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Residents oppose WWTP permit for **Mustang Springs**

The effluent from a proposed Mustang Springs wastewater treatment plant will meet "federal drinking standards when it comes out," according to the applicant's representative who spoke before a crowd of about 60 on Feb. 3.

Mustang Springs Utility LLC and Jaffe Interest, LP applied on April 5, 2024 for a new Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No. WQ0016524001, to authorize the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 990,000 gallons per day (GPD). An earlier permit from 2023 with a different discharge location was withdrawn.

The WWTP will serve Mustang Springs at Salado, an 1,105 acre development off FM 2843 that will have approximately 600 estate lots, mixed use and apartments. The first phase will be 1-3 acre single family residential estate lots.

The WWTP is proposed to be constructed in three phases served by a common fine screen headworks and flow equalization tankage to process up to 1,312,000 gpd. Each phase is proposed to be a membrane bioreactor (MBR) and each phase will include an anoxic zone ahead of the aerobic zone to provide nitrification. RAS will be recycled at rates up to 500%. Provisions for alkalinity, pH and supplemental carbon chemical feed systems will be included with each MBR. Sludge will be wasted to a separate aerated sludge holding tank to maintain optimal MLSS conditions in the bioreactor. Effluent will be stabilized by UV light per 30 TAC 217 Sub-chapter L prior to surface discharge.

Ron Lusk, representing the permit applicants told the local residents that very little, if any, of the effluent would be discharged into Mustang Creek.

The effluent will be used for landscaping irrigation for 100 acres of parks, as well as right of ways along the boulevards in the development, Lusk said.

The WWTP is based on 250 GPD per living unit equivalent (LUE). "That is not what is going to be generated," Lusk said. "It is going to be far less than that."

During the informal question and answer period, resident Max Prince asked why the developer was not using on-site septic systems since the lots were larger estate size lots.

"We personally don't like septic," Lusk said. "The principal reason is that it is not good for environment."

When asked about algae bloom in Georgetown being connected to wastewater discharge, Lusk responded that the blooms were "caused by fertilizer and ranches."

Applicant representative Randall Nelson responded that the developer is using "state-of-the-art membrane technology. We aren't using 90-year-old technology. We are going beyond Tier 1 ef-

fluent. It will actually meet USDA safe drinking water standard. We are not taking sewage water and putting it in the creek. We see it as a resource for land applica-

The membrane system has a porousness of 38/1000ths of a micron, meaning that "no viruses, bacteria or solids can pass through," according to one of the applicant representa-

Prince asked how many water monitors would be put up and down the stream to monitor. He was asked to make that comment during the formal comment period so that TCEQ staff could respond in turn.

"They do not have water locked up yet," resident Larry Michaels said. "How can you process a wastewater permit?"

During public comment, Michaels asked for a firm answer regarding back up generators and how the process will work during major, prolonged power outages. He also asked for clarification on the Certificate of Convenience and Necessity (CCN) for both water and wastewater services.

Resident Terry Stack asked about the technology, which dates to 1955, and locations where it is utilized. She was told that there are more than 60 systems across the country and a half dozen in Texas with another five soon to be or currently under construction. They range in size from 200,000 GPD to 750,000 GPD. Applicant representatives said they would take residents on a tour of a similar facility to show how it works.

The first phase of the WWTP will be for 50,000

One of the applicant representatives said that the location chosen for the WWTP (approximately 900 feet west of the intersection of FM 2843 and Mustang Creek Road) rather than further back on the property is because "There won't be any houses around it. It is not going to be offensive because it will look like a barn."

Further, odor for sewer systems is often the result of the collection lines, not the system itself, he said. "The collection system will have automated enzyme dosing machines at manholes along the way to change it from anaerobic to aerobic."

The plant will be an enclosed station with carbon filtration. "The screens are sealed as well," he said.

Resident John Cook told TCEQ that he was an affected landowner and should have been mailed notice of the meeting. He said that he and other neighbors (also affected landowners) were not mailed notices. During public comment, he requested that TCEQ extend the public comment period by 60-90 days to give residents a chance to review the new permit application.

