Hearings set on Williamson Co. annexation petition

Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District (CUWCD) will hold public hearings on Feb. 12 and Feb. 13 to receive input from citizens in both Bell and Williamson Counties on the possible annexation of Western Williamson County into their jurisdiction.

The prescribed two hearings will be held as follows:

Feb. 12 at 6 p.m. at the Cedar Park Recreation Center, 1435 Main Street, Cedar

Feb. 13 at 6 p.m. at the Harris Community Center, 401 N Alexander St, Belton,

CUWCD General Manager Dirk Aaron stated that the district first received a "Petition for Annexation" of Western Williamson County at its Dec. 13 regular board meeting. The district was aware that citizens in western portions of Williamson County would be again pursuing the district to annex all or parts of Williamson County's western territory.

The citizens who first delivered their petition to the Board are known as the Aquifer Conservation Alliance (ACA). ACA organized in late summer and fall of 2022 due to the recent declines in groundwater wells and the increase of groundwater production serving the mining industry

of Williamson County.

The Petition was signed by more than 50 Williamson County residents, whom the District has verified as owning land within the western portions of Williamson County.

Aaron stated for the record, "The annexation request is for the groundwater conservation district in Bell County to expand our territory by including Western Williamson County, but this has no affiliation with the **Bell County Commissioners** Court. Misstating this fact can be misleading to the citizens of Williamson County."

He further stated that "The most positive turn of events is that Williamson Commissioners, County while opposing the annexation as well as the proposed 2019 legislative study in approved by the Texas House of Representatives by Representative Brad Buckley in the 86th Legislative Session, six years ago" is now being funded by Williamson County.


Aaron further stated: "His Elected Board of Directors applaud County Commissioner Long for her positive comments in the Community Impact news. She was quoted as saying that Annexation into another groundwater district is premature, but if the results

from the study turned out [that] there's some action we need to take, that needs to be directed by Williamson County, in my opinion, and not by another county (Groundwater Conservation District).

Aaron reaffirmed that that is the same opinion stressed by most citizens and leaders in Bell County. "Having your own locally accountable GCD is far better than a larger entity without local ties. Local discernment and local accountability should rule the day," he said.

If annexed, then a confirmation election by citizens of Williamson County of the prescribed territory would be in order before citizens are subject to a new property tax. The cost of holding that election would be covered by Clearwater and the estimated cost is \$380,000 or more payable to Williamson County Elections Adminis-

The proposed territory starts along the north and south boundary of the west right-of-way line of Interstate Highway 35, and extends to the northern Williamson County line, and continues south along the west right-of-way line of Interstate Highway 35 to the southern Williamson County line then to the western Wil-

liamson County line boundary with Burnet County. The proposed additional territory for Clearwater would be the western half of Williamson County which is comprised of approximately 503 square miles of land.

Leadership of ACA stated publicly and on their website that "If you have a home in the rural parts of Western Williamson County

then you very likely have a groundwater well as your sole domestic water supply. If you receive water in your home, it can and often is a blend of surface and groundwater from public water supply entities, MUDs, SUDs or municipalities. Majority of these groundwater wells produce from the Middle Layer of the Trinity Aquifer. The Trinity Aquifer is a major aquifer that extends across much of the central and northeastern part of the state - sixty-one counties contain the aquifer. It is one of the most extensive and highly used groundwater resources in Texas."

ACA states that 1,775 new wells have been drilled between 2003 and 2021, validating the increase of wells across the region.

Wholesale prices fall, indicating high inflation is dead in US, China


Our dearly beloved S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) once more shivered and shook with fear as it approached its former record high point of 4796.56 set on January 3, 2022. It briefly rose above that magical number on Thursday shortly after the opening but retreated after sellers outsold the buyers. On Friday morning, it again rose, this time to a neat 4800, but was then driven back down by the sellers. The available news looked better than ever, but stock traders are a superstitious lot, and because they piled on as the SPX rose in January 2022 and then got burned, they are loath to cross that mystical line again. The fact that corporate earnings and the U.S. economy have both risen considerably since that fateful day in 2022 makes no difference to their animal spirits.

