Willingham retires after 42 years

After 42 years, Dr. Douglas B. Willingham is retiring from dentistry. At a retirement reception Jan. 31, he was greeted by the Marvin and Glenda Hill family, four generations of which he has served in his four decades.

Fresh out of dental school, Dr. Willingham set down roots in Salado in the community in which his great, great, great-grandfather Archibald Willingham is credited by historians as building the first home along Salado Creek, a log cabin built in

Dr. Willingham chose the historic Armstrong-Adams House, which was known to many old-timers in Salado as Dr. Guthrie's place, at the corner of Main Street and Thomas Arnold. Bill and Pat Ashe had purchased the onestory rock house the year before and had restored it.

For most of its century and a half, the limestone building has served the practice of doctors, pharmacists and, most recently, dentist. Here Dr. Willingham began and built a practice that spanned four decades and generations of local families, including this writer's.

"It's scary how little I knew then about managing a dental practice," he told Salado Village Voice. "Perhaps it's just as well. The risks involved in beginning a

ignorant.

And the dedicated, as Doug has proven throughout the decades. In the late 1980's, Dr. Willingham oversaw the rescue and securing of the College Hill ruins by the Salado Historical Society, conducted by his long-time friend Tim Brown.

Dr. Willingham served on the Salado Historical Society board of directors when the Boles-Aiken cabin was discovered, rescued and rebuilt on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center, next to the Hamblen-Aiken family cemetery. He served on the revitalized Salado College-Robertson Colony Foundation board as it works to turn the College Ruins into an historic park.

Love of history comes naturally for the man who grew up in the red dirt of Lubbock. When he decided to build a home adjacent to his practice, he turned again

At the center of his home is a two-story fireplace mantel moved to Salado from the Willingham ranch, dated 1880. A painting of the old Willingham place in Lubbock graces the wall of the living room.

A graduate of Baylor College of Dentistry, Dr. Willingham developed a long list of professional and community activities during his career. He served the Texas Dental Association in numerous positions, including editor of the awardwinning Texas Dental Journal for seven years. Among other citations received both the Distinguished Service Award and the President's Award, the Association's highest honors. He is a Fellow of both the American and International Colleges of Dentists, the Pierre Fauchard Academy. In 1988 was among 22 other Texas dentists to be nominated for "Texas Dentist of the Year."

Dr. Willingham has also been involved in Salado and Bell County organizations. A past president of the Salado Historical Society and the Railroad and Pioneer Museum in nearby Temple, Willingham has been involved in numerous historic preservation causes, such as his three-year chairmanship of the Salado College Preservation Project and his authorship of the applications for four Texas Historical Markers. He has served on the vestry and as Senior Warden of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Belton.

Doug says his favorite activity, however, has been that of father to his beautiful daughter, Sofie and husband to his wife of 16 years Carol Meyer Willingham.

In his retirement, he plans to spend more time with both and to travel and write.

"Fortunately for me, the citizens of this great community got behind me and supported me from the very beginning," Dr. Willingham

U.S. GDP grew by 6.9% in 4th quarter 2021, economy expanded by 5.7% for 2021

If you were following the markets all week and finally threw in the towel early on Friday, January 28, vou may feel a bit like the KC Chiefs fans who left the stadium with less than a minute before what seemed surely to be a heartbreaking defeat for the Chiefs, who, of course grabbed a tie with mere seconds left in the regular game and won in overtime. On Friday the S&P 500 (SPX) started out sliding downward, looking like it was going to continue its slipping, sliding fall that has been its main theme since the beginning of the month. Then, in a flash of glory, the SPX soared 3.1% to close at 4431.85, up 0.71% for the week. That still leaves it down just over 7% this year, but it seems to have once more dodged the negative 10% bullet and thus avoid-

The yield on the 10-year U.S. Treasury note continued its relentless rise to end the week at 1.778%, up about 0.7% since last week, leaving adequate steepness in the yield curve for the economy to have plenty of room to grow with the 30year bond yielding 2.083%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil joined in the climb, rising nearly 3% to \$87.25 per barrel. Wall Street analysts are estimating we will see \$100 per barrel prices in the summer, so get ready for some pain at the gas pump.

