Royal Street MUD could have \$110+ million in bonds

Near the bottom of the November 5 ballot for residents of a 381.156 acre parcel of land owned by Heights Evergreen Developers, LTD., are propositions confirming the formation of Royal Street Municipal Utility District (MUD), establishing a board of directors and approving a property tax within the MUD. The address of the parcel,

which is outside of the Extra Territorial Jurisdiction of any Bell County municipality, is 4784 Royal St.

In addition to Proposition A "Confirming the creation of Royal Street Municipal District," is the election of five directors to serve on the board of the Royal Street Municipal District: Jonathan Breton, Kim Connell, Andy Curtis, Thomas Dorroh and Michael Withers.

Proposition B authorizes "An operation and maintenance tax for the District not to exceed one dollar (\$1.00) per one hundred dollars (\$100) valuation of taxable property." The property tax will only apply to properties within the 381.156 acres.

Proposition C calls for "The issuance of \$29,445,000 bonds for water, wastewater, and drainage system facilities, and the levy of taxes sufficient to pay principal of and interest on the bonds."

Proposition D calls for "The issuance of \$14,625,000 bonds for roads, and the levy of taxes sufficient to pay principal of and interest on the bonds."

Proposition E calls for "The issuance of \$44,168,000 bonds for refunding water, wastewater, and drainage system facilities bonds (including refunding bonds issued therefor) issued pursuant to Section 59, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, and the levy of taxes sufficient to pay principal of and interest on the bonds."

Proposition F calls for "The issuance of \$21,938,000 bonds for refunding road bonds (including refunding bonds issued therefor) issued pursuant to Section 52, Article III of the Texas Constitution, and the levy of taxes sufficient to pay principal of and interest on the bonds."

You may fill out an online voter registration application that you can print out and mail to the Bell County Elections Administrator Office at https://vrapp.sos.state. tx.us. The application must be printed and mailed to Bell County Elections Adminstrator, P.O. Box 1629, Belton, Texas 76513.

Voter registration applications are available at the Elections Administrator Office at 550 East 2nd Avenue Belton, Texas 76513 to register in person.. They are also available at area libraries, Department of Public Safety and Texas Department of Human Services offices.

As soon as you establish residence in Bell County, you are qualified to register to vote in Bell County.

The last day to apply for a Ballot by Mail request (must be received, not postmarked) is Oct. 25. The deadline for receiving Ballots by Mail (they must be postmarked by election day) is Nov. 5.

Early voting will be Oct. 21-Nov. 1. Early voting hours are 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Oct. 21-25; 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Oct. 26, noon-6 p.m. Oct. 27 and 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Oct. 28-Nov. 1.

American exceptionalism appears to remain intact

The Markets

After hitting a new record closing high of 5713.64 on Thursday, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) slipped a bit on Friday, falling to 5702.55, but finished the week higher by 1.36%. That leaves our dear old SPX 19.55% higher than it began the year, up an astonishing 29.51% from a year ago, and having risen almost 31% in the last three years. The other stock index we follow, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, as we believe it better reflects the heart of the stock market, rose 1.28% for the week and is up 14.13% since last September, closing at 2861.10.

Over on the U.S. Treasury market, the benchmark 10-year Treasury note ended the week yielding 3.73%, 1.91% higher than last week, while the short end of the Treasury curve, the 1-month T-bill yield dropped from last week's annualized 5.15% to 4.87% as the Fed cut rates. The 30-year Treasury bond also posted an interest rate increase, climbing from last week's 3.98% to 4.07%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) at the close of U.S. trading was at \$71.77 per barrel, reflecting prospects for an improving economy.

The Economy

This week, there was one economic subject to rule them all as the U.S. Federal Reserve Board (the Fed) reduced the Fed Funds Rate by half a percent to a target range between 4.75% and 5.00%. Based on the number of published words, one would think that something earthshaking and unexpected had happened instead of a highly expected event. Then, as the week progressed, more pundits published and broadcast endless commentary and speculation about that cut. The U.S. Treasury bills

the longer-term twenty and thirty-year bonds saw an increase in their rates, disappointing people hoping for a decrease in mortgage rates.

What does all that mean? As usual, Fed Chair Jerome Powell explained it well during the post-Fed meeting press conference. He clearly stated, "Our economy is strong... and ...with recalibration, ... the labor market can be maintained in a context of moderate growth and inflation moving down to 2 percent." He stated that the Fed would be "reducing our securities holdings." In other words, the Fed sees little or no risk of a pending recession and anticipates further economic growth. By "reducing" its security holdings, he signaled that the Fed would continue selling bonds into the open market. Large-scale bond selling causes the market price of bonds to fall, effectively raising the interest rates on those bonds. What he said can be summarized as, "We are in the process of reducing short-term rates and raising longer-term rates," and that is what happened in the days that followed.

The Fed's actions were compounded by the growing perception that our economy will continue to expand, hopefully at a "reasonable" rate. That continued growth would then be reflected in an increasing demand for borrowed money in the form of corporate and municipal bonds, which would, in turn, raise longer-term rates and reduce the market value of existing bonds. The combination of lower short-term interest rates and the prospect of healthy economic expansion bodes well for corporate earnings, so after taking a day or so to digest that news, the stock market rose. Chairman Powell went on to state that the U.S. economy appears to be growing at an annualized rate of 2.2% per year while inflation is likely to be only 2.1% this year, very close to the Fed's goal of 2% per year. He also said he anticipated that the Fed Funds Rate would be down to 4.4% by the end of this year and 3.4% by the end of 2025. He also said he expected unemployment to rise to 4.4% and stabilize.

