Saladoans to elect 3 aldermen, 3 SISD trustees

Local voters will elect three Salado Independent School District trustees to three-year terms and three Village of Salado aldermen to two-year terms on May 6.

Candidates for the Salado ISD Board of Trustees will appear on the ballot in this order: Savannah Hennig, Kimberly Redelsheimer, David Matthews and Eric Malmin.

Candidates for the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen are these: D. Jasen Graham, Bert Henry, Linda Reynolds, Rodney W. Bell, Lennox J. Alfred, and Samuel Morris. Cody Coufal withdrew his candidacy on April 10.

In early voting, which

ended May 2, 629 total ballots were cast in the Salado elections.

Election day, the polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m.

Under Texas law, voters who possess one of the seven acceptable forms of photo ID must present that ID at the polls when voting in person.

Voters who do not possess and cannot reasonably obtain one of the seven approved forms of photo ID may fill out a Reasonable Impediment Declaration (RID) (PDF) at the polls and present an alternative form of ID, such as a utility bill, bank statement, government check, or a voter registration certificate.

"Born in Sharp Texas on est of six, a Depression era child, he was instilled by his farming father Jim to work hard, give much and ask little

of others," Reed said. Fifty years, ago, with a wife and three kids dependent upon him, he turned down the opportunity to take a state level job with Farm Bureau because it would require moving to Dallas.

"So, instead, he rolled the dice, and opened a real estate office that bore his name in Belton," Reed. said. "He moved his family to Salado and continues to live in the house he built here in 1973."

He joined the Salado Chamber of Commerce in those early days and his business continues as a long-term member. "In those days, the Chamber was much different than today," Reed said. "It was the billy pulpit, the unofficial governing body of an unincorporated village. It maintained Pace Park, paid for the street lights on Main St. and took on projects such as saving the old red schoolhouse and more. He served on its board in those early days of the Chamber and was President of the Board.

He also served on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees, taking a page from his father Jim, whose name was engraved on the cornerstone of the old school in Sharp, Texas. His own name is on the marker of the old Salado High School (now known as TAE 3). He was president of the board of trustees in 1979. He worked hard to prevent the consolidation of Salado ISD with Jarrell.

"He is a tireless supporter of local public schools," Reed said. His children and now grand-daughter have served on Salado ISD Board of Trustees

"Whenever there was a benefit auction - to build the pavilion at Pace Park that we continue to enjoy today, to renovate and maintain the old red schoolhouse on Main, to support the Salado Volunteer Fire Department, Youth Fair Boosters and Salado Education Foundation and more - you know he would raise his hand," Reed

"He usually won the bid," he added. "Particularly if it was for a homemade pie from Patsy Sanford or for one of those wagons crafted by the late Wilbur Foster. He has a collection of them at his home and at his office. Just as often, he would ask the auctioneer, usually Bill Hall, to sell it again."

Before there was a Salado Family Relief Fund, he and his wife Ruth would buy coats for the young students at Thomas Arnold Elementary every year.

"He leads not by dictate or order, but by example. Always smiling, he is the first one to work (usually at 6:30 a.m. in the morning) and the last to stop working," he said. "When not selling real estate, he can be found on his homeplace, shredding, fixing fence, working.

"Except on Sundays," Reed said. "Sunday is for church and Sunday school. Sunday is for family dinner and evening church and a nap in between. He is a devoted Baptist that you can find in the same pew, Sunday after Sunday after Sunday. Eighth row back. Even the day after his beautiful wife of 60 years Ruth passed, he was at that same pew on a Mother's Day Sunday in 2016. He says God has been faithful to him and he will be faithful to God."

"That pew has his mark," Reed said. "With his pocket knife, he made a mark on that pew, a small act of vandalism to mark his spot."

