Election is May 7

On Election Day May 7, Bell County voters can cast their ballots at any one of 42 polling locations 7 a.m.-7 p.m.

Bell County polling locations are listed at https:// www.bellcountytx.com/ departments/elections/ election day locations.php.

The Salado Church of Christ Activity Center (217 N. Church St.) will be open for voting 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May

There will be four local elections for Saladoans among three political subdivisions.

Salado ISD will hold two elections. One will be for two full three-year terms with the following candidates (in ballot order): Jim Reed, Sam Dowdy, Jr., Rick Marruffo, Amy McLane and Marlon Reed. The other will be for an unexpired two-year term with the following candidates (in ballot order): Christi Carlson and Chris

Salado Public Library District will hold an election for two two-year terms with the following candidates (in ballot order): Susan Starnes, Nancy Mills Mackey and Theresa Howard.

The Village of Salado will hold an election for Mayor with Michael Coggin facing a write-in challenge from Linda Reynolds.

Profiles on the candidates can be found in the A and C sections of this week's Salado Village Voice.

Texas voters will also decide on two proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution on May 7.

Proposition 1 (SJR 2 -87th Legislature, 2nd Special Session): "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the reduction of the amount of a limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for elementary general and

secondary public school purposes on the residence homestead of a person who is elderly or disabled to reflect any statutory reduction from the preceding tax year in the maximum compressed rate of the maintenance and operations taxes imposed for those purposes on the homestead."

Proposition 2 (SJR 2 -87th Legislature, 3rd Special Session): "The constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from \$25,000 to \$40,000."

Qualifications to vote are these: You must register to vote in the county in which you reside.; You must be a citizen of the United States; You must be at least 17 years and 10 months old to register, and you must be 18 years of age by election day.; You must not be finally convicted of a felony, or if you are a felon, you must have completed all of your punishment, including any term of incarceration, parole, supervision, period of probation, or you must have received a pardon.

Identification Requirements: If you do not have a Texas driver's license or a social security number, you will be required to present identification when you vote in person. For more information on Texas Voter ID Laws please visit votetexas.gov.

You must provide your Texas driver's license or identification personal number. Only when you do not have a driver's license or personal identification number, then give the last four digits of your social security number or if you do not have any of these identification numbers, then you must indicate by checking the appropriate box on the application side.

US GDP contracted 1.4% (annualized) in 1st quarter

To say that the week that ended on the 29th was "interesting" would be to make an understatement of historic proportions. The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) lost 3.27% to close at 4131.93. That disappointing slump left the SPX down 9.11% for the month of April, 13.31% this year and 1.18% from this time last year. The stocks that made headlines on the way up, like Robinhood, Zoom, DocuSign, PayPal, Netflix, Meta (formerly Facebook) and others were down more than 50% from their highs. The other equity index we follow, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index ended the week down 3.58% at 2457.2 and is now 5.39% lower than it was as the year began but still has a 1% gain for 12-months. The broad market is still in correction territory with fears of a China market crunch, the Fed raising rates too fast, and an unpredictable Russia creating a lot of fear on Wall Street.


The yield on the U.S. Treasury 10-year note rose 1% for the week to 2.928%. The reputedly prescient Treasury yield curve remained positive, if only just barely as the 30-year T-bond finished the week above 3% while the 2-year note ended at 2.731%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) slowly worked its way up 3.25% to \$104.43 per barrel.

The Economy

The economic headline for the week was the report that the U.S. gross domestic product (GDP) was estimated to have contracted at a 1.4% annualized rate in the first quarter. First, let's get that number straight. Because the report is annualized, the real first estimate reported by the Bureau of Economic Analysis was that our GDP contracted 0.35%. Looking deeper, it became clear that even that

The more recent data is distinctly positive. Just in the month of March, U.S. consumer spending, the prime engine that drives our economy, rose a seasonally adjusted 1.1% with personal income up 0.5%. Then there was inflation, and there we find some good news too. Probably the best measure of real consumer inflation is found in the personal consumption expenditure index (PCE). The core PCE rose 0.3% in March for the second month in a row. That geeky-sounding number is important because it says that core U.S. inflation so far in 2022 is only running at about a 3.6% annualized

In another critical report, orders at U.S. factories for long-lasting (durable) goods rose 0.8% in March. At the same time, business investment is up 10% from a year ago. Both of those are longer-term indicators of where the economy is headed over

the next year or so.

There was another bit of very counterintuitive good news as the American Association of Individual Investors (AAII) reported that an astonishing 59.4% of their members had a negative or bearish outlook on the stock market. Why is that good news? Well, the only times in recent history when investor pessimism has been this high was right at the bear market bottoms in March 2009 and in the fall of 1990, and both marked the turning point where a bear market became a bull market. As one investment newsletter writer commented, "It is so bad, it is good!" There are only five times when bearish sentiment has been in this range in the last half century or so, and all of them were within days of a market bottom. Whether it is different this time, only time will tell, but we are optimistic.

