Village approves PID assessment for Sanctuary

EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

Following a public hearing on the matter, Village aldermen April 4 approved an assessment roll for the Sanctuary East Public Improvement District and levying assessments against property within Improvement Area #1 of the District.

The PID financing ordinance was approved unanimously on a motion by Paul Cox that received a second from Jasen Graham.

The value of improvements to be financed by the PID assessment is \$5.5 million for Area 1.

The total assessment for Lot Type 1 is \$31,549.99. A 30-year payout will have an annual assessment of approximately \$2,400. Over the life of a 30-year assessment, a total of \$71,903.00 will be paid.

The total assessment for Lot Type 2 is \$34,507.80. A 30-year payout will have an annual assessment of approximately \$2,620.00. Over the life of a 30-year assessment, a total of \$78,643.91 will be paid.

The total assessment for Lot Type 3 is \$38,287.33. A 30-year payout will have an annual assessment of approximately \$2,900. Over the life of a 30-year assessment, a total of \$87,257.29 will be paid for Lot type 3 properties.

The total annual assessment for properties in the PID is more than \$419,000.

According to the PID attorney, for properties that have not been sold, the developer will be accountable for the annual assessments.

In other business, aldermen unanimously approved a Conditional Use Permit to Correcaminos Tejas LLC Provecho Tejas to allow for mixed beverage sales on property at 109 Royal St.

within the Historic District.

Aldermen also approved a Conditional Use Permit for an accessory building identified as a pool house at 730 Baines St.

Aldermen also issued conditional approval on the public improvements of Drakes Landing Phase II with the stipulation that the developer enter into a 10% maintenance bond, sidewalks will be constructed by the builders and street lights will be installed by Oncor. The approval came on a motion by Jasen Graham receiving a second from Bert Henry.

Aldermen approved a motion by Bert Henry receiving a second by Jasen Graham declaring March 29 to be annual Vietnam War Veteran's Day. The last combat troops left Vietnam March 29, 1973.

Aldermen approved a motion by Rodney Bell (second by Henry) for an Advanced Funding Agreement for the Royal Street between Main St. and Smith Branch Rd. rehabilitation project. The total cost of the project is \$2,241,750. The Federal funds for the project are \$1,680,000. State funds for the project are \$99,750. Village \$462,000.

On a motion by Rodney Bell and second by Paul Cox, aldermen approved the release of a 125.003 acre tract of land from the Extra Territorial Jurisdiction of the Village. The property is located at FM 2268 and connects to I-35 service road south of Bloomer Trailer manufacturing.

It took three motions with Mayor Michael Coggin casting the deciding vote to approve the consent agenda, which included minutes of the previous meeting and the appointment of Lynette Mc-Cain Jones and Glen Bowen to the Tourism Advisory

The last day to register was April 4.








All eyes on sky during total solar eclipse

American economy is charging ahead

The Markets


The good old S&P 500 aged to pull most of the fat out of the fire for the first **Update** week in the second quarter, closing at 5204.34, down by Jeffrey W. McClure 0.95% after being further down in the dumps following a sheaf of good economic news. A series of reports indicating that the U.S. economy is doing well and far better than economists expected this year set the traders back who were hoping for some bad news that would encourage the Fed to cut rates sooner rather than later. We are of the opinion that good news is good, but we seem to be in small minority. That decline leaves the SPX up about 9.11% this year, and almost 27% since this time last year. As we have seen consistently, the total threeyear gains in the Index are about the same as the oneyear return. The CRSP US Mid-Cap Value Index, our other followed market indicator, ended the week at 2651.58, having dropped 1.6%. It is up 5.44% this year and about 16% in the

last twelve months. The benchmark ten-year U.S. Treasury note wound up the week with a yield of 4.39%, its highest yield since November of last year as the 20-year bond yield rose to 4.65%. The highest yields remained in the very shortest maturity bills with, as usual, the 2-month maturity bill paying an annualized rate of 5.50%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) slid upward all week to \$86.71 per barrel, once more driven higher by an expanding U.S. econo-