"The mark he has made on Salado will be long lasting," Reed said. "Thank you for being a friend to Salado"

GDP drops from 2.6% for 4th quarter 2022 to 1.1% for 1st quarter

It did it again. In another week filled with stories of possible bank failures, predictions of a soon to be arriving recession, and tales of corporate earnings that were sure to fall, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) our favorite, if flawed, primary market indicator, crept upward 0.87% to close at 4169.48. That wee gain left the Index up 8.59% so far this year, up 0.91% from a year ago, 46% higher than it was three years ago, but still down over 16% from its record high in January of 2022. Our other favorite index, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, rose 0.21% for the week to close at 2331.25 but is still down 0.20% this year, and about 10% from its high in early 2022.

The yield on the benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note slipped from last week's 3.57% to 3.44% while the short-term Treasury bills at 2, 3, 4 and 6 months remained comfortably above 5% (annualized). We remain clearly in a world turned upside down with interest rates on ultra short-term bills yielding far more than the traditionally much higher yielding twenty and thirty-year Treasury bonds. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) prices continued to slip, ending the U.S. business week at \$76.68 per barrel.

The Economy

The top economics story for the week was clearly the announcement by the Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA), one of our favorite government agencies, that their "advance" estimate of our Gross Domestic Product growth rate for the first quarter was 1.1%. That is quite a drop from the real GDP growth rate in the fourth quarter of 2022 of 2.6%. Note here that all those rates are annualized, so they mean how fast the U.S. economy would grow if it remained at that rate for a full year. As usual, the real news was deeper in the report. There were elements in the economy that shrunk, after subtracting inflation,

and others that were grow-

The primary negative

was in inventory spending, which should not be a surprise. During the pandemic anyone who visited a store noticed that there were empty shelves. In the last two or three quarters of last year, retailers and wholesalers were stocking up on inventory, which adds to the GDP. The other big negative was new single family home construction and non-residential fixed investment, again not a surprise as higher interest rates have made mortgages and bank loans more expensive. The plusses in the GDP report, keeping the numbers positive, were just as significant. The primary plus was an increase in consumer spending, on both goods and services. On the goods side, the big one was surprisingly, motor vehicles and parts. Apparently, the pent-up demand for cars and light trucks dating from when the new car lots were empty is still with us. One of the surprises too was that investment in commercial buildings was up substantially. Another somewhat unexpected positive was a significant increase in exports. What does that all mean? Well, we like to see commercial investment in structures (buildings) because it means that companies are anticipating higher demand a year or more from now. The rise in exports, considering the high world price of the dollar, was another pleasant surprise. Apparently, the world still believes "Made in the USA" is a big positive. If we back off and look at

the current dollar GDP, the growth rate was 5.1%. Why, then, was the reported GDP only 1.1%. Oddly, the net, seasonally adjusted GDP is for the quarter, but annual inflation is subtracted from the number so, it comes out lower than common sense would have it. Since the price index for gross domestic purchases (PCE) rose 4.9% from a year ago, the net number for the quarter came out to 1.1%. Here is where the geeky economists get excited. Real disposable personal income, after subtracting debt payments, living expenses, and inflation, increased 8% in the first quarter! That is big. At the same time the personal savings rate rose to 4.8% compared with 4% in the fourth quarter of last year.

The bottom line to the GDP first estimate from the BEA is that the American consumer, the primary drivers of our economy, has more surplus income this year than last, and both raised their spending and raised their saving rates. The overall economic growth rate slowed, but that is exactly what the Federal Reserve wanted to see happen. Higher interest rates encouraged more savings too. The icing on the cake was that companies are building more buildings which typically take six months to a year to begin producing profits. Yes, the economy may slow to "below trend" growth in the next couple of quarters, but once again we have to say that this doesn't look like an economy that is sliding into some kind of severe recession. Unemployment remains at or near record lows, prices are stabilizing, savings are up, and the consumer is not overburdened by debt. As before, the one big threat we see is the possibility that Congress will force the Treasury to suddenly stop paying its legally mandated debts sometime in the next few months. Other than that, what we are seeing is a very reasonable reduction in the growth rate that will allow the U.S. economy to cool off and stabilize.

