Court dismisses petition to remove **Cox from ballot**

The Court of Appeals for the Third Judicial District of Texas on March 14 dismissed an Emergency Petition for Writ of Mandamus by Amber Dankert and Theresa Howard.

The two filed the Emergency Petition requesting the Court to order Village of Salado Administrator Manuel De La Rosa to reject Paul Cox's ballot application and strike his name from the May 4, 2024 ballot for the office of Alderman of the Village of Salado.

Cox failed to denote on his application for a place on the ballot that was filed with the Village of Salado on Jan. 22 whether he had been convicted of a felony.

The Village is bound by state law (Election Code, Section 141.032(b)) to inform candidates if their applications are acceptable within five days of receiving them. The Village failed to

The Third Court of Appeals in a Memorandum Opinion written by Justice Chari L. Kelly stated "Generally, challenges to the eligibility of candidates 'are matters of public concern' and must be prosecuted by the state. Id. (citing Allen v. Fisher, 9 S.W.2d 731, 732 (Tex.1928)). Consequently, a voter having no special interest cannot bring suit seeking the removal of an ineligible candidate. Id. (citing Allen, 9 S.W.2d at 732). Here, relators in their petition give no indication of any interest distinct from that of the general public such as would confer standing."

"Relators bear the burden of demonstrating their entitlement to mandamus relief. See In re Ford Motor Co., 165 S.W.3d 315, 317 (Tex.2005) (per curiam) (orig. proceeding); Walker v. Packer, 827 S.W.2d 833, 837 (Tex.1992) (orig. proceed-

ing)," Justice Kelly stated in the opinion. "Because relators here have failed to assert or demonstrate facts establishing their standing to bring this action, we conclude that they have not demonstrated this Court's jurisdiction to provide the relief sought, and we accordingly dismiss the petition for want of jurisdiction, and dismiss the motion as moot."

In Staples v. State 112 Tex. 61, 245 S.W. 639, the court opined that "It is necessary for the state to be a party where the action is for the benefit of the public at large, though growing out of a primary election. The statute cannot confer a right upon private individuals to act for all where it is shown they have no interest different from all other."

According to the Texas Rules of Appellate Procedure Rule 52.8 52.8 - Action on Petition: "(a) Relief Denied. If the court determines from the petition and any response and reply that the relator is not entitled to the relief sought, the court must deny the petition."

In response to the opinion, Dankert made the following statement, "We are saddened that the general public isn't able to pursue justice, but I am also relieved to have the validation that Cox is in fact ineligible based on the finding. Removal from the ballot would have to be sought by his opposers in the election."

Salado Village Voice reached out to the other candidates on the ballot (Michael MacDonald and Zach Hurst), neither of which said that they planned to file with the court. Hurst was out of the country on vacation at the time of the call.

"Choosing an elected official should always be decided by the votes of our village community members in the spirit of fair and open civic elections held within the Village of Salado," Mac-Donald stated.


Officers reviewed security camera footage revealing the subject to be a white male in his mid to late 50's driving a white in color Chevy Silverado quad cab truck.

Market & Economic Update

Fed reserve not likely to lower rates anytime soon

The Markets

Our beloved old and perhaps a bit senile S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), continuing to serve as the public face of the U.S. stock market, closed out the week at 5117.09, down 0.13%, or, in other words, about where it was last week and the week before. The shuffling SPX though is now 7.28% higher this year, and an astounding 29.21% higher than a year ago. Interestingly, it is now 29.13% higher than at this date three years ago, meaning that it has made all its gains in the last three years in the last 12 months. For those who like tracking annual average compound returns, that is about 9% per year for the trailing three years. As inflation has averaged 5.3% over that same period, the real return was about 4% per year when we throw in the dividends, which is very close to the real average annual return of the broad stock market going back decades. Our other stock market indicator, the CRSP US Mid-Cap Value Index fell 0.73% for the week to 2594.80, but is up 3.18% year-to-date, and is 15.26% higher than a year ago.

On the debt side of the market, the benchmark 10year U.S. Treasury note ended the business day on Friday yielding 4.31% up about 5% from last week's 4.09%, continuing a slow increase in longer-term interest rates. Once more though, the highest interest rates were in the lessthan-six-month maturities with the one-to-three-month T-bills all yielding around 5.5%, annualized. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) ended the US market week at \$81.04 per barrel as it too crept slowly upward.


The Economy

Once more, the headline economic news for the week that ended on March 15 was about what the Federal Reserve may or may not do in the light of new information about inflation and the strength of the American economy. First, the Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) reported that US employers added 275,000 employees in February, about 77,000 more than expected, although it did reduce January's new job numbers by 24,000. That puts the three-month average at 265,000, an annualized increase of 3,180,000 workers, or about 2% of the workforce. Why is that a big deal? If we presume that the newly hired workers are exactly as productive as the existing workforce, that rate of hiring increases the U.S. GDP and the cashflow available to families by that same 2%. If we further assume that instead

of the over-the-top productivity gains, we have seen in the past couple of years, we drop back to our long-term average of about 1.7%, it will increase our GDP by a whopping 3.7% over the next twelve months. There are a lot of assumptions there, but there is no sign of the much-prophesized recession in those numbers. What is there is evidence that there will be more money for consumers to spend and therefore the potential for further inflation.

