Village, Library races contested, McLane, Reed re-elected to SISD

Saladoans will have full ballots for the May 3 General Election.

Seven candidates have filed for three two-year terms on the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen.

Candidates in alphabetical order are Gail Allard II, Neil Dunch, Scott Hamilton, James (Jim) Lassiter, Jesse Mondragon, JoAnn Purser and Allen Sandor. Linda Reynolds withdrew her application on Feb. 18.

Eight candidates have filed for three two-year terms on the Salado Public Library District Board of Directors. They are Becky Michelle Hupport (incumbent), Christine Lanham, Philip Ray Lindner, Robert John Macko, Jr., Jill McKinney, Barbara Morris (incumbent), Dana Rojas, and

Stephen Sequeira. Incumbent Emmy Alvarez withdrew her name from the ballot.

The ballot will include a tax rollback for the Village of Salado to roll back the property tax from \$0.4860 per \$100 valuation to the Voter Approval Rate of \$0.3612 per \$100 valuation.

Amy McLane and Jim Reed will both be re-elected to three-year terms on the Salado Independent School District Board of Trustees.

The last day to register to vote or make a change of address effective for the May 3 election is April 3.

The first day of in-person Early Voting is April 22. The last day of in-person Early Voting is April 29. Polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 3.

Village sees 31.2% jump in sales tax

Bell County and the Village of Salado both exceeded the state in the February states tax rebate checks that were sent out by the Comptroller last week.

The Village of Salado saw a dramatic 31.2% increase in sales tax rebates for February 2025, when compared to 2024.

The Village will receive \$125,962.34, compared to last February's payment of \$96,027,43. For the calendar year, the Village has received \$203,956.87, an increase of 15.7% over 2024 year-to-date payments of \$176,315.42.

Bell County showed a 22% increase in sales tax

revenues compared to 2024. The County's February payment is \$4.09 million, compared to \$3.35 million last February. For the year, the county is 12.8% ahead, having received \$6.86 million, compared to \$6.09 million through February 2024.

The Village is one of three Bell County cities to levy a 1-cent sales tax, while seven other Bell County cities levy a 1.5 cent sales tax and Rogers levies a 1.25 cent sales tax.

The Salado Public Library District and Bell County each levy a half-cent sales tax.

For that half-cent tax, Salado Public Library District received a \$96,092.64 February check, which was 29.8% more than last February's payment of \$74,006.39. For the year, the Library received \$163,192.94, which is 17.8% more than the \$138,579.21 paid through February 2024.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar sent cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts \$1.5 billion in local sales tax allocations for February, 9.4 percent more than in February 2024.

These allocations are based on sales made in December by businesses that report tax monthly; October, November and December sales by quarterly filers; and 2024 sales by businesses that report tax annually.

Cities received \$936.2 million in sales tax rebate check, an increase of 8.7% over February 2024.

Counties received \$89.8 million, an increase of 13.2% over February 2024.

The comptroller sent \$311.4 million to transit systems for February, an increase of 6.1% over February 2024.

Special purpose districts received \$149.7 million for February, 19.6% more than February 2024.

Threat of tariffs may be causing spike in prices

venerable, and somewhat flawed indicator of the general direction of the U.S. stock market values, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), had a good week. The Index was up 1.47% for the week, closing at 6114.63, after taking a dip mid-week as traders tried to figure out whose ox would be gored by what tariff. The SPX is almost 4% higher this year, up about 22% from last year at this time, and nearly 39% higher than three years ago. The other stock index we follow, the CRSP US Mid-Cap Value Index, as it seems to us to provide a better indicator of what the mainstream U.S. stock values are doing, was up 0.11% to 2849.68 at Friday's close, 1.87% higher than when the year began, and about 15% higher than a year ago.

