Porch & Planet Festival April 20

The Second Annual Salado Porch and Planet Festival will be held on April 20 at a variety of Salado locations. The event, organized by Salado's Music Friendly Community Advisory Board, will provide an afternoon of music, food, Kid Friendly, and Earth Day activities where residents and visitors can stroll the streets the sidewalks, visit various sites and businesses while enjoying the streets of Salado.

The Salado Porch and Planet Festival will take place on the front porches, stoops, yards, or driveways of businesses along Main Street from Salado Plaza Drive to College Hill Drive and on Royal Street and Rock Creek Dr.

Events will include Kid Friendly activities as well as The Native Plant Society's Spring Plant Sale held from 8 a.m-3 p.m. on the Creekside Grounds near the Barrow Brewing Company. The Cancer Fundraising BBQ Cook-Off will feature as many as 20 entries spread out all along Main Street starting at 11 a.m. and ending at 3 p.m. with the Awards Celebration held at Lucy's Icehouse located at 805 North Main Street.

Throughout the day, there will be an Environmental Faire at the grounds surrounding the Salado Civic Center featuring several of the areas environmental organizations including Clearwater Water Conservation District, Master Naturalist, Wildlife Certification Program, Homegrown National Parks, Native Plant Society of Texas, and many others.

The grounds of the Halley House will host student entrepreneurs with booths on the property.

As part of the festival, the Salado Historical Society invites guests to tour the meticulously restored log cabins on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center, offering a glimpse into the past. The Boles-Aiken Cabin was discovered in 1986 by local real estate developer Bill Bartlett. Adjacent to the Boles-Aiken Cabin are the Writer's Cabin and the Denman Log Cabin, each with its own unique history. Visitors can also enjoy the serene outdoor seating areas and picnic spots nestled under the shade of large trees.

Sirena Fest moves to Belton festival that you have come

Legacy CTX, Inc. (which changed its name from Legacy Salado in November 2023) announced via social media April 14 that it is changing the name of Sirena Creekside Carneval back to the original Sirena Fest.

The group also announced that Sirena Fest will be moving to Belton. "While we love scenic Pace Park in Salado, we are so excited to be spreading out in Belton's downtown square," the group stated on its Facebook page. "Belton City Officials and the Belton Chamber of Commerce have been terrific to work with, and we are looking forward to putting on another amazing event with their support."

The group is also moving to a different time of year. "The next festival will not take place until 2025," the group stated. "We want to make sure to bring you the kind of quality mermaid to expect from us, so we are giving ourselves ample time to plan for the changes and challenges a new venue will bring."

Legacy CTX, Inc. board members are Amber Preston-Dankert, Theresa Howard, Michelle Lenis and Linda Lopez, according to the group's website.

Sirena Fest will place April 26, 2025.

Sirena Fest began in 2017. Tiffany Schreiner, working with other local businesses and enthusiast, launched Sirena Fest in October 2017.

The festival was named after Sirena, the bronze mermaid sculpture by Salado sculptor Troy Kelley. Kelley and friends dedicated Sirena at 12:01 a.m. on January 1, 1986 to be the first public art dedicated during the Texas Sesquicentennial.

The Legend of Sirena, a native Tonkawa maiden who was doomed (or tricked) the day she met a magical catfish, is a story that is dear

to the residents and tourists who come to Salado. Troy Kelley's bronze sculpture of the Tonkawa mermaid and the catfish that tricked her are an icon and one of the most important landmarks in this Central Texas town.

The late Jackie Mills, a local playwright, published the legend in a book, Sirena of Salado. She also incorporated it into the Legends of Salado play, performed every summer for more than 30 years.

Artist Troy Kelley learned of the move when he began to get texts from friends.

In 2017, funds from Sirena Fest benefited Keep Salado Beautiful. From 2018 to 2022, funds have benefited the All Abilities Playground, which has been built at Pace Park. In 2023, funds benefited the placement of a Little Pantry on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center.

