Early voting starts Oct. 23 in bond election

Salado Independent School District voters will decide on two proposed Salado ISD bond issues on Nov. 7. Early voting begins Oct.

The ballot will read as follows:

"PROPOSITION A The issuance of \$235,960,000 of bonds by the Salado Independent School District for a new high school; renovations at Thomas Arnold Elementary School; re-purpose existing high school for an intermediate school; information technology infrastructure and HVAC replacements, and levying the tax in payment thereof. This is a property tax increase."

"PROPOSITION B The issuance of \$34,490,000 of bonds by the Salado Independent School District for a new stadium complex and levying the tax in payment thereof. This is a property tax increase."

The district has contracted with PBK Architects, Inc. of Austin for design work at a rate of 6% of the actual construction cost.

The agreement sets out the following costs for items in Proposition A:

New High School: 1,000 Student Capacity with core spaces sized for 1,500 at a cost of \$179,307,000.

+ Site Improvements: 800 Student Capacity at a cost of \$52,008,750.

Re-purpose Existing High school at a cost of \$1,775,000. The high school will be re-purposed as an intermediate school.

IT Infrastructure Upgrades for Skyward and Document Storage at a cost of \$324,000.

Instructional Technology Upgrades for Interactive Flat Panels (IFP) in Classrooms at a cost of \$486,000.

Bi-Directional Amplifier at a cost of \$351,000.

HVAC Unit Replacement at Existing High School at a cost of \$1,728,000.

The agreement sets out the following costs for items in Proposition B: New Stadium Complex with 5,000 seats at a cost of \$34,489,539.

The proposed projects follow the recommendation of the District's Facility Planning Committee composed of 47 community members and 11 non-voting administrative members. The committee met seven times since February to build consensus on a long range facilities plan for the district.

The committee recommends the following long range future projects: Second Elementary School, Fine Arts Auditorium for High School and Animal Barn for

TAE 1 & 3 Replacement the High School. These are not included in the proposi-

> Hilltop Securities developed a pro forma to determine the district's bond capacity and a payment schedule based on future property value growth based upon an interest rate of 4.5%.

The pro forma estimates taxable property values to increase 16% each year in 2025-2029, 12% growth in 2030, 8% in 2031 and 4% growth annually 2032-2058.

The pro forma establishes taxable property values at \$1.7 billion in 2024, growing to \$12.7 billion in 2058.

The I&S tax rate to retire the debt will remain at \$0.50 per \$100 valuation through 2030 and begin decreasing over the next 28 years.

Zonda Education, in a demographics study for Salado ISD, predicts that enrollment in Salado schools will increase by an average of more than 6% per year through 2032 at which year the enrollment is predicted to be 4,149 students. SISD enrollment as of Aug. 1 2023 was 2,350 students. The Zonda study estimated the enrollment for the 2023-24 school year would be 2,522.

Salado ISD has three campuses: Thomas Arnold Elementary, Salado Middle School and Salado High School.

PBK Architects compiled a facilities assessment for the district. It identified the square footage of each campus, the design capacity for enrollment and assigned a Facilities Condition Index (FCI) for of each school facility in which lower percentage is a better score.


Thomas Arnold Elementary is the oldest of the schools with buildings occupied in 1967 (TAE 1), 1979 (TAE 3) and 1999 (TAE 2). Thomas Arnold Elementary sits on 33.5 acres, which includes the old softball and baseball fields and the current football stadium.

TAE 1 is 48,171 sq. ft and has a Facilities Condition Index of 89%. TAE 2 is 71,191 sq. ft. with an FCI of 35%. TAE 3 is 61,496 sq. ft. with an FCI of 60%.

The design capacity is for TAE is 1,136 students. Enrollment for 2023 is 1,103.

Salado High School was occupied in fall 2008. It sits on 50.00 Acres and is 114,435 sq. ft. It has a design capacity of 659 students. Current enrollment is 734 students.

Salado Middle School is the newest school, sitting on 51.73 acres and serving grades 6-8, opening to students in Fall 2020. It is 136,000 sq. ft. with a Design Capacity of 621 students. Enrollment for 2023 is 603

increase in sales tax revenues compared to the previous year. The Village of Salado showed a 6.6% increase in the October sales tax checks compared to October 2022. Nine cities in Bell County showed increases this month.

Village of Salado showed a 6.6% increase over last October. The Village received \$64,575.49 compared to \$60,67.33 in October 2022. For the year, the Village has received \$688,545.53, which is 5.39% more than the \$653,302.29 paid through October 2022.

The Village is one of three Bell County cities to levy a

Bell County showed an 1-cent sales tax, while seven other Bell County cities levy a 1.5 cent sales tax and Rogers levies a 1.25 cent sales

> The Salado Public Library District and Bell County each levy a half-cent sales

> For that half-cent tax, Salado Public Library District received a \$56,120.34 October check, which was 2.67% more than last October's payment of \$54,658.38. For the year, the Library District has received \$560,293.08, which is 1.92% more than the \$549,708.91 paid through October 2022.