The benchmark 10year U.S. Treasury rate fell about half a percent to end the week at 4.47% but remains about 5% higher than last year at this time when it was yielding 4.27%, and the yield is an astonishing 126% higher from three years ago when the yield was 1.96%. Fortunately for those who own U.S. Treasury money market funds, the very short-term Treasury obligations remained around 4.4%. The Treasury yield curve remained positive, with the 20-year bond yielding 4.75%. The price of a barrel of West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) showed little change for the week as the price was \$70.62 at the close of U.S. trading, but that oneweek view missed the rise to \$73.61 mid-day Tuesday, and a second price spike that occurred mid-day Friday. commodities are spooked.
The Economy

We have to pour over the data in some weeks to find the most relevant economic data. In other weeks, it is clear that one data point is significant. This week was one of the latter.

For the past couple of

years, inflation, as measured by the Labor Department's Consumer Price Index (CPI), has gradually declined, with the annual one-year trailing rate falling to around 2.5% late last vear. The release of the January 2025 report indicates a reversal in that trend. The 12-month trailing CPI rose to 3.0%, but perhaps the more alarming statistic is that the last two months have seen a substantial increase, with January's onemonth CPI hitting 0.5%, an annualized increase of 6%. If we pull the highly volatile food and fuel numbers out of the tally, revealing the "core" CPI, the picture doesn't improve as the socalled "core CPI" has risen 3.3% in the last 12 months.

So what caused this, and what is it likely to mean? A lot has been and is being written about this, but it is clear that prices started to climb as soon as the election results were finalized. Why? First, it seems logical to us that if a President is elected who has promised to impose high-level tariffs, there will be a rush to purchase things that may be subject to those tariffs. The law of supply and demand states that prices will rise if there is a sudden rise in demand with no accompanying increase in supply. The problem with that explanation is that commercial goods inventories declined in January, suggesting that commercial hoarding has not occurred. If businesses were accelerating purchases to avoid tariffs, one would think that their unsold inventory would rise. Another flaw in that logic is that

the most significant price increase among commodities was a 2.2% rise in the price of used cars and small trucks.

Inflation is the prime factor in short-term interest rates because anyone loaning money wants to receive back a little more than inflation in short-term. high-quality loans. It is also a significant factor in intermediate rates for the same reason. However, inflation is primarily driven by consumer expectations, at least in the United States, and collectively, the U.S. consumer sometimes appears to be surprisingly sophisticated. For example, because of the average quantity of steel and aluminum used in a typical car or small truck, a careful analysis of what a 25% tariff on steel and aluminum would do to the price of the average car reveals that it will increase the U.S. sales price by about 3%. In the end, an import tariff is a federal sales tax. Since our experience has shown that a tariff will raise the cost of imported goods and domestic manufacturers will raise their prices by the same amount, 3% inflation suddenly looks rational. With more tariffs in the works, combined with a reduction in the number of people available to perform manual labor, we consider it very likely that inflation will continue to be higher than the Fed's target and that interest rates will remain higher than we have seen in the past couple of

decades.

Meanwhile, U.S. economic growth still appears to be healthy. However, given the ongoing interest rate environment and limited infrastructure capacity in the U.S., we may be near capacity in some areas. We can confidently state that we are in uncharted territory as international trade adjusts to a new tariff regime from the world's largest purchaser.

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
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
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

Local historian to discuss relocation of cemeteries for Stillhouse Dam

Salado Museum and College Park will host a presentation by renowned historian Keith George in the Lucile A. Robertson Center at 10 a.m. March 1.

George is a member of the Bell County Historical Commission as Vice Chair and Chairs its Preservation and Grants Committees. His talk will focus on the Stillhouse Hollow Dam project which necessitated the relocation of cemeteries from the valley along the Lampasas River where many of Salado's early settlers were buried. The event is free and open to the public with donations welcome at the door.

"Following George's presentation, museum staff members will hold a tour of our historic Salado Museum building and the Salado College ruins on College Hill," says Lynette Jones, Museum Executive Director. "The tour will include a brief history of Texas Independence Day and the significant role Empresario Sterling Robertson played in establishing the Republic

of Texas on March 2, 1836."