The bottom line is very much the same from our perspective. Given our infrastructure restrictions, the United States economy is growing about as fast as it can without producing unacceptable inflation. We also missed what was probably the most forecast recession in recent history because of three factors. First, we had high immigration rates, filling mainly low-level jobs, and those immigrants spent most of what they made, boosting our economy. Second, worker productivity has risen rapidly, allowing employers to create more with less. Finally, the Fed got it right.

There are still threats, primarily geopolitical and geoeconomic. According to a report written by Mario Draghi, the former EU chief, the European economy may be in for a long, sustained decline. China's economy remains in contraction and appears to be preparing for war. We live in an interdependent world and trade system and are not immune from other major powers' ills. Still, at least

could drive up energy bills

At a recent press conference, California Gov. Gavin Newsom proclaimed what he called a "fact" -- "California has lower residential utility bills than states like Texas, states like Florida."

Ask any Californian facing sticker shock paying their summer power bills and they'll tell you a different story. Energy Information Administration figures show the average monthly price of electricity was 34.3 cents per kilowatt hour in May (second to Hawaii), compared to 14.7 cents in Texas and 13.63 cents in Florida.

These "nation leading climate policies" are an example of what Newsom calls "the California Way," and they're being picked up by Californian Kamala Harris in her presidential campaign. As documented in our new Pacific Research Institute book, the California Way encompasses bad policies on issues ranging from crime and homelessness to energy mandates and restrictions on worker freedom. Collectively, these ideas are subjecting the state's 40 million residents to higher taxes, more expensive costs, and less freedom.

Every American might eventually suffer under the California Way. As Newsom's recent political roadshow through red states illustrates, these bad policies are no longer being restricted by the Sierra Nevada mountains. They are inspiring the Biden-Harris administration -- the Los Angeles Times calls California the administration's "de-facto think tank" -- and state and local policymakers nationwide.

On energy, California imposes a complex array of regulations, taxes and subsidies on electricity production. These include taxpayer-funded electric car subsidies and unrealistic 100 percent renewable energy mandates. PRI's research found that Californians pay \$1,450 average annual electricity bills, with some residents paying more than \$2,000 per year. This is 56 percent more than the U.S. average, despite residents consuming 34 percent less

electricity. Worse, a recent controversial proposal would have charged people for electricity, in part, based on how much income they earned rather than how much energy they actually consumed.

Despite Newsom's public relations campaign against oil company "price gouging," Californians pay an additional \$1.41 per gallon thanks to government taxes, fees, and regulatory costs on oil production.

Don't forget the forthcoming prohibition on the sale of new gas-powered cars in the state starting in 2045. PRI's research shows the state will be conservatively 21.2 percent short of the power needed daily to charge the vehicles and meet the state's other power needs once the mandate takes effect.

Then there are the green mandates putting people out of work. One recently enacted law has the state on track to ban gas-powered lawn equipment, which will be a significant cost burden on lawn care and landscaping businesses that are today a path to prosperity for many Latino entrepreneurs. Another regulation adopted by Southern California's air quality regulators would ban commercial gas ovens in kitchens by 2036, which are used to provide baked goods for restaurants and stores. This will cost about 3,200 jobs once fully implemented.

Some may argue that these wild policies won't catch on nationally. Think again. The recent controversy over federal bureaucrats reportedly considering a ban on gas stoves, emulating an idea that first caught steam in Sacramento, shows the California Way is spreading nationwide. With Californian Harris now topping the presidential ticket, the California Way previews a future Harris administration's policy agenda, on green policy and so much more.



Bridge players in general, and experts in particular, occasionally get greedy. One of the most famous cases of this sort occurred many years ago - in 1935, to be exact.

Dick Frey and Ely Culbertson, world-famous experts in those early days of contract bridge, were playing a set game at very high stakes against two prominent French experts.

Frey opened one notrump, and Culbertson raised him to four. This was simply an invitational raise in

notrump, asking South to bid a slam if he had a maximum for his opening notrump bid. But Frey, with minimum values, declined the invitation.

West led the diamond nine, won with the ten, and Frey could count only nine sure tricks. The spade suit could always be tested later, if necessary, for a 3-3 break, so Frey decided to try to develop a club trick. Accordingly, he led the ten of clubs at trick two, planning to finesse in the hope that West held the jack.

After West followed low, Frey played the six from dummy, at which point East (Pierre Albarran) followed with the deuce! Frey now had 10 tricks, but enamored with his success in having found West with the jack of clubs — or so he thought — he continued with the nine of clubs in a greedy effort to make five notrump.

This was greeted with open arms by the wily Albarran, who proceeded to cash four club tricks for down one.

Nearly 90 years have passed, but the story lingers on. Certainly Albarran, France's top player of that era, deserves great credit for his deuce-ofclubs play at trick two. But whether Frey should be censured for leading a second club or praised for making it possible for Albarran's defensive play to be brought to public attention, is left to the tender mercies of the reader.
