# Chamber recognizes businesses, citizens for work

Salado Chamber of Commerce held its annual awards banquet April 25 at The Venue, recognizing the Citizen of the Year, Business of the Year, Hall of Fame, Volunteer of the Year, Rising Star, Shooting Star and Chairman's awards.

Afterward Bill Hall gaveled an auction of items donated by local businesses to raise money for the Chamber.

#### Citizen of the Year

The 2024 Citizen of the Year "has volunteered with numerous organizations within our community" in the 20+ years she has lived in Salado, according to Dr. Michael Novotny.

Among those:

- Hosting an interdenominational Bible study
- Serving as a Salado ISD mentor and as a mentor board member.
- Serving as a Salado Museum board member.
- Starting the Salado Escalera program to help students who were learning English.
- Serving as a Salado United Methodist Church committee member
- Helping start the Salado Senior Center and serving as a Senior Center board member
- Serving as a Bell County Emergency Services District #1 board member
- Serving as a member and the treasurer of the Salado Lions Club, including working at fundraising events like the pancake breakfasts and 5K's, conducting vision screenings for our elementary school students, and participating in highway cleanups on FM 2268.

"She served as a member of the Salado ISD school board for 15 years, which means she was elected five times as each term is three years," Dr. Novotny said. "This also puts her in a three way tie with Jeff Kelley and Darrell Street for the longest tenure as a school board member in the history of our school district."

"She served as the school board president for eight of those 15 years, which is an all-time record that no other board member in our school district has ever come close to," he said.

"She is an outstanding servant leader and is so generous with her time and her money," he said. "She truly cares about our community and residents."

"I think we sometimes take for granted how blessed we are to live in this great country, this great state, and this great community," he added, "and Salado is an even better place because of everything this person has done, and continues to do, for our community."

He then introduced Dr. Kim Bird who accepted the award.

"From exceptional service to its clients or in contributions that the business makes to the local community and beyond," Bob Hargrove said, "the winner this year truly is extremely deserving for all the amazing things they do."

"The winner this year also holds a special place in our hearts because of the work that they do," Laura Hargrove of Bentons said of the 2023 Salado Chamber of Commerce Business of the Year. "For over 12 years now, this business and art gallery has been a staple in the Salado community."

"From community events that bring people into town to visit and shop, to helping establish the Royal Street Arts District and the Royal Street Art Walk, to donating beautiful works of art to various auctions to help raise money for charities and non-profits," Bob Hargrove said, "they do so much for everyone around them."

"Not to mention the art they make brings such joy to patrons who purchase items from their gallery or commission custom pieces from them," Laura added. "It is always one-of-a-kind, immediately recognizable, and quite literally made in one of the hottest places in Salado."

"One of the things that makes an artist truly exceptional is their passion not just for their craft but to teach others their craft," Bob said. "They do this in numerous ways from participating in the Royal Street Art Walk, Blow-Your-Own events, and having bleachers set up so folks can come and watch them create most days of the week."

One thing that makes a business "truly exceptional is how they can come through adversity with grace and increased fortitude," Laura said. "From growing pains to road construction to pandemics...this business took them in stride, pivoted, and pulled through."

The Salado Chamber of Commerce added Chris and Karen Hale to its Hall of Fame during the annual awards banquet April 29 at The Venue.

"Chris Hale was the kind of person who believed in volunteerism," said Christy Goodfellow, owner of Christy's of Salado, which was next door to the Hales' shop Classics on Main. "In fact, he was always quick to volunteer Karen. Because Chris believed Karen could do anything, he knew her talents were limitless. With his passion and her gifts, they made a great team!"

Hale came to Salado in the late 1980s as the food and beverage manager of Mill Creek country club. "He immediately fell in love with the uniqueness of this community and the people that make it so special. Some of his first friends here were the artisans and shop owners that made Salado what it is today," Goodfellow said.

He worked for Texas author A.C. Greene and Jim and Ann Benton, owners of Bentons Jewelry.

Then, "his entrepreneurial spirit caught up with him and he launched Royal Street Provisions Bed & Breakfast in the year 2000, the same year he married Karen Rathgeber," Goodfellow said. "The Inn was a labor of love for Chris and Karen and they worked tirelessly to make it a premier lodging and event center for Salado."

