BoA restricts parking on Salado Plaza, tables ordinance on RV parking

With the completion of the Salado Plaza street project, Salado aldermen approved at their Oct. 21 meeting an ordinance to restrict parking on Salado Plaza Dr. from Main Street to Van Bibber Lane

"This is not just a construction issue," Village Administrator Don Ferguson told aldermen at their Oct. 21 meeting. "We have had significant weight put on the edge of the pavement. Loading big trucks broke off the edge of the pavement. We now have a stronger roadway that is not going to break, but we don't want to repeat the mistake that allowed parking for unloading on the road."

The ordinance will restrict parking on both sides of the roadway.

The new ordinance gives the Police Department authority to have a vehicle towed for parking on the street or right of way of Salado Plaza Dr. It also sets out a fine not to exceed \$500 as a Class C misdemeanor.

The Village will place No Parking signs at both ends of Salado Plaza Dr. and midway between Van Bibber and Main Street. "We'll hold off on signage until the wastewater construction is done on that road," Ferguson said. "Sleeves were put under the road to reach the properties there."

Ferguson added that he hopes "plaza ownership will take advantage of the extra space and build in some turnouts for loading and unloading."

"I don't know how it's going to be enforced," alderman Howard said before casting the single vote against the ordinance.

"We would be naive to think that a sign or a stripe or anything else is going to stop someone from pulling half on or half off," Mayor Pro Tem Rodney Bell said. "It comes down to enforce-

In related parking regulaons, aldermen tabled an ordinance regarding RV parking in the Village. The draft ordinance states that it "shall be unlawful for any person for any reason to park or place a recreational vehicle within the Village on any public or private property, public street, alley, parkway, road, or boulevard, or to rent any recreational vehicle for residential occupancy outside of an approved RV Park."

The provisions of this Ordinance shall not, however, apply to:

• The temporary place-

ment of a recreational vehicle onto privately owned property for less than twenty-four (24) hours for the purposes of loading and offloading.

· Locations where recreational vehicles are manufactured and/or commercially sold by the manufacturer or commercial seller

 A recreational vehicle located in an RV Park.

• Locations where property owners wish to rebuild, repair, or remodel a home that has been damaged by a flood, fire, tornado, or other natural disaster may apply to the Village Administrator for a permit to use a recreational vehicle as a temporary living site during construction: The application shall be for a specified period of time and it shall address how utilities, including sewage disposal, will be supplied to the recreational

Only 2% of registered Texas voters cast ballots in early voting for 8 proposed amendments

Early voting has been 2nd Ave very light for the eight proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution that will appear on the Nov. 2 ballot. Through Oct. 25, only 3,135 early vote ballots have been cast in Bell County. The Salado polling location has seen only 117 voters cast ballots through Oct. 25.

Statewide, only 2% of registered voters have cast ballots either via the mail or inperson early voting. Through Oct. 25, only 343,689 ballots have been cast. Texas has 17 million registered voters.

Proposition 2 (HJR 99): "The constitutional amendment authorizing a county to finance the development or redevelopment of transportation or infrastructure in unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted areas in the county."

Proposition 3 (SJR 27): "The constitutional amendment to prohibit this state caregiver for in-person visior a political subdivision of this state from prohibiting or limiting religious services of religious organizations."

Proposition 6 (SJR 19): "The constitutional amendment establishing a right for residents of certain facilities to designate an essential

Proposition 7 (HJR 125): "The constitutional amendment to allow the surviving spouse of a person who is disabled to receive a limitation on the school district ad valorem taxes on the spouse's residence homestead if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of the person's death."

Proposition 8 (SJR 35): "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty."

Fed regs, immigration limits, pandemic add to low numbers of OTR drivers

The Markets

Our preferred market in-

dicator, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) turned in a stellar week despite a steady beat of worrying news about supply and labor shortages, rising prices, rising interest rates, and general uncertainty. It closed out the week at 4544.90, up 1.64% for the week, 21% year-to-date, and 31% from this date a year ago. It wasn't quite a record close as the Index was four points higher at the close on Thursday, but it was a record for the end of a market week and the Dow Jones Industrial Average did set a record on Friday. Our other stock market indicator, the CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index closed at 2547.28, a record high, leaving it up 24.21% for 2021. The rise in the market averages was driven by third quarter earnings as a diverse set of companies as varied as Tesla and American Express reported earnings substantially higher than expected. So far, it looks like the average one-year earnings growth for the S&P 500 will come in at about 35%, or a bit more than the market average has risen, suggesting the impressive rise in the SPX over the last 12 months is rational and rea-