Bell County received \$2.68 million in October, which is 3.46% more than what was paid in October 2022. For the year, Bell County has received \$27.57 million, which is 6.13% more than the \$25.98 million paid through October 2022

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts \$1.1 billion in local sales tax allocations for October, 4.5 percent more than in October 2022.

These allocations are

based on sales made in August by businesses that report tax monthly.

The comptroller sent rebates totaling \$706.1 million to Texas Cities, an increase of 4.5% over last October.

The comptroller sent \$230.7 million to transit systems for October, an increase of 1.9% over October 2022.

Counties received \$68.8 million in sales tax rebate checks, an increase of 4.6% over October 2022.

Special purpose districts received \$107.1 million in sales tax rebate checks for October, 10.7% more than last year.

War in Israel, China's biggest RE developer defaults, no House speaker, markets stay put

second week in October and in the last quarter of 2023 on a Friday the 13th. During the week, the headlines were about the worst attack on Israel since 1948, and Israel's response, punctuated by a Labor Department report that year-overyear inflation was higher than expected and far higher than the Federal Reserve's targets, the auto worker's strike worsened, and small business sentiment appears to have soured. In short, there was no shortage of worrying news. So, of course, the stock markets, represented here by the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), rose 0.45% to close at 4327.78. That closing price leaves it 12.71% higher this year, about 21% higher than it was a year ago, and about 93% higher than it was at the bear market bottom in March of 2020. It is also about 24% higher than it was three years ago but still about 9.7% below where it was in January of 2022. Our other followed index, the CRSP US Mid-Cap Value Index, rose a whopping 0.47% for the week to close at 2237.71, leaving it about 4% lower than it was at the beginning of this year and about 14% lower than at the beginning of 2022.


The Benchmark U.S. Treasury note yield slipped just a bit to 4.63%, leaving it as the low point in the Treasury yield curve, with the 20-year Treasury bond yielding 4.97 and both the three and four-month T-bills paying an annualized rate of 5.62%. With all the tension and rumors of war in the Middle East, we certainly would have expected the price of oil to surge upward, but instead, it only rose about 6% to \$87.71 per barrel, well below its recent highs of about \$91.

The Economy

As the markets report suggests, the real economic news for the week was more about what didn't happen than what did. In years gone by, an attack on Israel could be depended on to send oil prices skyrocketing. It also

Whether we like it or not, the biggest employer and spender in our nation is the federal government. Not paying its millions of employees and contractors would be a severe blow to our economy and, if continued for more than a very short period of time, would almost certainly cause a recession. Oh, and add to all of that the minor fact that one of, if not the biggest real estate company in the world, Country Garden, defaulted on its bond payments and is quite likely headed toward a collapse and bankruptcy. Untold billions of dollars in loans from both Chinese and Western bondholders may be about to vanish.

So, what didn't happen? The stock market rose, interest rates stayed largely where they were before the drama, oil prices did not soar, and things appeared just to continue along as if nothing particularly notable had occurred. The most interesting story is "Why?" The answer can be found in the mass of apparently conflicting data in that Labor

Department Consumer Price Index (CPI) Report. Yes, the 12-month, all items change in price was 3.7%, far higher than the Federal Reserve (the Fed) target of 2%, but the one-month change was only 0.2%, or an annualized rate of 2.4%. Looking a bit deeper, the so-called "core" CPI only rose 0.1%. Moreover, the apparent higher inflation is being nearly totally driven by rents. The problem with including rents is they are prices that were set over the last one to two years and generally do not indicate what is actually happening now. Another report from the Labor Department, the New Tenant Repeat Rent Index (NTRR), looks at the same sample of rent rates but only includes new rental contracts signed in the last month. That report indicates that rental rates have stabilized.

What else happened? Since the last time Israel and its neighbors got into a brawl, the United States has become the world's largest oil producer. Moreover, our economy has diversified and now has a secret weapon. The secret weapon is the host of retirees with little debt and plenty of money in savings. And there was one more announcement: Social Security payments will rise 3.2% as 2024 begins. In the end the one item in all that list of worries that has the potential to really hurt us is if the deadlock in the House of Representatives continues. Why was there no reaction in the markets to that threat? It was because we have faith that those politicians will not really crash the economy because if they did, they would probably not get reelected in 2024. and in the end, their first priority is to stay in their positions of power, so their threats are empty. Let's hope and pray we are right.

I chat with my high school journalism teacher Jan Stalder on a pretty regular basis, even though it has been 40 years since I have been in her classroom.

