Library Dist. celebrates 25th

Friends and supporters gathered at the Salado Public Library May 20 to celebrate 25 years since the establishment of the Salado Public Library District by an election of voters and 20 years since the Library moved into its new home on the north end of Main St.

But the origins of the library go back almost four decades to a 1985 meeting between the late Dr. Robert McConnell and the late Ross Greenwood, who was the president of the Salado Chamber of Commerce at that time. Nancy Mills Mackey reviewed the history of the Salado Library since before it was incorporated in 1986 as a 501(c)3 non-profit. Those early day committee members were Dr. McConnell, Thelma Fletcher, Ruth Howe, Richard Goodman and Jane Wilmer.

The first home of the Library was at the end of what is now called Old Town Salado shopping center. It was then called the Double Eagle Shopping Center. A ribbon cutting was held with Salado Chamber President Grace Jones and Library President McConnell. Ruth Howe was the first volunteer librarian.

The Library was accredited by the Texas Library System in 1988 and was funded by donations and run by volunteers.

In 1993, the Library moved into the downstairs of the Old Red Schoolhouse, which had recently been saved from condemnation by a volunteer effort led by the Chamber, Library and Salado Historical Society, as well as alumni of the 1924 school.

Patty Campbell became an assistant librarian in 1994 and was the first employee of the library.

A long range plan was developed for the library and in May 1998, voters approved the formation of the Salado Public Library District along with a half-cent sales tax. The first board of directors included Luther Brewer, BJ McConnell, Susan Shobe, Lynn Epps and Carolyn Britt.

Even after expanding at the Salado Civic Cen-

ter, the library outgrew its space there and in 2002, the Library District bought the building where it is now located, moving into it in 2003.

Mackey then listed the founders of the Salado Library: Drs. Bob and BJ Mc-Connell, Adele Johnson, Pete Jennings, Dr. Luther and Marilyn Brewer, Teddy Dennis, Woodie Grisham, Carolyn Britt, Richard Goodman, Patsy Sanford, Holly Greenwood, Richard Rawson, SISD and its leadership, Mary Jane Taylor, Doodle Bridges, Lauralyn Carlisle, Adelle Johnson, Patricia Adams, Laurice McClellan, Georgann Bakke, Jackie Mills, Mary Belle Brown, Juanita Hardin, Jim and Ginny Mc-Cracken, Anne Thompson, Jeanne Berrier, Suzanne Berry, Joan Blum, Jack Buchanan, Lou Butler, Wynell Patterson, Jack Knox, Karin Borman, Judy Greene, Roy Hector, Patty Campbell, Lynn Epps, Tiffany McKeever, Perry Grisham, Connie Gillian, La Nora Miller, Mary Lou Williams, Jean Teal, William Wende, Blanch Kevlin, Richard Westlake, Susan Shobe, Pat Milford, Carolyn Britt, Alayne Fuller-Ramsden, Emmy Alvarez

The current board of directors of the Library District are president Nancy Mills Mackey, vice president Emmy Alvarez, treasurer Joycelyn Miller, secretary Barbara Morris and member at-large Susan Starnes.

Library director Jeannie Lively told the audience that "The most important asset of any library goes home at night – the library staff."

She then highlighted the staff of the Library through its years, to include the front desk workers, the first face you see when you come in the door: Karen Kinnison. Elaine Eddings, Andrew Hernandez and Nancy Shepperd and now Manuela

She then recalled those who have served as librarians: the first ones were Sylvia Schmidt and Alayne Fuller-Ramsden. Emmy Alvarez was the first children's librarian. Other librarians were Kay Coleman, Elaine Eddings, Rachel Gerik, Amy German, Kim Manger, Geri Neemidge, Kristyn Pittman, and Jennifer Zavaglia.

Patty Campbell was hired as the first paid Library Director in 1995. She served for nine years. She was followed by our second director, Marsha McGuire. "These women were responsible for directing the library. They guided it down a path of growth and development. directing the library," Lively said.