The yield on the benchmark ten-year U.S. Treasury note rose as well, ending the market week at 1.646%, up 3.9% from last week. It is sometimes hard to grasp, but a rise in bond interest rates occurs not because the ten-year bonds changed their coupon interest rate but because the value in the underlying bonds on the open market fell. The average Treasury bond maturing ten years from now is still trading at a premium to its maturity value, suggesting that intermediate interest rates have plenty of room to keep rising. As the releases and speeches from members of the Federal Reserve Board continue to warn that the Fed's bond buying stimulus is very likely to begin to taper off over the next several months, bond values have a high probability of falling as intermediate to longer-term interest rates rise. inated by reports of supply chain snarls as products and raw materials backed up outside U.S. ports and at railheads across the country. The reports are now falling into a pattern with the problems consistently being linked primarily to a shortage of truck drivers. Our economy has surged following the COVID lockdowns and continues to boom, growing at a rate we have not seen since the early 1980s. The difference this time is that the rapid growth of the early 1980s came after one of the more severe post-WWII recessions while the current supercharged growth blossomed out of one of the mildest and shortest recessions in U.S. history. The current surge in growth also comes as the average age of a long-haul truck-driver in the U.S. is about 55 while the average age in the early 80s was in the mid-40s. As the pandemic shut down industries across the country in the spring and summer of 2020, many truck drivers were laid off. When it came time to go back to work, many of those chose to retire rather than return to the grueling work that is long-haul trucking. Adding to the problem is the federal regulatory requirement that to drive an 18-wheeler, one must be at least 21 years of age, but the typical driver only has a high school education. That three-year gap between high school graduation and reaching the minimum age to drive the big rigs shifts those who are willing to make the sacrifices to do the hard work that takes them away from home for days at a time into other fields. In the past, when there have been driver shortages, trucking countries have been

able to recruit drivers from other countries, but a combination of general immigration restrictions and the pandemic have largely eliminated that fix. Meanwhile, ports are operating at about 60% to 70% capacity and railroads are turning down shipments because the freight yards at the destination are full of containers awaiting a driver and a truck to pick them up and deliver them.

There is good news out there too. Jobless claims have fallen to their lowest for the week since before the pandemic. Adjusted for seasonal factors, the IHS Markit Flash U.S. Composite Purchasing Managers Output Index was 57.3 in October, rising from 55.0 on a scale where numbers above 50 indicate growth as private sector businesses recorded a sharp and accelerated upturn in output led by the service sector. Unfortunately, the manufacturing sector, while still recording growth, was less that optimal as supply and labor constraints continued to limit activities. A major positive was reported by the Federal Reserve as household spending on debt is the lowest in over 40 years and correspondingly, household balance sheets are the healthiest in a generation. Presuming we can find some truck drivers, the pent-up demand and the cash and credit to fulfil it are there. Alternatively, we may see a slower rate of growth but extended

over a longer period.

Once more, the U.S. economy is bumping up against capacity limitations but unlike past times when we have hit the stops, there is ample credit and cash in the American consumer's pockets and the leading indicators are signaling clear weather ahead. This is a bumpy period, but many of the bumps are a result of high growth that looks
















Contract Bridge

BAD LUCK COMES IN BUNCHES

East South West North Opening lead — two of diamonds.

This is one of those hard-luck deals where you can't help sympathizing with declarer, even though you might not have played his cards exactly the way he did.

West led a diamond, taken by South with the king. Declarer had eight solid tricks and quite a few chances for a ninth. He started by leading a low heart to the jack at trick two. This gave him two chances for an extra

trick: one if West had the queen, and another if the opposing hearts were divided 3-3. But East took the jack with the queen and returned a heart. When South next played the A-K, he learned the hearts were 4-2.

Declarer now tried a low club to the queen, hoping West had the king. But East took the queen with the king and returned the jack of clubs to South's ace.

The situation took a further turn for the worse when declarer next led a diamond to the queen, hoping West had led originally from a threecard suit. But after East showed out, South decided that his last remaining

chance was to try a spade finesse. So he led a spade to the king and finessed the jack on the return. East won with the queen and cashed his remaining clubs to put the contract down two. All of which indicates that bad luck comes in bunches, though it's true that South could have made the contract easily had he known the queen of hearts was doubleton.

One reasonable but somewhat unusual method of play — without the benefit of a peek at the East-West cards — is to allow East's ten of diamonds to hold the first trick! Assuming West made a normal lead from a four-card suit, East would then be forced to return a spade, a heart or a club, all of which would hand declarer his ninth trick.
