Following an Aug. 22 public hearing on the FY 2025 budget and an Aug. 26 public hearing on the tax rate, Village of Salado aldermen unanimously adopted the budget and set the tax rate at \$0.4860 per \$100 valuation. The tax rate is composed of \$0.3019 for maintenance and operations and \$0.1841 for debt service costs.

Aldermen unanimously adopted the FY budget on a motion by alderman Jasen Graham that received a second from Zach Hurst.

The budget raises more total property taxes by \$604,467 than the 2024 FY budget, an increase of 48.47%. Of that, \$205,031.98 is tax revenue from new properties added to the tax rolls this year.

Aldermen also voted unanimously for the \$0.4860 per \$100 valuation property tax rate. Graham made the motion, which received a second from Hurst.

The tax rate is composed of \$0.3019 for maintenance and operations and \$0.1841 for debt service costs.

The adopted tax rate is

\$0.0913 higher than last Rate of \$0.3711. year's rate of \$0.3947 per For the average home-\$100 valuation. Of last year's stead value of \$350,015, it

stead value of \$350,015, it would be the difference between paying \$1,299 and \$1,701.

If the petition receives enough signatures to be put on the ballot and if voters vote to rollback the tax rate, the Village would face repayment of those taxes when the fiscal year is three-quarters of the way over.

The Voter Approved Tax Rate of \$0.3711 is composed of \$0.1798 in maintenance and operations taxes and \$0.1841 in debt service.


The adopted tax rate of \$0.486 raises \$1.15 million in operating revenues, according to the adopted budget. If the election rolls back the tax rate to \$0.3711, it would generate \$684,894 in operating revenues, a loss of more than \$465,000 in operating revenues.

How will the Village pay taxpayers back the \$465,000 and meet its escrow obligation of more than \$950,000?

The Village would likely see a mass exodus or lay off of administration and police as a starting point as the Village could find itself unable to make payroll. Where would it end?

BoA mulls sewer hook-ups, permit fees, advisory boards

Village of Salado aldermen unanimously adopted Ordinance 2024-18 to require properties outside the municipal limits that request sewer service to voluntarily annex into the Village and to pay sewer impact fees in order to receive those services.

"This will take any doubt from anybody that if you request sewer, you must annex," De La Rosa said.

The ordinance was approved on a motion by May-

or Pro Tem Rodney Bell and second from alderman Michael MacDonald.

Aldermen also adopted a new permit fee schedule for commercial and residential construction on a motion by alderman Jasen Graham and a second by alderman Zach Hurst.

After approving an escrow agreement with Campbell Branch Investment, LLC of \$3,000, aldermen then approved Ordinance 2014-15 which authorizes the Village Administrator to enter into escrow agreements with de-

velopers in the future. Bell gave the motion, receiving a second from MacDonald.

Aldermen approved Ordinance 2024-16 dissolving the Parks Advisory Board, the Tourism Advisory Board, the Economic Development Advisory Board and the Music-Friendly Community Advisory Board. The unanimous vote came on a motion by alderman Hurst and a second from alderman Graham.

The board will meet again 6:30 p.m. Sept. 5 at the Municipal Building.

Fed likely to lower interest rates in mid-September

The Markets

Our dear old Index, the S&P 500 (SPX), turned in another excellent week, soaring 1.45% to close at 5634.61, leaving it up an astonishing 18.13% this year, 27% from a year ago and about 26% from three years ago. Our other watched index, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, was even more jubilant, rising 2.46% for the week to 2805.84 and is now about 12% higher this year and up over 19% from this time last year.

On the other side of the market, the benchmark 10year U.S. Treasury note closed, yielding 3.81%, while the 30-year bond was paying 4.10%, and the 1-month T-bill held steady with an annualized interest rate of 5.51%. From the 2-year maturity at 3.90% to the 30-year bond at 4.10%, the yield curve is now positively sloped for the first time in two years. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) settled down to \$74.91 per barrel after a threatening climb toward \$80 earlier in the month.

The Economy

In the background, well behind the headlines about political candidates and soaring stock markets, some critical things have been happening. At the Kansas City Federal Reserve Bank's annual symposium (a big event for economists), Fed Chairman Jay Powell stated, "The time has come for policy to adjust," which means lower short-term rates are at hand. In context, he suggested that the Fed will begin decreasing its benchmark Fed Funds Rate downward from its current 23-year high of 5.25-5.5 percent in its mid-September meeting. He also warned that while the direction of short-term rate moves was clear, the frequency and degree of the reductions would be data dependent. Lower interest rates on short-term loans are generally considered to increase the profitability of




so there was rejoicing on Wall Street.

Behind the headline though, something quite different was happening. The Bank of England and the European Central Bank have lowered short-term rates by a quarter percent. Thus, global interest rates might decline, but that may not be the case. Beyond the very short-term rates lie the longer-term interest rates from which loans for automobiles, mortgages, and industrial equipment are set. Those rates are strongly affected by rates on longer-term Treasury securities, with the ten-year note being the benchmark. As the world's largest holders of intermediate-term government securities, the Federal Reserve and other G-7 countries' central banks' buying or selling in the open government securities markets are the foundation for those rates. During the pandemic and the recession that followed, the Fed and other central banks purchased vast amounts of U.S. government bills, notes, and bonds. The Fed reports having about \$4.4 trillion worth of those securities plus about \$2.3 trillion worth of mortgage-backed securities and other bonds totaling \$7.1 trillion, making it the 800-pound gorilla in the bond market. For comparison, according to Statista, China holds a total of about \$771 billion, and Japan holds about \$1.2 trillion in U.S. government debt. That was factual background; now for the real news: According to Bloomberg, the U.S. Fed, the Bank of Japan, the Bank of England, the EU Central Bank, and others are all quietly moving to "shrink their balance sheets." During the

