# **BoA proposes \$0.4860 tax**

Salado aldermen, on a 4-1 vote at a special meeting Aug. 12, have proposed a property tax rate of \$0.4860 per \$100 valuation to fund the fiscal year 2025 budget. The tax rate is composed of \$0.3019 for maintenance and operations and \$0.1841 for debt service costs.

Alderman Zach Hurst made the motion, which received a second from alderman Michael MacDonald. They were joined by alderman Jasen Graham in voting in favor of the proposed tax rate. Mayor pro tem Rodney Bell voted against the proposed tax rate.

The board also confirmed two public hearing dates. The Village will con-

duct a public hearing on the proposed FY 2025 budget at 6:30 p.m. Aug. 22 at the Village Municipal Building, 301 N. Stagecoach Rd. The Village will conduct a public hearing on the proposed tax rate at 6:30 p.m. Aug. 26 at the Village Municipal Build-

The tax rate is a 23.13% increase over the current tax rate of \$0.3947. The current tax rate is divided into \$0.1786 for maintenance and operation expenses and \$0.2161 for debt service.

According to the Bell County Appraisal District, the average homestead taxable value for the Village of Salado increased by 12.08%, from \$312,263 in 2023 to \$350,015 in 2024.

If the proposed tax rate is approved by aldermen on Aug. 26, the tax on the aver-

age homestead will increase by 38.01%. The tax on the average homestead in 2023 was \$1,232. The tax on the average homestead in 2024 will be \$1,701.

The total tax levy for the Village of Salado will be \$1,851,555, if the proposed tax rate is adopted by aldermen and if no petition for a ratification election is filed. Of that, \$1,150,000.00 will be for general operations and \$701,480 will be for

The proposed tax rate is just below the de minimus rate of \$0.4865 per \$100. The de minimus rate is the rate equal to the sum of the no-new-revenue maintenance and operations rate for the Village of Salado, the rate that will raise \$500,000 and the current debt rate for the Village of Salado.

# Village moves funds to boost depleted fund balances

In July, the Village of Salado transferred \$379,600 from its Wastewater Permanent Improvement Bonds fund to the Wastewater Operating fund and then from that fund to the General Operating fund.

With the transfers, the Village general operating checking accounts totaled \$811,543.14 as of July 31. Those accounts totaled \$419.266.17 as of June 30. In July, the Village also received a large payment from Texas Parks & Wildlife as part of the \$150,000 grant for the All Abilities Play-

In its operating receivables, the Village anticipates another \$340,144 in FY 2024 revenue.

The July 2024 financial report, part of the consent agenda for the 6:30 p.m. Aug. 15 board of aldermen meeting, shows that thus far in FY 2024 the Village has spent \$672,924.88 more than it has earned in general operating revenues, including \$388,545.28 transferred from the general operating fund to the All Abilities Playground fund and \$572,829.23 in capital street projects. The adopted 2024 FY budget had

\$200,000 in capital street 19, 2019 with a deficit of projects expenditures. Most of the funding for the FY 2024 street projects came from the American Relief Act federal funds to the Vil-

The July financials report assets of \$1.38 million and liabilities of \$1.05 million to leave the Village with a general fund balance of \$327,583. Of those liabilities, \$996,473 is in escrow deposits from developers. The escrow deposits are shown as a liability in the Village financial reports. The Village does not have to liquid assets to pay that liability at this time.

Of the general operating fund balance, \$218,816 remains due from the wastewater operating fund, which has a negative fund balance of \$128,741.

In July, the Village issued \$138,297.74 in general operating checks, excluding payroll checks.

"Take it out of fund balance," has been the mantra when the Village has adopted deficit budgets or taken on special projects.

The first deficit budget was in FY 2020. Those deficit budgets have grown every year since.

Village aldermen adopted the FY 2020 budget Sept. \$40,000 for a general operating budget of \$1.33 million in expenses.

Village aldermen adopted the FY 2021 budget Sept. 17, 2020, with a deficit of \$65,175.00 for a general operating budget of \$1.5 million in expenses.

Village aldermen adopted the FY 2022 deficit budget Sept. 16, 2021 with a deficit of \$114,711.96 for a general operating budget of \$1.64 million in expenses.

Village aldermen adopted the FY 2023 budget Sept. 15, 2022 with a deficit of \$300,487.50 for a general operating budget of million in expenses.

Village aldermen adopted the FY 2024 budget Sept. 21, 2023 with a deficit of \$365,912.80 for a general operating budget of \$2.35 million in expenses.

