Early voting starts April 24

Local voters will elect three Salado Independent School District trustees to three-year terms and three Village of Salado aldermen to two-year terms on May 6.

Candidates for the Salado ISD Board of Trustees will appear on the ballot in this order: Savannah Hennig, Kimberly Redelsheimer, David Matthews and Eric Malmin.

Candidates for the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen are these: D. Jasen Graham, Bert Henry, Linda Reynolds, Rodney W. Bell, Lennox J. Alfred, and Samuel Morris. Cody Coufal withdrew his candidacy on April 10. His name will remain on the ballot.

Early voting in the election will begin April 24 at the Salado Civic Center, 601 North Main St.

Early voting hours are 7 a.m.-7 p.m. April 24. 8 a.m.-5 p.m. April 25-28 and May 2; 10 a.m.-2 p.m. April 29 and 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 1.

Election day, the polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 6.

Under Texas law, voters who possess one of the seven acceptable forms of photo ID must present that ID at the polls when voting in person. Voters who do not possess and cannot reasonably obtain one of the seven approved forms of photo ID may fill out a Reasonable Impediment Declaration (RID) (PDF) at the polls and present an alternative form of ID, such as a utility bill, bank statement, government certificate.

Here is a list of the acceptable forms of photo ID:

- •Texas Driver License issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)
- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by
- Texas Personal Identification Card issued by DPS

- Texas Handgun License issued by DPS
- United States Military Identification Card containing the person's photograph United States Citizenship Certificate containing the person's photograph
- United States Passport (book or card)

With the exception of the U.S. Citizenship Certificate, which does not expire, for voters aged 18-69, the acceptable form of photo identification may be expired no more than four years before being presented for voter qualification at the polling place.

For voters aged 70 or older, the acceptable form of photo identification may be expired for any length of time if the identification is otherwise valid

Identification Election Certificates are available from DPS driver license offices during regular business

Here is a list of the supporting forms of ID that can be presented if the voter does not possess one of the forms of acceptable photo ID and cannot reasonably obtain one:

- copy or original of a government document that shows the voter's name and an address, including the voter's voter registration certificate;
- copy of or original current utility bill;
- copy of or original bank statement:
- copy of or original gov-
- copy of or original pay-

ernment check;

U.S. state or territory) birth certificate or (b) a document confirming birth admissible in a court of law which establishes the voter's identity (which may include a foreign birth document).

After presenting one of the forms of supporting ID listed above, the voter must execute a Reasonable Impediment Declaration.

Village Administrator Don Ferguson said that there are two vacancies in the police department. He added that the Village may consider converting the SRO positions to full-time Village police department positions.


Coufal withdraws BoA candidacy

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An Open Exchange of Ideas

Fear remains that Feds will increase interest rate too far

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) keeps on plugging away in its not-uncommon, counterintuitive manner. Having professionally experienced about 10 bear and bull markets, not to mention the many academic works we have read that were devoted to the study of those two undomesticated animals, we can say with assurance that what we have seen since about October of 2022 has a strong resemblance to the early days of every sustained bull market we have lived through. In our experience and research, the largest part of any rise in a bull market occurs in the face of a loudly voiced fear of a pending recession. The SPX for this foreshortened holy week did lose about 0.01%, closing out the week at 4105.02 but remains about 15% higher than it was last October. It is also up 83% from its low in March three years ago but still a bit over 14% lower than it was at its peak in January 2022. It is and was our humble opinion that October 2022 has a high probability of having been this cycle's low point. Morningstar continues to proclaim that the broad U.S. stock market is undervalued, with the caveat that despite that, there could be some rough periods ahead. The CRSP US Mid-Cap Value Index continued to suffer from the selloffs in the regional banking sector and fell 1.11% to 2291.44, but its loss since its record high back in January 2022 is only about 11% and still compares favorably with the

14% loss in the SPX. The yield on the benchmark 10-year Treasury note fell just a bit from last week's 3.48% to this week's 3.39%. The highest yields are still to be found in the 1-year and less maturities with the 4-month T-bill yielding an annualized 5.07%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil, the benchmark for the black goo on this side of the world, rose to a price of \$80.46 per barrel. While that is a bit higher than some of the prices we saw last winter, it is also

about 18% less expensive than it was last year at this time.