Then, on Tuesday, March 12, the BLS hit us with its monthly Consumer Prince Index Summary (CPI). For the month of February, seasonally adjusted inflation rose 0.4% after rising 0.3% in January. The trailing three-month average CPI then came to 0.3% or at an annualized rate of 3.66%, well above the 2% target of the Federal Reserve. For the trailing 12 months the CPI has risen 3.2%. Worse, if we pull out the often-volatile food and fuel categories to arrive at the so-called "core" inflation rate, it was even higher, running at 3.8%. But the BLS was not done with us. On Thursday it released the Producer Price Index, a measure of wholesale prices. To cut to the chase, wholesale prices too have a three-month trailing average rise of about 3% per year. Finally, later the 14th, the Census Bureau put the icing on the cake as it announced that retail spending by consumers rose 0.6% in February, seasonally adjusted but not adjusted for inflation. That number, after subtracting inflation for the month, was consistent with the trailing 12 month rise in retail spending of about 2%.

What do all those numbers mean? The future is always uncertain, but the trend is reasonably clear. We are in an economy where 3% inflation seems to be the norm, as well as a growth in our GDP of something around 3.7% per year. Note that inflation is subtracted from the growth before reporting the GDP. Our conclusion from that is the Federal Reserve is not going to be in any hurry to reduce short-term rates and longer-term rates are likely to continue to rise. In an interesting sidelight, consumer credit levels appear to have leveled off with default rates lower than before the pandemic. Since credit balances are not adjusted for inflation, the current 1.7% annual growth rate in consumer credit balances is, in real terms, a steady reduction in debt. In short, we again report that the U.S. economy is still barreling along under a full head of steam with no red flags flying anywhere.

lence in all fields of higher education and to engage the community of scholars in service to others."

Since its founding, more than 1.5 million members have been initiated into Phi Kappa Phi. Some of the organization's notable members include former President Jimmy Carter, NASA astronaut Wendy Lawrence, novelist John Grisham and YouTube co-founder Chad

Hurley. Each year, Phi Kappa Phi awards \$1.3 million to outstanding students and members through graduate and dissertation fellowships, undergraduate study abroad grants, funding for post-baccalaureate development, and grants for local, national and international literacy initiatives. Consider this deal where South won the opening diamond lead with the king and led a club at trick two, successfully finessing the jack. Then, imbued with the notion that dummy's clubs were his primary source of tricks, and lacking the entry to his hand to repeat the finesse, South continued with the ace, hoping the king would fall.

When the king did not appear,

South played a third round of clubs to establish the suit. West won and led a diamond to dummy's ace and the contract went down one. Declarer finished with six clubs and two diamonds, while the defenders scored two aces, two diamonds and a club.

South would have fared better had he not put all his hopes on West's holding the K-x of clubs and focused more on the possibility of West's holding the K-x-x. South could have covered both possibilities by playing dummy's king of spades at trick three, abandoning clubs temporarily. Had he done that, he would have finished with at least nine tricks.

If West took the ace of spades and returned a diamond, South could make 12 tricks by cashing his spades and repeating the club finesse. If West did not take the first spade, South could then revert to clubs to finish with nine tricks.

While it is granted that the king-ofspades play at trick three is not easy to think of — considering the magnetic attraction of dummy's clubs — there can be no denying that it is the right play.

Left undiscussed here is the possibility that a wily East holding the doubleton king of clubs might not have taken the king to lure South into taking a second club finesse — but that's a subject for a whole other column.






Estimated Total Cost of Public Improvements: The total cost of the public improvements to be funded by the District is approximately \$15,000,000.00, including issuance and required reserves related to the proposed issuance of bonds to fund the construction of the Authorized Improvements. The total estimated cost of the Improvement Area #1 Projects is expected to be \$7,050,179.00, including issuance and required reserves related to the proposed issuance of bonds to fund the construction of the Improvement Area #1 Projects.

District Boundaries: The District includes approximately 188.85 acres generally located to the north of FM 2268, south of Royal Street, and east of IH 35 (the "Property"). Improvement Area #1, comprised of approximately 65.508 acres, is located within the Property as generally depicted on Exhibit A attached hereto.

Materials: The field notes, a copy of the proposed service and assessment plan, and assessment roll are available for inspection at the Salado Municipal Building, 301 N. Stagecoach, Salado, Texas 76571.

All written and oral objections will be considered at the hearing.