Change

April sales tax rebate up slightly for Village

Bell County showed a 5.84% increase in sales tax revenues compared to the previous year. The Village of Salado showed a 0.57% increase in the April sales tax checks compared to April 2023. Nine cities in Bell County showed increases this month.

Village of Salado received \$54,682.46 compared to \$53,466.69 in April 2023. For the year, the Village has received \$287,046,27, which is 5.6% more than the \$271,812.36 paid through April 2023.

The Village is one of three Bell County cities to levy a 1-cent sales tax, while seven other Bell County cities levy a 1.5 cent sales tax and Rogers levies a 1.25 cent sales

The Salado Public Library District and Bell County each levy a half-cent sales

For that half-cent tax, Salado Public Library District received a \$50,036.89 April check, which was 5.84% more than last April's payment of \$47,271,70. For the year, the Library District has received \$236m261.77, which is 7.71% more than the \$219,337,44 paid through April 2023.

Bell County received \$2.57 million in April, which is 4.56% more than what was paid in April 2023. For the year, Bell County has received \$10.92 million, which is 0.3% less than the \$10.95 million paid through April 2023

China will try to export its way out of economic slump

Our dear old S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), acting very much its age, (It is, after all, 101 years old!) got spooked by the bureaucrats at the Bureau of Labor Statistics, causing its minions (stock traders) to bolt for the proverbial door, taking the Index level down to 5123.41, a decline of 1.55% for the week. It finished the week 7.41% higher so far this year and about 24% up from this time last year. The CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, not to be outdone by its older, larger, brother, fell 2.86% to 2575.07 but managed to hang on to a 2.4% gain this year and a very respectable 10.75% rise from this time last year. The inflation fear was suddenly compounded at the end of the week by news that U.S. warships are headed for the shores of Israel in anticipation of an Iranian attack on


The benchmark ten-year U.S. Treasury note, apparently missing the message that war is bad for investments, ended the U.S. workweek yielding 4.5%, up from last week's 4.39% as it continued its uneven but powerful decline in value as its yield has risen most weeks this year. The highest (annualized) rates were, as usual, at the shortest maturities with the 2-month bill hanging in there at 5.5%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) apparently missed the message too, as the price ended the U.S. workweek at \$85.51, about where it was last week.

The Economy

High inflation or not high inflation, that is the question. It is the question that a lot of folks are asking, but it may be the wrong question. The very bureaucratic Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) dropped their monthly bombshell on Wednesday with the release of their "Consumer Price Index Summary" and it reported an "unadjusted" twelve-month trailing consumer price increase of 3.5%. That was relatively unpleasant, but for those of us who delve beyond the headlines, the monthly numbers for February and

will not be surprised.

So, what is the question we should be asking? The prime issue here is whether those areas where prices suddenly surged can keep on surging. The answer is probably, "No." We suspect that prices will stabilize in the coming months unless there is a major escalation in one or more of the wars plaguing the other side of the world. The consensus among those who actually do a bit of thinking before spouting off was that the hoped for three interest rate cuts from the Fed this year are probably off the table. That, in our opinion, is not a bad thing. It is reasonably important, in our opinion, that we remember for most of the past several decades, 3% inflation has been the normal rate. If we continue to have the booming economy we are seeing now, and let's hope we do, then demand will continue to be high, particularly for services, and more people will be employed at higher wage rates. What's not to like about that? It also means though that we are return-

ing to a more or less "normal" economic condition in which short term rates will be between 3% and 4% but longer-term Treasury rates will rise to 6% and above. That sounds extreme if you do not remember the U.S. economy prior to the Great Recession of 2008-2009. That Great Recession created an abnormal imbalance in the U.S. economy, resulting in near zero rates through the pandemic and out the other side. That imbalance necessitated an abnormally low set of rates, then many folks assumed those abnormally low rates and inflation to be a forever thing rather than a shortterm reaction (which in the long-haul is exactly what it

Then, as the week drew to a close, the same BLS released the Producer Price Index (PPI) (wholesale prices). After rising 0.4% and 0.6% respectively in January and February, presaging the CPI numbers we are seeing, the PPI for Total Final Demand rose only 0.2%, or about 2.4% annualized. Wholesale prices tend to drive retail prices with the only major addition to the equation being labor costs. Better yet, Processed Goods for Final Demand (things that only need to be put on the shelf to sell) actually fell 0.5% in March. If labor prices do not rise precipitously and wholesale prices fall, then retail inflation has a short half-life.