The Economy

The markets and the economy are caught between a rock and a hard place, as our mother/grandmother used to say. There remains a deep and abiding fear at all levels of business and economic leaders that the Federal Reserve (the Fed) will raise interest rates too far and thereby create a major recession as Paul Volker's Fed did back in the late 1970s and early 1980s. We are comfortable that scenario is unlikely because the economy today is very, very different than it was 45 years ago. Also, unlike the 1970s, inflation has not become entrenched, with workers, often through their unions, demanding double digit pay raises each year. Many of the issues that made a major recession almost inevitable in the early 1980s generally don't exist today. Yes, using the monetary tools available to the Fed is often more of an art than a science, but unlike the 1970s, the U.S. Federal Reserve Board is full of academics who have spent their lives studying this subject whereas in the 1970s the Fed Governor's chair was sometimes seen as an award for loyal party members.

U.S. Employers added 236,000 jobs in March, far more than would be needed in a steady-state economy, and that announcement raised fears that the Fed would jack up rates and crush the economy. Another bit of reverse psychology was revealed with the announcement that the number of unfilled jobs in the U.S. is finally declining, albeit slowly. The labor market appears to be on the path for a return to normalcy. Fewer jobs open, of course, was seen as a positive and the market rose on the news.

economic slap in the face to both Europe and the U.S. as it announced it had negotiated a one-million-barrel per day reduction in oil production with OPEC(+). The announcement came after Saudi authorities effectively reached an agreement with Russia to raise the price of oil so Russia could continue its invasion of Ukraine. The surprise, at least to us, is that the average U.S. at-thepump gasoline price only rose about 7 cents per gallon or about 2% from recent prices. There was a time we remember all too well when the Saudis could do a lot of damage to our economy, but that was 50 years ago, and we have learned a few things since then. In the 1970s when the Saudis decided to wage economic warfare against us, the price of an average gallon of gasoline quadrupled as long lines formed at gas stations to try to get fuel at any price. The bottom line is un-

changed. We are in a healthily growing economy that seems to be reducing its growth rate to something more sustainable than we have seen since the pandemic. The Atlanta Fed is forecasting a GDP rise of 1.5% (annualized) for the first quarter. The key here though, is that it is confusing. There are strong signals suggesting we are in the early stages of an expansion and equally strong signals that a downturn is imminent. Over the four (+) decades we have been doing this we have found the best way to understand a confusing set of economic statistics is to go out into the economy and get a feel for what is happening. What we see and hear in the real world of people making and spending money doesn't feel like there is a recession pending.

Village will have several projects beginning this summer

This summer will be an exciting time for Salado! Your Board of Aldermen has been busy planning street improvements. Fasten your seatbelts this summer and get ready for orange cones, construction workers and traffic detours. Here are the highlights:

Royal Street will get a full restoration during a \$1.2M road improvement project from Main Street to Drake's Landing (well past the Methodist Church). Work will start and be completed this summer.

Center Circle will be repayed with new ribbon curbs. Work will start and be completed this summer. This includes the entire Center Circle Street.

Salado School Road will be repayed this summer. We are also teaming with the Sanctuary Water's Edge **Mayor's Update**

developer and plan to pave Santa Maria Road this summer – a new haul route has also been made to keep construction traffic out of our neighborhoods.

The \$700K drainage program projects will start this summer. Stagecoach Circle, Chisholm Trail and Mill Creek Drive are scheduled to see drainage improvements.

The Salado waste water treatment plant will receive a \$1.5M expansion from 200,000 gallons per day to 300,000 gallons per day. The design will start this summer with anticipated

project completion scheduled for next summer.

Road patching on Van Bibber Road and Blaylock Drive is scheduled for this summer. Other pothole and patches will be ongoing throughout the village.

Our design for a new City Hall is nearing completion. It is hoped this \$1.5M project will start this summer and be completed next spring. This 5,000 square feet building will house our village administration office and police department located next to the new Bell County Annex on Event



Facilities planning committee will present plan to SISD board

Our facility planning committee has met four times so far and has participated in a tour of our school facilities. The committee is comprised of 47 voting members, including 23 parents, 13 community members, and 11 teachers. All of the voting members on the committee live in our school district. Of the 47 voting committee members, five of them also served on our facility committee in 2017-2018 and 42 of them did not.

The committee will present a facilities plan to our school board, including a recommendation regarding whether or not to call a bond election. Our Interest and Sinking (I&S) tax rate is currently at the maximum rate of 50 cents per \$100 of property value. Therefore, if a bond election is recommended by the committee, called by the school board, and approved by the voters,





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Salado Water Supply Enters Stage 1 Drought Contingency Water Use Restrictions:

Due to recent drought conditions in the area, the water resources depended on by Salado, being the Edwards Aquifer and Stillhouse Hollow Reservoir, have been negatively impacted.

