# SISD will fund local match for sidewalks

Village of Salado aldermen on Feb. 6 approved an interlocal agreement with Salado ISD for the Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) and Killeen-Temple Metropolitan Planning Organization sidewalk grant for a shared-use sidewalk along Williams Road between FM 2484 and West Village Road.

Under the grant, the Village is required to match 20% of the total cost of the project, as well as reimbursing TXDOT for engineering fees of \$13,978 and environmental studies of approximately \$10,000.

Under the interlocal agreement, approved by Salado ISD trustees at their January meeting, Salado ISD will place \$672,838 in an escrow account with the Village of Salado to fund the estimated cost of the project. Of the project, TXDOT/KTMPO will fund \$492,534.40. The local share will be \$180,303.60 including the engineering and environmental costs.

The Village match of \$123,133.60 will be reimbursed from the escrow.

After completion of the project and receipt of reimbursement of the TXDOT/KTMPO grant, the village will return the remaining unspent escrow funds to Salado ISD.

The Village will have project oversight and re-

sponsibilities. The Village will issue Requests for Proposals and Invitations to Bid for construction services, will oversee of contractors and ensure that the project is completed.

"This project meets two of the three things we focus on in Salado, including student safety," Ted Smith, chief operations officer for Salado ISD told aldermen Feb. 6.

Salado ISD will dedicate necessary right-of-way to the Village for the sidewalk project.

Salado ISD will fund its portion from bond proceeds because it will be part of the overall project for the new high school and stadium to provide sidewalks. Salado ISD is bound the subdivision ordinance to provide sidewalks.

The interlocal agreement was unanimously approved on a motion by alderman Jasen Graham, receiving a second by Mayor Pro Tem Rodney Bell.

Aldermen zoned 2.085 acres owned by Celts International, LLC, known as Salado Center at the northwest corner of FM 2484 and IH-35, and 7.109 acres at 1991 N. Stagecoach Rd. owned by Salado Hospitality Investments, LLC, as Local Retail.

Aldermen also approved a special events permit for the 2025 Sirena Fest to be held Oct. 5 in Pace Park, closing Pace Park Dr. and allowing the sale of alcohol.

# Ferdin named Salado Police Officer of the Year

Mayor Bert Henry recognized Salado police officer Edward Ferdin as the 2024 Village of Salado Police Officer of the Year during the Feb. 6 Board of Aldermen meeting.

"Officer Ferdin has demonstrated exceptional commitment to community policing, fostering strong relationships with citizens and business owners alike. His proactive engagement has significantly enhanced the safety and well-being of our community," Henry stated.

"In addition to receiving two lifesaving awards, Officer Ferdin was recently awarded the Law Enforcement Commendation Medal for Outstanding Performance," Henry

said. "He has consistently shown the ability to handle the most challenging situations with the utmost level of pride, professionalism and attention to detail. His exemplary performance and unwavering dedication to duty have made a profound impact on the Village of Salado and the surrounding community."

Henry also read a resolution from State Senator Pete Flores for his lifesaving action in response to two recent emergency incidents.

The resolution read: "On November 11, 2023, Officer Ferdin was called to a truck stop in Salado to investigate a reported overdose; upon arrival, he and a fellow officer discovered an unconscious individual who was determined to be suffering from fentanyl intoxication, and Officer Ferdin immediately administered Narcan and began performing CPR in an effort to restore the victim's pulse; thanks to Officer Ferdin's swift and decisive efforts, the individual regained consciousness after the arrival of emergency medical personnel and ultimately survived."

"Just six months later, on May 24, 2024, Officer Ferdin was the first to respond to a major collision involving a pickup truck and a semitruck; though one of the occupants of the pickup had been killed, Officer Ferdin immediately aided a second occupant who was critically injured, applying two tourniquets to control

blood loss from the individual's arm and leg; his calm response helped reassure the victim, who was subsequently transported to a hospital to undergo successful emergency surgery," the resolution read.

The proclamation stated that "Officer Edward Ferdin demonstrated dedication to duty during two crisis situations, and heroic efforts, he has exemplified the finest qualities are sworn to serve and protect; now, therefore, be it resolved that Officer Edward Ferdin be commended for his lifesaving actions and that he be extended sincere best wishes for continued success with his important work."

# Trade imbalance may be in anticipation of sharp tariffs

It was, to say the least, interesting to watch the various stock and bond indices this week, not only because of what they did but perhaps more importantly, what they did not do. As a prime U.S. stock market proxy, our dear old S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) only had a very minor net movement for the week, falling 0.24% to 6025.99. That insignificant movement in the total market value hides the fact that the SPX dropped to about 5900 on Monday and rose to about 6100 on Friday before ending the week about where it started. The surprise was, and is, the lack of any significant reaction to what should be market-shaking economic pronouncements out of the White House. Either the U.S. corporate economy is so strong that announcements that would typically have been seen as potentially recession-generating can be ignored, or traders have come to believe that Presidential executive orders are more show than reality. The concern is that if one or some of those executive orders is left in place, the shock of that new perception of reality could catch market participants off guard and spark a panic.