The same is not true everywhere. Both China and the European Union are concerned about a potential recession this year, even as the EU is facing the highest inflation in recent history. The anti-COVID lockdowns in China are the big wildcard right now. Much of what we manufacture in the U.S. has parts made in China and in many places there, the factories are at a standstill.

The bottom line is that the U.S. economy is still charging ahead at full steam in a world filled with more uncertainty than we have seen in a long time. Under the surface though, all the U.S. indicators are still positive.

Let Disney Be an Example

Just like that, tyranny has descended on Florida.

The state legislature, with the support of Gov. Ron DeSantis, voted to repeal the "special independent district" enjoyed by Disney for half a century.

This is a sign, we are told, of the advent of an American authoritarianism that brooks no dissent -- Disney criticizes a measure supported by the Florida GOP, the so-called Don't Say Gay bill, and immediately gets targeted.

There's a reason this fight escalated to this point, though. Disney was the aggressor in the battle over the education bill, lied about it, and pledged to work to repeal it.

Even though the bill had nothing to do with Disney whatsoever -- nothing to do with its product, its business model, or its employees. The company got pushed into its stance based on pressure from a woke segment of its employees and from progressives on the outside.

Disney's case against the bill relied on the smear that the legislation somehow threatened gay or trans people. In fact, the law merely seeks to exclude inappropriate material from being taught to young children in the classroom -- an objective that once would have been considered utterly banal.

"Classroom instruction," the law says, "by school personnel or third parties on sexual orientation or gender identity may not occur in kindergarten through grade 3 or in a manner that is not age appropriate or developmentally appropriate for



students in accordance with state standards."

Based on that, Disney went to the mattresses. And it did so, not to serve its shareholders, enhance its profitability, protect its intellectual property, or align itself with its vast and politically diverse customer base.

This was, shockingly, an iconic American brand making itself into a free-floating weapon of woke cultural politics in response to the social and political influence of a small number of vocal progressives.

Like so many companies before, Disney calculated the risk/reward of gratuitously taking up a left-wing political and cultural fight and considered it all reward, no risk. The Florida legislature decided to convince it that it was wrong.

Republicans have fantasized about exacting revenge on woke corporations before, but to no effect. Disney's problem is that it had a glaring vulnerability in the form of an arrangement that can easily be portrayed as a special favor.

The provisions allowing Disney to govern itself in its special independent district are so extensive that one analyst refers to the so-called Reedy Creek Improvement District as "the Vatican with mouse ears."

" Never before or since has such outlandish dominion been given to a private corporation," Florida writer Carl Hiaasen notes in his book "Team Rodent." "Dis-

ney owns its own utilities. It administers its own planning and zoning. It composes its own building codes and employs its own inspectors. It maintains its own fire department. It even has the authority to levy taxes."

For good measure, it can build its own airport and nuclear power plant. Now, that's all scheduled to go away in a year's time. Obviously, it is not a good practice for government to retaliate against a business, even a business enjoying a special status.

This fight could have welcome effects, though, if it convinces Disney that it made a mistake by allowing itself to get bullied and cajoled into becoming a combatant in the culture war, or if it convinces other corporations that there's a potential price to be paid for joining woke mobs.

Republicans don't want corporations to become tools in advancing their agenda; they just want them to exit the culture wars and focus, once again, on their business, an outcome that would lower the temperature in the country's cultural fights at least a little.

I deally, Disney and the Florida legislature work out a renewal of the company's special district before it is set to expire, and the house of mouse -- and other corporations seduced into making themselves de facto left-wing pressure groups -- resolves to stick to its core competency and mission.

Question 1: Some of my core values I will bring to this position are: I hold myself to a high ethical standards of Truth, Integrity and Honor, I consider myself a Team Player; however, I have the courage to share my opinions. I am a self-motivated leader, who will show my loyalty to the Library Board of Trustees and my dedicated service to the Community of Salado and the Library District.

Question 2: The Head Library Director is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the staff. The Board of Trustees oversee the Head Director. We currently have two full time librarians: the Head Library Director and the Young Adult and Adult Librarian. There are three part-time librarians on staff currently. If there

is not enough library staff or too many the decision to hire or downsize would be up to the Head Library Director not the Board of Trustees.

Question 3: The current strategic plan has long range goals for the Salado Public Library (SPL) and the funds received to date are invested to help those long-range goals. If after all financial responsibilities are met and the community asks the Board to look at possible reduction we should of course look and determine what would be in the best interest of the library serving the community.

Question 4: Regarding the library election in which mistakes were made which disenfranchised almost 100 potential voters in the district on the first day. Would I challenge the election if I lose within that margin; Yes.

