BoA approves Sanctuary, Sanctuary East PIDs

Salado aldermen unanimously approved the formation of Sanctuary Public Improvement District and Sanctuary East Public Improvement District (PID) following public hearings on each Feb. 2.

Only one person, Michael McDonald, spoke during the public hearings. He asked aldermen to push for improvements to Royal St. to handle the amount of traffic that will feed into it from the Sanctuary development.

Aldermen heard from PID legal and financial experts before acting on the proposed PIDs, the first of their kind in Village of Salado.

The Sanctuary PID is located at the intersection of I-35 and FM 2268. It has two tracts separated by FM 2268 totaling 106.47 acres. The North tract is 49.43 acres. The South Tract is 57.04 acres. Plans for the Sanctuary PID include construction of a 365 door hotel, approximately 500,000 square feet of office, mixed-use, restaurant and retail space; 576 multi-family for rent units; 107 multi-family for sale units and 11 single family units. Construction of 210 apartments has begun at what is called Water's Edge on the North Tract of Sanctuary PID.

The developer is seeking \$7.4 million in PID bonds for the construction of approved PID facilities on the Sanctuary PID.

PID funds can be used

for the payment of landscaping, streets, roadway construction, water, wastewater, drainage facilities and improvements, park improvements, improvements related to the foregoing, payment of expenses incurred in the establishment, administration and operation of the District, and other improvement projects, and the costs of financing the public improvements.

The total assessed value, according to the developer, of the Sanctuary PID will be \$315 million. At that rate, the PID assessment would be about \$0.227 per \$100 of assessed value based upon a payment schedule of 30

The Sanctuary East PID sits on 188.85 acres of land that connects FM 2268 to Royal Street. The Sanctuary East PID when fully built out will be 416 single family lots of between 50 and 75 feet in width. Sanctuary East will have a total assessed value of \$208 million according to the developer's market estimate. The developer is seeking \$15 million in PID Bonds. The PID assessment is estimated at \$0.50 per \$100 assessed value over a 30 year lifetime.

PID assessments are only paid by the property owners within the boundaries of the PID. It will have no effect on the tax rates of other property owners within the Village.

Rick Rosenberg with Development Planning and Financing Group, Inc. (DPFG, Inc.) told aldermen that when fully developed, the Sanctuary PID would generate \$1.2 million per year in property

tax revenues to the Village (separte from the PID Assessment). Sanctuary East would generate \$2.8 million in property tax revenues to the Village when fully built

Mayor Michael Coggin asked Rosenberg if those calculations took into account the rebate paid back to the developer. "No they don't," he replied.

Rodney Bell made the motion for the formation of the Sanctuary PID, receiving a second from D. Jasen Graham Bell and Graham were joined by John Cole, Paul Cox and Jason Howard in voting in favor.

Cox made the motion for the formation of the Sanctuary East PID, receiving a second from Bell, All voted in favor.

Aldermen also approved professional service agreements with P3 Works for the administration of the Sanctuary PID and the Sanctuary East PID. Mary Petty and Jon Snyder joined together to create P3Works, LLC, to assist cities, counties, and management districts with the creation and administration of their special districts. Special taxing districts such as PIDs, MMDs, and TIRZs are created to meet the unique needs of each city, county and management district. P3 Works has offices in Keller and Austin.

Petty has 22 years of experience in banking, management and public administration. Snyder has 15 years of experience in real estate and municipal finance.

Unemployment dips to 3.4% 517,000 jobs added in Jan.

The Markets

It was a wild week for the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX). It puttered along until late Wednesday when Chairman Powell had his post-Federal Reserve Board meeting press conference. Just before that the SPX stood at 4046, but by the end of the day it had risen to 4150. It wobbled around near that level for the rest of the week then dipped a bit on Friday's astonishingly good jobs report before finally closing at 4136.48, up 1.62% for the week. As always, a bit of perspective is in order here. The SPX is now up 7.73% in 2023 after turning in one of the best January performances in decades. It is also up about 15% from mid-October and a whopping 84% from its low back in March 2020. It is now ahead about 22% from three years ago, just before the pandemic. It is though, still about 14% below its all-time high in January of 2022. Our other followed stock indicator, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, closed at 2517.97, up 1.22% for the week and 7.62% so far this year. It is now only down about 3%


from its all-time high. The yield on the 10-year U.S. Treasury note finished the week at 3.53%, barely budging from last week's yield, despite having dropped to 3.34% on Thursday and then returning to where it started. The Treasury yield curve followed suit and remained solidly inverted with the 6-month and 1-year maturities both yielding about 4.8%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) fell another 7% to \$73.76 per barrel, putting it exactly where it was at the end of the first week of the

er boot dropped. Our dearly beloved Bureau of Labor Statistics, (BLS) released its jobs report showing total non-farm payroll employment rose by an astounding 517,000 in January, and the unemployment rate dropped to 3.4%, the lowest it has been since 1969. Last year, when hiring was on a blitz, the average month's new jobs added number was just over 400,000. Now, with the economic tea leaves warning of a pending recession, hiring jumped to a level over 100,000 higher. That news flies in the face of the major layoffs announced recently at the big tech firms. al-time indicator we have Then, the report went on to suggests we are in full say that total employment for both November and December were revised upward by over 70,000 jobs total. Wages, meanwhile, rose 0.3% for the month, at a 3.6% annualized rate, but much lower than December's 5.2% rate and labor productivity rose at a 3.0% annual rate in the 4th quar-

