2023: A look back

This year has been one of marked growth, deep drought and change.

Salado ISD voters approved more than \$270 million in bonds in the Nov. 7 election, but will the new capacity be ready soon enough and will it be enough?

Voters overwhelmingly approved the issuance of Proposition A for \$235,960,000 in bonds for a new high school; renovations at Thomas Arnold Elementary school; re-purpose existing high school for an intermediate school; information technology infrastructure and HVAC replacements: 1,880 voted for and 1,084 voted against.

Voters also approved Proposition B for \$34,490,000 of bonds for a new stadium complex, with 1,511 for and 1,462 against.

According to Supt. Michael Novotny, the new high school, which will have a core capacity of 1,500 students and a classroom capacity of 1,000 students, will be open in Aug. 2026.

Work on the current high school to convert it to an elementary/intermediate school will begin during spring and summer 2026 to re-open in Aug. 2026.

Work on Thomas Arnold Elementary will begin in summer 2026 and finish in 2027 or 2028.

Construction of the new stadium is "contingent on when the district will have enough bond capacity to sell those bonds," Dr. Novotny said.

This year has been marked by growth, drought and change and planning for more growth, drought and change.

The largest potential growth is the Solana Ranch development.

Solana Municipal Utility District #1 was approved in June by the Texas State Legislature. It was helped along the way by a unanimous March endorsement of the MUD by the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen.

"The first glass of water is going to cost more than \$25 million," said Nick Taratsas, executive vice president with DMB Development, which is developing a 7,000-acre community from the 9,000-acre Solana Ranch. The community will have 14,000 homes when completed.

Phase 1 will be 5,000 homes.

"DMB has been working with Jarrell-Schwertner WSC to formulate a solution for the first phase of the development," Taratsas stated.

"Severe groundwater restraints exist in the aquifers west of I-35," he told aldermen. Because of that, DMB is focusing its efforts on locating viable sources of water on the east side of I-35.

In January, aldermen approved a development agreement and later approved the voluntary annexation of Mustang Springs at Salado. The development will include 891 acres of single family residential development, 31 acres of multi-fam-

ily residential, 27 acres of mixed use, 20 acres of commercial, 22 acres of private parkland and trails and 15 acres dedicated for a future public school, if it is accepted by the school district.

When built out, Mustang Springs at Salado will have 599 single family residences on lots ranging in size from an acre to two acres.

Mustang Springs at Salado will be developed in three phases. Phase 1 will be 134 single family residential lots of two acres on 352.29 acres. This phase will be served by on-site septic systems.

At their final meeting of 2023, aldermen narrowly approved the construction plans for Phase 1 of Mustang Springs at Salado with aldermen Paul Cox and Jasen Graham and mayor pro tem Rodney Bell voting in favor, while aldermen Bert Henry and Jason Howard voting against.

Phase 2 and 3 will be served by a wastewater treatment plant built by the developer. Phase 2 will be 377.95 acres of 151 single family residential estate lots of an acre to two acres in size. In addition, there will be 27.46 acres for mixed use, 31.41 acres for multi-family mixed use, 20.16 acres for commercial use, 15.13 acres for public facilities, 7.11 acres for wastewater treatment plant, 2.82 acres for water storage use, 18.51 acres for a ranch headquarters and 5.75 for existing ranch use.

Phase 3 consists of 375.44 acres with 314 single family residential estate lots of an acre of more as well as 1.57 acres for an amenity center.

The developer applied to Texas Commission for Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a wastewater treatment plant discharge permit, but has withdrawn that application. The developer will file a different application for wastewater treatment.

The developer also ap-

plied to Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District (CUWCD) for a drilling permit for two wells, each capable of 320 gallons per minute. CUWCD is in the process of considering the permit applications and will hold an evidentiary hearing on Feb. 14. During two preliminary hearings, the board considered applications from nearby property owners to have standing in the hearing process.

In January, aldermen approved the formation of the first two Public Improvement Districts in the Village.

The Sanctuary PID is located at the intersection of I-35 and FM 2268. It has two tracts separated by FM 2268 totaling 106.47 acres. The North tract is 49.43 acres. The South Tract is 57.04 acres. Plans for the Sanctuary PID include construction of a 365 door hotel, approximately 500,000 square

feet of office, mixed-use, restaurant and retail space; 576 multi-family for rent units; 107 multi-family for sale units and 11 single family units. Construction of 210 apartments has begun at what is called Water's Edge on the North Tract of Sanctuary PID. The Water's Edge developer applied for and later withdrew a drilling permit for a well on its property. It will be served by Salado Water Supply Corporation. The developer was not able to conduct what is called hot construction work on the site until adequate water for fire suppression was put on the location. This was achieved toward the end of the year, so construction is likely to advance more quickly in 2024. The developer is seeking \$7.4 million in PID bonds for the construction of approved PID facilities on the Sanctuary PID.

The Sanctuary East PID

sits on 188.85 acres of land that connects FM 2268 to Royal Street. The Sanctuary East PID when fully built out will be 416 single family lots of between 50 and 75 feet in width. Sanctuary East will have a total assessed value of \$208 million according to the developer's market estimate. The developer is seeking \$15 million in PID Bonds. The PID assessment is estimated at \$0.50 per \$100 assessed value over a 30 year lifetime. Construction of homes on this section of Sanctuary began in 2023.