publicly traded companies, pandemic and afterward, when economies were in danger of a serious contraction, those banks bought bonds on the open market, lowering longer-term interest rates and flushing dollars into the global economy. When things had stabilized, those same central banks began to sell longer-term bonds back into the market. The Fed began to sell in late 2022, causing mid-to-long term rates to rise, but recently, the last holdout, the Bank of Japan, joined the selling process. That selling of bonds does the opposite of buying bonds, it pulls cash out of circulation. The net result? Yes, the Fed will almost certainly be reducing short-term rates gradually, beginning in mid-September, but at the same time, it and the other central banks will be selling government government-backed and longer-term holdings, effectively raising longer-term rates. If so, expect the yield curve to finally return to a positive slope with shortterm rates lower and longer-term rates higher. That shift in the yield curve may be bullish for stocks but not for bonds. In the domestic econo-

my, Target (TGT) reported a 3% increase in same-store sales in the last quarter, following Walmart (WMT) reporting an increase of about 5%, suggesting the American consumer is still charging ahead and both companies forecast rising sales for the rest of the year. That elusive and much-forecasted recession is getting harder and harder to locate. U.S. economic growth still appears to be moderating to a sustainable rate and has plenty of steam left.

Kamala Harris is no investor

Kamala Harris took a few brief minutes on the campaign trail to answer a couple of questions from reporters and flash her policy chops.

When asked how she is going to pay for her lavish spending plans, the vice president explained that it would be covered via those indispensable fiscal tools -- pixie dust and magical thinking.

The expansion of the child tax credit, which will cost \$1.2 trillion? According to Harris, "The return on that investment, in terms of what that will do and what it will pay for, will be tremendous."

Tax credits generally, including a \$150 billion expansion of the Earned Income Tax Credit? "We know that there's a great return on investment."

Subsidies for home ownership, costing \$200 billion? "When we increase homeownership in America, what that means in terms of increasing the tax base, not to mention your property tax base, and what that does to fund schools. Again, return on investment."

In general, the vice president opined, "I think it's a mistake for any person who talks about public policy to not critically evaluate how you measure the return on investment."

Because, she continued, "when you were strengthening neighborhoods, strengthening communities, and in particular the economy of those communities and investing in a broad-based economy, everybody benefits and it pays for itself in that way."

Clearly, someone mentioned "return on investment"



to her in a policy briefing somewhere along the line, and the phrase stuck. Now, Harris thinks she's the Warren Buffett of deficit spending.

The concept of investment tends to be inapt in the context of government spending. In the private sector, when someone takes the risk of investing in a business or product and if it doesn't work, he or she pays the price. This ensures a measure of accountability and rigor that is lacking in government.

There's a reason that no one ever confuses the Department of Health and Human Services with Apple Inc.

That doesn't mean that some projects don't create real returns. By making New York the country's most commercially vibrant city, opening up the West to settlement and drastically reducing transportation costs, the Erie Canal was indeed a great investment. Spending \$330 billion during World War II to defeat the Axis powers and to make the United States the world's preeminent power was worth it by any measure.

These are the exceptions, though. There's been so much so-called investment by the federal government in general and the Biden administration in particular, that it's a wonder that the budget hasn't already balanced itself. Instead, the deficit is nearly \$2 trillion a year, and the debt is \$34 trillion.

Where's the return? There is some, no doubt, but it is overwhelmed by the geyser of spending on every priority, from the Administration for Children and Families to the Wireless Telecommunications Bureau.

Harris is proposing to layer on another \$1.7 trillion in deficit spending.

It's not just that there will be no return to almost all of it, government intervention often has the opposite of its intended effect by driving up prices. There's a reason that health care, higher education and housing cost so much. Regardless, the answer from the likes of Kamala Harris is always more intervention. An element of her program is more subsidies "to help Americans afford health insurance on the Affordable Care Act marketplace." Wasn't that what the ACA itself was supposed to do?

So, no, the Harris spending program won't pay for itself any more than the Biden program did, or for that matter, the Trump, Obama or Bush program did. Magical realism -- or magical unrealism -- in budgeting is an entrenched, bipartisan phenomenon in Washington. That's why we've gotten so much "investing" with so little return, except an ever-escalating debt and a series of worthless pledges about impending fiscal probity.

Like any huckster working in a boiler room, Harris is hoping to find people credulous enough to believe what's too good to be true.



In many deals, declarer must make assumptions about the location of certain key cards because if they are located otherwise, there is no hope for the contract.

Today's deal occurred in an IMP Pairs event at a national tournament some years ago. North-South did well to reach three notrump rather than four spades, a contract that had virtually no chance as the cards lay.

West led the seven of diamonds to dummy's queen and East's ace, and South won the diamond continuation with the king. At this point, declarer had only six winners — four spades, a heart and the diamond already taken.

To have any hope of making the contract, he needed to score three additional tricks in clubs and hearts without allowing East — who was marked by his pre-emptive bid with the rest of the diamonds — to gain the lead. South therefore had to assume that East did not hold either the ace of clubs or king of hearts.

Acting on this assumption, declarer cashed the A-K-Q of spades and then led a club toward the king. West had no choice but to follow low. After the king held, South crossed to the jack of spades in order to lead a heart to the queen.

When the heart finesse succeeded, declarer cashed the ace of hearts and played a third heart. West took the jack and king but was then forced to lead a club from the A-9, handing South the game-going trick with the queen.

Once declarer made the necessary assumptions and proceeded accordingly, there was no way the defenders could escape.