They purchased Classics on Main in 2005 in the heart of Salado where they spent the next 15 years.

"Through all of his career changes, Chris remained active and faithful to the Salado Chamber of Commerce; serving on various committees, not to mention his two terms as president," Goodfellow said. "While serving as president he saw the need for Grace Jones's dream to come to fruition. He had an integral part in forming the Salado Community Foundation which began as an arm of the chamber and is now a thriving non-profit organization serving the citizens of Salado."

"Chris was an incredible shop neighbor to all of us in Salado," Kaye Coachman, owner of 21 Main, next door to Classics. "He was always willing to give others guidance based on his experiences. # **Comparing apples** to oranges drives everyone bananas

The Markets

If ever there were a week for the market to draw back on current news, it was this one, ending on 4/26, but instead, it roared ahead, suggesting an old saying, "A bull market climbs a wall of worry." The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) closed out the week at 5099.96, about as close to the psychological 5100 mark as one can get, after rising 2.67% for the week. That pleasant gain still leaves it down almost 2% in the last month but up 4.27% for the last three months and 6.92% this calendar year. It also leaves the SPX up over 22% from a year ago. As has been the norm of late, all of the 22% gain we have seen in the last three years has been in the last twelve months. Our other stock market indicator, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, closed the week at 2592.95, up 1.18% for the week and 12.26% for one year.

On the other side of the market, where debt is king, the ten-year U.S. Treasury note ended the week yielding 4.67%, up from 4.62% last week. The rise in longer-term interest rates has rarely been dramatic but is far more like the fable of the frog in a slowly heating pan of water, rising gradually but no less significantly. The 10-year T-note paid out only 3.95% at the beginning of 2024, and thus, the yield has risen about 17% so far this year. The difficulty is that the market value of a bond falls when interest rates rise, so bond investors have seen some impressive losses this year. Even that is only a small part of the big picture. The Wall Street Journal's Jason Zweig noted that long-term bond funds have lost nearly a third of their value over the past three years. Meanwhile, West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) crept up about half a percent for the week to \$83.68 but about 17% higher than at the beginning of the year and 11.9% higher than a

see the ongoing economic status of an economy, and the popular methods sometimes seem to make little sense. For example, when it comes to Gross Domestic Product (GDP), each quarter when our beloved Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA), buried deep in the bowels of the Commerce Department, announces its quarterly GDP report, the top line figure is given as an annualized number, as though it were for the whole year, thus giving us four annual growth rates each year with each one, in effect, suggesting that will be the rate for the last 12 months. But, when the same BEA releases its inflation data, known as the Personal Consumption Expenditures Price Index (PCE), or the Labor Department releases the Consumer Price Index (CPI), the news media jump on the trailing 12-month actual data. The result this week, if you just read the headlines, was that our GDP grew at a 1.6% annualized rate in the first quarter, while inflation was up 3.4%, measured by the Labor Department's Consumer Price Index (CPI) over the last year. If that sounds to you like we are going backward, you are not alone. In fact, inflation is subtracted from the GDP before it is calculated, and to compound the issue, the inflation number that was subtracted was not the CPI but rather the PCE.

Who Confused? wouldn't be? The result is that apples are measured against oranges to get (and drive us) bananas. First, let's stick with one measurement tool the Fed pays attention to: the BEA's Personal Income and Outlays report. Why? Because they calculate the GDP. Over the last 12 months, accord-

ing to the BEA, real prices in the United States have risen 2.7%, while the current nominal dollar Gross Domestic Product (GDP) has risen 5.4%. Subtracting PCE inflation from the gross, nominal GDP gives us a real, inflation-adjusted GDP growth rate of 2.4454% or rounded, about 2.45% for the last twelve months. That is, in our opinion, an important number because the infrastructure of the United States is probably at its maximum capacity at about 2.5% real, inflation-adjusted growth. Moreover, it is consistent with the very low levels of unemployment we are seeing and explains why there has been an impressive quantity of net employment growth over the last year.

