He leaves his hometown school after six seasons as head football coach, where he has posted a record of 49Championships in 2017 and 2020 and were second place in 2021 behind the 4A Div. II State Champions China Spring Cougars. The 2017 Eagles were Finalists with a 12-2 record. The 2020 Eagles were 4A, Div. II Regional Finalists with an 11-2 record losing to State Champions Carthage.
Haire came home to Salado from Stephenville, where of a program that now has six state championships in football, most recently in 2021 in 4A-Div. I, as well as a 2003 state champ volleyball team. In his final season at Salado, two of the four losses
came at the hands of eventual State Champions: Div. 1 Stephenville and Div. 2 China Spring.

Haire was the Head Football Coach and Athletic Director for the Lago Vista Vikings for 13 seasons. He took over a fledgling young football program in a tough central Texas district

finalists in 2010, with a 13 record, Regional Finalists in 2011 with a 10-2 record and again in 2012 with a $9-4$ re cord. The Vikings had three

Haire was named the 2 A Coach of the Year by Dave Campbell's Texas Football magazine for 2010
He also earned Coach of the Year nods at the Distric a 1988 graduat he played football do, he played football at Tar
leton State University, wher he earned a Bachelor of Sci ence in 1993 and a Master of Education in 1994 at the tiny Salado, coaching for the E galado, coaching for the Ea-
gles from 1994 to 2000. The Eagles went to the playoff Eagles went to the playoffs five times and were bi-dis
trict champions three times. Haire was the Offensive Coordinator here in Salado He was also the head boy basketball coach, where th Eagles won their first district championship in 15 years. "I am proud of being from Salado," Alan Haire said " am proud of playing Eagle Football and I want the kid to feel the same way." And they should. ## Sales tax growth begins to weaken <br> Most of Bell County

continues to show dramatic increases in sales tax revenues compared to 2021, but three cities actually showed decreases in their February sales tax rebate cehcks. Salado continued to show an increase over the previous, but much less than the January payment's comparative increase. In January, the
Village of Salado showed Village of Salado showed an increase of $26 \%$ over January 2021. The Village received $\$ 73,449.67$ compared to $\$ 58,336.20$ in Jan. 2021 .
For February, that in-

Village received $\$ 76,740.64$ compared to the $\$ 71,614.10$ Feived in Feb. 2021. For the year, Salado is
running about $15.6 \%$ running about $15.6 \%$ ahead, having received $\$ 150,190,31$ in sales tax rebates compared to \$129,950.390 paid through Feb. 2021
The Village is one of three Bell County cities to levy a cent sales tax, while seven 1.5 Bent County cities levy 1.5 cent sales tax and Rogers levies a 1.25 cent sales
The Salado Public Li-
ty each levy a half ax. For that half-cent tax, Salado Public Library District received a $\$ 62,261.09$ Februmore than payment of \$57,389, the year the 1 ning $18.8 \%$ ahead of 2021 . The Library has received $\$ 120,737.11$, compared to $\$ 101,669.80$ paid through Feb. 2021.

Bell County received $\$ 3.0$ million in February, com-

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar sent cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts $\$ 1.22$ billion in local sales tax allocations for February, 16.4 percent more than in February 2021. These allocations are based on sales made in eport tax bysinsses that November and October, sales by quarterly filers; and 2021 sales by businesses that report tax annually.

To the Editor:

I read the Salado mayVillage Voice stating, "...th Village is going to annex as nuch as it can along Intertate 35 south...and...Jarrell s far as it can..." Sadly, the mayor's train may have left the station years ago. Shortly after Salado in corporated, concerned citizens made a unified effort to be included in the Village's ETJ to avoid involuntary annexation by Belton and Killeen. This would have protected the Village's surrounds against such intrusion as well as assuring any future "rights" to properties in the ETJ. But Vilage leadership was recalcitrant to pursue expansion of the ETJ. The mayor at the time did not understand the concept and was leery of Salado's responsibilities in the ETJ, of which there were none. As a result, Belton's city limits, which were expanded during the era of non-voluntary annexation, are now menacingly close to the Village proper. Killeen's influence extends to the north side of Crows ble road, taking in valuable developable land. 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## Russia build-up leads to bumpy week in U.S. stock markets