The Edwards Aquifer is below normal due to a lack of recharge. Also the lake is extremely low due to lack of rainfall west of our area to refill the lake through the Lampasas River.

Stage 1 requests our customers to voluntarily limit outside watering to twice a week with odd addresses watering Tuesday and Friday and even addresses watering Wednesday and Saturday.

Water usage is three (3) times higher when lawn and outdoor watering begins. Please check sprinkler systems for leaks and adjust the system to be sure sprinklers are not spraying driveways and streets. Avoid over watering and allowing runoff. For example, if you water an area for 20 minutes, cut the time back to 10 minutes for two (2) different times to allow the ground to absorb the water instead of running off.

Further, mowing grass at the highest setting on mower provides the root system an extra degree of shade which requires less additional water.

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

Salado Lady Eagles' season came down to a tenth of a second at Northwest ISD Stadium on April 8.



Salado, on the other hand, took six shots on goal on 13 total attempts.




Lexi Rice fights Mackenzie Gonzalez of Stephenville for possession in overtime. (PHOTO BY ROYCE WIGGIN)



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



The secret of good declarer play lies mostly in visualizing how the unseen cards are divided and putting this knowledge to effective use. The clues that furnish declarer with a picture of the opposing hands can come from the bidding, the play, or both.

Consider this deal where declarer failed to process the many clues available. It was played in the South Africa-Ireland match at the 1960 World Team Olympiad.

The South African declarer got to four hearts doubled as shown, and West led the club queen. South won with the ace, cashed the ace of trump, felling East's king, then led a diamond and successfully finessed the queen.

After discarding a club on the ace of diamonds, declarer led a spade to the king, losing to the ace. South eventually lost two more spades and a trump trick and finished down one, -200. He was able to ruff his fourth spade in dummy to prevent an even greater loss.

South's early plays were certainly correct. The diamond finesse, though dangerous, was necessary, but after it succeeded South should have reassessed his prospects and made the contract.

It was a serious mistake to lead a spade to the king at trick five. To play a spade from dummy was surely right, but to play the king was surely wrong. South should have placed West with the spade ace for his takeout double, because East had already turned up with the king of hearts and (by inference from West's opening lead) king of clubs.

Had South played a low spade on East's eight at trick five and later played a low spade again, he would have gained a spade trick and made the contract. He also would have been 990 points to the better.





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Small business optimism declines

AUSTIN – NFIB's Small Business Optimism Index decreased 0.8 points in March to 90.1, marking the 15th consecutive month below the 49-year average of 98. Twenty-four percent of owners reported inflation as their single most important business problem, down four points from last month. Small business owners expecting better business conditions over the next six months remain at a net negative 47%.

"Small business owners are cynical about future economic conditions," said NFIB Chief Economist Bill Dunkelberg. "Hiring plans fell to their lowest level since May 2020, but strong consumer spending has kept Main Street alive and supported strong labor demand."

Although state-specific data is unavailable, NFIB State Director Annie Spilman warned that without meaningful tax and regulatory relief, small business owners in Texas could remain pessimistic about future economic conditions:

"Texas entrepreneurs want to hire hardworking men and women, invest in their communities, and expand their operations - despite the economic uncertainty they face. Meaningful property tax relief and regulatory consistency would make it easier for our job creators to do all this and more. We hope the legislature will act quickly on behalf of small business owners and their employees."

Key findings include:

Forty-three percent of owners reported job openings that were hard to fill, down four points from February and remaining historically very high.

The net percent of owners raising average selling prices decreased one point to a net 37% seasonally ad-

justed.

The net percent of owners who expect real sales to be higher deteriorated six points from February to a net negative 15%.

As reported in NFIB's monthly jobs report, a seasonally adjusted net 15% of owners are planning to create new jobs in the next three months. Twenty-six percent of owners reported few qualified applicants for their open positions and 27% reported none. Eleven percent of owners cited labor costs as their top business problem and 23% said that labor quality was their top business problem. Labor quality remains in second place behind inflation by one point as the top business problem.

Fifty-seven percent of owners reported capital outlays in the next six months, down three points from February. Of those making expenditures, 40% reported spending on new equipment, 23% acquired vehicles, and 11% spent money for new fixtures and furniture. Fifteen percent improved or expanded facilities and 6% acquired new buildings or land for expansion. Twenty percent of owners are planning capital outlays in the next few months, down one point from February. Overall, the small business sector shows little strength from capital spending.

A net negative 6% of all owners (seasonally adjusted) reported higher nominal sales in the past three months. Sales are trending down. The net percent of owners expecting higher real sales volumes deteriorated six points to a net negative 15%.