In 1825, Robertson acquired lands grants from Mexico and is credited with bringing 600 families to this area, mostly of Scottish ancestry, to form the first large colony in Central Texas. In 1859 his son Col. Elijah Sterling C. Robertson donated land to a corporation formed to build a college and lay out and sell lots for a town to be called Salado. "During the tour on College Hill, attendees will view the statue of Colonel Robertson in which he is depicted in his Republic of Texas uniform," Jones adds.

Today, the mission of the Salado Museum is to promote and preserve the pioneer history of Salado

through educational and literary programs and exhibits that document the settlement and heritage of the area. The museum maintains the ruins and grounds of Salado College built in 1860 by visionary pioneers who established a co-educational facility for students grade one through two years of college based on the then unconventional belief that both men and women deserved equal access to higher education in a nondenominational setting.

Texas Independence Day is the celebration of the adoption of the Texas Declaration of Independence on March 2, 1836. With this document, signed by 59 delegates, settlers in Mexican Texas officially declared independence from Mexico and created the Republic of

Texas.

The Salado Museum and College Park is a 501(c) (3) non-profit organization located in a historic stone building at 423 South Main Street in Salado across from the Stagecoach Inn. College Park is located just south of the museum. Donations are always welcome and volunteers are always needed to help maintain this important part of Salado's history. www.saladomuseum.org.


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






Shopping Map of Salado

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
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
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House takes up vouchers

The first bill in Texas regarding private school vouchers/Education ings Accounts (ESAs) was filed back in 1956. Thus, the Texas Legislature has been debating private school vouchers/ESAs for almost 70 years.

However, none of these bills have ever passed both the Texas Senate and the Texas House. That trend continued in 2023 during the regular legislative session and four additional special sessions. While the majority of the Texas Senate supported school vouchers/ESAs, the majority of the Texas House did not.

Governor Abbott posted on his Facebook page on January 4, "2025 will be the year that Texas PASSES school choice!" However, school choice has already existed for 100 years. The U.S. Supreme Court ruled in 1925 that the right to choose a private education is protected by the 14th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution. Thus, parents already have the choice to enroll their children in public school, private school, homeschool, or charter school.

Of course not all families can afford private school. If the goal of vouchers/ESAs is school choice, then the vouchers/ESAs should only be provided to economically disadvantaged families. However, if vouchers/ESAs are provided to families that can already afford private school, then they will not increase school choice and will instead use those taxpayer dollars to subsidize private school for the wealthy.

The Texas Senate approved Senate Bill 2 on February 5. This bill allocates \$1 billion for private school vouchers/ESAs.

Superintendent's Corner

Unfortunately, the income limits set by this bill would allow wealthy families (that can already afford private school) to receive these vouchers/ESAs. Instead of using the income limits set for free or reduced meal eligibility in public schools (which 62.3% of students in Texas public schools qualify), this bill sets the income limits at FIVE TIMES the federal poverty thresholds. Thus, this bill sets the income limits at \$133,250 for family of three, \$160,750 for a family of four, and \$188,250 for a family of five. Furthermore, these income limits would only apply to 80% of the vouchers/ESAs and the remaining 20% could go to families without any income limits.

Senate Bill 2 also does

same academic accountability and transparency for private schools that accept taxpayer funded vouchers/ ESAs.

Furthermore, Senate Bill 2 does not apply financial accountability to private schools. All Texas public schools receive a Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas (FIRST) score annually based on 21 different financial indicators and resulting in a score from 0 to 100. Salado ISD earned a score of 98 out of 100 on our most recent financial accountability rating. Senate Bill 2 would not apply this financial accountability to private schools receiving taxpayer funded vouchers/ ESAs.

Senate Bill 2 will now be considered by the Texas amendments financial



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