Last on the list this week are growing reports that mainland China is making a shot at exporting their way back to economic health. A growing body of evidence suggests that Chinese manufacturers are making a substantially larger quantity of products than current demand will support. That means that the price of all those goods will need to,

The Bible is America's book

Of all the objectionable things Donald Trump has ever done, selling a Bible would seem to rank pretty far down the list.

Yet his marketing, along with Lee Greenwood, of a God Bless the U.S.A. Bible for \$59.99 has occasioned a couple of news cycles of outrage. The Bible has an American flag cover and accompanying American historical documents, including the Declaration of Independence, as well as the words to Greenwood's iconic patriotic song.

Hawking the Bible like it's a digital trading card or a personalized sneaker -- to name a couple of other products Trump has pushed in his inimitable style -- is tasteless and unpresidential, needless to say.

Dwight Eisenhower didn't market golf balls, and it was notoriously Jimmy Carter's brother -- not the president -- who sold a specially branded beer.

Nor should anyone confuse the handiwork of Thomas Jefferson -- or Lee Greenwood -- with the Word of God.

But the incensed commentary makes it sound as though Trump is the first person to sell an edition of a Bible catering to a niche market. In reality, there's a dizzying array of Bibles in this country for people with different interests, whether it's the law enforcement Bible, busy mom's Bible or outdoorsman's Bible with a camouflage cover and "devotions that tie directly to the sports of hunting, fishing, backpacking or any outdoor activity.'

The God Bless the U.S.A. Bible was first published in 2021 and already had competition in the American Patriot's Bible from 2009.

The fact is that selling Bibles is a very American

venture, and the Bible, particularly the King James Version endorsed by Trump, is a very American book, in fact, the American book.

the Mayflower might have brought the first copy of the King James Bible to our shores. The historian of Christianity Mark Noll notes that the Bible was often the only book that families owned.

ing Bible salesman Parson Weems (famous for his biography of George Washington) was marveling at the hot market: "I tell you, this is the very season and age of the Bible. Bible dictionaries, Bible tales, Bible stories -- Bibles plain or paraphrased, Carey's Bibles, Collins' Bibles, Clarke's Bibles, Kimptor's Bibles, no matter what or whose, all, all will go down, so wide is the crater of public appetite at this time."

According to Noll, between 1794 and 1815, 186 novels were published in America compared to 246 editions of the New Testament or the full Bible. Almost all of the Bibles published before 1840 were the King James Version. Already early in the 19th century, he writes, "printer-publishers were creating and meeting demand by packaging the King James Version in many sizes, shapes, and prices.'

Constant innovations in printing and distribution meant that the Bible and Bible-related literature led to what another historian calls "the birth of mass media in

America."

The King James Version played an enormous role in shaping America's anti-monarchical attitudes during the Revolution. And the way the Bible pervaded and shaped American life was one reason that the country's early leaders hoped a state establishment of religion was unnecessary -- thanks to the Bible, they could have Christianity, and a virtuous society, without Christendom.

The King James Bible became foundational to American rhetoric and literature such that it is impossible to imagine the work of the likes of Martin Luther King Jr. or William Faulkner without it. Even as its influence has declined, we often quote or echo it without even realizing it.

The great influence of the King James Version in American history," Noll has said, "came precisely because it was so widely available; because precisely its words, and what the words communicated, had entered so deeply into the consciousness of so many Americans, and particularly of otherwise voiceless Americans."

The God Bless the U.S.A. Bible won't be a signal contribution to this tradition, but neither is it a betrayal of it.


The Lady Eagles took eight shots in the match with Hollywood taking three of them, Reese Lange taking two, Sydney Lange taking two and Cade Harris taking one.