The net percent of owners reporting inventory increases was unchanged at a net negative 1%. Not seasonally adjusted, thirteen percent reported increases in stocks and 17% report-

ed reductions. Nineteen percent of owners reported that supply chain disruptions still have a significant impact on their business. Another 31% reported a moderate impact and 35% reported a mild impact.

A net 1% of owners viewed current inventory stocks as "too low" in March, up five points from February. By industry, shortages are reported most frequently in transportation (18%), retail (17%), manufacturing (16%), and wholesale (16%). Complaints of shortages in construction (3%) have been reduced because home sales have slowed due to higher interest rates. A net negative 4% of owners plan inventory investment in the coming months, up three points from February.

The net percent of owners raising average selling prices decreased one point from February to a net 37% seasonally adjusted, the lowest since April 2021. Unadjusted, 11% reported lower average selling prices and 50% reported higher average prices. Price hikes were the most frequent in wholesale (71% higher, 16% lower), retail (61% higher, 8% lower), construction (57% higher, 8% lower), and finance (56% higher, 8% lower). Seasonally adjusted, a net 26% plan price hikes, up one point.

Seasonally adjusted, a net 42% reported raising compensation, down six points from February. A net 22% plan to raise compensation in the next three months.

The frequency of positive profit trends was a net negative 18%, five points better than in February. Among owners reporting lower profits, 31% blamed weaker sales, 23% blamed the rise in the cost of materials, 13% cited the usual seasonal change, 9% cited


lower prices, 8% cited labor costs, and 3% cited higher taxes or regulatory costs. For owners reporting higher profits, 48% credited sales volumes, 21% cited higher prices, 18% cited usual seasonal change, and 5% cited lower labor costs.

Two percent of owners reported that all their borrowing needs were not satisfied. Twenty-nine percent reported all credit needs were met and 59% said they were not interested in a loan.

A net 9% reported their last loan was harder to get than in previous attempts, up four points.

Three percent reported that financing was their top business problem. A net 26% of owners reported paying a higher rate on their most recent loan, up two points. Rates are rising, but credit is still available.

The NFIB Research Center has collected Small Business Economic Trends data with quarterly surveys since the fourth quarter of 1973 and monthly surveys since 1986.

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Texas voters support homestead exemption over property appraisal caps, survey shows

as Association of Property Tax Professionals release the results of a statewide survey conducted by Texas' preeminent political pollster Mike Baselice.

The statewide survey of 800 Texas voters found strong support for the Texas Senate plan to provide significant property tax relief by increasing homestead exemptions as opposed to the Texas House scheme to lower appraisal caps.

In summarizing the survey results, Mike Baselice said, "More than four out of five likely voters in Texas support SJR 3 – a measure to increase the Texas homestead exemption to \$70,000, and to increase the exemption for seniors and disabled homeowners to \$100,000. Specifically, voters support SJR 3 by a 70-point margin - 82% in favor to 12% op-

"At a smaller 42-point margin, voters support reducing the cap on appraisal increases to 5% in HJR 1 (67% in favor to 25% op-

When forced to choose between the two proposals, voters prefer SJR 3 over HJR 1 - 47% to 40%. That margin grows wider to 57%-38% after a series of informed choices about the two proposals. For example:

• Voters prefer SJR 3 over HJR 1 by over two-to-one (64% to 29%, respectively) after learning SJR 3 provides additional tax relief to seniors which the appraisal cap proposal fails to do.

• Voters choose SJR 3 over HJR 1 by nearly twoto-one (61% to 32%, respectively) when they learn the increase in the homestead exemption will provide every Texas homeowner \$798 in property tax savings every year whereas appraisal caps give owners of more expensive properties larger tax breaks than owners of lower-valued properties.

Other informative statements that led to increased opposition to HJR 1 include:

• 72% are opposed to HJR 1 when they learn the appraisal caps are modeled after California's property tax system which has led to

a massive housing shortage, skyrocketing home prices, homelessness, increased and among the nation's highest cost of living.

• 68% are opposed to HJR 1 when they learn the measure adopts California's property tax law which led to the largest divide between rich and poor in the nation with older, higher income property owners getting the biggest tax breaks while lower income and younger people pay significantly more in taxes than they otherwise would without an ap-

In summary, there was serious concern and hesitation over how appraisal caps in California led to a massive housing shortage, the greatest divide between rich and poor, and huge inequities with owners of similarly valued properties paying dramatically different property taxes. At the end of the survey, support for HJR 1 and appraisal caps was cut in half to just 31% of voters, while opposition more than doubled from the beginning of the survey to 55%.
