U.S. economy adds 255,000 new jobs in November

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) continued to Update bull its way ahead as it rose 0.96% for the week to close at 6090.27, another recordhigh weekly close. The SPX is now up 27.68% this year and 33.87% higher than a year ago. Our other market indicator, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, slipped 2.09% for the week to close at 2870.40. Despite the loss, it remains 18.49% higher than when the year began and up 24.63% from a year ago.

The benchmark tenyear Treasury note ended the week with a yield of 4.15%, little changed from last week's 4.18%. The onemonth T-bill slipped a bit to yield an annualized rate of 4.57%, while the 2-year note slid to 4.1% and the 20-year Treasury bond was paying 4.42%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil ended the U.S. market week at \$71.14 per barrel, still about 0.7% lower than when the year began.

The Economy

The U.S. economy is on a roll. As they are reported, third-quarter corporate earnings and guidance continue to support the statistical reports from independent agencies and the government that our economy is continuing to plow forward with what Fed Chairman Powell has described as "remarkable resilience." While on the surface, this expansion resembles the dot-com boom of the late 1990s; there is a marked difference in that the AI revolution is creating increased corporate profits and profound increases in labor force productivity. The market and economic bubble of the late 1990s held great promise but failed to produce the profound changes investors hoped for. Echoing that theme, the U.S. economy created 227,000 more jobs, net, in November, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics

(BLS). That number handily beat the consensus expectation of 200,000. Our economy has averaged a 180,000-job creation rate over the past year. Additionally, the BLS increased last month's new jobs number to 255,000. Though the unemployment rate rose from 4.1% to 4.2%, that rise was apparently the result of new workers entering the workforce rather than layoffs. November's new job creation was partially created by last month's end to the Boeing strike and the return to work of thousands of people who had been temporarily out of work because of the hurricanes. Still, the number of new jobs reported was significantly higher than could be accounted for by those events. Analysts commented that the acceleration in job creation was not so large that it would likely prevent the Federal Reserve from another 0.25% reduction, bringing it to the 4.25% to 4.5% range at its December meeting. It did add to the concern that the Fed might not decrease rates as much over the next six months as was previously assumed. We have commented for some time that the two percent inflation target set by the Federal Reserve is, in our opinion, unlikely to be achieved. Over the past several decades, Americans seem to have been most happy with inflation at about 3%. Ultimately, American consumers set the inflation rate by being willing to keep buying goods and services up to a certain level of price appreciation.

56.0 in October to 52.1 in November. New orders, production, and employment remained above the 50.0 neutral level. That slight reduction takes that section of the economy back to a sustainable level. For better or worse, both China and Germany's export-oriented economies continued to show general weakness.

Despite all the good news, there were some shadows. As the new administration takes office. a consensus seems to be developing that bailing out bank account holders who have deposits over the FDIC \$250,000 limit must stop. We suggest you pay attention to that warning and avoid exceeding the FDIC limits whenever possible. A change appears to be developing in the job market. Mid and low-level white-collar job applicants are seeing a significantly lengthier wait to find a job. One of the results of the AI revolution seems to be a reduction in low and midlevel management and administrative positions, even as hourly workers are being hired at an increasing rate. If the promised cuts in the Federal workforce come to pass, that oversupply of jobs in those stratus levels may be compounded. The good news in that area is that specialty job openings are rising again. As is common with rapid technological change, some areas are negatively impacted even as

Texas Needs a Rural Maternal Health Rescue Plan Now

Texas stands at a crossroads. Once a leader in rural health care innovation. the state now finds itself grappling with a burgeoning maternal health crisis. Alarmingly, nearly half of Texas counties are classified as "maternity care deserts." This lack of access to essential health care services puts the lives of many women and their children at risk, particularly in rural areas. The solution lies in swift legislative action to implement a rural maternal health rescue initiative. Without it, the health and economic vitality of Texas' rural communities may be irreparably compromised.

The statistics paint a bleak picture. Over 47% of Texas counties lack obstetrical care services entirely, far exceeding the national average of 33%. The consequences of this are stark: rural mothers face higher rates of inadequate prenatal care, long travel times to maternity facilities, and poorer health outcomes for both mothers and infants.

Additionally, the financial strain on existing hospitals is unsustainable. Most rural hospitals do not provide obstetrical services and of those that do, 59% lose money on labor and delivery services. These alarming trends demand immediate attention.

The history of rural health care in Texas underscores the urgency. In the 1990s, the state faced a similar crisis, marked by hospital closures and the exodus of OB care providers. Lawmakers responded with the Rural Health Rescue Act, stabilizing and strengthening our rural health care system. Today, Texas needs a similarly bold approach to prevent history from repeating itself. The Rural Texas Maternal Health Assembly has proposed a comprehensive plan to address these challenges and secure the future of rural maternal health care. (https://architexas.org/programs/maternal-health/index.html)

At the heart of the problem is access – or rather, the lack of it. Women in rural areas often live more than 30 minutes from the nearest maternity care facility, a barrier that disproportionately affects low-income and uninsured women. This distance exacerbates the risks of complications during pregnancy and childbirth, and it underscores the broader inequities in health care access between urban and rural populations.

This issue is not just about health: it's about economics. Rural communities generate more than \$20 billion annually for the state's economy, but their long-term viability hinges on their ability to attract and retain young families. Who would choose to start a family and raise children in a place without adequate maternal health care? Without investment in these areas, Texas risks not only the well-being of its citizens but also the economic stability of its rural heartland.

The proposed rescue initiative offers a roadmap for change. It calls for targeting investments in Texas' rural health care infrastructure, strengthening access to maternal health services in Medicaid, and expanding incentives to attract and re-


tain obstetric care providers in underserved areas. These measures are not only morally imperative but also fiscally prudent.