As massively complicated as all that sounds, we haven't even touched on the fact that the CPI inflation report measures one set of numbers and multipliers while the PCE measures another. The CPI is based on a largely fixed set of weights, while the PCE is adjusted for where consumers are actually spending their

While there is much more than can be said about the measures of economic health in these United States of America, suffice to say that despite the various and currently pessimistic readings of the mixed measurements, the overall picture remains one of health and growth. That growth rate is moderating, which is a good thing because we do not have the capacity for faster growth, but the long-anticipated recession remains out of sight. Could we get a recession this year? Of course, but that can be said of every year; it is just that the economy continues to show far more signs of a return to a healthy growth rate than a recession.

By engaging with the Texas Comptroller to apply and establish the following programs:

• Economic Development Corporation: An EDC is a nonprofit created to finance new and to expand business enterprises. Salado will define projects for the EDC and adopt a specific sales tax to fund those projects. Similar to the Hot Tax Fund, voters approve the use of this sales tax in the same manner. In doing so, a portion of the net proceeds from the sales tax can be converted to eligible expenditures for current and future businesses to acquire the following: Capital Improvements, Job Creation, Land, Machinery/Equipment, and Professional Services to name a few.

• Chapter 380 Municipality Agreements: Local Government Code 380 authorizes municipalities to offer Loans and Grants of City Funds and/or Services at little or no cost to promote local economic development and to stimulate business and commercial activity.



# Mayor candidates on future challenges, successes & failures in office, top 3 priorities in budgeting process

Salado Village Voice presented the candidates for Mayor of the Village of Salado with the following questions.

Question 1: What is the biggest challenge facing the Village of Salado in the next five years? How will you lead the Village through this challenge? (300 words)

Question 2: Since you have served in an elected position in the Village, what has been your greatest success? Your greatest failure? Why? Would you do anything differently? (300

Question 3: What are your top three priorities in the Village general operating budget? Why? (300 words)

Question 1: Growth is the biggest challenge that the Village faces! This impacts our water supply, traffic, schools, businesses, road conditions, police department, wastewater system and other critical infrastructure. Under my leadership, here are some key actions the Board of Aldermen has taken to plan for growth:

Police Department: I have recommended to the Board of Aldermen to build a new City Hall, primarily to house our Police Department. Our current police office does not meet our growing requirements, is inefficient and does not help in retaining our police force. Our plan is to construct a new City Hall/ Police Department and sell our current office which will allow us to more quickly pay off the loan. This plan will allow Salado to improve conditions for our police team, improve retention and add space for additional officers to serve as Salado grows.

Water: All new developments must provide a water plan to provide service either by contracting with the Salado Water Supply Corporation, water wells or other sources. This plan is verified by our engineering team prior to approving the new development. The Board of Alderman has also approved Salado to vie for a seat on the Lone Star Regional Water Board. This will allow Salado to input into future major water supply ventures.

Roads: I am working with the new village administrator and the Board of Aldermen to begin a program to charge developers a Road Impact Fee. The fund generated by this fee will be used to improve traffic congestion and road conditions. If elected, I will continue to look for means to improve our roads and traffic conditions using our successful grant program, impact fees and my engineering background to efficiently manage our resources.

Question 2: Our Mayor - Board of Aldermen team successfully amended the development Sanctuary

agreement. I would consider this as our greatest success. The amended agreement will save the Salado taxpayer approximately \$10 million over the life of the Sanctuary development agreement and will now have a 20-year expiration date versus a 60+ year expiration date. The Sanctuary development agreement amendments also includes return of village government authorities to inspect work, zone and other actions. Our team successfully turned the "Worst Development Agreement in History" to more resemble our other development agreements which are fair to the Salado taxpayer.

Our greatest failure as a team is to repair and improve road conditions over the entirety of the village. It has been difficult to balance the need for road improvements with the need to keep tax rates low keeping in mind that approximately 50% of our taxes are used to pay off the sewage bond. We have averaged \$300K in road repairs in each of my budgets in the past years which is not sufficient to catch up on needed road repairs. Our latest engineering street study indicated that we have over \$5 million in needed street restoration work. It is my strategy to use grant funds to cover large projects like the \$2 million Royal Street restoration and the \$5.5 million West Village Road improvements while chipping away at the smaller repairs using our yearly budget funds. Then in the future we will have options on using available funds when the sewage bond is paid off to aggressively attack street improvements! If elected, I hope to use my experience in creating and managing budgets and use my engineering experience to efficiently improve street conditions!

