In General Douglas McArthur's "Duty, Honor, Country" speech, he told cadets, "the Long Gray Line has never failed" the country and that if it were to fail, it would disappoint "a million ghosts in olive drab." From the Modern War Institute at West Point website.

The Long Gray Line refers to the close connection -- a continuum that traces its beginning to 1802 when the United States Military Academy (USMA) was established under the presidency of Thomas Jefferson -- between the graduates of the United States Military Academy, the current cadets and the cadets of the future.

For one Salado family, this mystic connection to a phrase whose origins may be lost in the historical record of documents and dates has taken on a new and deeper meaning.

Noah Self, a 2023 graduate of Salado High School, will report for Beast training at West Point on June 26 before beginning his Plebe year at West Point.

Once there, his name will be added to The Long Gray Line, joining that of his father Nate Self (Class of 1998) and his older brother Caleb Self (Class of 2024).

From the song "The Corps," written in 1902 about the Academy are these

"The long gray line of us stretches, thro' the years of a century told

"And the last man feels to his marrow, the grip of your far off hold.

"Grip hands with us now though we see not, grip hands with us strengthen our

"As the long line stiffens and straightens with the thrill that your presence im-

"Grip hands tho' it be from the shadows. While we swear, as you did of yore.

"Or living, or dying, to honor, the Corps, and the Corps, and the Corps."

When Noah is a Plebe, his brother Caleb will be a Firstie. "That's what I look forward to the most," Noah says, "getting to spend a year with my brother at West Point."

- Children of Medal of Honor Awardees.

Each year, a little over 1,000 are admitted to USMA. Fewer than 1,000 graduate four years later.

The Long Gray Line may be limited in numbers, but it is rich in tradition, connection and service to the na-

Both Noah and Caleb were nominated by Congressman John Carter. Nate was nominated by Congressman Chet Edwards.

Both Noah and Caleb

knew that they would join the Army. They both got their sense of service to the nation from their father, who served seven years in the Army after graduating West Point. Nate was an Army Ranger Captain who led a rescue effort to save Navy SEAL Neil C. Roberts, who had been captured by Al Qaeda in Afghanistan in the Battle of Takur Ghar. He was awarded the Silver Star, Bronze Star and Purple Heart during his service.

Like his sons, Nate grew up in a small town, China Spring, just northwest of Salado. He married his high school sweetheart Julie and they have four children: Caleb, Noah, Elliot and Griffin. All four have grown up in Salado, as Nate and Julie moved here in 2009.

Nate got to China Spring in second grade. His wife Julie got to China Spring in fourth grade. They got married the summer after Nate graduated from West Point.

Like his father, Caleb will get married shortly after graduating from West Point next summer. Only not to a high school sweetheart. Caleb is engaged to a Second Lieutenant Nataleigh Cantu from Augusta, Kansas, a recent West Point graduate. The couple plan a June 21 wedding after graduation. Their first assignment will be Fort Riley, Kansas.

While Caleb will be in the Infantry as was his father, Noah will begin his service in Military Intelli-

Caleb is currently majoring in Organizational Psychology. Noah will major in International Affairs at West

Noah says that he wants to become an Army Chaplain, which brings the term service to a completely deeper level.

He says that he will pursue a seminary degree from Baylor University after graduating from West Point.

Becoming an Army chaplain will give him a way "to connect with people, to minister to them and share my faith. I don't know of anything that connects you with people more than the Army does," Noah said.

Noah says his "faith is what gives me my identity."

Noah had multiple ways to become an Army officer. He was accepted into the Reserve Officers' Training Corps at both Oklahoma University and Baylor University before ultimately accepting the nomination to the USMA at West Point.

While there, he will compete in basketball and golf, two sports he excelled in while at Salado High.

His older brother played Sprint Football, which was once called 150 lb. Football, something his father did in his years at West Point. As a Firstie, he will coach Sprint Football.

Physical training is a fundamental part of the West Point training. A cadet's days are marked by waking up early and going to bed late, with PT, formations, a vigorous academic schedule and discipline filling the

time between. "If you do what you're supposed to do, you won't have any problems," Caleb says as a word of advice to his younger brother.

And his younger brother listens. Noah has also listened to the unspoken lessons of hard work, ethic and discipline laid out for him by his father.

Much of that, for all three men, comes from growing up in small towns like Salado and China Spring.

