Despite the abuse, Manchin is onto something. The current situation illustrates the purpose of the filibuster nicely -- it is a guardrail keeping a very slender Senate majority that could easily be wiped out by January 2023 from enacting a far-reaching radical agenda in a fit of partisan passion.

Democrats aren't mad because they know that support for their agenda will build over time -- they are mad because they know that it won't, and absent Manchin and other recalcitrant Senate Democrats getting on board right away, they will miss their tiny window to get their way through

brute legislative force prior to losing one or both chambers of Congress.

They have convinced themselves that GOP state legislatures are destroying democracy with new voting laws rolling back pandemic-driven innovations and tightening up security, a fevered myth that also won't stand the test of time.

As for HR1, it is a constitutionally dubious monstrosity that would trample on state voting laws in an enormous step toward the federalization of American elections. Manchin was right to say in his op-ed that it is telling that not one Republican, whether Susan Collins or Mitt Romney, is supporting this partisan power grab.

Manchin isn't always as stalwart in standing up to his own party as he sounds, but he's been remarkably firm so far. His role as a senatorial brake on Biden's left-wing ambitions has certainly made him more popular back home, and the progressive slanders against him will only boost his political standing. The left will get nowhere if it tries to primary him in 2024 (assuming he decides to run again), and if he did lose to a more progressive Democrat, Republicans would easily win his seat.

Surely, the attacks on Manchin will only get more venomous. Such is the price of refusing to reverse himself on the filibuster and get on board a sprawling travesty of a voting bill.

Theron Thomas Brown left this world Monday, June 6, 2021, succumbing to injuries from an auto/pedestrian accident.

Theron was born December 8, 1997, in Midland, Texas, to Thomas Vernon (Fore) Brown, IV and Crystal Beth Brown. He enjoyed a happy and fruitful childhood, adored and cherished by his family. He was a precocious child, inventing his own language, which he called "Theronian." Asked for a demonstration, he said "Amoshanee. That means 'Hi, how are you' in Theronian." He had many races against his younger brother Aiden in the back yard, pushing Tonka Trucks at breakneck speed, while his grandfather called the races as announcer. He was always sweet and loving to his baby sister, Savannah, joining in on the occasional tea party and sharing a secret handshake. Growing up surrounded by love and with a sense of community and inclusion nurtured his loving and giving nature. It was this nature that led him to make the selfless decision to be an organ donor which he fought so very hard to do, but due to complications in the end he was not able to do so. Because of his valiant efforts the Southwest Transplant Alliance still praises him as a donor in spirit and he is receiving a medal of honor.

He had a keen sense of faith throughout his life. September 2, 2015 he was baptized at Stonegate Fellowship in Midland. In the November 24, 2005 Thanksgiving edition of the Midland Reporter Telegram, seven year old Theron's "most thankful for..." entry from Fannin Elementary was published as follows:

Child thankful for coolest person on earth: God
"I am most thankful for my Lord. I love him, I give him my blessings. He rules the Earth. He is the owner of Heaven. He is the coolest person on earth."

Theron was inherently kind, loving, intelligent, articulate and funny. He attracted friends like flowers attract butterflies. His circle of friends was large, and he loved all of them. He always made sure that any greeting or parting was accompanied by a wonderful hug and an "I love you."

Theron was a man of many achievements. He attended Midland High School where he was on the varsity football team as a receiver. He was fearless and agile. He was small in stature but huge in heart on and off the field. He graduated in 2016 with honors. He was an avid Boy Scout, hunter, fisherman and outdoorsman, achieving the rank of Eagle Scout and going on many long outdoor adventures, including a week in the mountains at Philmont Scout Ranch and a trip to Alaska. His last grand adventure he traveled to Italy with his grandparents, siblings and cousins, starting New Year's Eve 2019 in Rome, and ending at Pompeii, with the Leaning Tower, Venice, Florence and other great experiences in between. He acted as cameraman and impromptu guardian angel of all his younger siblings and cousins on all of their adventures.

Theron received a congressional nomination from Representative Mike Conaway recommending him to the Air Force Academy but his ultimate journey took him to Texas A&M where he pledged with PIKA fraternity, same legacy as his Dad. Theron was a proud employee of Magellan Midstream and was looking forward to completing his college degree while continuing to work there.