"I didn't know about this meeting until I read it in last week's newspaper," Cook said. "We didn't have time to prepare to make final comments tonight. Or to request for a contested hearing."

Mayor discusses Village finances

After receiving a petition to roll back the property tax rate for \$0.4860 to \$0.3612, the Village of Salado froze new hires and salaries, paused participation in major road projects on Williams Rd., Royal St. and Mill Creek Dr. and paused mowing and street mainte-

"We knew it was going to trigger this," Mayor Bert Henry said during a town hall Jan. 30. "We anticipated the petition."

The town hall was originally set for Jan. 9 but postponed due to potentially inclement weather. The next Mayor Town Hall meeting will be Feb. 11 and will continue on the second Thursday of each month through

The successful petition for a rollback election has put the matter before Salado voters, who will decide on it May 3. If the election is successful, the Village will have to refund \$550,000 to property tax payers within

Mayor Henry said that

the forensic investigation into Village finances show that "there doesn't appear to be embezzlement or anything like. There are no unusual costs. It was just spent."

Since then, he added, the Village has implemented "process to prevent that from happening again."

Henry said that the "Village has been subsidizing developers and people who want to make improvements to their property. We are doing something about that."

He reviewed the original Sanctuary Development Agreement from 2015 and the Amended Agreement from 2022. The new agreement is in place for up to 20 years, with reimbursement of 50% of property taxes, 50% of hotel occupancy taxes and 100% of wastewater sewer fees. It also sets a total limit on the tax rebates that can be collected for \$6 million in tax rebates and \$6 million in wastewater impact fees. The original agreement had those with a lifetime of 45 years with no limit on the amount of any rebates that could be collected.

He also reviewed the economic development agreement with Eagle Heights development.

The Village waived \$592,900 in Parkland Development Fees and \$540,960 in Wastewater Impact Fees

"Sidewalks were not required for the entire development per the agreement," Henry said.

"We talked with DR Horton and they agreed to build sidewalks on Williams and West Village, even though they don't have to," he said.

The agreement runs with the land, not the owner. The five-year agreement can be extended another year at the option of the developer, he said.

Agreements that only benefit the developer will no longer be pursued, he said. "If developers want to come in, they can pay to come in," he said.

"Reducing property tax significantly in a short period of time without additional revenues streams has several risks to it," Henry said. "You will have to reduce public services. The

community is growing, but dropping the tax rate, how are you going to fix the roads, provide parks, provide police?"

Henry said of his conversations with police staff, "They are a little nervous. They are concerned for their jobs because of the potential cuts. From day one, I have said the police department budget is off limits. If we take any steps back on that, we are behind the curve."

The department has eight officers and provide 24-7-365 protection.

Further, if the Village has to continue postponing road projects and street maintenance, "The costs are only going to go up," Henry said.

Despite these issues, the Village has made forward progress by agreeing to annex the Holiday Inn Express. This will bring \$25,000-30,000 in property taxes to the Village. "The cost of extending the sewer will be on the developer. They will pay full impact fees. They have been trying to come in to the village for years."

Fed Chair: Tariffs will have unpredictable cost effects

Reading the financial news, one would think we were amid a stock market crash following the news that DeepSeek, a Chinese artificial intelligence (AI) company, came out with a supposedly cheaper version of Chat GPT. Indeed, the S&P 500 Stock Index dropped from around 6119 early Friday to 6040.53 at the close, but from the close of the market last week to this week's end, there was a mere 1% decline. The value of diversification was demonstrated as Nvidia stock declined from its high of \$153 early in the week to close at \$120, a 22% drop that took a cool trillion dollars off the total value of the SPX. The SPX remained up a respectful 2.7% for the month and year to date, 24.66% higher than a year ago. The other stock index we follow, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, declined a mere 0.50% for the week to 2868.20 and remained up 2.54% this year and about 16.28% since this time in 2024.

