Pruning after drought, freezes may do more harm than good

While winter is the ideal time to prune trees, pruning after recent droughts and freezes may cause more damage than good this year.

Oak wilt is one of the deadliest tree diseases in the U.S., killing millions of trees across 76 counties of Texas.

"Pruning always adds stress to trees because it opens wounds that need to seal, so if a tree is already stressed, it's best to avoid unnecessary pruning this year," said Demian Gomez, Texas A&M Forest Service regional forest health coordinator. "Especially avoid pruning for aesthetics and controlling growth if a tree is already showing signs of stress."

For oak trees specifically, all wounds, including those produced by pruning, construction activities, livestock, land clearing, lawnmowers, string trimmers and storms should be painted over to produce a physical barrier and prevent the spread of oak wilt.

KNOW THE BEST

TIME TO PRUNE

Oak wilt is caused by the fungus Bretziella fagacearum. The fungus invades the xylem, the waterconducting vessels of the trees, and the tree responds by plugging the tissues, resulting in a lack of water to the leaves, slowly killing the infected tree.

Any new wound on oaks can be an entry point for oak wilt infection. Small insects, called sap beetles, move spores of oak wilt fungus to new trees and are very active in late winter and early

"Prevention is key to

stopping the spread of oak wilt," said Gomez. "With wounds being the best entry point for the pathogen, landowners should avoid pruning or wounding trees from February through June." For oak trees specifical-

ly, all wounding, including those produced by pruning, construction activities, livestock, land clearing, lawnmowers, string trimmers and storms should be painted over to produce a physical barrier and prevent the spread of oak wilt.

"Pruning always adds stress to trees because it opens wounds that need to seal, so if a tree is already stressed, it's best to avoid unnecessary pruning this year," Gomez said. "Especially avoid pruning for aesthetics and controlling growth if a tree is already showing signs of stress."

RECOGNIZING AND

UNDERSTANDING OAK WILT

Oak wilt can spread two ways - above ground by sapfeeding beetles or underground through connected

The disease spreads above ground by sap beetles more rapidly in late winter and spring because of high fungal mat production and high insect populations. During this time, red oaks that died of the disease last year may produce spore mats under the bark. With a fruity smell, these mats attract small, sapfeeding beetles that can later fly to a fresh wound of any oak tree and infect it, starting a new oak wilt center.

The second way oak wilt can spread is underground by traveling through interconnected root systems from

tree to tree. Oak wilt spreads an average of 75 feet per year by the root system. This occurs primarily in live oaks and is responsible for the majority of spread and tree deaths in Central Texas.

Oak wilt is often recognized in live oaks by yellow and brown veins showing in leaves of infected trees, known as veinal necrosis. It may be difficult to diagnose oak wilt due to seasonal transitioning of oak leaves in the spring when evergreen oak trees shed their old leaves while simultaneously growing new leaves. The signs of oak wilt can be seen on most leaves when a tree is fully infected. Landowners should contact a certified arborist if they are unsure if their tree is infected.

"For red oaks particularly, one of the first symptoms of oak wilt is leaves turning red or brown during the summer," Gomez said. "While red oaks play a key role in the establishment of new disease centers, all oaks can move oak wilt through root grafts, particularly live

To stop the spread of oak wilt through the root system, trenches can be placed around a group of trees — at least 100 feet away from the dripline of infected trees and at least 4 feet deep, or deeper - to sever all root connec-

Another common management method for oak wilt is through fungicide injection. The injections only protect individual trees injected, and the best candidates for

Beaty was the Georgetown Eagles Offensive Coordinator and Associate Head Football Coach when he accepted the head football coaching job in Salado.

Beaty has taught and coached at Georgetown since

2016. He is the Off-Season and Strength and Conditioning Coordinator, Head Girls Powerlifting Coach, interim Head Track Coach and 7-on-7 coordinator.

While coaching Georgetown, the Eagles made the playoffs every season with a win percentage over 70%. In 2021-23 seasons, the Eagles have averaged more than 40 points per game and 500 yards per

game with a balanced attack of 260 yards on the ground and 240 yards in the air.

Georgetown went 6-5 and 4-2 in 5A-Div. 1 in 2023. In 2022, the Eagles lost in the Region semi-finals to State Finalists College Station, ending their season with a 10-3, 6-1 record.

An Open Exchange of Ideas

Echoes of the 1920s economics playing out globally in the 2020s

The Markets

Apparently, we have

reached the end of 2024 here in early February. Late last year the most optimistic analysts predicted that by the end of this year the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) would reach the unheard of high of 5000. This week ended with our venerable if often misleading SPX closing at 5026.61, a rise of 1.37% for the week, 5.38% this year, and almost 23% higher than where it was a year ago. The rise was credited to the better-than-expected corporate earnings reports that have been pouring in. Our other tracked index, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, only inched up 0.30% to 2491.17. It, like the rest of the market outside a select group of large-cap tech companies, appears to not be joining in the celebration as it plods ahead, emulating the legendary turtle rather than the equally famous hare.

The benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note yield crept a bit higher to 4.17%, about 12% higher than it was at the beginning of the year, but substantially lower than it was last October when it touched 5%. The rest of the Treasury yield curve remained about where it has been with the highest rates at the one- and two-month points, above 5.5%, and the 30-year bond at 4.37%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil inched upward to \$76.49, higher than at the beginning of the year, but about 4% lower than it was a year ago.

The Economy

The economic news this week was at least as much about what didn't happen as what did. The most forecast recession in memory, or possibility in history, just keeps putting in a "noshow" as the U.S. economy appears to be, if anything, accelerating. Given that our economy is behaving so oddly when compared to the recent decades, it may be wise to step back and look at the causes of what was and what may possibly be coming down the road.

Market & Economic Update

Over the last decade or two we have gotten used to things being a certain way and there was little evidence that things would change. As so often is the truth, now we realize that the steadystate assumption was based on some false assumptions. Inflation stayed stubbornly below 2%, interest rates remained historically low, and an ever-increasing portion of what we purchased here in the United States was made in China in whole or in part. So, what changed? As we discussed in our TPWC Podcast scheduled to be available this weekend, China is the biggest thing that changed. The astonishingly low level of inflation we experienced in the early 21st century was primarily generated by the same forces that produced a similar low-price increase in the 1920s. In that century following the banking crisis of 1908, we saw a large-scale influx of immigrants from Eastern Europe and displaced farm workers willing to work for ultra-low wages combined with the advent of internal combustion engine driven automobile and trucks. The combination of low labor costs, widespread industrialization, and a greatly decreased cost and increased speed of transportation resulted in prices for goods and services falling in real terms, but as our wealth increased, our buying largely kept up with the increasing supply. The end of World War I combined with a global pandemic triggered a supply interruption, triggering a burst of high inflation, which dissipated in a few years. With the rise of authoritarian governments in Eastern Europe, the supply of low-cost labor dried up. What followed was a surge in technology-based productivity gains and soaring wealth in the investment markets, during what came to be known as "The Roar-

In the late 20th and early 21st century, there was a large-scale movement of low-cost labor from agriculture to factories in China. Part of why that happened when it did was a massive decline in transportation costs as largely automated container ships and ports came online. Additionally, aviation technology advances allowed relatively low-mass goods to be manufactured in Asia and flown to America and Europe for a small fraction of their historical shipping costs. Just as in the previous century, large scale industrialization in a previously low-income area was enabled by the ability to get manufactured goods to where the buyers were at low cost. Following the banking crisis of 2007-2008, just as the world economy appeared to be recovering, first a pandemic swept across the world, then a war broke out in Europe further depressing economic growth. Once again, supply disruptions created a burst of inflation. Again, too, followed a dramatic reduction in the availability of low-cost labor as the government in China turned to authoritarianism and plans for the conquest of neighboring territory.

If that historical pattern continues, and we more and more suspect it will, then what lies ahead in this decade is an accelerating economy accompanied by slowly rising longer-term interest rates and a repeat of the roaring 20s. Only time will tell. What we can say with some certainty is that the U.S. economy is still charging forward and seems to have no shortage of momentum and fuel to carry it further down the

Prop. 2. Texas should create a Border Protection Unit, and deploy additional state law enforcement and military force, to seal the border, to use physical force to prevent illegal entry and trafficking, and to deport illegal aliens to Mexico or to their nations of origin.





One advantage of playing weak twobids is that they frequently cause the opponents to bite off a bit more than they can chew. As with all preemptive bids, weak twos present a challenge to the enemy, who often overreach themselves by bidding a game or slam unwarranted on their combined values. The outcome may then depend on the proficiency of the defenders.

Consider this deal from a team-of-

four match. At the first table, the bidding went as shown, and North-South wound up in three notrump with only 23 high-card points. Declarer then made the contract after West led the queen of spades and East turned up with the king of hearts, allowing South to score one spade, three hearts and five clubs for nine tricks. West's twospade bid at this table thus backfired, pushing North-South into a game they almost surely would not have reached if left to their own devices.

Not surprisingly, the bidding went the same way at the second table, but here the outcome was altogether different after West hit on the inspired opening lead of a diamond. East won the trick with the jack and shifted to a spade, taken by West with the jack.

West led another diamond, won by East with the queen, and East returned another spade. When the smoke cleared, East-West had scored six spade tricks and three diamonds to put the contract down five — 500 points — a terrible penalty to pay for a marginally ambitious contract.

The deal thus demonstrates both the advantage and disadvantage of pre-emptive bids, as well as the difference judgment can make in determining the final outcome.