"Everyone knows your business," each of them have told me. But it is something more than that, something deeper.

From talking with these men, one gets the sense that even if no one knew their business, each of them would still hold themselves to a high standard of behav-

Talking with these three men, three soldiers, three servants, one gets the sense that the words of General MacArthur of "Duty, Honor, Country," carries a deep, fundamental and personal meaning.

Which it should, as they have joined The Long Gray Line, whose origin may be lost in history but whose meaning is not lost on the men and women who have gone this way before them.

West Point's history is intimately and intricately linked to the founding and the foundation of this nation.

As commander of the Washington considered West Point to be the most important strategic position

in America. The first fortifications were built in 1778 and Washington headquartered at the fortress along the banks of the Hudson River. It became the center point of the most famous tale of treason in America. Had Benedict Arnold's treason been successful, the rebellion of the American colonies against the British Crown may have had a completely different

Instead, Fortress West Point was never captured by the British. It is the oldest continuously occupied military post in America.

In 1802, President Thomas Jefferson signed legislation creating the United States Military Academy. Since then, graduates of West Point have led troops into battle.

One tradition that Caleb, Noah and Nate all look forward to is the Pinning Ceremony, when Caleb as a Second Lieutenant has his Butter Bars pinned on him by the person of his choos-

Moody's: Stable retail prices are not likely to return

The Markets

Our preferred market surrogate, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), seesawed up and down for the week that ended on June 9, and looked like it was going for the lofty 4,400 mark on Friday morning, but settled for a close at 4298.86 as the week ground to a close: a rise of a mere 0.39%. That small positive move, not unlike many others in weeks dominated by negative news, could easily obscure the fact that since last October 12, the SPX has now accumulated a gain of over 20%, and thus unofficially has returned to bull market territory. So far in 2023, the Index is up almost 12%, is 10.2% higher than it was a year ago, and is up an astounding 34% from where it was only three years ago. Still, it remains 10% lower than it was in the early days of 2022. As we have so often written, whether the market is up or down depends entirely on your time horizon. The CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, the other index we like to watch, rose 1.67% for the week as it closed at 2313.41, leaving it also about 10% lower than its record high and down just over 1% so far this year.


The benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note yield changed very little as it ended the week at 3.75%, about where it ended 2022. The Treasury yield curve remained in its now familiar upside-down configuration with the one-year and shorter maturities all offering annualized yields well above 5% and the 2-year note yielding 4.59%. Despite Saudi Arabia announcing reductions in oil output, the price of West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) slipped down to \$70.37 per barrel as the European Union officially entered an economic recession. For reference, just under a year ago WTI was priced at over \$100.

Germany and Ireland's first quarter GDPs were revised downward, and those revisions took the Eurozone GDP to a negative 0.4% for the first quarter of 2023 after falling 0.1% in the fourth quarter of 2022, creating, at least technically, a Eurozone recession. A significant contract has emerged between the Eurozone and U.S. economies. While the U.S. economy is now 5.4% larger than it was before the Covid-19 pandemic struck, the Eurozone economy has grown only 2.2%. At the same time, year over year inflation there has been 6.1% as of the end of May while in the U.S. it is at 4.7%. Whatever the complaints about what we did here in the U.S. it appears to have worked better than what was done there.

On Thursday, June 8,

with a report suggesting that the remarkably stable retail prices we experienced in the decade prior to the pandemic are unlikely to return. Underlying those often-falling prices that combined with a few rising items to produce a net zero increase in the cost of living was a dramatic offshoring of manufacturing as cheap labor in China produced a price decline in many manufactured goods. That, combined with the petroleum fracking revolution, produced one of the most stable retail price environments the United States has experienced in a century or more. Evidence of the shift could be found in the Commerce Department report that Chinese imports only accounted for 15.4% of U.S. goods imports for the 12 months ended in April of this year, the smallest share since October 2006. In the years just before the pandemic, the U.S. purchased about 19% of its imported goods from China.

The bottom line for the week is that the U.S. economy continues to be robust and shows little sign of sliding into a recession, but its previously unsustainable growth rate as it emerged from the pandemic lockdown appears to be abating. Indicators suggest a stabilization and leveling off growth. Demand for employees is still high, and perhaps higher than is sustainable in the services sector, but overall, the consumer still has money to spend, unemployment is still low, and wages are good. While it is possible that the U.S. economy may, like the Eurozone, experience a technical recession, no major downturn appears to be in




To the Editor:

Democrats are making a crazy bet

President Joe Biden's fall at the end of the Air Force Academy graduation ceremony was a brief event. He tripped, got helped up, and walked off under his own power.