The Economy

The big economic news, announced early in the week by our beloved U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis, was that the 2021, fourth quarter U.S. GDP grew at an annualized rate of 6.9%! Presuming that first estimate holds, it means that for the whole year of 2021, the economy of the United States expanded at a 5.7% net rate of growth. Note that inflation is subtracted from the GDP, as is the trade deficit, so that 5.7% is a net number and the fastest economic growth we have seen since 1984. There is a caveat here though. A substantial portion of that high annualized GDP number came from businesses restocking inventory as the supply chains started to unkink. We will not see that kind of inventory build in the first quarter of 2022, and it appears that we may see inventory drawdown as the massive number of COVID-related sick days builds up. We are already seeing grocery store empty shelves and hardware shortages limiting manufacturing. Inventory drawdowns reduce GDP, so best estimates for GDP growth in the first quarter of this year

are running about 2.2%.

Related to that, manufacturing output started slowing in December and decreased between 1% and 2% across the country. Durable goods orders, driven by transportation orders, followed suit and fell 0.9%. If we exclude transportation from the orders, they rose 0.4%. The underlying reason appears to be the onslaught of Omicron causing large numbers of workers to stay home sick.

also fell in December by 0.6%, the first decline in 10 months. That slump was driven in part by people doing Christmas purchases early, back in November, but primarily by Omicron. The patterns were there that as Omicron surged through the population centers on the east and west coasts, consumer spending fell. Sick people and people scared of getting sick tend not to spend much money Economists are predicting that consumers will open up their pocketbooks again as soon as Omicron looks to be in the rear-view mirror. The reasoning is sound since the cash in consumer balance sheets remains at near record levels and a New York Federal Reserve survey of consumers showed that households across the country are planning to spend more in 2022 on food, clothing, housing, utilities, and transportation than they have in the past two years. Those factors coupled with a substantial increase in wages suggest that sometime in the second quarter of 2022, the U.S. consumer, who is responsible for about 2/3 of our GDP, will return to traveling, the internet, restaurants, theaters, and stores to celebrate.

So, what about the stock market? All the data available when parsed against history strongly suggests that this semi-correction we are seeing is nothing more than that. The earnings yield of the S&P 500 is still higher than bond yields, the yield curve is still forecasting better times ahead, and the Omicron tidal wave appears to have peaked in the areas it hit first. Barring a Russian invasion of Ukraine or another, more severe virus variant, the future looks bright. We will need some patience as the first quarter is likely to be bumpy, but beyond that we expect some very good times ahead.

Mark/brand renewal deadline Feb. 28 registered in other counties

The process of renewing all registered marks and brands in Bell County in accordance with Texas Agricultural Code Section 144.044 will end Monday, February 28, 2022.

A person who does not re-register their mark/ brand before this date, forfeits their legal right to that mark/brand. Any brand that is not renewed during this period becomes 'void' on March 1, 2022, in accordance with the Texas Agricultural Code.

Once processed, a renewal will remain in effect for ten (10) years following which will be August 30, 2031. The recording fee is \$11 per mark/brand per location on the livestock.

Generally speaking, there are two schools of bidders. The first is composed of those whose chief goal in bidding is to reach the best possible contract for their side. This group represents the overwhelming majority of bridge players.

Members of the second school are those whose chief purpose is to try to prevent the opponents from reach-

ing their best contract. The tactics employed by these players can take many forms, but the aim is always the same — to do as much damage to the opponents' bidding structure as possible.

South opened the bidding in third seat with one diamond, presumably because it was her turn to bid. West doubled, and North, attempting to muddy the waters, bid one spade! East entered the fray with two hearts, employing her partnership's peculiar system of bidding what you have rather than what you don't have.

West raised two hearts to four, and this rolled around to South, who apparently thought she had not yet expressed the full value of her hand. Accordingly, she bid four spades! West, who no doubt could not believe her ears, found a double, and North retreated to five diamonds, also doubled.

Then came five spades and six diamonds, both doubled, at which point the bidding mercifully came to a grinding halt. Declarer finished down six - 1,700 points - and North-South were left with a gnawing feeling that perhaps something had gone wrong with their system.



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
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What forms of identification do I need to vote in

older may present one of the

If you have been expecting your voter registration card to come in the mail, it won't be coming.

Instead, you will need an acceptable form of photo iden-

tification to vote in person. According to votetexas.gov website, Senate Bill 5, passed by the 85th Legislature, Regular Session, requires voters who possess an acceptable form of photo identification for voting listed below to present that identification in order to vote in person in all Texas elections. For voters aged 18-69, the acceptable form of photo identification may be expired no more than four years before being presented for voter qualification at the polling place. For voters aged 70 or older, the acceptable form of photo identification may be expired for any length of time if the identification is otherwise

Voters who do not possess an acceptable form of photo identification and cannot reasonably obtain one of the forms of acceptable photo identification listed below may present a supporting form of identification and execute a Reasonable Impediment Declaration, noting the voter's reasonable impediment to obtaining an acceptable form of photo identification, stating that the information contained in the declaration is true, that the voter is the same individual personally appearing at the polling place to sign the declaration, and that the voter faces a reasonable impediment to procuring an acceptable form of photo identification.