The Economyu

Some weeks there is so little economic news that economists and economic writers have little to read. Other weeks the data come pouring in like a tsunami. This week was one of the latter. The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported on Friday that U.S. employers added a seasonally adjusted 303,000 jobs in March, net of layoffs, quits, and the like. Considering that the American economy needs to only add about 150,000 per month to remain static, that it doubled that number

As we have mentioned before, the key to understanding how the unemployment rate could remain less than 4% while employees are being hired in mass, is an immigration-based growth The theme in the Amerrate in our national labor ican economy remains solforce. This has happened before, notably in the mid-1920s when masses of immigrants poured into the United States, mainly from eastern and southern Europe. Despite the unexpectedly high number of new hires, there are still about 8.8 million unfilled job openings in the nation. Many of the new employees are working in healthcare and hospitality, where about half of all newly filled jobs were so far this year. That news reenforces Goldman Sachs' announcement that one of the prime reasons we are not in a recession while the rest of the world is either in one or nearly so has been our relatively high immigration numbers. Despite the robust economic growth over the last sixteen months, the manufacturing sector has been

slipping. That reversed in March as the Institute for Supply Management (ISM) manufacturing index rose from 47.8 to 50.3 on a scale where numbers at 50 or above equate to expansion. The change in direction appears to have been driven by production increases and is being reinforced by expanding new orders. Meanwhile the ISM non-manufacturing index fell to 51.4 from last month's 52.7. While that is still an indication that economic expansion is underway, it has now fallen to a level that is historically sustainable.

All that good news was, of course, reported as bad news by some news media companies who have a lot riding on the economy doing badly or are fearful that

the Federal Reserve will not cut interest rates soon. Many commentators continue to insist that the Fed will make three or even four interest rate cuts soon, but Fed Governor Bostik warned that he believes there will be no interest rate cuts before the fourth quar-

idly different from anything we have seen in the past half century or more. Interest-rate sensitive sectors remain in a slump while the services sector, which is 80% of our economy, is still growing strongly. Corporate America appears to be doing well, particularly in those companies that have publicly traded shares. The Philadelphia Fed's Survey of Professional Forecasters indicates a consensus of a 3.8% growth in GDP for 2024, while equity analysts appear to agree that average public company earnings will rise about 11.5%. Despite the clear evidence of expansion, including average wages being up about 4.1% from a year ago, many consumers report they believe we are in a recession. Despite the near record low unemployment levels, and increases in wages, and orders, the belief persists. It also appears that what a person believes is happening in the economy is highly dependent on how they get their news. Generally speaking, those who depend on politically focused television sources believe we are in bad shape, while those who read the news, either in newspapers, or online, have a much more realistic and optimistic view of our current economic situa-

We are pleased to report once again that the American economy is charging ahead at or even a little ahead of its long-term capacity. It just doesn't get much better than this.

Colorblindness is America's most transgressive idea

Writer Coleman Hughes went on "The View" and was greeted almost as though he had shown up wearing a white hood.

Hughes, a soft-spoken black intellectual who is a political independent, was talking about his new book, "The End of Race Politics: Arguments for a Colorblind

Once upon a time, colorblindness was an uncontroversial idea. It was considered a core American ideal and worth aspiring to, even if we were failing to live up to it. In recent decades, though, it has run into a buzz-saw of opposition. It clashes with the Left's near-theological commitment to racial preferences, especially on college campuses, and with fashionable new forms of left-wing ra-

So it is naive, out-of-date, and, worse, even a tool of oppression used by sneaky racists to hide their malignant designs in lofty rhetoric. This was the attitude of co-host Sunny Hostin when Hughes showed up on set. She declared that colorblindness has been "co-opted" by conservatives and that the widely respected Hughes is a "charlatan." For the offense, mind you, of arguing that people should be treated equally regardless

of their race. Thoughtless even by the standards of a panelist of "The View," Hostin was easily outmatched by Hughes, who pushed back without getting flustered or raising his voice. He even won occasional applause from the studio audience for ideas that still, despite all that has been done to belittle them, have strong common-sense appeal in

As Coleman notes in his book, a devotion to colLowry

orblindness runs through some of the most honored writers and activists in American history, the likes of Frederick Douglass, Wendell Phillips, Zora Neale Hurston, A. Philip Randolph, Bayard Rustin and, of course, Martin Luther King Jr.

