## Village annexes Mustang Springs

Village of Salado aldermen on June 1 ratified the annexation of Texas Department of Transportation right-of-way on FM 2843 west to Mustang Creek Rd. and south along I-35 to the southern Bell County limits and ratified the voluntary annexation of 1,105 acres of the development known as Mustang Springs at Salado.

The board conducted a public hearing on the annexations prior to ratifying them 3-1 on a motion by Paul Cox receiving a second by Rodney Bell. Alderman Bert Henry joined Cox and Bell in favor while Jason Howard voted against. Jasen Graham was absent.

During public comment, Darlene Walsh asked if annexing the rights-of-way would allow the Village to extend water lines or sewer lines in the TXDoT right of way and at whose cost. Village administrator Don Ferguson responded that "TXDOT is not an open advocate of putting these utilities in their right-of-way."

The board also gave its consent for the creation of a Municipal Utility District within its Extra Territorial Jurisdiction (ETJ).

Ferguson reported to the board that due to the new law governing annexation, that the property is not in the ETJ. The 220.70 acre development is likely to be industrial or warehouse distribution center. :The developer has not finalized their plans," Ferguson said, adding that they will construct a wastewater treatment plant. The developer is applying to Texas Commission for Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for creation of the MUD. On a motion by Cox and second by Henry, aldermen approved consent unanimously.

In other business, aldermen approved the following:

• Inter-local agreement with Bell County Animal Control. The county will pick up and impound any vicious animal in which the public is at risk, or any animal involved in an animal-to-human bite circumstance only if the owner of the animal is unknown or unavailable at the time of the incident. The Village will be responsible for the quarantine fees (\$30 per day with initial intake fee of \$60. The Village staff or citizens of the Village may deliver and the county will

receive animals to the shelter for impound.

• The appointment of Lennox Alfred to the Planning & Zoning Commission.

Ferguson reported to aldermen that TXDOT has opened bids on the replacement of all the street light fixtures on Main Street. Bids ranged from \$240,000 to \$335,000, according to Ferguson. TXDOT will work with the low bidder "and then the replacement process will begin," Ferguson said. He said that TXDOT expects the lights to be repaired and turned on by the end of September

Ferguson also reported that the Village continues to work with other governing entities in Bell and Coryell County on a Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP) for the several endangered and threatened species within the county.

"This is a critical document," Ferguson said. "It is a smart move for the county to move forward with this. The Bell Coryell HCP may be completed in late 2026 at a cost of \$1.46 million. Of that, the Village is responsible for \$8,300.

"We don't know what the ongoing cost of administering and managing the plan," Ferguson said.

Ferguson reported that the Solana MUD was approved by the state House and Senate

He also reported that construction is continuing on the Quick Trip station. Project completion is expected in early 2024.

He reported that 14 new home permits for Sanctuary East have been issued to residential builder Castle Rock, which has purchased 30-40 lots of the 340 residential lots in Sanctuary East. "Every one of those permits is graded against the development agreement to meet one of the approved design styles," Ferguson said.

He reported that REEAF has completed about 85% of the wastewater line to connect to the village sewer system. "This will serve the Boynton subdivision as well," Ferguson said.

He added that townhome construction "is getting real" in the Water's Edge portion of Sanctuary.

He also reported that work is proceeding on a unified code for the Village and may be complete in 24 months.

# Markets surge with Sword of Damocles finally removed

he Markets

It was a good week to be

invested in the stock market with the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) rising 1.83% as the debt ceiling sword of Damocles that had been hanging over the markets and the economy was removed. The SPX closed at 4282.37 leaving it 11.53% higher this year and 19.55% from last October's bottom. While there is no official measure for such things, the consensus among traders is reputed to be that a rise of 20% from a bottom point marks the end of a bear market and the beginning of the next bull market. If we accept that wisdom, we are only 0.45% away from a general acceptance of the bull market we have been writing about for months now. The Index is now 4.23% higher than it was at this time last year and almost 32% higher than it was three years ago but still over 10% lower than it was in January 2022. Not to be outdone by its older big brother, the CRSP US Mid-Cap Value index rose over 2% for the week closing at 2275.52..


The yield on the benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note declined just a bit to 3.69% but the Treasury yield curve remained severely inverted with the 90-day T-bill sporting a 5.5% annualized yield. West Texas Intermediate crude oil remained in a narrow trading range as the price per barrel fell just a percentage point to \$71.95.

