For more than 30 years SFRF has served Salado

Salado Family Relief Fund, working with local individuals, churches, businesses and civic organizations, will make Christmas possible for more than 50 families and more than 150 children.

"We still have requests coming in," Basilia Lopez said.

Applications for the Christmas project are sent in early November through the school district to families that are identified as economically disadvantaged. The forms, printed in English and Spanish, include the child's age and requests for up to three gifts. SFRF sets a \$100 limit per child for expenditures.

The SFRF keeps a list of previous sponsors and assigns families or individual children through that list. Donors do not know the identity of the child they are adopting. Donors bring the gifts to the Presbyterian Church of Salado where the SFRF volunteers organize them by family and child for the pick up day.

"Salado United Methodist Church handles the requests each year for coats," Griffin said. "Salado Masonic Lodge #296 handles requests each year for bikes and helmets."

Salado Family Relief Fund got its start three decades ago when Marilyn Fleischer saw two Salado school employees carrying used toys into the Salado fire station on the access road in December 1994.

"I saw the late Mary Ribeiro and Dana Britt, who both worked at Salado schools, hauling big trash bags of stuff into the fire station by the Salado Church of Christ," Marilyn said. "Being nosy, I walked over to see what they were doing. They were collecting used stuff animals, clothes and toys to give to the kids in the Salado school that they knew day-to-day who were in need. I did not know there was such a need and there was no real program to serve these families. I wanted to help, so for the next Christmas, we got a head start."

viduals was tremendous," Fleischer said. "We were able to build on the quiet charity that two Salado school employees showed and connected it to a wider community of givers."

Salado Family Relief Fund was founded on this loose coalition of volunteers and churches. It continues to work with churches, volunteers, civic groups and businesses to serve the Salado community. Salado Family Relief Fund became a 501(c)3 corporation in 1997 after the Jarrell tornado struck that community.

"We knew there was a bigger need at that time, so we worked to collect donations from local citizens and groups. It was more than we expected and we knew it was time to get organized," Marilyn said.

Tablerock announces cast of A Christmas Carol

SFRF relies entirely on donations for the services it provides. The group held its annual Empty Bowl fundraiser on Nov. 16 at the Salado Middle School. Proceeds from the Empty Bowl benefit the Christmas project and other needs throughout the year.

The Christmas project is the oldest service project of the Salado Family Relief Fund. The other major service project is the Back to School drive each year. SFRF provides back-toschool supplies to economically disadvantaged Salado ISD children each year along with a new backpack. The back-to-school project serves pre-K through High School students.

"Through the years this project has blossomed into a community-wide fundraiser which covers all of the expenses for Back-to-School, the largest expenditure we have all year," SFRF Board President J.R. Lett said.

"Funds for this project are raised through the Project Backpack Fundraiser," Lett explained. "This began as a fundraiser at Salado United Methodist Church over 16 years ago that was intended to help SFR's efforts by purchasing and donating backpacks."

Throughout the year, volunteer board members receive and respond to requests from individuals that are needing temporary assistance with rental payments, utilities, or other emergency needs. "Mary and Dana had been doing this collection of used toys and stuffed animals for quite a long time with help from the volunteer fire department," Fleischer said.

Working with Ribeiro and Britt, Marilyn promoted the Christmas gift project through the *Salado Village Voice* newspaper and contacted local churches and civic organizations like the Ladies Auxiliary and Salado Lions Club, this time for new gifts and clothes.

The first formal collection and distribution of gifts was December 1995 thanks to the Salado Volunteer Fire Department. "They held an open house and the late Wayne Rutherford invited the community to come see the fire equipment and donate new gifts for Salado school kids. The volunteer firefighters delivered those gifts that year on Dec. 23."

That year, the group served 42 elementary students. Dana Britt worked to serve the junior high and high school students.

"The response from the area churches and indi-

and we knew we had to become tax-deductible and incorporate," founding president Marilyn Fleischer said. "The Jarrell tornado was the catalyst."

That was when she worked with groups like the Ladies Auxiliary, Chamber of Commerce, Lions Club, Salado Rotary Club and local churches to formalize a board and an organization.

The late Eldon Miller did all of the legal paperwork to make the Salado Family Relief Fund a 501(c)3 charitable organization. He was the first Treasurer of the Board and Marilyn was the first President.

"It's interesting that the only time since then that SFR has helped with this type of large community effort was the summer of 2022 following the tornado that struck Salado," advisor to the board Marilyn Griffin said. "Salado Family Relief worked with the organizers of Salado Strong to collect and distribute funds raised for victims of this storm."

Salado Family Relief Fund has had a dedicated board of directors ever since with many who have given of their time and treasure over the span of a quarter of a century. Leigh (Drake) Ihrie followed Fleischer as the second President. Mary Catherine Ervin was the third President. Renee Oas was the fourth. JR Lett is the current President of the Board of Directors that oversees and manages the annual projects of the Salado Family Relief Fund.

Xi pushes for Chinese yuan to replace American dollar as world reserve currency The Markets

As represented by the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), the stock market expressed some second thoughts about the economic, or at least corporate earnings prospects generated by a Trump presidency this week as it declined about 2.08% to close at 5870.62 this week. That retracement still leaves the SPX up about 23% this year, just over 30% from a year ago and 25% higher over the last three years for a three-year average annual rate of 7.83%. The other stock market indicator we follow, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, slipped 1.24% to 2927.03 but remains up about 17% this year and 26% from a year ago.