Question 3: Most cities multiply their tax rate by their total tax property values and then make their budget match this value. I do not build the Salado village budget this way. I start with a clean sheet and add required costs to accomplish the village responsibilities. This allows the Board of Aldermen to approve a "bare bones" budget. I have successfully built village budgets this way for the past four years. (I have successfully managed much larger budgets throughout my career in the Department of the Army.) My priorities are:

Police Department: Our emergency services and public safety are paramount in our mission critical priorities. My budget builds salaries, vehicles, fuel, supplies and other funding components to ensure our village is protected with police services. I will continue to budget funding to keep a license plate reader gate system in place to support our police team.

Street/Traffic Improvements: It is a very exciting time for our street projects. We have completed our Center Circle Road improvement project. We are working on the design start of Royal Street and getting ready next year to tackle the West Village road project. We are waiting on the award of the pot hole/patch contract and expect to start soon. If elected, I will continue to have street and traffic improvements as a budget priority!

Village Services: Our village services are wide and varied from reviewing engineering drawings to assisting with tourism events. (I am very excited about our new marketing director and building on the existing relationships that she brings to our village team!) Our village salaries are a part of this budget. Our staff continues to do amazing work for such a small workforce! Thank you for allowing me to serve and ask for your vote to continue in your ser-

Question 1: The biggest challenges facing the Village of Salado over the next five years are deteriorating infrastructure and a lack of municipal services due to limited resources. Our roads and public facilities need repair and upgrades, but our small tax base makes it difficult to fund these necessary improve-

To lead Salado through these challenges, I will focus on promoting responsible economic development and managing responsible growth. By attracting new businesses and encouraging sustainable development, we can expand our tax base and increase revenues without burdening our existing residents with higher taxes. This influx of funds can then be allocated towards upgrading our aging infrastructure and enhancing municipal services like public works, parks, and community facilities.

However, growth must be carefully managed to preserve our historic, smalltown charm and avoid overcrowding or straining our resources further. I will work closely with the Village Administrator, the Board of Aldermen, developers, and residents to create a balanced growth strategy that revitalizes Salado while retaining the charming qualities that make our village so appealing. Sustainable practices, effective zoning, and a community-driven vision will guide our development efforts.

In addition, I will partner with the Village Administrator and the Board of Aldermen to proactively seek out grants and other alternative funding sources to supplement our budget for capital improvement projects. By exploring all available options, we can make the investments needed to modernize Salado's infrastructure without creating a financial burden on our citizens.

These are undoubtedly challenging times for our village, but I am confident that by promoting responsible economic growth and seeking innovative solutions, we can generate the resources required to maintain and enhance Salado's quality of life for years to

Question 2: My greatest success since being elected to the Board of Aldermen has been upholding my commitment to transparency, being a strong advocate for the citizens and local businesses of our Village and accountability for Village government. I'm proud that I voted against measures that didn't align with the best interests of our community, such as the annexation of FM 2843, the Mustang Springs Development. and the Mayor's proposal for a \$30k pay increase for the former Village Administrator. I also voted in favor of replacing the \$200k for Street Improvement Projects, after the mayor's proposal eliminated it from the budget altogether. These votes demonstrated my dedication to fiscal responsibility and prioritizing the needs of residents over special interests. I also voted in favor of important infrastructure projects like the Royal Street and West Village Road improvements. the Center Circle project, and the Stagecoach Circle Drainage Improvement project.

Staying true to my commitment of accountability for Village government, I authored the proposal to censure the mayor for violations of the United States Constitution, specifically the First Amendment, as well as State Law, which prohibits public criticism of the governing body. That proposal was approved by the Board of Aldermen on September 21, 2023.

I am an imperfect human, but I don't believe I've had any failures at this point in my tenure on the Board of Aldermen. I'm aware I have some opposition to my stances on certain issues, but I have handled the opposition with mutual respect for views that differ from mine. Moving forward, I will continue to make open communication and inclusivity top priorities.

**Question 3:** My top three priorities for the Village's general operating budget are infrastructure improvements, additional law enforcement personnel, and an additional public works employee. These priorities are not only crucial for maintaining public safety, but they also directly impact the quality of life for our residents and the first impressions for visitors to our community.