Voters go to the polls to have their voices heard. Due to an election procedure mistake, a number of voters did not get a chance to have their voices heard. The Bell County Office of Election Administration reported almost 100 potential voters did not get an opportunity to have their voices heard. Because of this mistake these voters were disenfranchised. I would be doing a disservice and it would even be unfair to my constituents if I lost and did not challenge the results. Every voter should have a chance to vote. If the majority votes for something or someone, then that something or

someone should prevail. Question 5: My passion is to see our library grow as the community grows. I would love to help this library become a community center where all patrons may find classes and tools to learn new skills, have fun with neighbors and friends at bridge or Mahjong tournaments and maybe even a coffee bar. I envision our library becoming not only a quiet place to read, but also a place where you can find your voice. Our library could become a one-of-a kind facility where all will find things they never dreamed a rural library could offer here in Salado. The possibilities are endless as the growth comes to Salado and the needs of the community are heard and put into place. I am the person who has the determination to roll up my sleeves, work with the Board, the Staff and District Community to get things done. I will be the newcomer that Salado wants and needs on the Board.



NANCY MILLS MACKEY

Question 1: Literacy has been a driving force in my life and my career, which started with me working as a newspaper reporter and then moving to magazine editing, marketing communications, professional fundraising, and freelance writing. When I retired, literacy continued to be important to me, influencing how I spend my leisure time and give back to my community. The things I cherish most in life are the love of God and freedom of worship; the love of my family, many of whom live in Salado: the friendship of my neighbors; and literacy, which I believe gives people the potential to transform their own lives and the world. I am passionate about improving lives through literacy and have demonstrated my passion through more than 25 years of volunteer service to the Salado Public Library and the Temple Public Library. I have already made an impact and want to continue doing so. In Temple, I helped with the multi-million-dollar effort in the early 1990s to relocate and double the size of the library. As Salado Public Library District president in 2017-2018, I appointed the longrange planning committee that began examining the Salado library's future needs and preparing for Salado's unprecedented growth.

Question 2: The library director

manages day-to-day library opera-

tions and recommends staffing levels according to community needs and state guidelines. Staffing is reviewed and approved by the board during annual budget planning and long-range planning. The Salado Public Library is accredited by the Texas State Library and Archives Commission, which sets standards along with the Texas Library Association. TSLAC/TLA uses a formula incorporating population and total service hours to calculate optimal staffing ranges. The standard for a population of 10,000 to 24,999 ranges from one full-time equivalent staff member for every 2,500 to 3,500 people, with at least .25 to one full-time equivalent accredited librarian who has a master's in library science. The Salado Public Library currently serves 8,000 to 9,000 people with a staff of two full-time accredited librarians, one full-time staff member and two parttime staffers (a total of 4.3 full-time equivalent employees). The library is open 48.5 hours per week, including Saturdays and extended Thursday hours. Paid staffing is augmented by volunteers and Friends of the Salado Public Library. Based on state standards, no staffing issues have been identified at this time. (NOTE: The American Library Association no longer suggests public library staffing standards.)

Question 3: Reducing the sales tax rate is unwise in view of the anticipated area growth and future demand for library services. As an elected official, I remain open to new ideas for funding the library, but it's difficult to think of a better way than one where visitors, tourists and passersby on I-35 share the burden of support. The library district was established by voters in May 1998 during a special election, with a .005 percent local sales tax set to provide district revenue. Salado is one of 15 library districts in Texas with public libraries funded by a district rather than a city or county. The library district is not funded by property taxes! Funding comes from revenue on taxable goods sold within the library district's 134 square miles. If the tax rate was reduced, it would mean only a few dollars in savings for each consumer but a big loss in funding for the library's literacy outreach. The library district's sales tax revenue, which totaled \$528,967 during the last fiscal year, must be used by law "to establish, equip and maintain one or more public libraries for the dissemination of general information relating to the arts, sciences and lit-

erature." Question 4: I want to win this election! I have more I'd like to accomplish in completing the library's long-range plans and ensuring the library remains a vibrant hub of the community. It is disheartening to think that anyone would have been prevented from voting for the candidate of their choice because of a ballot printing omission. I'm not sure what I will do if I should lose the election or if I would challenge the election's outcome. Since I don't know what the outcome will be, and I don't know what margins will be posted by the winners, I will reserve judgment. Should I lose, I will need to confer with my family and supporters and

consider my next steps prayerfully. Question 5: My values, passion for literacy, experience with library expansion, and leadership, consensus-building, strategic planning, budgeting, fundraising, grant writing and communications skills make me the right candidate right now. My motivation for serving is clear. I have no axe to grind and no hidden agendas. I simply want to promote literacy in the community I now call home. When I was three years old, I'd read every children's book in our home. A trip to the library (and many trips since) opened a world of possibilities. The library became an extension of my home and family. It nurtured me, gave me an understanding of the world we live in and the imagination to envision a better world. I would like for those in our community -- which historically has valued culture, the arts, literature and learning -- to discover the same palace of possibility in our Salado

Question 1: I have integrity, I'm steadfast, and I don't mind hard work, all of which are necessary when taking on the task of leading an organization or mission in the right direction. I have a proven track record of service to our community, having established Legacy Salado Inc., Salado's newest non-profit, to benefit the entirety of Salado. I, two other board members, and some very much appreciated volunteers work together with the mission of improving Salado for all citizens. If elected to serve on the board, my values, personal characteristics, and work ethic will be put to good use in helping to continue the growth and advancement of our library.