In the depth of this drought, Clearwater UWCD has remained in Stage 3 of its Drought Status Report for the Edwards Aquifer BFZ. Salado Water Supply Corporation remains in Stage 3 of its Drought Management Plan, limiting outside watering to one day a week with odd addresses watering on Tuesdays and even addresses

watering on Wednesdays.

Salado WSC in late July also issued a moratorium on servicing new developments within the boundaries of its Certificate of Convenience and Necessity (CCN).

Residents in the western portion of Williamson County petitioned for annexation into the Clearwater UWCD as a means of addressing water issues in that area. The petition was later withdrawn before CUWCD board could act on it. However, CUWCD expects that a new petition will be presented in early 2024.

U.S. Congressman John Carter's office announced in March that it has secured \$1.5 million in federal funds for the expansion of the Village of Salado wastewater treatment plant. Work on this will likely begin in 2024.

Inflation may not be dead, but it is in coma

After all the headlines about the stock market plunging and then roaring to record highs, one would assume that something big had happened in the last week before Christmas. Instead, the net result as measured by the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) was a gain of a mere 0.75%, taking it to 4754.63. During the day on Wednesday, and again early on Friday morning, it did

On the other side of the market, the benchmark 10year U.S. Treasury note ended the week almost exactly where it ended last week, yielding 3.90%. Both the longer-term bonds and the shortest of the T-bills were also about where they were last week with the one-month T-bill yielding 5.54% and the thirty-year bond paying 4.05%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) rose 2.38% to \$73.49 on news of increased shipping costs for oil from Southwest Asia resulting from the shipping attacks on vessels lined up to enter

the Suez Canal.

Once more, the excitement in the stock market was driven by statements, misunderstanding of statements, and rumors about what the Federal Reserve was likely going to do in the next six months. Most of that was triggered by an unexpectedly benign report on inflation from our beloved Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) at the Commerce Department. The monthly Personal Income and Outlays report for November of this year was a delight to read. First, personal income for US workers rose 0.4% in November and has averaged about 3.2% for the last five months. The even better news was that inflation (PCE) for November was minus 0.1% bringing the five-month average to 0.16%! If we carefully annualize that rate, as the BEA does each quarter in its report, it means that over the last five months inflation has been running at an annual rate of 1.94%, almost exactly what the Fed has been targeting! It appears to possibly have been fears that November's PCE would come in unexpectedly high but instead it came in low that created the rush to buy on Friday what had

In that report, it was not only the good news that inflation has fallen into an even deeper sleep that was important. The news that workers (read "consumers") who are the driving force for good or ill in the U.S. economy, have been consistently seeing a gain in their collective income at an annualized rate of about 3.91% while inflation has declined to under 2%. The difference between those two numbers, almost 2% per year, is almost exactly the sweet spot the Fed has been shooting for. For the U.S. economy to grow at what is generally accepted to be its maximum longterm capacity, consumers need to have about 2% more money to spend each year, after subtracting inflation.

At least from a theoretical macroeconomic view, it just doesn't get any better than

Then, as if that combination of news was not enough to get the juices of any macroeconomics geek flowing, the University of Michigan reported that their consumer sentiment survey increased to a five-month high of 69.7 from last month's 61.3, the largest monthly rise since 2005. The centerpiece of that increase was consumers' collective belief that cost of goods and services (inflation) would rise only 3.1% over the next year and average 2.9% over the next five to ten years. Inflation, like our economy, is mostly driven by consumers, and when consumers anticipate higher inflation, they tend to buy things in larger quantities and sooner than they otherwise would, creating a surge in demand that pushes prices up, a self-fulfilling prophecy. The great fear in the Fed and among economists is of that behavior and belief system feeding on itself as prices rise because people expected rising prices, which causes them to buy even more and faster, generally with borrowed money, creating an inflationary spiral. Then, when they finally run out of credit, those same consumers suddenly stop buying, creating a recession, or

Once more our report is that inflation, if not dead, is in a very serious coma and the U.S. economy is in as good a shape as we have ever seen it.





Contract Bridge



Trump control is often a decisive factor in the play of suit contracts. Whenever possible, the defenders try to run declarer out of trumps so that they can eventually cash one or more tricks in the side suits. At the same time, declarer tries to maintain control of the trump suit in order to withstand this attack.

Consider this deal where trump control plays a key role. West leads the king of hearts and continues with the ace. After declarer ruffs, he has four trumps left, and so does West.

If South were now to play the ace and

another trump, he would lose control of the hand and take a bad beating. West would take the K-Q of trump and play another heart. When South ruffed, leaving West with the only remaining trump, the rest of West's hearts would become tricks, and declarer would go down four!

To forestall this, South leads the nine of spades at trick three, not the ace. If West ducks, South gets home safely by cashing the ace and then leading his winners in the side suits.


So let's say West takes the nine with the queen. How does West then proceed? This is a crucial decision, for West's next play determines the outcome. Since dummy can ruff a heart continuation, West might decide to make a neutral return, such as a diamond or a club.

If he did this, declarer would win and play the ten of spades in order to maintain trump control. Whether West won the ten with the king or decided to let the ten hold, the contract could no longer be defeated.


But if West, upon taking the nine of spades with the queen, returns another heart, the contract cannot be made. The old bugaboo against giving declarer a ruff-and-discard does not apply here. In fact, it will cause South endless pain and suffering, regardless of which hand he chooses to ruff in. Indeed, the best South can do against this defense is to settle for down one.