The benchmark ten-year U.S. Treasury note yield continued its rise to 4.43% this week from last week's 4.30%, while the one-month T-bill held at an annualized rate of 4.7%. The price of a barrel of West Texas Intermediate crude, the U.S. petroleum benchmark, fell 4.79% to \$70.38 as demand from China continued to decline.

The Economy

There was no shortage of economic news this week, and everything looked good. The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) reported that the Consumer Price Index (CPI), the most widely followed measure of U.S. inflation, rose only 0.2% in October and was up 2.6% from last year. If we pull out the relatively volatile food and energy data to get the so-called "core" CPI, the monthly increase rises to 0.3%, and the annual measure of inflation rises to 3.3%. All the numbers were higher than the Federal Reserve's goal of 2% inflation but were both steady and low enough not to be considered dangerously high. We have been saving that we expected long-term inflation to stabilize around 3% based on historical trends, and it is

looking more and more like we were right.

We also pay attention to the Producer Price Index (PPI) from the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). In October, the PPI for final demand, i.e., the index of wholesale prices as retailers pay them, was up 0.2% in October and 2.4% for the last 12 months. Interestingly, the wholesale price of services is rising at about 3.3%, while goods prices have fallen about 1.2% over the previous year. A little further upstream, the cost of intermediate goods and services has decreased by 2.9% in 12 months. It certainly looks like the inflationary pressures have abated. Another critical point that emerges from that data is that retailers are bumping the inflation numbers up, which appears to result from a labor shortage at the retail level. Our economy continues to bump into the fact that we don't have enough people willing to work at the retail level. Over the past several decades, much of that low-level, relatively low-income work has been done by immigrants. In the more distant past, younger workers filled those jobs as they entered the workforce. Unfortunately, our native birth rate has declined, and we have far fewer young workers to fill those jobs as a percentage of the workforce.

The same trends are confirmed even further up the goods and services supply chain. Because we import substantially more goods than we export, import prices tend to drive both the PPI and the CPI. The BLS reported this week that prices for U.S. imports rose 0.3% in October and 0.8% from a year ago. The most volatile element in that area is fuel imports. If we remove fuel from the calculation, import prices have risen 2.3% in the last year.

Our clients have expressed concern over the years that the Chinese yuan (aka renminbi) might somehow replace the dollar as the world reserve currency. Indeed, Premier Xi commonly expresses that desire, such as at last month's **BRICS** conference. Actions speak louder than words, though. Despite having no internal need for more dollars, the PRC Finance Ministry is offering sovereign bonds denominated in dollars rather than yuan. The Chinese government remains committed to retaining their currency for use only in the People's Republic to retain tight control of the yuan's market value. Another interesting issue is that dollar-denominated sovereign bonds issued and guaranteed by the People's Republic of China are offered on the Riyadh Exchange in Saudi Arabia rather than on a Chinese exchange. Even as the Chinese Premier calls for the dedollarization of the world economy, when the PRC needs external funding, it asks for it in dollars. The bottom line remains

the same. The U.S. economy is, as we used to say, "firing on all cylinders" and appears to have plenty of fuel and momentum to continue to expand. There are concerns that if the new administration does impose steep tariffs while at the same time deporting millions of undocumented immigrant workers, prices



will rise for both imported goods and labor, but that is only a possibility and one to worry about on another day.

Alan decided that the couple would build the house themselves, including doing much of the labor.


"He installed trim and doors, as well as some insulation and wiring, while I was generally on clean-up duty," Kelly said.

The home of Alan and Kelly Brooks, 708 Rose Way. (Photo BY TIM FLEISCHER)



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
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Shopping Map of Salado

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
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Eagles beat Devine, 46-21

The Eagles led throughout the game, scoring in the first minute of play on a 77 yard pass from Lincoln Hossfeld to Brendan Wilson. The Eagles went for two and Hossfeld hit Korbin Konarik to make the score 8-0 with 11:09 in the first.

Townes Sather's kick hit the Devine player in the knees on the ensuing kick off and Brayden Dildine recovered the ball for Salado at the Devine 16, but the Eagles could not convert the opportunity into points, turning the ball over on downs at the Devine 12.

The Warhorses got a first down, but then had to punt from their own 29 for Salado to take over at their own 37 yard line.





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

Opening lead — jack of spades.

The strong emphasis duplicate bridge places on overtricks can sometimes produce a result that would cause a nonduplicate player to shake his head in disbelief. A spectacular example is provided by today's deal, which occurred in a national pairs event.

South reached six notrump as shown, and West led the jack of spades. In rubber bridge, declarer would have no

problem assuring the slam. He would simply establish dummy's hearts, losing a trick to the queen along the way, and wind up with 12 tricks consisting of two spades, four hearts, three diamonds and three clubs.

But at duplicate, where making six might be a poor result if seven can be made, South cannot afford to settle for a mere 12 tricks. So when dummy came down, declarer immediately noted that if West held two, three or four hearts including the queen, 13 tricks could be made by taking one or two heart finesses.

Accordingly, South won the first trick in his hand with the king of spades and led a heart to the ten, whereupon East, smoothly and in tempo, followed low! This had the desired effect on South, who quite understandably was convinced that the precious overtrick was just around the corner.

So he cashed dummy's king of clubs to unblock the suit, crossed to the queen of diamonds and played the A-Q of clubs before leading a heart to the jack. One can only imagine South's chagrin when East won with the queen and cashed the jack of clubs for down one! Duplicate bridge is not for the faint of heart.



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