Theron found enjoyment in hard work and loved working with his hands. He loved working on his grandparent's ranch in San Saba, where Pop Pop taught him to drive tractors, cut and weld and drive an old 1949 D-7 Cat, with which he loved to push cedars and mesquites. Working with his Dad Fore and being around Grandfather Tom, he learned many manly arts. He was very hands-on and ready to help dig ditches, build, work cattle, sheep and goats and generally be helpful. His favorite dessert was his TaTa's German Chocolate Cake which she would make for him at a moment's notice any time he asked. He was a man out of his time, playing dominoes and 42 with the "old" folks with great amusement and enthusiasm. If something was really good on the dinner table, and everyone was bragging on it, if his Mom asked him what he thought, he would say "Meh..." because he loved to tease folks. His laugh and smile were contagious and warmed your heart as only he could.

We write this in the hope that we can just share with you a tiny portion of the joy Theron gifted into our lives. Nothing and no one can replace him; we just pray we can remember that he loves us, and wants us to be happy until we see him again. Godspeed, Theron Brown! You were 5'7" tall, but you were in every way one of the biggest men we ever knew. Here is a giant hug, and an "I Love You!" until we meet again.

Theron leaves behind to cherish his time with us, his mother and father Fore and Crystal, his brother Aiden, sister Savannah, grandparents Tom Brown and Gloria Collis and family of Midland, grandparents Mike and Vi Lea Borland and family of San Saba and Midland, grandmother Elisa Dunkley and husband Steve of Waco, Great Uncle Carleton Wilkes of Austin, Great Aunt and Uncle Tim and Lana Brown and family of Salado, Great Aunt Colleen Fuglaar and family of Austin, Aunt and Uncle Misty and Devin Phiffer, aunts ViLeysha Borland and Kate Ikard, cousins Jake and Bailey Phiffer, Ashley Branum (Lane) and ViLeyna and Richard Mike Borland, and a vast assemblage of quasi-relatives and adopted aunts, uncles, grandparents, interlopers, and innumerable friends.

Pallbearers will be Tyler White, Sergio Ramirez, John Utsman, Josh Carnett, Tito Salcedo, Blake Rasmussen, Kade Hicks and Jake Massey.