Paying for my meds twice

Texas law needed to protect patients

I was only 10 years old the first time I went to the hospital with severe head pain, uncontrollable vomiting, and visual disturbances with complete blindness four hours to Dallas from my home in Abilene was my family's only option if I wanted to see a pediatric neurologist after being diagnosed with chronic migraine. It was a sacrifice of time, but necessary for my health. More than 35 years later, managing this illness, several co-morbid conditions, caring for my family, and working is a lot to juggle, physically, emotionally, and financially. I pay what I owe, but I was livid when I realized that fine print in my insurance contract was causing me to pay my de-

For me a migraine attack is so much more than excruciating head pain; it's also decreased motor skills, nausea, and sensitivity to lights, sounds, and odors. For two years, I wasn't allowed to drive due to balance issues. When I finally found a specialty treatment that worked, I was hopeful, but nervous because it was expensive. Enrolling in a charitable patient assistance program offered by my drug's manufacturer helped me afford the medication that finally helped me feel better.

ductible twice.

Unfortunately, the migraine medicine that provided relief suddenly became more expensive because of a policy woven into my insurance contract - a co-pay accumulator program. Copay accumulator programs prevent the money provided by third parties from counting toward a patient's deductible or out-of-pocket maximum. It shifts the payment burden away from insurers to patients' wallets.

At the pharmacy, I paid for my medicine using my assistance program. I expected those funds to be applied to my deductible, but they weren't. Instead, my monthly co-pay jumped from \$40 to around \$350, or as much as a car payment.

When my son was also diagnosed with migraine and needed expensive medications, I stopped taking my medicine for a while to put his health ahead of mine. Why? Because his prescription was slotted into an accumulator program, too. It was incredibly frustrating to be hit with this double payment dilemma twice. Neither of us should have to go without the medicine we need to function, but I couldn't make the math work to pay for both of us.

People with chronic disease are frequently at risk for being victims of accumulator programs because we often rely on specialty, brand-name medications for which there are no generic or biosimilar options. To that end, patient assistance programs were created to benefit patients, not insurance companies. When a patient uses their copay assistance program to pay for

their medication at the pharmacy, then it should be applied to their co-pays, co-insurance, or deductibles, as expected. It's not fair for insurance companies to accept these funds, use them up, and then still expect the patient to keep paying their deductible.

Sixteen states passed laws mandating that all payments made by patients count toward the patient's out-of-pocket maximum or deductible. Texas should too!

Insurers oppose these bills, speculating that state insurance premiums will rise at a higher rate for everyone. However, new research from my organization, the Global Healthy Living Foundation, demonstrates that claim isn't true. Legislation banning accumulator programs has not resulted in increases to state health insurance premiums beyond what has been seen in states without this legisla-

In Texas and the United States, everyone should be able to access the medications that potentially will improve their health and their ability to positively contribute to their family and community. I hope all Texas will support HB 999 and call your local representative to say that people should come before profits.




Below are initiatives that I will work for if I have earned your vote:

"WHEREAS, over the years, Mary Hodge demonstrated her love for the history of Salado through her actions. For example, Mary was an active member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. 



FLOYD AND VALERIE BEARD

Valerie is a rancher's wife, teacher, writer, crew cook, quilter and reader. She and her husband, cowboy poet Floyd Beard, live in Southeast Colorado and run Corriente cattle with their daughter and son-in-law. They keep a few Border Collies around to stay humble. Valerie was a top five finalist for IWMA Female Poet of the Year in 2019.

Floyd began writing poetry while out working his cattle in the 1980's. He would write down lines and verses about what he experienced while out in the saddle and dealing with his livestock and horses. He would then mold these thoughts into stories and songs when he got back to the house that evening. His poetry reflects on his own experiences and his observations of the western way of life.