Over in the U.S. Treasury bond market, which is both everywhere and nowhere as it has no celebrated location like the "stock market" has at 44 Wall Street, the benchmark yield of the 10-year U.S. Treasury note fell a bit over 1% to 4.58% as the week and month ended. Today's yield is almost precisely what it was as the year began, about 15% higher than a year ago. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) slipped a wee bit less than two dollars to close the U.S. market week at \$72.91.



Knowing where to start for this week's economic news is hard. The good news is that most of it was good news.

The literally biggest news was that the Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) released its advance estimate of the annualized gross domestic product growth rate for the United

sonal consumption expenditures (PCE) inflation rate during the fourth quarter was 2.3%. Real US GDP increased by 2.8% in 2024 after 2.9% in 2023. The PCE inflation rate for last year was 2.3% compared with 3.3% in 2023. Last quarter's GDP reflected an increase in net consumer spending combined with a lower rate of imports.

The good bureaucrats at

the BEA also announced today that personal income increased by \$92 billion, or 0.4% in December. Disposable personal income (DPI)—personal income less personal current taxes—increased by \$79.7 billion, while personal savings were up by \$843.2 billion, or 3.8% of personal income. Collectively, we U.S. consumers increased our spending by \$78.2 billion for services but only \$55.3 billion for goods. We often hear comments and questions about why services is such a large part of our GDP compared to manufacturing. One of the primary reasons. We Americans spend a lot more on services than we do on goods. No one is making us do that. We do it because many of us have about all the "stuff" we want or need, but we can always purchase more services, which are expended as soon as they are received in most cases, while goods tend to persist before needing replacement.

The Federal Reserve Open Market Board, comand decided to vigorously do nothing. In most months and weeks, that meeting and the press conference following would have been covered in minute detail with volumes of print and commentary produced analyzing the nuances of each word uttered or reported to have been spoken by the Fed chairman. Still, so much else was happening that it became minor news this week. They did, though, make two small but significant changes. First, the statement dropped any suggestion that rates might be lowered further. The second comment was perhaps more critical; Chairman Powell warned that tariff increases, if they come, may have an unpredictable effect on prices, suggesting that if prices rise because of tariffs, both ours and possible retaliatory actions, the Congressional mandate to the Fed was to act to stabilize prices. That implied that rates might go up.

Then, on Friday, the other shoe dropped. President Trump announced he would impose 25% tariffs on imports from Mexico and Canada but possibly exclude oil. Considering that the U.S. imports a significant portion of its fresh fruit and vegetables from Mexico in the winter and things like lumber and automobiles and their repair parts from Canada, if those tariffs are imposed, expect a significant increase in food and other things soon.

The bottom line is that all appears well in the U.S. economy; however, the threat of large tariffs on our biggest trading partners with potential counter-tariffs in return is potentially problematic.

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Readers on town hall meeting, Buckley against MAGA mandate

weekends of the Christmas Stroll from a local vendor for \$10,000. National commercial rentals would be less than a quarter of that. And how many people rode the bus? Zero? Can the Mayor and Aldermen be trusted with more tax money?

We need a financial advisory board or a Department of Government efficiency (a "DOGE") in Salado to protect us!

Finally, in the Town Hall, the Mayor used smoke and mirrors to justify increasing property tax rates. He did this by presenting tax rate comparisons higher in prior years in Salado and in other cities. What the Mayor did not show in slides was that property tax appraisals in Salado have increased substantially which may have allowed property tax rates to be reduced in prior periods. The Mayor and Aldermen cannot manage money. They want taxation without representation, without remorse, and without accountability. You know – tyranny.

The Mayor and Aldermen should be hanging their heads in shame rather than defending the largest percentage tax increase in

Salado's 25 year history. Why would you trust the Mayor with another \$1M or more in taxes?

Additional recognitions included School Crisis Response Counselors, Counselor Advisory Board Members, New Counselors, and Elite School Counselors.





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

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

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
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