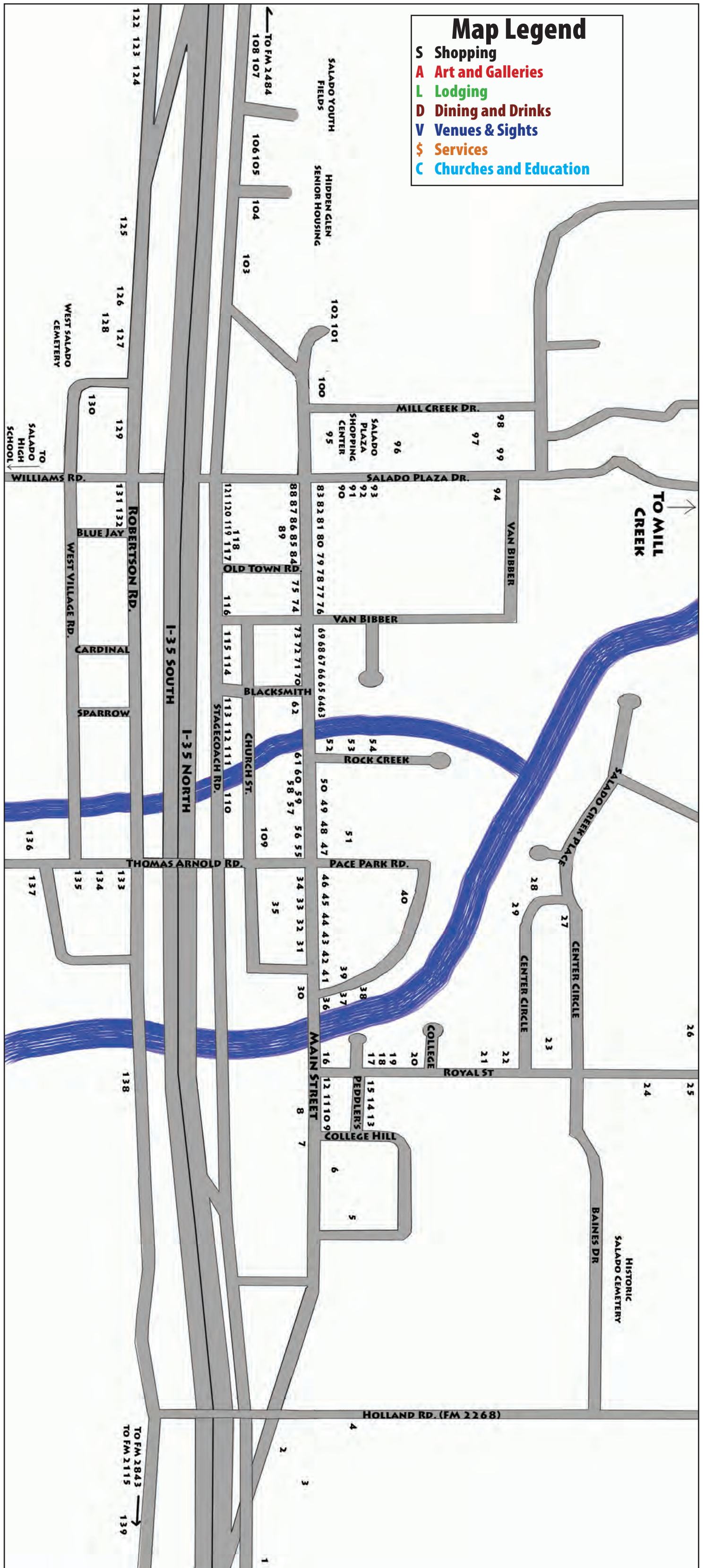

One of the keys to good card play is the step-by-step process by which declarer gradually learns how the adverse cards are distributed and then proceeds to take full advantage of this knowledge.

Consider this deal played by Bob Hamman, one of the world's top players, in a match some years ago between Australia and the United States.

West led a club, won by East with the jack, and East cashed the king of spades before continuing with the ace of clubs. Hamman ruffed and played

the queen of spades, taken by East with the ace.

East led a third round of clubs, ruffed by South, leaving Hamman in a position where he had already lost three tricks and West — although Hamman did not yet know it — held four trumps to his three.

Had Hamman decided to draw the opposing trumps at this stage, hoping to take the rest of the tricks on the assumption that the trumps were divided 3-2, he would have failed in his mission. Instead, he cashed the K-A of diamonds in that order, bringing forth West's Q-J.

Hamman now had solid grounds for suspecting that the trumps were divided 4-1. West had shown up with just two diamonds, at most four clubs (he had led the deuce at trick one) and probably had three spades, judging from the earlier spade plays.

So Hamman played dummy's spade jack at trick eight and discarded a diamond, finding the suit divided 3-3, as he had expected.

He then cashed the ace of trump and proceeded to make the last four tricks on a crossruff, trumping dummy's 10-9 of spades with the K-Q of trump, and his 10-6 of diamonds with the J-10 of trump. In the process, West's apparently certain trump trick — which would have come into its own had Hamman drawn any more than one round of trump — simply disappeared.



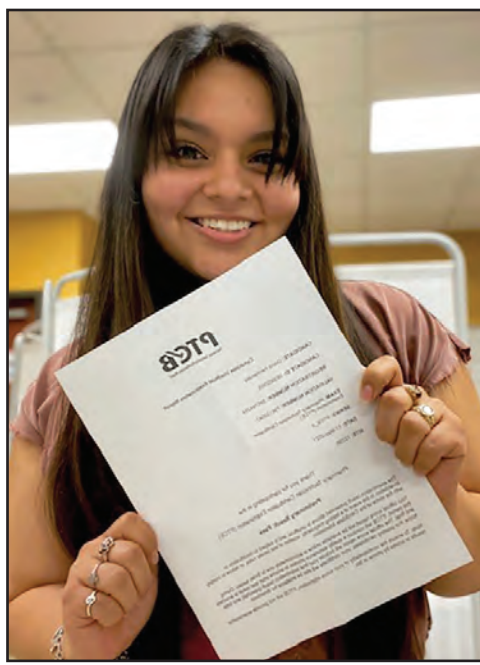

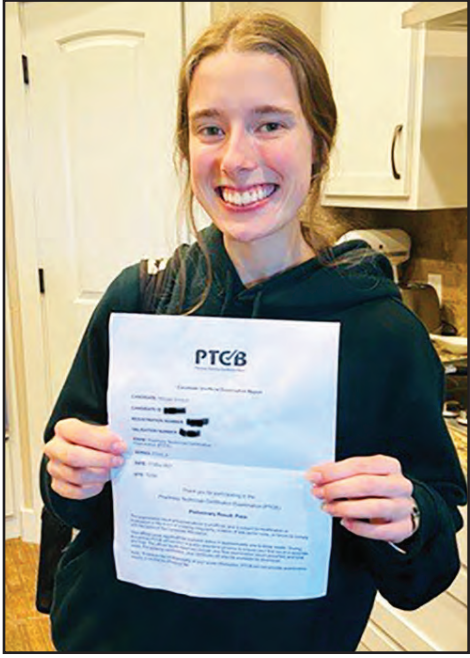