"And we continue to grow through the work of our current staff," Lively said. At the front desk we have Manuela Smith, Jane Hackley, and Sarah Engleking. Our librarians are Julie Hoy, Adult Librarian, April Gatliff, Teen Librarian and Mia Wilson, Children's Librarian.

"Our mission," she added, "is to welcome, empower and enlighten everyone who walks through these doors."

Mortgage costs causing home prices to drop

The S&P 500 Stock Index once more moved in a manner the week's headlines suggested it should not as it rose 1.65% to finish the week at 4191.98, its highest weekly close this year. It is now up 9.18% since the year began, over 17% since its low last October, 7.45% since this time last year, and nearly 40% since this time three years ago. At the same time, it remains 12.54% lower than its record high point in January 2022. Observers gave the credit for the gain to hope that the debt ceiling will be raised. The other stock index we follow, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, rose 0.16% to 2266.71, leaving it down 3.1% this year, and 12.72% from its high last year.

The yield on the benchmark 10-year US Treasury note climbed to 3.70% from last week's 3.39%, leaving the yield up more than 9% this year but with the yield curve still strikingly inverted. Once more the one-month T-bill held the top rate, yielding an annualized 5.62%. All the Treasury issues out to one year also remained above 5% with the 30-year T-bond at 3.95%. While not so dramatic, the longer-term Treasury maturities yields have gradually been moving upward, suggesting that the bond market collectively is of the opinion that interest rates are going to be higher over the long-term. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) rose about 2.3% to finish the week at \$71.70 remaining in the trading range it has occupied for most of



The U.S. Economy continued its counterintuitive trek, ignoring the pundits and soothsayers whose reading of economic tea leaves has had them warning of both a major recession that should have arrived by now and with it a Federal Reserve "pivot" with sharply

U.S. industrial production rose a surprising 0.5% in April despite a decrease in inventories. Normally, as businesses see excess inventory, we also see a decline in industrial production and manufacturing, but April's reports indicated that domestic manufacturing grew a full 1% after slipping 0.8% in March. The economy's maximum sustainable speed is measured in something economists call capacity utilization (Cap-U), which typically stalls at about 80% as weak links and bottlenecks have historically kept Cap-U below that number. In April Cap-U rose from 79.4 to 79.7, suggesting that goods manufacturing is running about as hot as it can get. For reference, last fall when the economy was clearly over speeding, Cap-U was at 80.6.

U.S. single family residences prices tell the most year-over-year in 11 years as April's prices came in 3.4% lower than at this time last year. It is becoming clear that higher mortgage interest rates are having an effect. The backside to that statistic though, like so much we are seeing in the economy now, went the other way as the NAHB Housing Market Index, a measure

rose to 50 on a scale where that is the dividing line between growth and contraction. Single family building permits in April rose 3.1% as housing starts rose 1.6%, despite another increase in mortgage rates. Increased and increasing interest and mortgage rates are having an effect, but it is minor when compared with what was expected.

The wild card regarding which way the economy and stock market will go this year remains the debt limit. There continues to be universal agreement among business leaders and economists that a failure to raise the debt ceiling, resulting in the United States of America defaulting on its debts for the first time in its history, would very likely result in a severe recession and potentially a bear market in stocks. The Treasury announced that on June 1, outflows will be \$75 billion greater than inflows, with another \$22 billion hit coming on June 2, equating to more than the \$92 billion the Treasury reported it had available as of May 17. If the Treasury doesn't run out of funds before June 5, it likely could make it until July, according to the Bipartisan Policy Center.

The bottom line remains much as it has been. Despite an inverted yield curve and negative leading economic indicators, the underlying U.S. economy appears to be on solid ground and growing at a sustainable rate. Were it not for the threat of a federal default on what it owes others, the route ahead looks far more like recovery and growth than like a pending recession.

protect the children, tax the rich

A campaign to curb greed was key to the first fight against child labor. With GOP states putting young kids to work, we need that battle again.