This requirement is effective immediately.

Here is a list of the acceptable forms of photo ID:

Texas Driver License issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)

Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS Texas Personal Identification Card issued by DPS

Texas Handgun License issued by DPS

United States Military Identification Card containing the person's photograph

United States Citizenship Certificate containing the person's photograph

United States Passport (book or card)

With the exception of the U.S. Citizenship Certificate, which does not expire, for voters aged 18-69, the acceptable form of photo identification may be expired no more than four years before being presented for voter qualification at the polling place. For voters aged 70 or older, the acceptable form of photo identification may be expired for any length of time if the identification is otherwise valid.

Election Identification Certificates are available from DPS driver license offices during regular business hours. Find mobile station locations

Here is a list of the supporting forms of ID that can be presented if the voter does not possess one of the forms of acceptable photo ID and cannot reasonably obtain one:

copy or original of a government document that shows the voter's name and an address, including the voter's voter registration certificate;

copy of or original current utility bill;

copy of or original bank statement;

copy of or original govern-

ment check; copy of or original pay-

check; or copy of or original of (a) a

certified domestic (from a U.S. state or territory) birth certificate or (b) a document confirming birth admissible in a court of law which establishes the voter's identity (which may include a foreign birth docu-

After presenting one of the forms of supporting ID listed above, the voter must execute a Reasonable Impediment Declaration.

Procedures for Voting

New version: When a voter arrives at a polling location, the voter will be asked to present one of the seven (7) acceptable forms of photo ID that is current or, for voters aged 18-69, expired no more than four years. Voters aged 70 or

seven (7) acceptable forms of photo ID that is expired for any length of time that is otherwise valid. If a voter does not possess one of the seven (7) acceptable forms of photo ID and cannot reasonably obtain one, the voter may present a supporting form of ID and execute a Reasonable Impediment Declaration, noting the voter's reasonable impediment to obtaining an acceptable form of photo identification, stating that the information contained in the declaration is true, that the voter is the same individual personally appearing at the polling place to sign the decla-

ration, and that the voter faces

a reasonable impediment to

procuring an acceptable form

of photo identification.

Election officials are still required by State law to determine whether the voter's name on the identification provided (acceptable photo ID, or supporting form of ID, if applicable) matches the name on the official list of registered voters ("OLRV"). After a voter presents their ID, whether it's an acceptable form of photo ID or a supporting form of ID (if applicable), the election worker will compare it to the OLRV. If the name on the ID matches the name on the list of registered voters, the voter will follow the regular procedures for voting.

If the name does not match exactly but is "substantially similar" to the name on the OLRV, the voter will be permitted to vote as long as the voter signs an affidavit stating that the voter is the same person on the list of registered

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If a voter possesses an acceptable form of photo ID but does not have it at the polling place, the voter will still be permitted to vote provisionally. The voter will have six (6) days to present an acceptable form of photo identification to the county voter registrar, or fill out the natural disaster affidavit referenced in the Exemption/Exceptions section below, or the voter's ballot will be rejected. Alternatively, a voter who possesses an acceptable form of photo ID but does not have it at the polling place may choose to leave the polling place and return before the close of the polls on election day with said acceptable form of photo ID to, if the voter would otherwise qualify, vote a regular ballot at that time.

Exemptions:

Voters with a disability may apply with the county voter registrar for a permanent exemption to presenting an acceptable photo identification or following the Reasonable Impediment Declaration procedure in the county. The application must contain written documentation from either the U.S. Social Security Administration evidencing the applicant's disability, or from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs evidencing a disability rating of at least 50 percent. The applicant must also state that he/she does not have a form of identification prescribed by Section 63.0101 of the Texas Election Code. Those who obtain a disability exemption will be allowed to vote upon display of their voter

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registration certificate reflecting the exemption, and will not need to execute a Reasonable Impediment Declaration. Please contact your county voter registrar for more details.

Voters who have a consistent religious objection to being photographed or who do

not present an acceptable form of photo identification listed above or follow the Reasonable Impediment Declaration procedure because of certain natural disasters as declared by the President of the United States or the Texas Governor, may vote a provisional ballot,

appear at the voter registrar's office within six (6) calendar days after election day, and sign an affidavit swearing to the religious objection or natural disaster, in order for the voter's ballot to be counted. Please contact your county voter registrar for more details.