The Left always wants to retroactively enlist MLK for woke racial causes and thinking, but Hughes convincingly locates the great civil rights leader firmly within the colorblind tradi-

In a statement that might now earn him an unfriendly reception on college campuses (or on the set of "The View"), King maintained, "Black supremacy is as dangerous as white supremacy, and God is not interested merely in the freedom of black men and brown men and yellow men. God is interested in the freedom of the whole human race."

Such a majestic belief in what unites us as persons and Americans can only scandalize today's socalled "anti-racists," whom Hughes deems, more accurately, "neo-racists." They have much in common with the white supremacists that they array themselves against. "They both deny our common humanity,' Hughes writes. "They both deny that all races are created equal. They both agree that some races are superior to others, and they both agree that not all people deserve to be treated equally in society."

The neo-racist project is nonetheless ascendant in America's elite institutions,

and a narrative of racial conflict has gained more traction in recent years. Hughes attributes the sense of worsening race relations since 2013 to the rise of social media and the accelerated spread of racially charged false stories and myths. We've talked, and clicked, our way into believing we are in a state of racial crisis.

The neo-racists the dissension by attributing any racial disparity in America to racism and ignoring the influence of demographics, geography and especially culture. They disregard, or disparage. all the indicators of racial progress, which are inconvenient to their simplistic condemnations of American society as fundamentally and irredeemably racist.

For Hughes, the alternatives are "a grim world in which whites and non-white eternally swap the roles of the oppressor and the oppressed," or a world where we "recommit ourselves to the principles that motivated the civil rights movement." This wouldn't seem a difficult choice. Yet, the very notion of colorblindness is now anathema to much of progressive America. Sunny Hostin is sadly representative in her reflexive hostility to the belief that we should -- and can -- treat one another without regard to race. So much the worse for her.

Along with taking out a large commercial loan (to be paid with taxpayer monies).

The proposed new 6,200 SF building, with seven bathrooms, would include both the Village office and the police station. "He piled his chaps on his saddle and we sat down. For how long, I wanted to know, had he been a vaquero. For a time of twenty years, he told me, from the age of six years.

Your father also? I asked. Si. Un vaquero.

And your grandfather? Un vaquero.

There was a silence. Vaqueros siempre.

Vaqueros always, he said finally. Desde el comienzo. Since the beginning."

In the early 1970s, noted Texas historian Joe Frantz offered Bill Wittliff a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity-to visit a ranch in northern Mexico where the vaqueros still worked cattle in traditional ways. Wittliff photographed the vaqueros as they went about daily chores that had changed little since the first Mexican cowherders learned to work cattle from a horse's back. Wittliff captured a way of life that now exists only in memory and in the photographs included in this exhibition.

Vaquero: Genesis of the Texas Cowboy features photographs with bilingual narrative text that reveal the muscle, sweat, and drama that went into roping a calf in thick brush or breaking a wild horse in the saddle. This exhibition is available in wall-hanging and abridged freestanding ver-







Wichita Falls missed three shots early in the first 13 minutes of second half and the Lady Eagles defended against a corner kick with 34:15 left in the match.



Some plays in bridge are not seen very often, largely because the opportunity to use them is relatively rare. But when they arise, they can spell the difference between success and failure, so the conscientious player must continuously be on the lookout for them.

hearts and West led the king of clubs. This was followed at each table by a spade shift at trick two.

At the first table, declarer won the spade with dummy's king and, in an attempt to reduce the possibility of a spade ruff, led a heart to the ace and continued with the jack.

This approach failed to produce the desired result when West took the jack with the king and shifted to a diamond. Declarer put up dummy's king, but East won with the ace and returned a spade, ruffed by West, so the contract went down one.

At the second table, West's spade shift at trick two was also taken in dummy, but South found a superior line of play that enabled him to make the contract. At trick three, he led the queen of clubs from dummy and, after East followed low, discarded the ten of

West took the queen with the ace and switched to a diamond, but the bird had by this time flown the coop. South ruffed, played the ace and queen of hearts and easily scored the rest of the tricks. He had executed a "scissors coup" — a play designed to cut communications between the defenders in order to defuse an impending threat.