## The Markets

It was another bumpy
week for stocks as the S\& 500 Stock Index (SPX) charged up to nearly 4500 before sagging back on fears of a Russian invasion of Ukraine, closing at 4348.87, down $1.58 \%$ for the week, and $8.76 \%$ so far this year. On the brighter side, it is still up $11.32 \%$ from this time last year. There was an abundance of good economic and earnings news, but the imminent threat of war continued to weigh on the markets. The CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index broke its recent string of gains to lose $1.2 \%$ for the week, and down $3.38 \%$ so far this year, closing at 2509.59 .

traders and pundits could be forgiven for focusing more on what looks more like Eastern Europe in 1938 than anything else.
Retail sales jumped a seasonally adjusted $3.8 \%$ in January, a month when we normally see a sales decline. That jump was the largest one month rise since last March when the last round of pandemic-related stimulus was being distributed to households. The gains were across the board with new purchases of vehicles, furniture, and building materials leading the way. At the same time, seasonally adjusted factory, mining, and utility output increased $1.4 \%$ for the month. Manufacturing output rose too, up $0.2 \%$ for the month.

The back side of those retail sales increases, the Producer Price Index, a measure of wholesale costs, was
up $1 \%$ after a mere $0.4 \%$ rise in December. Looking deeper into that report from the Labor Department revealed that services prices were up $0.7 \%$ while the price of The underlying driver appeared to still be the cost the things we want to buy from where they are bade from where they are made to retail outlets. worked very hard to continue to provide an excellent education to our students. It began with Governor Greg Abbott closing all public schools in Texas
from March 2020 through May 2020 and our teachers May 2020 and our teachers
having to provide remote having to provide remote
instruction to our students. This also resulted in the cancelation of all extracurcancelation of all extracur-
ricular activities and prom. We were fortunate enough to be able to have our Salado High School Class of 2020 graduation ceremony at the outdoor football stadium at the University of Mary Hardin - Baylor.
Schools in Texas re opened for the 2020-2021 school year, which brought new challenges as we im-
plemented strategies to try to limit the spread of CO-VID-19 in our schools. We also continued to provide

remote instruction for families that preferred that opfion. We were required by the Texas Education Agency to quarantine students and employees that were in close contact with someone that tested positive for CO-VID-19. We had to limit attendance at UIL activities to $50 \%$ of the capacity of the gyms and stadiums. GovEducation Agency required all school districts to implement a mask mandate until the COVID-19 vaccines became widely available in March 2021. We provided the vaccine weekly in March, April, and May to any employees, students, parents, and community members that chose to get vaccinated. This was possible thanks to our school
nurses and our partnership with the Bell County Public Health District. Thankfully, we have been able to return to more
"pre-COVID-19 normal-cye-COVID-19 normal-
cy school year. We discontinued remote instruction so all ued remote instruction so all of our students attend school
in person. We no longer require students or employees quire students or employees
to wear masks or face coverings. COVID-19 vaccines are widely available, but are not mandated in our school district. Thus, all parents and employees get to make their own decision regarding the vaccine. We also no longer require students or employees to quarantine for being in close contact with someone that tested positive for COVID-19.
Last month the Omicron
variant caused our school
district's COVID-19 case district's COVID-19 case
numbers to increase significantly. Our case numbers peaked on January 19 bers peaked on January 19
when 129 of our students and employees tested positive for COVID-19 within
the previous seven days. So the previous seven days. So
many employees were out many employees were out
sick that we had to close our sick that we had to close our
schools for three days. Our schools for three days. Our
case numbers have steadily case numbers have steadily
declined since then and as declined since then and as
of Monday, February 21 only two of our students and only two of our students and
none of our employees testnone of our employees test-
ed positive for COVID-19 ed positive for COVID-19
within the past seven days. Fortunately, all of our students and employees that contracted COVID-19 during the past two years have recovered. Please join me in thank ing all of our employees,
especially our teachers and school nurses, for all of their hard work and for the outstanding job they have done these past two years.

Gu is the lead investigator of the Crapemyrtle Bark Scale Team, which has been recognized for its national impact via webinars, You Tube videos and publica tions.
She said the timing of this event is right before people typically see the scale populations flare up on their crapemyrtle plants.