Question 2: Staffing is one of the duties of the library director, and while the board should provide guidance to the director, ultimately, the director should understand the staffing needs of the library. To properly address the matter of understaffing/overstaffing, I would find it prudent to first have the library director review the current staff, their job descriptions, and their performance of assigned duties. Should the director find that a staff member is underperforming, she should meet with that person to find a solution to the problem. Additionally, should the director find that a staff member's duties are not substantial enough to warrant the position, then for the sake of fiscal responsibility, the director should look at reducing the hours of that employee or eliminating the position entirely. Findings should then be delivered to the board as a matter of checks and balances to ensure that the library is adequately but not unnecessarily over-staffed. A yearly review of staff assignments would be beneficial to identify possible staffing needs or reductions.

Question 3: Before supporting a reduction in the amount of sales tax the library collects, I think it is important that the library financials be thoroughly reviewed and understood. Currently, the library has several CD investments that total slightly more than \$275,000, and while that may seem a substantial amount of money to have in savings, the library does have plans for expansion. Currently, the cost to build or renovate is exorbitant, so one cannot begrudge the library for having the necessary funding to cover or make a substantial dent in their expansion costs. That said, there may be ways to cut library spending that warrants review. For example, is there a better rate for utility providers, cleaning services, lawn maintenance, etc. Additionally, and as I've stated in past writings, there are numerous programs / services that I think could be added to the library that would make it more appealing to all ages. Technological advancements such as virtual reality equipment, improved website functioning and services such as being able to acquire a library card online, and live web streaming of programs all cost money to facilitate. Therefore, before stating that a sales tax reduction is in order, I believe more research into this matter is needed.

Question 4: At this time, I am compiling information and speaking with various entities to understand the mistakes that were made during this election. An educated, logical, and well thought out decision will be made at the appropriate time.





Maximum residual disinfectant level or MRDL: The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial

contaminants.

The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. 


Shopping Map of Salado

Tomlin is Embedded Teacher

This is Teacher Appreciation Week. We have Superintendent's outstanding teachers that provide our students an excellent education. Students and parents, I encourage you to consider sending an e-mail or a note to your teachers to thank them for all of their hard work.

One of our outstanding teachers is Salado Middle School science teacher Laura Tomlin

Laura Tomlin is one of four teachers from Georgia, Iowa, Texas, and Wisconsin, selected to serve as "Embedded Teachers" with the Carthage College Microgravity Team. The Embedded Teacher Program is a partnership between the Wisconsin Space Grant Consortium, the National Space Society, and the Zero Gravity Corporation (ZE-RO-G).

The teachers and their experiments will each experience eleven minutes of weightlessness during a series of two-hour flights the ZERO-G aboard G-Force One aircraft. Thirty parabolas are executed during each flight. The parabolas allow the researchers to float in free-fall during the maneuvers, which each last about 22-24 seconds.

Laura comes to teaching from a career as a research biologist studying crops and pests of the California and Arizona agricultural systems. She is flying two primary experiments. One is designed to investigate how water transport in lunar and Martian soils (regolith) is affected by the different gravity levels on these bod-

ies. The second experiment studies whether the microgravity environment suppresses enzyme function in the liver, possibly leading to liver damage on long-term spaceflight.

The NASA WSGC Embedded Teacher program has flown eight teachers and their experiments over the past seven years. Each teacher works with Carthage Professor Kevin Crosby to develop their experiments for flight, but the ideas for the experiments often come from the hundreds of students involved in each teacher's project. The teachers will bring the lessons and experiences of the program back to their classrooms to motivate students to pursue their own journeys in STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics).

Ms. Tomlin captured the experience of working on her project and the impact on her students. She said, "The project has required critical thinking, communication, and creativity, giving students a better understanding of the scientific and engineering process. Enthusiasm for this project continues to grow with each accomplishment. A young girl remarked that she 'did not even know' she liked science, and now wants to work at NASA one day."

Congratulations to Laura Tomlin for being one of only four teachers in the nation selected for this program.

Thank you to all of our teachers for the fantastic job they do preparing our students for their future.




Dr. Novotny is well respected amongst his peers and leaders in the region. His opinion is sought out on numerous issues and he represents our community well.