At a town hall meeting Aug. 6, Mayor Bert Henry mentioned a possible forensic audit of Village books to determine how the Village finds itself financially strapped.

The Mayor told an audience at the Salado Civic Center during that town hall meeting that major projects, including the new Village office and police department building are now on hold.

# sales tax rebate trails trend in county llage

The Village of Salado is one of two Bell County cities to see a decrease in sales tax rebates for August 2024, when compared to 2023.

The Village will receive \$83,151.90 a decrease of 1.31% compared to last August's payment of \$84,257.08. For the year, The Village is running 5.53% over year-to-date payments in 2023: \$590,931.52 compared to \$559,962.43 through August 2023.

Rogers was the only other Bell County city to show a decline in sales tax rebate in

Temple, Killeen and Belton all felt increases of about 5% while Nolanville saw a dramatic increase of 25%.

Bell County showed a 7.18%% increase in sales tax revenues compared to the

previous year. The County's August payment is \$3.25 million, compared to \$3.03 million last August.

The Village is one of three Bell County cities to levy a 1-cent sales tax, while seven other Bell County cities levy a 1.5 cent sales tax and Rogers levies a 1.25 cent sales

The Salado Public Library District and Bell County each levy a half-cent sales

For that half-cent tax, Salado Public Library District received a \$70,600.16 August check, which was 4.19% more than last August's payment of \$67,756.04. For the year, the Library District has received \$487,653.96, which is 8.16% more than the \$450,846.21 paid through

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced Aug. 7 that he would send \$1.2 billion in local sales tax allocations for August, 0.3 percent less than in August 2023.

These allocations are based on sales made in June by businesses that report tax monthly and on sales made in April, May and June by quarterly filers.

The comptroller sent re-

bates totaling \$770.3 million to Texas Cities, a decrease of 0.2% over last August.

# **Bank of Japan's threat** to increase interest rates causes market turmoil

The Markets

The markets were anything but boring as the week began. The S&P 500 (SPX) opened Monday at about 5136, around 4% lower than last Friday's close, and ended the day in very much the same condition. Rumors of "1987" abounded as reports were published that Japan's Nikkei 250 dropped the most in a single day since Black Monday in 1987. Few would have guessed that by the end of the week, the Index would close at 5344.16, down a mere 0.04%. That leaves the venerable SPX just over 12% higher than when the year began and nearly 20% higher than a year ago, about the same total gain it has achieved over the last three years. Our other market indicator, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, closed at 2680.50, down 0.32% for the week, up 6.93% this year, and 10.22% higher than at this time last year.

The 10-year US Treasury note yielded 3.94%, up 3.68% from last week. The 1-month T-bill paid an annualized rate of 5.54%, and the 30-year bond 4.23%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) rose 4.57% to \$76.95.

We normally focus on the economy because the markets tend to reflect the economy in the long run. This week, we will focus on markets, and more specifically, the stock market, because there are relatively short periods of time when the stock market moves in opposition to the economy in which it resides, and Monday of this week was one of those times.

It started in Japan. Tokyo time is 13 hours ahead of New York, which is critical in this scenario. On Monday morning, Tokyo time, the Bank of Japan (BoJ) floated the idea that it might raise interest rates from the 0% they have been for over a decade. Using something called the "carry-trade," U.S. speculators have long borrowed money (in Japanese Yen) at 0% interest

from the Tokyo exchange, then, through a complex chain of transactions, used that borrowed money to purchase stocks and crypto in the U.S. Because the much higher interest rates in the U.S. had caused the dollar to rise against the yen those carry-trade loans have been profitable for the borrowers. Compounding the issue was the tradition that senior traders take their vacations in August, leaving the junior traders with instructions to avoid losing money while the big boys were away.

The Monday morning

announcement by the BoJ immediately triggered a rush to sell stocks on the Tokyo Exchange as purchasing Japanese stocks "on margin" is the first step in getting the carry trade loans to the U.S. markets. The immediate result was a 12.5% single-day drop in the Nikkei 225, following a 5.8% fall on Friday. The Nikkei decline was headlined worldwide before the U.S. markets opened as "The biggest decline in the Nikkei since Black Monday of 1987." As the second-string traders arrived at their desks on Monday morning, they saw that an increased interest rate in Japan would tend to reverse the dollar's rise, hitting carry trade loans with a double whammy. The dollar, in which their highly leveraged assets were held, would fall against the Yen, and, at the same time, they would begin owing interest on those loans.