Ever since the middle of the 20th century, our history textbooks have applauded the reform movement that put an end to the child-labor horrors that ran widespread throughout the early Industrial Age.

Now those horrors are reappearing.

The number of kids employed in direct violation of existing child labor laws, the Economic Policy Institute reported this year, has soared 283 percent since 2015 — and 37 percent in just the last year alone.

More recently there was the alarming news that three Kentucky-based McDonald's franchising companies had kids as young as 10 working at 62 stores across Kentucky, Indiana, Maryland, and Ohio. Some children were working as late as 2 a.m.

Federal legislation to crack down on child labor has stalled out amid Republican opposition. And at the state level, lawmakers across the country are moving to weaken — or even eliminate child labor limits.

One bill in Iowa introduced earlier this year would let kids as young as 14 labor in workplaces ranging from meat coolers to industrial

laundries. And Arkansas just eliminated the requirement to "verify the age of children younger than 16 before they can take a job," the Washington Post report-

Over a century ago, in the initial push against child labor, no American did more to protect kids than the educator and philosopher Felix Adler. In 1887, Adler sounded the alarm on child labor before a packed house at Manhattan's famed Chickering Hall.

The "evil of child labor," Adler warned, "is growing to an alarming extent." In New York City alone, some 9,000 children as young as eight were working in factories. Many of those kids, Alder said, "could not read or write" and didn't even know "the state they lived in."

By the end of 1904, as the founding chair of the National Child Labor Committee, Adler had broadened the battle against exploiting kids. He railed against the "new kind of slavery" that had some 60,000 children under 14 working in Southern textile mills up to 14 hours a day, up from "only 24,000" just five years earli-

Adler put full responsibility for this exploitation on those he called America's "money kings," who he said were after "cheap labor." Alongside his campaigns to limit child labor, Adler pushed lawmakers to end the incentives that drive employers to exploit kids.

Aiming to prevent the ultra rich from grabbing all the wealth they could, Adler called for a tax rate of 100 percent on all income above the point "when a certain high and abundant sum has been reached, amply sufficient for all the comforts and true refinements of life."

After the United States entered World War I, the national campaign for a 100-percent top income tax rate on America's highest incomes had a remarkable impact. In 1918, Congress raised the nation's top marginal income tax rate up to 77 percent, 10 times the top rate in place just five years

During World War II, President Franklin Roosevelt renewed Adler's call for a 100-percent top tax rate on the nation's super rich. By the war's end, lawmakers had okayed a top rate at 94 percent — nearly that high. By the Eisenhower years, that top rate had leveled off at 91 percent.

Felix Adler died in 1933, before he could see the full scope of his victory. But by the mid-20th century those inspired by him had won on both his key advocacy fronts. By the 1950s, America's rich could no longer keep all they could grab, and masses of mere kids no longer had to labor so those rich could profit.

The triumphs Adler helped animate have now come undone. We need to recreate them.



and the ace of diamonds was cashed, on which West showed out.

At this point, declarer was in serious trouble. He tried dummy's queen of clubs, but West wisely refused to win, and that was that. South wound up with only seven tricks — three spades, a diamond, a club and two hearts — and finished down two.

Sadly, the fact is that not even an earthquake can stop South from scoring nine tricks if he plays correctly. While he was unlucky to lose the diamond finesse and run into a 4-1 division in the suit, South should have allowed for the worst and not subjected himself to the possibility of ill fortune.

Declarer lost his contract at trick one. Although the spade lead presented him with a "free" finesse, he should have put up dummy's king rather than play the ten. This would assure nine tricks. South would then play the queen of clubs and, if necessary, next overtake the ten with the jack and persist with the suit until the ace was driven out. With the ace of spades still in his hand as an entry, declarer would finish with at least four clubs, two hearts, two spades and a diamond for nine tricks.

All South needed to do was to give up the chance of gaining an extra spade trick in favor of assuring nine tricks by playing dummy's king at the outset.