The SPX rose 1.84% for the week to close at 4783.83 and is now a mere 0.27% below its record high. Since this time last year, it is up 19.62%, about 34% higher than it was during the October downturn in 2022, and has gained about 25% over the last three years. The CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, our indicator of what the market looks like minus the seven tech stocks that now dominate the S&P 500, fell 0.40% for the week to close at 2480.37, leaving it up about 18% from a year ago and up 16.17% from this time three years ago.

The benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note closed out the week yielding 3.96%, little changed from last week. The same applies to both the short-term bills and longer-term Treasuries. For all the talk and angst about interest rates that seem to dominate stock market fears and hopes, the bond market is just sitting there seriously inverted but otherwise quite unmoved. The same could be said of the oil markets. West Tex-

lines for the week centered around the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) monthly release of its first estimate of the Consumer Price Index (CPI) on Thursday, an inflation indicator that reportedly the Federal Reserve and most professional economists consider to be a less than accurate set of data, but which still manages to make the front page of financial news. Said CPI is then generally reported in the media based on what happened a year ago rather than what it says about inflation today. What it really announced is that the prices of goods and services purchased in these United States of America rose a seasonally adjusted 0.3% last month after rising 0.1% in November and 0.0% in October. That leaves the trailing CPI over the last quarter rising at an average rate of about 0.13% per month, or about 1.57% per year. The popular press largely ignored those readings and instead fixated on the 12-month total of 3.4% which has far more to do with where prices were a year ago than where they are headed today.

The indicators that high inflation is dead were then reinforced on Friday as the BLS reported that the Producer Price Index for final demand (PPI), in essence, wholesale prices, also fell 0.1% last month, rounding out the year with a rise of only 2.5% after rising 6.4% in 2022. In yet better news,

if we remove the food, fuel, and trade services elements from that PPI, it too is rising at about 1.24% per year. On Thursday, the Federal Reserve Bank of New York reported that among consumers it surveyed last month, the median expected annual inflation had come down to 3%. As we have noted before, inflation becomes persistent when consumers believe it will continue into the future. If they expect prices to go up, they accelerate their buying while prices are low, which increases demand and, in turn, causes prices to rise in a self-fulfilling cycle.

Contrast our relatively healthy small inflation rate with what is happening in China, and things get a little more interesting. The China wholesale price index has now been dropping for 15 months, and consumer prices have been falling for the last three months. Economists at Morgan Stanley called that price decline the "longest and deepest" deflation in China since 1998. The concern in the West is that the government there is stimulating manufacturing production, but domestic demand continues to fall. That means that there are a lot of goods sitting unsold in China that are likely to be "dumped" as underpriced exports, which could easily set off an escalation in the trade war.

The bottom line, both domestically and globally, remains much the same. The U.S. economy is chugging along pretty much as its maximum sustainable capacity, China's economy is slipping backward, and the Europeans are teetering on the edge.

To stop predators from using AI to exploit children, Congress must act now

Sexual predators are using a new tool to exploit children -- AI image generators. Users on a dark-web forum shared 3,000 AI-generated images of child sexual abuse in one month, according to the Internet Watch Foundation.

Current child sexual abuse laws are outdated. They don't account for the dangers AI and emerging technologies pose. Lawmakers must act fast to put legal protections in place.

The national CyberTipline -- a reporting system for suspected online child exploitation -- received a staggering 32 million reports in 2022, up from 21 million two years prior. That figure is sure to grow with the rise of AI.

AI platforms are "trained" on existing visual material. Sources used to create images may include real children's faces taken from social media, or photographs of real-life exploitation.

Advanced AI-generated images are virtually indistinguishable from unaltered photographs. Investigators have found new images of old victims, images of "deaged" celebrities depicted as children in abuse scenarios, and "nudified" images taken from otherwise benign photos of clothed children. Much of this technology is downloadable, so offenders can generate images off-line without fear of discovery.

Using AI to create pictures of child sex abuse is not a victimless crime. Behind every AI image, there are real children. And studies show that a majority of those who possess child sex abuse material also commit hands-on abuse.

Adults can also use platforms like ChatGPT to better lure children. Criminals have long used fake online identities to meet young people in games or on social media, gain their trust and manipulate them into sending explicit images, then "sextort" them for money, more pictures, or physical acts. ChatGPT makes it shockingly easy to masquerade as a child or teen with youthful language.