The Economy

The passage by Congress of an increase in the U.S. debt ceiling and the resulting avoidance of a U.S. government default on its debt was the big news during the week, but in the best traditions of bull markets, the pundits were quick to fall back on their warnings that the economy was growing too fast and that growth would cause the Federal Reserve to raise short term interest rates too far and bring about a

From the perspective of domestic economic growth that was great news as more employees earning wages means more goods and services will be bought with those extra earnings, but in this time where good news is commonly considered bad news, the pundits were wringing their hands at the prospect of the Fed continuing to raise rates and causing a recession. Add to that the other big report for the week which announced that employers had a seasonally adjusted 10.1 million unfilled job openings and the clear picture is that of a resilient economy that is brushing off the higher interest rates imposed by the

On the other side of the

world, China's factory output contracted for the second straight month, and its purchasing managers index remained below 50, indicating that its manufacturing industry is contracting. They also appear to be experiencing a slowing in growth in the non-manufacturing side of the economy. That contrasts with the forecast high level of growth that was generally expected following the halt of draconian quarantine enforcement. The issue appears to be that both American and European companies are reducing their purchases of Chinese goods. The Chinese economy is also facing a 20% unemployment rate among those between 16 and 24 years of age. It appears that in China job creation and business investment is not recovering as well as was assumed.

Ben Bernanke and Olivier Blanchard, two giants in the field of macroeconomics published a paper assessing what factors generated the sudden rise in recession here and in most of the rest of the world. They concluded that almost the entire inflation dynamic was attributable to energy and commodity shocks and supply chain snarl-ups. They further concluded that the stimulus checks issued in the United States were at most a tiny factor in inflation's return. They pointed out that in Europe, where no stimulus checks were issued, inflation rose more and is persisting longer than in the U.S.

Once more, with the threat of default behind us, we find ourselves in an amazingly healthy and robust economy that looks more like one poised on the cusp of further growth than one on the edge of slipping into recession.

## The NAACP's stupid anti-Florida smear

The NAACP is on high alert -- a Republican governor, with an unabashedly conservative agenda and some chance of winning, is running for president.

It has duly sprung into action with a travel advisory warning people what they're getting into if they take the risk of visiting Florida's sunny beaches or world-class at-

"Florida is openly hostile toward African Americans, people of color and LGBTQ+ individuals," the statement says. "Before traveling to Florida, please understand that the state of Florida devalues and marginalizes the contributions of, and the challenges faced by African Americans and other communities of color."

This is a shameful lie even by the standards of the NAACP.

The political play is obvious -- use "travel advisory" to get attention and credibility that a mere harsh statement about Gov. Ron DeSantis wouldn't garner, and hope the resulting media coverage helps drive negative associations with the state.

We are used to taking travel advisories seriously, since the State Department often issues them and for non-frivolous reasons. When it says we shouldn't travel to Burma "due to civil unrest and armed conflict" and urges "increased caution due to wrongful detentions and areas with land mines and unexploded ordnance," most of us pay attention.

The NAACP wants people to think of Florida as a hellhole where the peril isn't physical but ideological --DeSantis is pursuing an agenda that, ipso facto, is hostile to certain minority



groups

The group makes it clear that it is thinking of the governor's fight against diversity, equity, and inclusion programs, critical race theory, and gender ideology in the schools, as well as his rejection of an Advanced Placement African American studies course.

This is a classic instance of progressive goalpost shifting. DEI is a relatively recent fad, but now if someone wants to keep it out of education, it's the equivalent of George Wallace standing at the schoolhouse door. It's the same thing with gender ideology -- no one thought that LGBTQ rights depended on teaching young children about gender fluidity until the day before yesterday.

As for the fight over the African American studies course, it's false to suggest the state's stance against overly politicized material in the course makes it opposed to the teaching of African American history as such.

In fact, the state's curriculum requires the teaching of key aspects of African American history, and these provisions have been made more robust under DeSantis.

Again, none of this has anything to do with travel -- if someone wants to read Ibram X. Kendi while standing in line at Universal Studios or brush up on their DEI training on an airboat in the Everglades, there's nothing stopping them.

Even if you come down in a different place than DeSantis on these various controversies, to suggest that his positions constitute some kind of malice toward African Americans or other groups is a stupid libel.

Florida is a vibrant, diverse state, where people from all backgrounds stand to benefit from good government. The state has an unemployment rate under 3%, and the earnings of African Americans have been increasing smartly. The schools are excellent and minority test scores are strong. Crime is at a half-century low.