Well-maintained residential roads are something we've been lacking for far too long. This is not only a quality-of-life issue but will also promote a positive image for those passing through. By allocating funds towards these improvements, we can avoid costly emergency repairs down the line and provide a solid foundation for future growth.

Public safety is of paramount importance, which is why hiring an additional police officer is a top priority. Our law enforcement officers play a vital role in protecting our community and ensuring that our residents feel secure. With an additional officer on staff, we can better respond to emergencies, increase patrols, and foster stronger community-police relations, while eliminating some of the burden on our current officers.

Finally, hiring an additional public works employee will bolster our ability to maintain our parks, streets, and public spaces. These dedicated individuals are responsible for keeping our Village clean, well-groomed, and visually appealing - a key factor in promoting a positive perception of our community. With an extra set of hands, we can ensure that our public areas receive the attention they deserve, enhancing both resident satisfaction and visitor experiences.

By prioritizing these three areas, we can address critical public safety concerns while simultaneously improving the overall quality of life for our residents and creating a welcoming environment for visitors. It is a balanced approach that recognizes the interconnected nature of infrastructure, public safety, and community aesthetics in fostering a thriving, desirable community.



He graduated from Danbury High school in Danbury, TX in 1965, where he played football, basketball, and ran track. Wayne was involved with Theatre Arts and the school's One Act Play. He was offered a scholarship to go to acting school in California, but instead, in 1967, joined the US Army where he went on to graduate from Aviation school to fly Huey helicopters. During Wayne's first tour in Vietnam, he served in the Infantry. Question 1: Salado ISD does a great job of preparing students for college, as evidenced by the success of our graduates attending colleges such as Texas A&M, the University of Texas, and other premier state universities. We have also had a number of students selected to attend the Military Service Academies and even Harvard.

Salado also does a great job with the career and vocational programs the district offers. Right now that includes computer sciences, health science, floral arrangement, welding, and agriculture. The new high school will have modernized and larger facility space for all of those, allowing improvements and expansion of all of those programs. In the future it would be great to add other career and vocational programs such as cybersecurity and artificial intelligence, or automotive mechanics and paint/body. In last week's questions I mentioned these are currently beyond the fiscal ability of Salado without actively seeking business and community partnerships to support student learning in those or other

I believe Salado is looking at and actively working toward improving everything in the district. I have reviewed the Salado ISD District Improvement Plan 2023-2024, which includes a mission and vision, a comprehensive needs assessment, and a student learning summary. The plan incorporates input from parent and community stakeholders. There are six problem statements that instruction, safety, special services, career education programs, and community

involvement. Goals are established for each problem statement, and there are documented performance objectives and strategies to meet each goal. The goals, objectives, and strategies are all long-term and evaluated annually to determine whether they are accomplished, should be continued, modified, or discontinued based on a change in circumstances. The plan is comprehensive and well thought out, and this type of strategic and systematic approach will achieve great results for our schools.

Question 2: I am excited about the new construction funded by the 2023 bond election, and I am thankful the voters chose to invest in our students and schools by passing both of the bonds. The new facilities will not only increase the capacity of the schools to meet current and future growth, but will modernize all of our schools and greatly improve the educational environment. The community planning committee that studied the need for the bond did a thorough assessment and developed the overall plan. It is a real plus that there will not be an increase in our local tax rate to fund the new construction.

Construction will start with the new high school and stadium concurrently. The high school is the facility that has been overcrowded the longest, and by doing the stadium concurrently there will be a savings of over \$2 million dollars in construction costs by not having to stage materials and equipment twice for two separate projects, and not having to pay associated labor costs twice. The old stadium dates back to 1979 when the district had only 400 students, and does not come close to meeting cur-

rent needs. When the new high school opens it will immediately solve the overcrowding at the high school, and also solve the overcrowding at the elementary school by moving half of the stustadium complete will also solve the problem of having high school students traveling daily to all of the TAE buildings to use the locker room and athletic spaces there because of the high school overcrowding. Since high school students won't be using the TAE campus facilities it will allow renovations at that campus to be

completed much faster. Question 3: Safety is a good news story in Salado ISD. Thirteen years ago, only the new high school had a vestibule and locked entrance doors, and that met the need of that time.