Meanwhile, the SPX is up 2.45% this year, about 21% in the last 12 months, and over 34% higher than three years ago. That appreciation equated to an average annual rate of return of about 10.49%. Since inflation averaged about 4% over that period, the net SPX return has been about 6.5%, well within historical norms. Our other tracked equity market index, the CRSP U.S. Mid Cap Value Index, fell 0.76% for the week to 2846.47, up 1.76% this year and 14.59% from this time last year.

The 10-year U.S. Treasury note yield fell to 4.49%, about 10% higher than a year ago and 134% higher than three years ago. West Texas Intermediate crude oil slipped 2.56% to

\$71.04 per barrel, 3.82% less expensive than a year ago, and down over 22% over the last three years.

The Economy

According to the Labor Department, the U.S. economy added 143,000 jobs, dropping the unemployment rate to 4% in January. While the new jobs figure was slightly lower than most economists had forecast, it was still a robust job creation rate. Meanwhile, nonfarm business labor productivity increased at a 1.2% annualized rate in the fourth quarter and 2.3% for all of 2024. That sounds great, but job openings decreased from November's 8.16 million to 7.60 million. What does all that mean? The bottom line is that employers are still hiring more job seekers than before the pandemic, but the days when it was a job seeker's market are drawing to a close. That is also shown in the productivity report. New hires are generally less productive than those who have been there for a while. Digging deeper, we also see a historically low rate of layoffs, suggesting that employers are focused on retaining existing employees but are less enthusiastic about bringing new people on board. That is a good place to be for any economy, although it may be far less exciting.

Two reports, one from he Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) and the other from the Census Bureau. illustrate a clear, if perhaps short-term movement in the U.S. economy. The Census announced that U.S. factory orders fell sharply in the final month of 2024, while the BEA noted that

nificant negative trade balance since 2022, as we imported about \$365 billion in goods and services but only exported \$266.5 billion, a \$98.4 billion deficit in December. The probable cause appeared to be anticipation of tariffs. Anticipated needs for things manufactured in Mexico, Canada, and China took top priority in an attempt to beat the price increases that come with tariffs. Those figures, though, are lagging indicators. The prime leading indicator, the U.S. manufacturing PMI, rose to 50.9, indicating potential growth in domestic manufacturing for the first time in 26 months. At the same time, the Atlanta Federal Reserve's GDPNow tracking model suggested a potential annualized growth rate in the first quarter of this year of 2.9%. Despite a short slowdown as purchasers front-ran anticipated tariffs, it looks more and more like the good times will keep rolling here in the U.S. of A.

Adding icing to the rapidly growing U.S. economic "cake," small, medium, and large U.S. enterprises have been saying they plan to expand their capacity sharply this year. The economic data suggests that the labor market and the larger economy are finding a balance at full employment, supporting our optimistic view of the near future.

Yet again, we must disappoint those looking for an economic contraction to validate their negative opinion of the U.S. economy. Instead, we continue to see ample evidence of continued healthy economic growth.

# **Voucher bill will balloon** in cost, reduce chances for future teacher pay raises

Gov. Abbott and Lt. Gov. Patrick claim to want to raise teacher pay, but the Senate today is expected to debate SB 2, a voucher bill that, if finally enacted, will make it increasingly more difficult for public school classrooms to be adequately funded and public school teachers to be adequately

The Legislative Budget Board's fiscal note on SB 2 projects that after an initial cost of about \$1 billion during the 2026-27 biennium, the bill will balloon to a \$6 billion tax giveaway for private schools in the 2028-29 budget period. Then who knows how high it will soar? Meanwhile, our under-funded public schools will see their financial problems increase - and more teachers disappear from classrooms – as they continue to educate most of Texas' students.

Several states with existing voucher programs have within a few years dramatically increased tax funding for private schools while reducing appropriations for public education. We believe the same thing will happen in Texas, considering the fiscal note on the Senate bill and the millions of dollars that school privatization advocates have contributed to Abbott's provoucher campaign.

The simple truth is that Texas taxpayers cannot afford two separate education systems, one public and one private. And they cannot afford to give tax subsidies to wealthy families with kids already in private school, many of whom will receive vouchers under this bill.

According to a report released two years ago by the Southern Poverty Law Center and the Education Law Center, states with some of the longer records with vouchers have seen substantial increases in state funding for vouchers over the years as per-student funding for public schools has declined. The report is linked at the end of this statement.

Florida – This state, like some other states, has multiple voucher programs, and spending on three of the oldest programs increased by 313 percent between

2008-2019, while per-pupil funding for public education was cut by 12 percent.

Arizona - Increased spending on voucher programs by 270 percent between 2008-2019, while reducing per-pupil funding for public education by 5.7 percent. Then, a few years ago, Arizona adopted a universal voucher program similar to SB 2, which soon helped blow a hole in the state budget.

Georgia - Increased spending on vouchers by 883 percent between 2009-2019, while trimming perpupil spending on public schools by 1.9 percent.