During those years that I worked on the newspaper, there were late nights pasting up pages and taking them to the local newspaper, the *Copperas Cove Leader Press*, to be printed. When I say late, I mean late. More than once, I would go straight from the press to school without sleep in between.

And she did the same. We committed to each other that we wanted to have the best high school newspaper in the state.

We did. She built a nationally-recognized high school journalism program in a school district without many resources. Many of her students look back on their time with Jan as some of the best times.

I know I certainly do. I thank her for helping to lay

the foundation for my life.

That is what teachers do. They help to lay the foundation for our society one student at a time.

Jan Stalder is one of 420,000 annuitants in the state of Texas who may get a cost-of-living adjustment through the Teacher Retirement System if Proposition Nine is approved by Texas voters on Nov. 7.

She lives in the same house she has lived in since she first arrived in Cove in the early 1980s. She didn't become a teacher to get rich, but she shouldn't have to wonder how to make ends meet.

According to the Texas Retired Teachers Association, the average monthly TRS annuity is just \$2,174. Further, there has not been a COLA since Sept. 2004, almost two decades.

The proposed amendment authorizes the 88th Legislature "to provide a cost-of-living adjustment to certain annuitants of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

The legislature has already appropriated \$3.355 billion to fund the cost-of-living adjustment contingent on voter approval of the proposed amendment.

When I vote for Proposition Nine, I will be thinking of Jan, and of my sister Tena Simmons, who retired after 30+ years in the classroom.

I will also be thinking about my grandkids and the teachers who will play a crucial role in shaping their lives

Ten facts regarding the SISD bond

The following are 10 facts regarding our upcoming Salado ISD bond election

1. Our student enrollment has increased from 1,348 in 2012 to 2,323 this year. That increase of 975 students is the fourth highest enrollment increase of all 77 school districts in our Waco region. It also represents a percentage increase of over 72%, which is the highest percentage increase of all 77 school districts in the Waco region during that time period

2. A facility planning committee of 46 Salado ISD community members, parents, and teachers met several times and developed the recommendation for this bond election. Our school board discussed their recommendation during multiple board meetings and in August voted unanimously (7-0) to call the bond election. All of these facility planning committee meetings and school board meetings were open to the pub-

3. There are two bond propositions. The first proposition is for \$235,959,750 and includes construction of a new high school, conversion of the current high school to an elementary/intermediate school, and the renovation and expansion of our current elementary school. The second proposition is for \$34,489,530 and is for the construction of a new stadium for football, marching band, soccer, track and field. These amounts are based on projected costs, however, we would open bids to any and all construction companies to get the best value for our school district.

4. Although approval of this bond election will not increase Salado ISD's tax rate, state law requires that the statement "THIS IS A PROPERTY TAX INCREASE" must appear as part of all public school district propositions regardless of whether passage of the proposition would result in

a tax rate increase, a tax rate decrease, or not impact the tax rate at all.

5. Funds for bond

payments are generated through the Interest and Sinking (I&S) tax rate, which is currently \$0.50 per \$100 of taxable value. This is the legal limit and cannot be increased. This is why passage of this bond election will not increase Salado ISD's tax rate. I&S funds can only be used for bond payments and cannot be used for teacher salaries

or other expenses.

6. The other part of school district tax rate is Maintenance and Operations (M&O). This is what pays for the day-to-day operations of the school district. We have decreased our M&O tax rate (and total tax rate) the last five years in a row.

7. Our school district's total tax rate this year is \$1.1692 per \$100 of taxable value (\$0.6692 for M&O and \$0.50 for I&S). This is the lowest tax rate for our school district in 34 years. Passage of this bond election would not increase the tax rate so we would still have the lowest tax rate for our school district since 1989.

8. This year we reduced the school district tax rate by \$0.1844 per \$100 of taxable value. That decrease will result in a savings of \$184.40 for every \$100,000 of taxable value for your home, business, or land, for the taxes due in January 2024, as compared to this past year. For example, there will be a reduction of \$737.60 in taxes on a home with a taxable value of \$400,000. Passage of this bond election will not affect that reduction in taxes.

9. In addition to the two

Salado ISD bond propositions, there are also fourteen constitutional amendments on the ballot. One of those fourteen constitutional amendments is Proposition 4, which would increase the property tax homestead exemption from \$40,000 to \$100,000. If this is approved, homeowners in our school district will save \$701.52 every year, regardless of the value of their home. Thus, a home with a taxable value of \$400,000 could have a total property tax reduction of \$1,439.12 this coming January, as compared to this past year. \$737.60 of those tax savings is due to our school district's property tax rate decrease and the remaining \$701.52 of those tax savings will be from the increase in homestead exemption if Proposition 4 is approved by the voters next month. Passage of this bond proposal will not affect this reduction in



Additionally, after the passage of House Bill 357 during the 88th Legislative Session, the Secretary of State's office is now required to set the date of a runoff election resulting from an election held on a uniform election date. The runoff date for the November 7 election will be December 9.