Today the story is so much different. Each campus has a security vestibule, and all other doors are locked. We have a badge entry system to limit access control for protection of students and staff. Volunteers, once screened via a third-party contractor, are now screened through the Texas DPS. The district employees are screened through a live state system, meaning the district is immediately notified when something is reported about an employee. SISD's website has instructions for anonymously reporting anything unsafe on-line, by voice, or by text. The district hired three school resource officers, and there are an undisclosed number of marshals that completed safety training that meets police standards.

The district has also

ensure a safe environment. Where there was once only one nurse there are now four. The district has eight counselors to include one mental health counselor. Each campus has a Threat Assessment Committee, and there is a district Safety and Security Committee that includes school staff and SROs, plus the local sheriff, Salado Police, and Bell County Constables. All doors are checked weekly to ensure they are mechanically sound and locked. All district emergency plans were recently voluntarily reviewed by the TEA. Finally, thanks to the recent bond, a bi-directional amplifier is being installed to cover dead zones for first responder radios. I am very confident the district takes this seriously, and every appropriate measure is being taken to ensure our schools

**Question 1:** The metrics tell us what so many of us already know- Salado ISD does an excellent job preparing our students for life after high school, especially when it comes to those who desire to attend college. Our on-time graduation rate of nearly 99% far outpaces the state average as does our college readiness rates in math and reading. The number of students who pass an AP examination outpaces the state average by 23%, and the average score on the SAT far outpaces the state average. Students are given multiple avenues to earn college credit, ranging from AP exams to the Texas Biosciences Institute, and the number of courses offered dents from TAE to the old within the endorsement high school Having the cohorts continues to grow Salado ISD continues to show the results, and every teacher in the school district, from Pre-K through 12th grade, should be proud of and commended for the success that is revealed in these results!

> As with everything, we must do what we can to ensure that these results continue and the students coming through the pipeline can have even more opportunities. This includes looking at that data at all grade levels and striving to increase the number of students performing at a mastery level on state exams. It also means looking at programming offered within our district; with a new high school coming on-line that will include more space for vocational programs, I hope to see more offerings that lead to certifications upon graduation. Since my time as a principal in Salado ISD, I have wanted to explore the addition of a JROTC program; not only does this provide a pathway for students to enter the military or a ROTC program upon graduation, but the leadership and character development that is part of that program is truly exceptional.

Question 2: I am deeply grateful to the voters of Salado ISD for their support of both Proposition A and B this past November. The \$270 million in bonds will allow the school distaken other measures to trict to address space con-

cerns, fund improvements on campuses, and address needed infrastructure upgrades. Having attended every Long-Range Planning meeting leading up to the bond and serving on the school board at the same time, I have seen the plan come together from the initial idea to the final wording that went on the ballot and have since watched as the implementation of the bond has begun.


As such, I have been able to develop my priorities for the bond and its implementation. Throughout the process, I have wanted to prioritize academic projects and my votes on the board have reflected as such. I also understand that the implementation of these projects is multi-faceted and involves cost considerations, securing labor, and ensuring that a timeline can be met that allows for the most students and teachers to be positively impacted in as short of a time as possible. To that end, we have always known that the new high school would need to be built first, and it is on track to open in August 2026. When it does, the current high school will be updated and can come on-line as additional space for our elementary school, potentially as an intermediate school campus for grades 3-5. That will then allow for fewer students to occupy the current TAE campus, allow for a significant remodel and expansion of the TAE-2 campus, take the two older buildings offline, and ensure that each campus has what it needs to meet its student needs.

Question 3: Of all the

areas addressed in my two years on the school board, this is the one that has seen the most improvement and the one I am most proud of. On the day I was elected, Salado ISD had one School Resource Officer (SRO) through a shared contract with Salado PD. This was a very common setup, and I am glad we at least had that in place. It was later that May that the tragedy in Uvalde occurred, which magnified why school safety was a top priority. That summer, we added two SROs, giving us one per campus, and later in the fall, I helped lead that effort that resulted in Salado ISD adopting the School Marshall Program. By the end of that year, in large part due to the leadership of Dr. Novotny, we established our own Salado ISD police department. These changes were made at the same time we thoroughly reviewed and upgraded the physical setup of our campuses, ranging from fixing gates to installing new badge readers on our older campuses, and improved communication with parents when a challenging, safety-related situation needed to be addressed. Coupled with teachers and staff whom I have personally watched implement best practices on our campuses, I am confident this is something that has been addressed and will remain a top priority.