Buried in the jobs report was the news that manufacturing employment rose by 19,000 in January. That was a real surprise because on Wednesday, the Institute for Supply Management (ISM) reported that their manufacturing Purchasing Manager's Index (PMI), a normally excellent indicator of where the manufacturing sector of our economy is headed, came in at 47.4, for January on a scale where numbers below 50 indicate contraction. In other words, manufacturers are seeing shrinking demand going forward but at the same time hired another 19,000 new workers! The anecdotal notes on the ISM report were that manufacturers are not planning to lay off workers and are hiring more because they are positive about the second half of the

If this sounds confusing, it is because it is. We are seeing consumer confidence rise, hiring accelerate, labor productivity, particularly in the service sector where employees are most wanted, shoot upward, while at the same time prices are leveling off and beginning to fall. On top of that, Friday's weekly new unemployment insurance claims dropped to a 9-month low of 183,000 and have been falling for three weeks as continuing claims fall too.

Every economic regrowth mode. This is not at all like the lead up to any recession we have seen in the past half century we have been watching such things. Instead, inverted yield curve or not, this looks more and more like a healthy, growing economy with plenty of juice left in it. It will certainly be interesting to watch what happens over the next several months and years.

Tired of hearing about China? Stop cash flow

Do you get tired of hearing about China? Now we have floating surveillance balloons over our country. We are yet to know for sure what this is about but time will tell. China is probably scouting out the next land or business purchase. They may have come up with an easy way to determine which military bases have available adjacent land. It doesn't matter if it's for sale they can come up with enough money to buy the property. All they have to do is to keep piling up the money from everything they sell to the United States.

Alarms went off in Washington when the Fufeng Group, a Chinese agricultural company, bought 300 acres of land and set up a milling plant last spring in Grand Forks, N.D. The plant is a 20-minute drive from an Air Force base that, according to North Dakota Sen. John Hoeven, hosts a space mission that "will form the backbone of U.S. military communications across the globe." Source WSJ

Ten years ago Smithfield Foods was purchased by China's leading pork producer, Shuanghui International Holdings Ltd. (now called WH Group Ltd.), for \$4.72 billion.

Keep in mind China has 1.5 billion people. This requires a lot of people to feed. China would love to gain as much of our farmland as possible to gain more control of our food production. This is one area where China really needs us. Our agricultural exports to them increased by over 27% from 2020 to 2021. They would need us if they can gain control of our farmland. It's also a plus for them if they can have it close to our military bases. This provides a twofold benefit for them. In the middle of the cornfield, they can watch everything we are doing or even attempt to thwart what we are

The U.S. trade summary reveals the depth of our trade with China.

In 2021, U.S. exports to China were \$151.1 billion, a 21.4% (\$26.6 billion) increase from 2020; U.S. imports from China were \$506.4 billion, a 16.5% (\$71.6 billion) increase; and the trade deficit with China was \$355.3 billion, a 14.5% (\$45.0 billion) increase from \$310.3 billion in 2020.

China was the United States' third-largest trade partner in 2021.

In 2021, 8.6% of total U.S. exports of \$1.8 trillion were exported to China and 17.9% of total U.S. imports of \$2.8 trillion were imported from China.

Mechanical Appliances, Sound Recorders and TV sets were the most traded commodity sectors. In the last five years, U.S. exports of those commodities show an upward trend from \$25 billion in 2017 to \$36.1 billion in 2021. The percentages of imports of those commodities from China out of total imports from the World are impressive with 37.0% in 2017 and 29.3% in 2021.

In 2021, U.S. exports of Agricultural Products to China continue to show an upward trend. In 2021, U.S. exports of Agriculture Products were \$31.6 billion, an increase of 27.5% (\$6.8 billion) from \$24.8 billion in 2020.

In 2021, China remained the major source of U.S. imports of Textile Products. In 2021, U.S. imports of \$50.3 billion of Textile Products from China constituted 32.6% of the total U.S. imports of Textile products.

Additionally, in 2021, China remained the major source of U.S. imports of Furniture, Bedding, Lamps, Toys, Games, Sports Equipment, Paint, and other Miscellaneous Manufactured Items. In 2021, the U.S. imports of \$68.5 billion of Miscellaneous Manufactured Items from China constituted 53.2% of total U.S. imports of those commodities. Source: Government info data

What can we do about China? Try to buy products not made in China. You have to shop but it's possible. Shrinking the cash flow to China is crucial to reducing their growing economic and military power. By all means, please do not sell them your land.







Assume you're declarer at four spades and West leads the queen and another heart. East wins the second heart with the king and continues with the ace. This presents you with a thorny problem of sorts, since it is virtually certain from the bidding and play that West started with a doubleton heart.

If you ruff the third heart with the

ten, you say to yourself, and West is able to overruff with the jack, you are sure to go down. If you decide to ruff with the king instead, you run the risk that West might have started with three trumps to the jack, in which case you will also go down.

But if your thoughts have been running in only these two channels which card to ruff with — you are not giving yourself a fair shake. The fact is that you should not ruff at all! Instead, you should discard your eight of diamonds.

This discard changes the complexion of the situation completely. In the actual case, you have no trouble taking the rest of the tricks, whatever East plays next.

It is true that East could have defeated the contract had he been smart enough to cash the ace of diamonds before he played the ace of hearts. In that case, you would have to go down one as the cards lie regardless of which card you elected to ruff with.

The moral that emerges is clear. If you are given a chance to make a contract that could have been defeated by better defensive play, you should try to take full advantage of your opportunity. You're not expected to reciprocate in kind.