Sometimes, though, a small thing is fraught with meaning -- and with peril.

Biden's stumbles are not minor incidents, or a laughing matter. We aren't talking about a manufactured narrative about President Jerry Ford's alleged clumsiness played up on "Saturday Night Live." Biden is 80 years old, is in decline, and has a stiff, shuffling gait that makes you hold your breath when he's negotiating stairs or any place with potential obstacles. At his age, once the falls start, they usually don't stop.

Democrats should be thinking long and hard whether this is the vessel they want to ride into 2024 -- and to portray as up for performing the job of president of the United States in a second term extending all the way until January 2029.

A couple of weeks ago at the G-7 summit in Japan, Biden lost his balance going down steps at the Itsukushima Shrine to greet Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida. He managed to right himself with some focus. He stuck the landing and could shake the prime minister's hand like nothing happened.

But how close was he and the United States to major international embarrassment and a seismic political event? A couple of inches either way?

If Biden were to do a face plant, even down a few steps, it could be very ugly. It'd be a symbol of U.S decrepitude. It's one thing to have a senior senator from California who obviously should have hung it up several years ago; it's another to have a U.S. president lacking the agility to get around easily and safely anymore.

He also could get seriously hurt. Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, 81, fell a couple of months ago and had to be hospitalized. He suffered a concussion and a broken rib.

I don't say this with any pleasure. Anyone who has dealt with an elderly parent in decline knows aging and its attendant loss of capacity are frustrating, heartbreaking and humiliating.

In their apparent willingness to acquiesce to another Biden nomination, Democrats are looking away from the enormous risk his frailty poses to their prospects.

A bad fall or some other health event could happen on a catastrophic political timetable -- if something happened to Biden in late October 2024, it could easily throw a close race to his Republican opponent. Hillary Clinton's polling took a hit in 2016 after her fainting spell on Sept. 11.

While the public often


sympathizes with politicians with health troubles (see Sen. John Fetterman), any adverse Biden event would confirm widespread doubts about his capacities and the wisdom of him running again. Rather than simply the victim of circumstances out of his control, he'd likely look foolhardy for having taken on, once again, at age 80 or 81, the physically, mentally and emotionally taxing enterprise of a national campaign.

Moreover, it make Biden the issue in the campaign when the whole idea is supposed to be that he can repeat his role as the default candidate, making the other guy, especially Donald Trump, the focus of the race.

All of this should be factored into any calculus of how electable Biden is or how strong a candidate he is against Trump. It's understandable that Democrats feel they are stuck -- there's no good way to leverage an incumbent out of office and there aren't readily evident strong candidates waiting in the wings.

The conservative intellectual James Burnham famously said, "If there's no alternative, there's no problem." There may be no good alternative to Biden for Democrats, but having to hold your breath every time he climbs or descends the steps of Air Force One is a big problem and one that isn't going away from now until Nov.

GOING AGAINST THE GRAIN



This deal occurred in a team-offour match. Both North-South pairs reached four spades, and both Wests led the ten of clubs.

At the first table, declarer made the natural play of covering the ten with the jack. East played the queen, and South won with the ace and drew the opposing trumps. He then led a small club, hoping to quickly establish a discard for his diamond loser.

But East took the club nine with the king and returned the ten of diamonds. Whatever South did from this point on, he had to lose a diamond, a heart and

HOCUS-FOCUS

At the second table, declarer did not cover the ten of clubs with dummy's jack at trick one, following low instead. East had to play the eight (an honor would have cost a trick), whereupon South contributed the deuce!

West could do no better than to exit with a trump, whereupon South won, drew trump and played the ace and another club to establish the suit. When East now returned the diamond ten, declarer rose with the ace, led a club to the nine and discarded his remaining diamond on dummy's last club to make his game.

In finding the winning play, declarer reasoned that West's lead was either a singleton or from the doubleton 10-8, marking East with both club honors. West was therefore virtually certain to have the king of diamonds for his twoheart overcall.










Shopping Map of Salado