All of this was done before any state mandates and with the sole intent of protecting our students and staff on a daily basis. While we must always remain vigilant and aware of new and best practices related to school safety, I am thankful that I can confidently take my two boys to school every morning, pick them up in the afternoon, and know that they will be protected and taken care of in be-



I voted for the original timeline that prioritized academic investments such as the new high school and renovations to TAE and current high school. The bond addressed a huge need in academic facilities and Prop A will absolutely benefit all students and educators of Salado in a massive and necessary way. At a February 12, 2024 special board meeting, a change in timeline was proposed by administration that would reallocate 21 million dollars from our bond sale to Prop B allowing the field house and stadium construction to be funded before any TAE renovations would be funded. As an active participant in the facility planning committee, it was overwhelmingly chosen to prioritize academic facilities over the stadium complex. 
**Question 3:** Threats at Salado schools fall into two categories, either internal or external. For external threats, we have responded to state requirements for hardened campuses and

utilized funding opportunities to establish the Salado ISD Police Department. The SISD Police Department is an amazing tool that was put into place last year and gives the schools dedicated resources to address both internal and external incidents. Having dedicated officers at every campus provides an additional layer of security and protection while also reassuring the community that safety is the number one priority for the school district. For internal threats, the challenges present every day and require administrators to remain diligent and focused on keeping all students and educators safe. During the 2022-23 school year, I strongly advocated to administration and to the school board for a significant safety change when I became aware of an area that needed improvement in providing a safer environment at the elementary school. The resulting change in policy led to an environment that was not only safer for students but also provided a more enriching learning and teaching environment for several classrooms. It is of the utmost importance that our schools have a culture where both students and teachers feel safe and know that no amount of violence or bullying is acceptable. Internal safety can be fluid and changes in protocol may need to be made based on the situations at hand. 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

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#### **Combating forever chemicals**

Texas A&M AgriLife Research scientists are looking for a better way to remove or degrade stubborn pollutants, also called forever chemicals, from waste before they impact human and animal health.

Eunsung Kan, Ph.D., associate professor and AgriLife Research biological engineer in the Texas A&M Department of Biological and Agricultural Engineering, published a study focusing on the fundamental understanding for biological treatment of waste containing per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances, or PFAS, which are difficult to degrade through biological means. PFAS are found in a variety of synthetic chemicals used across a range of industries that produce countless products including appliances, foams, textiles and food packaging.

"We believe this study helps address basic questions about pollutants that are difficult to remove or degrade," Kan said. "PFAS present a challenge that could impact long-term sustainability and health. That makes this type of

Kan's study, "Effects of perfluorooctanoic acid and perfluorooctane

sulfonic acid on microbial community structure during anaerobic digestion," appears in Bioresource Technology, a top peer-reviewed biological engineering journal. The major experiments were conducted by Kan's post-doctorate researcher Gyucheol Choi, Ph.D., in Kan's lab.

Because PFAS are difficult to degrade, there are great concerns that accumulation of toxic PFAS compounds could impact soil and water quality and subsequently human, plant and animal health. Current physical and chemical techniques used for PFAS treatment in wastewater and solid waste require high levels of energy and chemicals. These treatment methods are costly and do not completely degrade PFAS.

Kan said this lack of PFAS degradation is a serious problem for existing systems, which produce a sludge con-

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taining PFAS compounds. The sludge is then taken to landfills, but there is concern that these pollutants might enter the surrounding environment or watershed by a runoff rain

Most solid waste and wastewater sludge is treated through biological means called anaerobic digestion, or AD. Complex microbial communities in AD systems break down and transform solid waste into biogas while undigested sludge is disposed of or applied to land. The study showed how two commonly known and difficult-to-degrade PFAS compounds - perfluorooctanoic acid, PFOA, and perfluorooctane sulfonic acid, PFOS are degraded by AD systems. The researchers also sought to understand the effects of the chemicals on the microbial communities.

Kan believes the study will help guide designs for AD systems that use various technologies to holistically deal with stubborn PFAS.