Indiana - Increased voucher spending by 796 percent between 2012-2019 and cut per-pupil spending on public education by 1.5 percent.

Wisconsin - Increased spending on vouchers by 119 percent between 2008-2019, while essentially freezing per-pupil spending on public schools.

Ohio – This voucher state increased per-pupil spending on public education by 14.2 percent between 2008-2019 but increased voucher spending by 416 percent.



# Why can't we deport more white criminal aliens?

The progressive response to President Donald Trump's deportations is just getting underway, and it's already dumb and hysteri-

According to MSNBC hosts Nicole Wallace and Joy Reid, we are potentially headed down the path of another Holocaust. "Similarities to what happened in Germany and what's happening now in America are just undeniable," Reid said the other day.

A common refrain is that the criminal illegal aliens who are being targeted are overwhelmingly Black and brown, proving that something nefarious is afoot. Leave it to progressives to see in these deportees not, first and foremost, violent offenders who represent a threat to the public, but people of color who are inherently victims.

Al Sharpton asserted on MSNBC's "Morning Joe" that "we're looking for people of a certain Black or brown color." On "The View," Sunny Hostin explained that the Trump deportations are going out of their way to target "a certain group or type of immigrant." Hostin believes that there are a lot of Asian and European visa-overstayers who are getting off scotfree while the administration goes after immigrants coming over the border because of the color of their

"So I think there's a very clear message as to what this president wants the look of a criminal migrant to look like," she said, adding, "I think that's racist," to the applause of the studio audience.

This is predictably illinformed. According to the Migration Policy Institute, in 2022, 80% of all illegal immigrants in the United States were from Latin America and the Caribbe-

The top five countries of origin were Mexico (45% of illegals), Guatemala (7%), El Salvador (6%), Honduras (5%), and India (3%). No European country made the top 10. Altogether, illegal immigrants from Europe, Canada and Oceania were

The picture is overwhelmingly of non-white illegal immigrants, who are coming from poor countries with some geographical proximity to us. This is a fact. It has nothing to do with how Trump "wants" illegal immigrants to look. If ICE undertakes entirely randomized raids, 80% of the people it finds are going to be Black and brown.

Now, the raids aren't random --they, at the moment, are largely, if not entirely, targeting criminal aliens.

As a general matter, criminal offending is associated with low levels of education and socioeconomic status. That doesn't mean that all poor people are criminals. But you are likelier to get entangled with the law if you are an immigrant who hasn't graduated high school, compared with one who has a medical degree. (The same is true of the U.S.-born population.)

So, why isn't ICE cuffing lots of, say, Indian illegal immigrants? If we assume

that the demographic characteristics of Indian illegal immigrants are broadly consonant with -- although not exactly the same as --Indian immigrants generally, they'll have a different profile than other illegal immigrants.

The Migration Policy Institute notes, "On average, Indian immigrants are highly skilled and earn significant incomes: the vast majority hold a bachelor's degree or higher, their median income is more than double that of the U.S. -and overall foreign-born populations, and their likelihood of living in poverty is half that of these groups."

Hostin cited visa-overstayers, and there are a fair amount from Canada. But, again, they are travelers and students coming from a relatively affluent, welleducated country and so are unlikely to be mixed up with, say, prison gangs. What's the French-Canadian equivalent of Tren de Aragua?

Of course, every illegal immigrant should be subject to deportation, but however we draw the line, the criminal migrant, as Hostin put it, is never going to look how she and fellow race-obsessed commentators want.

The logic of their view is that it's racist to keep out non-white illegal immigrants, racist to make them go, and, at the end of the day, racist to have a country that takes its borders seri-

And they wonder why they are losing.





# **Contract Bridge**

When a defender is reasonably sure he can set an opposing contract, he naturally considers doubling. Before he actually utters that word, however, the defender should consider whether he might be giving away information that will help declarer make a contract that might otherwise fail.

Opening lead — three of clubs.

Take this case where West doubled four hearts and led the three of clubs. South had no trouble diagnosing the three as a singleton, since the deuce

was in dummy and the bidding marked West with length in spades and hearts.

Declarer won the club with the queen and, utilizing his knowledge of West's hand to the fullest, cashed the ace of hearts, disdaining a finesse. When East showed out, as expected, South led another heart toward the J-8.

West put up the king since declarer would finesse the eight if the heart was ducked. Furthermore, West wanted to lock declarer in dummy and force him to lead a diamond or a club.

So, after taking the heart king, West played the ace and another spade to dummy's king. Declarer cashed the jack of hearts and then made the key play, leading the diamond king from dummy. This rendered the defense helpless. (If declarer had led a low diamond instead, East could have won the trick and given West a club ruff to defeat the contract.)

West took the king of diamonds with the ace, but when he tried to cash the queen, declarer ruffed and drew West's ten of trump with the queen. South then claimed, discarding his fourth spade on one of dummy's good clubs.

It's true that South might have made four hearts without the double by West, but the double left declarer with no doubt about how to proceed.