President Biden recently signed an executive order geared at managing the risks of AI. But we need help from lawmakers.

We need to update the federal definition of child sexual abuse material to include AI-generated depictions. As the law stands, prosecutors must show harm to an actual child. A defense team could claim that AI material is not depicting a real child, even though AI images often pull from material that victimizes real children.

We must adopt policies requiring tech companies to monitor and report exploitative material. Only three companies were responsible for 98% of all CyberTips in 2020 and 2021: Facebook, Google, and Snapchat.

Many state laws identify "mandatory reporters," or professionals who are legally required to report suspected abuse. Employees of social media and tech companies ought to have mandated reporting responsibilities.

We need to rethink how we use end-to-end encryption, in which only the sender and receiver can access a message or file. While it has valid applications, endto-end encryption can help people store and share child abuse images. To illustrate how many abusers go undetected, consider that out of the 29 million tips the CyberTipline received in 2021, just 160 came from Apple, which maintains end-to-end encryption for iMessages and iCloud.

Even if law enforcement has a warrant to access a perpetrator's files, a tech company with end-to-end encryption can claim that it can't help. Surely an industry built on innovation is capable of developing solutions to protect our children

AI and social media are evolving every day. If lawmakers act now, we can prevent wide-scale harm to kids.

The representative or audience you are addressing needs to know who you are, why the issue matters to you, and what action you want taken. In the case of legislation, this means urging the representative to vote yes or no on a specific







Bill is survived by his wife of 66 years, Loretta Ruth, residing in Georgetown, Texas. 

Britt's unique approach to saving structures defined charm of Salado



Even though he was never schooled as an architect, the late Darwin Britt's buildings have been featured in architectural and design magazines for his approach to saving the structures and salvaging and reimagining materials from Texas warehouses, Victorian homes and old storefronts to give them new life.

The storefronts he moved from Santa Anna, Texas were the initial stores of Salado Square. Later, he expanded and added storefronts using bricks and limestone he salvaged from Belton, including the famous Beamer brick defined by its soft, almost sandy feel. Beamer bricks were sun-dried. They found their way into many of the buildings that Britt built, including the commercial buildings and private homes in Mill Creek, Salado Commons and Rock Creek Dr. that he built during his second career. His first was for IBM.

Darwin also designed and built furniture from material he salvaged over the years. One of those highly collectible pieces will be featured in the Salado Historical Society Gala and Auction on Jan. 27.







After graduating from Salado in 1982, Westerberg went to Texas A&M, gradu-

Salado ISD Athletic Director Paul Baird said that he is taking applications for the position and may begin the first round of interviews next week.






Niu to play for University of South Florida



Partscore deals where each side has about half the high cards usually provide a give-and-take in the play that is not found at higher-level contracts. Consider this case from a national team event where South wound up in two diamonds and West led a club. East took the ace and shifted to a trump, the queen losing to West's

West returned a trump to South's ace, the spade jack lost to West's ace, and another trump return by West eliminated dummy's last trump. South then cashed the queen of spades before exiting with the ten of clubs to

West's king.

Declarer was hoping for a spade or club return at this point, but West not unexpectedly shifted to a low heart, forcing South to guess the location of the missing honors.

After much thought, declarer played low from dummy, hoping to force the ace. This would establish the king as an entry to dummy's good clubs, and South would be home free, losing only a spade, a heart, a diamond and two clubs. But declarer was counting his chickens before they were hatched.

After South played low from dummy on the heart return, East smartly inserted the nine. Declarer won with the jack but now had no way to reach the dummy.

However, South was not yet out of ammunition. He cashed the king of spades, hoping the ten would fall; when it didn't, he led a heart to the ten, hoping East did not have the ten of spades. In that case, East would be forced to return a heart (or a club, if he had one) to dummy. But when East won the ace of hearts, he cashed the spade ten, and that was that.

Declarer should have made the contract despite the excellent defense he encountered. He was guilty of one small slip: Had he played the ten from dummy on West's heart return at trick eight, he would have been assured of an entry to dummy regardless of how East defended.