One of the most pressing needs is ensuring postpartum care, as 25% of maternal deaths occur within a year of delivery. By improving postpartum services in Medicaid, Texas can prevent avoidable deaths and improve the quality of life for mothers and their families. Furthermore, investments in preventive care such as cancer screenings and contraceptive services - will lead to healthier communities overall.

Texas has always prided itself on resilience and innovation. Our state's leaders must now channel these qualities to resolve our maternal health crisis. The stakes are too high to delay. A modern rural maternal health rescue plan is not just a policy priority. It is critical to ensuring Texas' economic miracle continues. Healthy mothers and babies are the foundation of strong families and thriving communities. By investing in their future, Texas invests in its own.

It's time for lawmakers to act boldly and decisively. The lives of rural mothers and their children depend on it.

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parent to deny their child's abuse

The recently released Netflix series on the Menendez brothers reignited debate over whether a parent would overlook their child's abuse at the hands of their spouse.

The sad truth is that these sorts of cases are far from unique or even uncommon.

A parent faced with the abusive conduct of a partner, family member, or friend must confront the unthinkable -- harm to their child and the worst possible betrayal committed by someone they perhaps considered to be their life partner, better half, or best friend. Parents should know that initial feelings of confusion, or even shocked disbelief, are not unusual.

But parents should also know that the decisions made in the immediate aftermath of such a revelation will have a lifelong impact. Rates of depression, PTSD, substance abuse, and suicide are all significantly higher for victims of child sexual assault. A child's trauma is only compounded if a trusted adult denies or minimizes the abuse.

To protect their child, parents don't need to immediately believe every word they say. But they need to report the abuse, separate their child from the offender, and suspend their own disbelief through the course of an investigation.

Often, those actions give parents the time they need to process the reality of what happened. But there are other pitfalls that may hinder a parent from supporting a child. It's important for every parent and child advocate to be aware of these barriers and work to overcome them.

If the offender is the primary breadwinner in the family, the non-offending parent may panic over housing and financial stability. This is especially true in circumstances where the parent lacks a solid support system. Can they rely on friends or family? Or are they dependent on their child's abuser?

Often, concerns about public image arise. A nonoffending parent may worry at the prospect of losing their social and professional circles.

Experiencing child sexual abuse is a devastating trauma. And while a parent experiences their own form of psychological trauma upon learning their child was abused, the obligation to protect their child must always come first. The good news is that help is available for families navigating this excruciating time. Experts working at Children's Advocacy Centers nationwide play a pivotal role in ensuring that abused children and their caregivers receive the support they need. Professionals at these centers provide therapy, medical care, and liaising with police -- but also advice, like how to get the offender removed from the home and how to tell family, friends, or teachers about what happened.

According to the CDC, an estimated one in four girls and one in 20 boys experience child sexual abuse. Its prevalence is believed to be higher because children often wait years to report abuse. About 30% of victims have been sexually abused by a family member, while roughly 90% know their abuser in some way. Parents everywhere should take note, listen, and learn.

A child's disclosure of abuse is shocking, disturbing, and life-changing. But supporting your child from the start is always the right thing to do.



All are welcome to join both the Posada procession, mass, and celebration. This walk takes place on the second weekend of The Annual Salado Christmas Stroll.





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
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

Whenever declarer finds himself in what appears to be a hopeless contract, he should try to visualize some lie of the opposing cards that might allow the contract to be made. . .

Consider this deal where it seems that South must lose two club tricks at six spades and go down one. However, South has an excellent chance for the slam if he plays his cards correctly. West's two-club overcall should guide him to the winning method of play.

Declarer ruffs the diamond lead and cashes the ace of trump. When both opponents follow suit, South knows that East started with a singleton spade and, in view of West's two-club bid, with either one club or none.

It follows that East must have lots of hearts and diamonds - and, more especially, that East almost certainly has more hearts than West. If this probability pans out, the slam is ice-cold.

So, South cashes the A-K of hearts and ruffs a heart, then cashes dummy's ace of clubs and ruffs the queen of diamonds.

The stage is now set for the key play. South leads the eight of hearts and, when West shows out, discards a club from dummy! East wins with the queen and is forced to return a

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Buckley brews with Barrow

Texas House Representative (District 54) Brad Buckley collaborated with Barrow Brewing Company of Salado on a new craft beer that will compete in the Texas Craft Brewers Guild Pro Am competition in early 2025. During the 2025 Legislative session Buckley will be presenting a bill to alleviate some of the tax burden on Texas' craft breweries. The bill has been nicknamed Beers For Steers.

"The Beers for Steers legislation seeks to ensure mutual benefit for brewers and agricultural producers statewide, incentivizing the practice of providing spent grain by-products to livestock operations free of charge. This legislation would lower feed costs for livestock producers, while also lowering the excise tax burden on small businesses in the brewing and distilling industries. By supporting Texas small businesses in the agriculture and alcohol industries, we provide opportunity for localized economic growth particularly in more rural communities and communities with a focus on the Agriculture and Tourism industry." -Travis Bailey, Texas Craft Brewers Guild Government Affairs Associate.

According to Salado Rancher Matthew May, "It is a win win for everyone, taking a by-product that would otherwise be thrown away, and upcycling it into cattle feed." May has supplemented his Beefmaster Cattle's ration with spent grain from Barrow Brewing since 2016. Most recently

he weaned Big Red, a heifer born in early 2024, using spent grain. The calves transition seamlessly to the ration used by the development program for his bulls.

The Buckley team and members of the Texas Craft Brewers Guild met at Barrow for the brew day along with rancher Matthew May and the Arnold Family from Holland who brought a Beefmaster heifer, Big Red. Nine-year-old Cade Arnold will be showing Big Red in Livestock Shows statewide