As the junior carry traders started selling, the other second-string traders assumed the sellers knew something the rest of Wall Street had missed and joined in the rout. That was followed by even more selling as members of the public saw the fall and, like the traders, figured someone knew something they didn't and panicked. On Tuesday, a "deputy governor" at the BoJ announced the BoJ would not hike interest rates when the financial and capital markets were unstable, and the markets began to recover. As with all such panics, there were a series of aftershocks as some investors reacted with a lag. There was a parallel with Black Monday, though. Funds and strategies that promised to dampen volatility generally failed, just as they did in 1987.

The Economy

Meanwhile, in the real world of the economy, nonfarm business sector labor productivity increased by 2.3% in the second quarter, according to the Labor Department, as output increased by 3.3% and hours worked increased by 1.0%. Notably, despite reports that manufacturing slowed, manufacturing productivity increased by 1.8% as output increased by 3.4% and hours worked increased by 1.6%. This is an example of how contradictory some economic data has become. If, as the PMI surveys suggest, manufacturing is producing less, how does output increase 3.4%? We suspect the PMI data, with its large sentiment component, is being distorted by political rhetoric.

Once more, despite Chicken Little's pronouncement that "The sky is falling!" we are forced to report that the U.S. economy is in fine shape and the stock market shows little sign of being in a "bubble." We remain confident it will eventually arrive at the euphoric state of irrational exuberance at some point, but not

# **Answer the Call, Jury Service Is Essential to Our Democracy**

In this election year, we'll hear much about the importance of voting, but there are additional responsibilities that strengthen our democracy and protect our rights as citizens. It's also critically important to answer the call for jury ser-

Every citizen can contribute to fairness and balance in the civil justice system by serving on a jury when called. A robust jury system is essential to protecting our rights as Americans and ensuring all defendants are treated fairly in the courtroom.

Yet, in recent years, many people in Texas and around the country have avoided jury service. National research and previous studies have estimated that fewer than half of those called to serve in some areas of our state and nationally ignore their summons.

Such statistics are abysmal and don't bode well for our civil or criminal courts. Why aren't people answering the call?

The Pew Research Center found that only half of those ages 18 to 29 say jury service is part of being a good citizen, compared to 70 percent or higher in older age groups.

I t's difficult for defendants to receive a trial by their peers don't show up. Courts depend upon citizens to serve as jurors, and all citizens should be encouraged to respond when summoned for jury service.

We all know time is money.

And over the past decade, more counties have been doing their part to make jury service as painless as possible, offering online scheduling that saves both jurors and courts time and money.

More recently, a new law approaching its one-year anniversary increased juror pay from \$6 to \$20 for the first day of service and \$40 to \$58 per day for those impaneled to serve for a trial. Thanks to state lawmakers who passed HB 3474 in the last legislative session, Texas now ranks among the states with the highest pay for jury service.

Serving on a jury is fundamental to our democracy, and jurors who respond when called will receive a pay increase for the first a jury of their peers when time in nearly 20 years. Texas has removed one more obstacle or excuse not to serve when summoned by increasing juror pay.

The U.S. and Texas constitutions guarantee the right to a trial by jury. A trial by a jury of your peers is a fundamental safeguard of each American's civil liberties and an important component of civic engagement.

Remember, it's important not only to vote but also to serve on a jury. When summoned, answer the call.



than one line of play available at the start of a hand. The challenge each deal presents is to compare the various possibilities and then select the one that has the best chance to succeed.

Long experience may certainly help in making the proper choice, but even so, some of the most experienced players might miss the best approach when a relatively rare type of play is

required. Consider this case where West led a heart against four spades.

East won with the king and continued with the ace, ruffed by South. Hoping to find the missing trumps divided 3-3, declarer played the A-K-Q of spades. When West showed out on the third round, South was on the way to defeat. He cashed the K-Q-A of diamonds, after which it made little difference whether he played another diamond or tried a club finesse. Either way, he would score only nine tricks — five spades, three diamonds and a club to go down one.

If declarer had looked beyond the obvious, he might have hit upon leading a low trump from his hand after ruffing the heart continuation at trick two! Once this thought is conceived, its virtues become manifest. It assures the contract against a 3-3 or 4-2 trump division, and also allows declarer to maintain control of the trump suit, since a third heart lead can be ruffed in dummy.

Certainly the low trump lead at trick three from a holding of A-K-Q-4 is not an obvious play to make. But that should not stop one from making a play that has a clear-cut advantage. The difficult part is to think of it, but once declarer gets over that hurdle, everything falls into place.