Of course, if Florida were really a hotbed of antagonism toward minorities, Americans would have noticed and wouldn't be moving there en masse. The state has gained some 700,000 people since the 2020 census. The U-Hauls are coming because Florida has a well-earned reputation as an open place full of opportunity.

If the NAACP were truly concerned about the welfare of African Americans instead of trying to score points against a Republican potentially on the rise in national politics, it would issue travel advisories about going to Chicago or Baltimore, poorly governed cities where it is affirmatively dangerous for young Black men to live.

Such places could learn from Florida. If the NAACP were thinking clearly and didn't have an agenda, it wouldn't be denouncing the state but considering moving its headquarters there.





Looking only at the North-South hands, you can see that six spades is unbeatable regardless of how the opposing cards are divided, provided that — and this is a big proviso declarer knows which opponent has the queen of diamonds. In that case, declarer can collect six spade tricks, two clubs and four diamonds (by means of a finesse or a drop) to make

But in real life, the location of the crucial queen is not known to declarer. If he stakes everything on the diamond finesse and misguesses which opponent has the queen, he goes down, since at least one heart trick must be lost.

An alternative line of play is for declarer to avoid the diamond guess altogether by discarding his third diamond on the king of clubs. But as he gets rid of one headache, he acquires another, since he might then lose two heart tricks.

There is, however, a reasonable chance of avoiding two heart losers if the latter approach is adopted. If East has the A-Q, only one heart can be lost. If the heart honors are split, declarer will have to guess whether to play the jack or king when he leads a heart toward his hand. This is essentially a 50-50 proposition. Of course, if West has both honors, declarer has no chance on this line of play.

There is no sure way to guarantee 12 tricks, but the best chance, percentagewise, is to draw trump and cash the K-A of diamonds, hoping to drop the queen, roughly a 1-in-5 proposition. This works in the actual deal, and the slam is home.

If the queen does not appear when the K-A are played, declarer can discard his remaining diamond on the king of clubs and then tackle the hearts. In this way, South gives himself two chances to make the slam instead of just one.







Strickland was the starting pitcher for Salado, making 13 starts and 14 appearances on the mound in his senior year. He posted a 6-4 record and had one save. Strickland pitched 68 innings and gave up 48 hits and 30 runs, 17 of them earned. He walked 27 and hit 3 batters. He struck out 11 batters. #### Texas drought, winter took toll on residential lawns, turfgrass

Drought and harsh winter weather has taken a toll on lawns throughout Texas leaving many homeowners wondering what can be done to restore turfgrass this summer.

"Last year we experienced severe drought conditions across the state and then winter featured some harsh freezes, particularly in North Texas and down through Central and South Central Texas," said Young-Ki Jo, Ph.D., Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service plant pathologist in the Department of Plant Pathology and Microbiology, Bryan-College Station.

"Water restrictions during the drought also prevented lawns from getting sufficient moisture to sustain growth. Homeowners can take advantage during the spring by re-sodding or plugging turfgrass. This is the perfect time before it gets too hot."

#### ABOVE-NORMAL TURF LOSSES TO DISEASE

Following last summer's drought, Jo said precipi-

tation returned to create a different type of stress turfgrass diseases.

"This late-season precipitation promoted large patch disease caused by Rhizoctonia solani, a common fall disease that infects and decimates turf until plants go completely to winter dormancy," he said. "During the past summer and fall, turf damage was more than usual."

Jo said this dead turfgrass is likely visible this spring, and turfgrass sometimes never recovers even with sufficient fertilizer and

"Fertilizer and water may promote dormant grass to grow but will not make dead plants revive," he said.

#### TAKE-ALL ROOT ROT DISEASE

Take-all root rot, a fungal disease by Gaeumannomyces species, has also been appearing in Texas lawns among St. Augustine grass, Bermuda grass and zoysia grass varieties. Jo said the fungus survives in soil, roots and stolons for extended periods and infects turfgrass during warm weather and wet soil conditions.

"The fungus can be

When turfgrass is already infected with the fungus, drought stress can cause infected plants to rapidly decline, leading to death."

Fortunately, there are many fungicides available to control take-all root rot disease for homeowners. Many of these products labeled for the disease are available at lawn and garden retailers. The best time for application is the

Jo said homeowners need to realize that dead areas of the lawn will not return to normal unless the dead plant material is removed and plugged with new turfgrass and a soil

"Also, make sure these newly established areas are well watered," he said.