While there are no runoffs for constitutional amendments, runoffs may be required for some local and special elections.

This information and all the details for casting a ballot can be found at VoteTexas.gov, Texas' official voting resource.

Salado Independent School District voters will have two Propositions on

the ballot. The propositions are below the 14 proposed constitutional amendments. Salado Independent School District

PROPOSITION A

The issuance \$235,960,000 of bonds by the Salado Independent School District for a new high school; renovations at Thomas Arnold Elementary school; repurpose existing high school for an intermediate school; information technology infrastructure and HVAC replacements and levying the tax in payment thereof. This is a property tax increase. PROPOSITION B

The issuance \$34,490,000 of bonds by the Salado Independent School District for a new stadium complex and levying the tax in payment thereof. This is a property tax increase.

Texans will vote on 14 proposed amendments as a part of the November 7 Election. Below is the ballot order as drawn.

Proposition 1 – HJR 126 "The constitutional amendment protecting the right to engage in farming, ranching, timber production, horticulture, and wildlife management."

Proposition 2 - SJR 64 "The constitutional amendment authorizing a local option exemption from ad valorem taxation by a county or municipality of all or part of the appraised value of real property used to operate a child-care facility."

Proposition 3 - HJR 132 "The constitutional amendment prohibiting the imposition of an individual wealth or net worth tax, including a tax on the difference between the assets and liabilities of an individual or family."

Proposition 4 - HJR 2 from the second special session "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to establish a temporary limit on the maximum appraised value of real property other than a residence homestead for ad valorem tax purposes; to increase the amount of the exemption from ad valorem taxation by a school district applicable to residence homesteads from \$40,000 to \$100,000; to adjust the amount of the limitation on school district ad valorem taxes imposed on the residence homesteads of the elderly or disabled to reflect increases in certain exemption amounts; to except certain appropriations to pay for ad valorem tax relief from the constitutional limitation on the rate of growth of appropriations; and to authorize the legislature to provide for a four-year term

of office for a member of the board of directors of certain appraisal districts."

Proposition 5 – HJR 3 "The constitutional amendment relating to the Texas University Fund, which provides funding to certain institutions of higher education to achieve national prominence as major research universities and drive the state economy."

Proposition 6 – SJR 75 "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas water fund to assist in financing water projects in this state."

Proposition 7 – SJR 93 "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the Texas energy fund to support the construction, maintenance, modernization, and operation of electric generating facilities."

Proposition 8 – HJR 125 "The constitutional amendment creating the broadband infrastructure fund to expand high-speed broadband access and assist in the financing of connectivity projects.'

Proposition 9 – HJR 2, regular session "The constitutional amendment authorizing the 88th Legislature to provide a cost-of-living adjustment to certain annuitants of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Proposition 10 – SJR 87 "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation equipment or inventory held by a manufacturer of medical or biomedical products to protect the Texas healthcare network and strengthen our medical supply chain."

Proposition 11 - SJR "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit conservation and reclamation districts in El Paso County to issue bonds supported by ad valorem taxes to fund the development and maintenance of parks and recreational facilities."

Proposition 12 "The constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Galveston County."

Proposition 13 - HJR "The constitutional amendment to increase the mandatory age of retirement for state justices and judg-

Proposition 14 – SJR 74 "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the centennial parks conservation fund to be used for the creation and improvement of state parks."

Entries pose a problem in the play of many deals. In the case of declarer, an abundance of winners in either his own hand or dummy is worthless if there is no way to reach them.

The defenders might likewise be faced with this difficulty. Either defender might have tricks that cannot be taken because there is no entry card in the hand that holds the good tricks. The defenders can sometimes solve this problem if they use their resources expeditiously. Here is such a case.

Let's first assume that West leads a heart in response to East's overcall, and that East covers dummy's queen with the king, which South ducks. As a result of this communications-breaking play by declarer, he makes the contract.

If East continues the suit, South finesses the ten and leads a club. No matter when or how the defenders take their A-K of clubs, East's hearts wind up withering on the vine, and South eventually scores three club tricks to make the contract.

Note that if declarer slips by winning the opening heart lead, he goes down. Whenever he leads a club, West wins with the king and returns a heart to East's jack, and East leads a third heart to establish his suit. East still has the club ace as an entry, and South goes down two.

Note also, though, that East can defeat the contract if he plays the seven of hearts on the opening lead! By allowing declarer to win the first trick with the queen, he maintains a heart contact with West that prevents South from scoring more than seven tricks.

Thus, if declarer plays a club at trick two, West takes his king and returns a heart to East's K-J, driving out South's ace on this trick or the next one. The race for the establishment of tricks is then won by the defense, and South winds up taking second money.