Floyd's stories are inter-woven with his western code of high ethics and integrity and sprinkled richly with humor. Floyd also recites some cowboy poetry classics, from some of the best cowboy poets from the past, keeping the western spirit and history



STRAW BERRY

Born in the San Joaquin Valley of California, "Straw" Berry grew up in west central Oklahoma. He was part of the third generation of the Berry family to live and work on the Botchlett Ranch west of Cordell in Washita County. Straw graduated from Southwestern Oklahoma State University with a degree in history. After short stints as a musician and police officer, he later settled on a career in the livestock feed, grain and fertilizer industry, while he and his father partnered in a small cow/calf operation. Straw still keeps a couple of horses around just to smell the "sweat and leather." He serves on the board of directors of the Washita County Historical Society and is a member of the Cordell Round Up Club. He and wife, Penny reside in Cordell and stay busy following their eight grandchildren. Straw began to write and recite cowboy poetry in about 2000. He has performed at the National Cowboy Poetry Gathering in Elko, Nevada, Texas Cowboy Poetry Gathering in Alpine, Texas and The Red Steagall Cowboy Gathering and Western Swing Festival in Ft. Worth, Texas. Local civic groups and Cowboy Churches also invite Straw to speak and perform. His two CDs are Red Hill Reflections and Strawberry Preserved.



Senate holds budget hearing, passes bill to limit purchase of land by hostile governments

With just over a month left in the 88th Regular Session, the Conference Committee on HB1, the budget, held its first public meeting as legislators begin the work of aligning the House and Senate spending plans. Led by Senate Finance Committee Chair and Houston Senator Joan Huffman and House Appropriations Chair Representative Greg Bonnen of Friendswood, the two promised a friendly process that will result in a budget that works for the state. "We have many, many shared priorities, big important issues that we need to resolve for the state of Texas," said Huffman. "We have a great group here that I'm certain will be able to work through these issues and come up with a fabulous budget that's great for Texas." While the two proposals are very close in terms of actual numbers, the major obstacle to an agreement will be how to deliver \$15 billion worth of property tax cuts.

The House plan would accomplish this by lowering appraisal caps, limiting the amount that real property can increase in value year-to-year to five percent, down from a current cap

of ten percent. The Senate would get there by raising the homestead exemption, the amount of value a homeowner can deduct from the assessed value, from \$40,000 to \$70,000. It also raises the additional exemption for Texas homeowners aged 65 and older to \$30,000, for a cumulative exemption of \$100,000 annually for seniors. Both chambers strongly backed their budgets as they passed, indicating staunch support for their respective plans. Lt. Governor Dan Patrick, however, has said that appraisal caps won't fly in the Senate. Because the Legislature capped local revenue growth at 3.5 percent in 2019, he said it doesn't matter how much appraisal values go up, because local leaders will have to lower the tax rate in order to stay under that revenue growth cap - or go to the voters to approve a rate higher than 3.5 percent. The House plan, said Patrick, is operating from a faulty premise. "It's just the math, and the math doesn't work on appraisal caps," he said. "We will not pass those." House and Senate negotiators have until Memorial Day to present a compromise plan that can satisfy both the leadership and membership of each chamber.

Also this week, the Senate approved a bill that would prohibit the representatives of hostile foreign governments from buying large tracts of agricultural, mining, timber, or oil and gas land. Author and Brenham Senator Lois Kolkhorst said that her constituents have come to her with concerns that foreign interests with unknown intentions are buying up land in Texas. "Private property rights are extremely important to maintaining liberty," she said. "Unfortunately, some of the authoritarian regimes that pose a threat to the United States do not respect private property rights and are willing to use these rights to undermine our constitutional republic." Her bill would prohibit representatives of any hostile foreign nation from buying these parcels. Nations would be considered hostile if they appear for three years in a row on the U.S. intelligence services Annual Threat Assessment; right now, that would apply to Iran, China, North Korea, and Russia. It does not prohibit any legally present resident from buying land or from buying a home or a business. "It keeps alive the American

dream of home ownership

to all, the ability to own a

business, the ability to own

a homestead and 20 acres, the ability of anyone that's legally here in the United States to own that land and live that dream," said Kolk-

Thursday, the Senate passed a bill aimed at illegal street racing. Occurring with increasing frequency in some of the state's larger cities, this involves large groups of young racers with souped up automobiles "taking over" intersections at night and driving recklessly fast and without regard for personal safety. Houston Senator Paul Bettencourt says his hometown prosecuted more than 1,000 people for street racing in 2022. His bill, SB 1970, would allow law enforcement to seize any vehicle used in reckless street racing or other exhibition on the state's highways.
